

PROTECT THE FARMER.

In last evening's issue of The Planet appeared an editorial comment on the much needed revision of the tariff, commending Mr. H. S. Clements, M. P., on the excellent and popular stand taken by him in the House on Friday, In view of the fact that the government seems inclined to do nothing towards this important reform, Mr. Clements has quite properly taken up arms in the interests of the farmers, who, under present conditions are working under a great and serious disadvantage, and is pressing the Premier for Premier for a fulfilment of Liberal pre-election pledges, and urging the Government to adopt some legislation which will tend toward bring-

ing about equality of tariffs. Mr. Clements is not alone in his fight against the present policy of the Government, He is backed by every agriculturist in the Dominion. The Toronto Mail and Empire also in following up along the same lines adopted by Mr. Clements in his speech in the house, has the following to say editorially:

There is one free trade proposition that the Ottawa Ministers and their organs have still the courage to maintain-namely, that protection is valueless to the farmer. Evidently they think that the farmer has no such keen sense of the possibilities of the home market as the manufactura er has and that he has little appreciation of the advantage it would give him in that market to have his

products adequately protected. At all events, while ministers have become discreetly silent about free trade in relation to other depart. ments of industry, they think it quite safe to keep on insisting that agriculture can stand it. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Cobden medalist, and Fielding who was to have taken the axe to the tariff, saw their way to the adoption of a duty of \$7 a ton on steel rails, but they put corn on the free list. They presume too much on the simplicity of the agriculturists. In the United States the farmers are protectionists, as manufacturers are protectionists, from motives of self-interest. The McKinley tariff hedged about the domestic market with duties that barred the entrance of agricultural products of other. ments of industry, they think it quite of agricultural products of other countries. The tariff dealt an almost finishing blow to barley-raising in this country and gave a great impetus to it in the United States. The American farmers resented the Wilson Bill of the Democrats as much as the manufacturers did. In the Dingley Act the farmers have the protection they wanted. It is not to be supposed that our farmers are less wide-awake than their competitors across the line. What the latter have found good would be good for the Canadian farmers, and they are entitled to have it. They will not be content to have the balance of trade in agricultural products constantly increasing in favor of the farmers in the United States.

Mr. Clements' timely speech on this subject in the House on Friday will strike a responsive chord throughout agricultural Canada. The Dominion Government is understood to be desirous that as many as possible of the immigrants from abroad shall be farmers. It is very sensitive to mints that its agents in Great Britain and on the Continent encourage tain and on the Continent encourage skilled workmen to come here, but it cannot have too many agricultural it cannot have too many agricultural could go anywhere, but a case of newcomers. It cares not how much it increases competition in the production of Canadian grain, roots, live stock, dairy products, etc. The more our farmers increase in number and in the volume of their production, the more should the products of foreign agriculturists be excluded from the Canadian market."

#### TIMELY LEGISLATION.

During the last night of the recent session of the Ontario Legislature a measure of special importance to farmers was adopted. The act provides in effect that all agreements or stipulations providing for trial of action at a particular place shall be null and void. This law will compell the trial of all Division Court suits against farmers and others at the Court nearest which the defendant resides, unless the whole cause of action has arisen in some other place. In the case of County and High Count actions, it is left t the judge to direct that the trial shall take place at the most convenient and least expensive place for trial. Manufacturers of implements and nurserymen, in selling on time, have been in the habit of inserting a clause in their agreements of sale that, in pase of litigation arising, the case Mall be tried in the Court nearest the seller's headquarters. These agreements are now rendered null and void, and trial will take place at the point most convenient for defendant.

A Few Suggestions For Appropriate

For those who are planning to build a bungalow or cottage here are a few suggestions. It is not supposed for a moment that every woman who has become interested in home handicraft can do all of these things unaided. Some can, for the things are not very hard. But those who cannot do all the work themselves can surely do the thinking part and by the aid of a very ordinary workman achieve any of the objects here described. The bungalow to which we refer is to be built of un finished logs, and straight young sap-lings or the straight limbs of older trees are chosen as a material for interior decoration.
Unfinished timbers are used to very

good advantage as a grill, and they look well, too, in other than log houses. To make the grill seen in the picture to make the grill seen in the picture two slightly curved branches three or four inches in diameter were selected. It is generally easier to find two short ones with nearly the same curve, which may be fastened in the center, which may be fastened in the center, the company of the content of the content of the center of ones with nearly the same curve, which may be fastened in the center, than one long one that will make the entire arch. This arch is fastened securely against the side posts of the doorway, and between the arch and

It seems unnecessary to give dimensions, as each one can decide this for herself, according to the space or place it is to occupy.—Good Housekeeping.



