

MR. GRAHAM'S PLEDGES.

The new Minister of Railways started out with a beautiful program. He says that the Intercolonial must be made free from political control and operated on business principles. There are to be no more political appointments, no more political and party consideration in railway contracts, or railway freight rates or in the improvements and operations of the line. The same announcement came from Mr. Emmerson when he took office, and in the next election year he producad a deficit of nearly two million dollars made by campaign expenditures on the railway. The business management of Mr. Graham's essor involved the Moncton land deal, the Truro land deal, the Halifax land deal, the Eastern Supply purchases, the oil contracts, and other transactions which savor more of politics and of graft than of straight railway business.

Mr. Graham may intend to do better, but he is not beginning well, for in the very week when he is promising a business management his colleague, Mr. Pugsley, is running an election in St. John in the same old manner, promising revised railway rattes, increased accommodation at stations, more suburban trains, more warehouses, increases of railway men's pay and all sorts of concessions with which Mr. Pugsley as Minister of Public Works has nothing whatever to do. Mr. Graham makes himself a party to this political use of the railway by allowing it to go on, thus showing that his pledges are vain and that he is following the same old path.

### THE COUNTRYMAN'S TURN.

The area of a kingdom has been thrown to political favorites under the form of Saskatchewan land grants, grazing and irrigation conces For this same land the farmer will pay high prices to the political beneficiary. Nothing has been done to protect the Western settler from the extortion of the land grabber, the holder of timber leases, the coal mine owner and the various other monopolists who have been favored by the Government. Mr. Borden hinks that it is time to consider the man who does the work in the country, the original producer of all, the principal taxpayer, the great consumer of imports, the man for who the railways carry, the man who pays the postage, who owns or ought to own the public franchises and the public domain.

# CONFESSED HIS CRIME

But Police Thought It Was Only a Delusion.

David Glass Under Agrest at Washington Says He Burned Two Barne and Tried to Murder His Cousin Escaped From Jail at St. Johns Four Years Ago-Joined the Unit-

Four Years Ago—Joined the United States Army.

Washington, D.C., Sept. 20.—Daniel Glass, a former resident of Canada and member of the United States Hospital Corps, who was locked up on Monday by Detective Weedon and Detective Boriney, after he had confessed that he burned two barns belonging to his cousin, Frank Miller, and had attempted to murder him, while living near Roxhsm, Que., was re-arrested Wednesday night upon the request of the police. Additional messages from Canadian authorities had been received, requesting that he be taken into custody.

The story told by Glass of his crimes near Roxham, Quebec, and of his subsequent escape from jail at St. Johns four years ago, was not credited by the police. They believed the young man, who had suffered from attacks of nervounness, imagined he had committed the crimes alleged, but a message from Canadian officials give information that he had told the truth. The same message also stated that the authorities would not stand the expense of returning him there for trial, and he was released.

The Canadian authorities, however, seem to have changed their minds in the matter of his return, two messages received by Inspector Boardman Wednesday night indicating that he is wanted there, and that an officer will come for him.

Upon receipt of the messages, Inspector Boardman sent word to the barracks to have the military authorities detain him. Capt. Ashford had arranged for the formal discharge of the Canadian, saying he wanted nobody in his command who was under such charges, but the discharge papers had not arrived, and Glass was still in the service. It was expected that Glass would be turned over to the police authorities yesterday, but when Detective Weeden went to get him he was informed that an enlisted man could not be extradited until he had been discharge in about a week or ten days, and the police will then take him into custody. Meanwhile he is being kept under guard at the barracks.

Golden Text-Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His Saints.-Psl. 116-15.

At God's command—see Deut. 32, 49-50—Moses ascends Mount Nebo to de, although his eye was not dim nor his natural force abated. Why is this penalty visited and exacted from such a devoted servant of God't In the wilderness of Zin the people of Israel murmured against Moses and Aaron and against God, who was leading them by the pillar of cloud and fire—because there was no water. God directed both these leaders to gather the people before a great rock and to command or speak to the rock before the eyes of all Israel, that it give forth its water. See Num. 20, 8. Instead of doing so they addressed the people and said, Here, now ,ye rebels, shall we bring you forth water out of this rock? And Moses smote the rock with his rod twice, and the water came abundantly.

It was not righteous indignation on Moses' part; not the fruit of the Spirit, but the fruit of the flesh and the carnal mind, and prevented a God-designed type of the Rock Christ Jesus, once for all stricken on Calvary for our sin, and to d'e no more, but now exalted a Prince and a Saviour to give the Holy Spirit to them that ask. Moses' and Aaron's presumption dishonored God in the eyes of Israel and spoiled the double type of Jesus on the cross and Jesus on the right hand of God for us—The Rock of Ages.

This is a grand end of a great life. At last the wilderness is past, the hot dry sands, the fiery serpents, the weary marches, the desert graves, the slow, sad schoolings and mutitered grumblings, all past; and here before Moses, in full view is the promised land flowing with milk and honey. He could not sing, "Tve reached the land of corn and wine," but he could sing, "Nearer my God to Thee, e'en though it be a cross that raiseth me."

His silence has mystified the delegates and they are displaying their resentment by placing an order for to-day's executive session for the consideration of united political action by labor interests.

Paris, Sept. 20.—(C. A. P.)—The Franco-Canadian treaty was signed yesterday at the Foreign Office by the British ambassador, Messrs. Fielding, Brodeur and Pichon'; Caillaux, Doumergue and Ruan. Hon. Messrs. Brodeur and Fielding go to London this week and will sail on the Victorian for Canada.

The same secrecy observed throughout the negotiations is still maintained regarding the provisions of the Franco-Canadian treaty, which, it is intended, will not be made known until officially communicated to the Canadian Parliament. If the negotiations have been anusually protracted, it is not owing to any particular divergence of views so much as to the minute attention of the Canadian representatives to details and precautions they had taken to prevent any chance of a future misunderstanding or misinterpretation.

Both Canadian and French delegates are much pleased at the result, which is hailed as a commercial success.

## THE LOCAL MAIL SERVICE

People of Chatham Complain That Morning Mail Is Late

Petition Should be Made to Get a Better Train Service

For some time past bankers, business men and others, have made frequent complaints because of the late hour at which they receive morning mail from the east. Of late, these complaints have become more pronounced. The delay in receiving mail is cited as a great drawback to business, and valuable time is often lost in this way.

Relative to recent complaints, a Planet reporter called on Postmaster Sam. Barboot yesterday afternoon, and inquired as to the cause.

"The mail is sorted just as promptly as we can get it," said Mr. Barfoot in reply. "There are two morning mail trains—one at 8.30 and another at 8.37. The mail carrier has to await the arrival of both these trains before he can bring the mail to the post office. Supposing that these trains arrive on time—which is not a regular happening—and you allow ten minutes for the carrier to bring the mail to the post office, and for the clerks to get it in chape for distribution, it would then be 8.47. This, you can see, does not allow very much time for our staff to get it all sorted and in the boxes before nine o'clock.

"The norning mail is the heaviest mail we have to handle during the entire staff is called into requisition, and everyone husties their portion of the work up as promptly as possible. We endeavor to get this mail up with the fastest possible speed. Doing our very best, it would be impossible for us to get that mail all up and in readiness for the public before 9.30, even supposing that the trains were always on time.

"We make it a point to put up the bankers and business men's mail first."

It will be seen from this that the only possible remedy for the late morning mails would be a better

As most people will admit, Postmaster Barloot and his staff are all quite efficient and thorough in their work, and they make their best efforts to give entire satisfaction.