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

#### STRAWBERRY TIME.

DAINTY AND VARIOUS WAYS OF SERVING THE FRUIT.

A Recruit In the Gastronomic Army, Strawberry Salad - The Fruit Now Eaten With a Fork - Individual Dishes.

Strawberry season is with us once more, and any new way to serve the delicious little fruit is welcomed by the housewife.

Strawberry salad may certainly take rank as a recruiting dish in the gastronomic army. For this seasonable salad arrange strawberries in a china bowl and mix with them two bananas cut in slices, one apple very thinly cut, one orange cut in sections and free from pith, A few stoned French plums are very good, but may be omitted. When these fruits are prepared have ready a sirup made from three table-spoonfuls of white sugar, half a pint of water and a squeeze of lemon juice boiled together for five minutes. When slightly cooled pour this over the fruit and when ready to serve pour over all a gill of maraschino or sherry.

Strawberry jelly and whipped cream always make a delicious dessert for dinner or luncheon. Take a pound of sugar, half a pint of cold water, half a package of gelatin, the juice of a lem-



INDIVIDUAL DISH AND STRAWBERRY FORK on, a pint of boiling water. Soak the gelatin in the cold water for half an hour; add this to the sugar and lemons and pour over all the pint of boiling water. Stir until the gelatin is thoroughly dissolved. Before the jelly is put in the mold add a quart of ripe, fresh strawberries. Wet the mold with cold water; then fill with jelly and set away to cool. Just before bringing to table pour over the jelly whipped cream containing half a cupful of powdered sugar and flavored with strawberry juice. Haspberries and peaches are good substitutes for strawberries.

Charlotte de fraises, or strawberry charlotte, is made by lining a plain mold with halves of lady fingers. Then make a sirup of one pound of sugar and one pint of water. Let it boil and when clear add three-quarters of a pound of picked strawberries. Bell up, but do not let the berries break. Pour into the mold while hot, closely cover and let it stand. When set pour out and pile whipped cream on top. The sirup should be heavy enough to "set," but if there is any doubt add a little gelatin.

Still another way of preparing strawberries is to line a pie dish with short

still another way of preparing strawberries is to line a pie dish with short pastry and bake in a moderate oven for five minutes. Mix three heaping tablespoonfuls of flour with a small quantity of milk until it is cream. Sweeten to taste. Boil the remainder of the pint of milk and add to it the mixed milk and flour, stirring all the time. Pour in a saucepan, bring to a boil and pour into the pastry lined ple dish. Bake until a light brown in a moderate oven. This pie cuts like blancmange and is delicious when eaten with fresh strawberries and cream. The new silver berry bowls in which the fresh fruit may be charmingly piled are beautiful. The gray finished silver is particularly stunning, and a really handsome berry bowl of sterling silver may be bought at a silversmith's for \$25. The silver individual dishes are lovely, with their, shell-like shapes and handles adorned with strawberries. Very new, too, are the strawberry forks, a more up to date appliance with which to eat the luscious berries than the old fashioned spoon.

Brides Now Wear Two Vells.
Brides to be who have gone to Paris for their clothes and have filled their trunks with lovely apparel say that there is a fad over there for the wearing of two wedding vells. One is of brussels lace and the other of tulle. The tulle vell has the advantage of not disarranging an elaborate coiffure. A bride who introduced this idea in Paris wore the veil of orthodox tulle over the face, while hanging down her back was the rich brussels lace drapery, looped up in graceful folds, with sprays of orange blossoms behind the ears. There is little doubt that the bride who wishes to have just a touch of originality to set her costume apart from the conventional will be much taken with the idea.

A Bath For Hardwood Floors.
