## McCOIG TALKS ABOUT CANADA LAND COMPANY

His Statements as Reported However are Directly Contrary to The Truth—False Impressions Going Around About "What McCoig Has Done"

Mr. A. B. McCoig, M. P. P., referred to the way in which he and Mr. Add had forced the Whitney Government to put through a bill, giving to the farmers the mining rights which had been withheld from them by the Canada Land Company.

The above appeared in yesterday's morning's press report of the speeches delivered at the Liberal picnic held in Windsor the day before. To those acquainted with the facts, and especially those of this county, where the conditions of the Canada Company dispute are well known, the falsity of such statements as those quoted above is well known and indisputably apparent.

The portion of the speech quoted from the report appeared yesterday morning. It is presumed that the report is correct, for although a full day has passed since it appeared in print, it has not been denied by Mr. McCoig's local political organ. In any event, Mr. McCoig is culpable, for he is allowing it to be circulated throughout the country, credited to him, without a single word of protest.

It is looked upon in many quarters as very peculiar that Mr. McCoig should go to what was intended to be a big Liberal event in a neighboring constituency, and his own organ should come out the next night with almost a column about the affair, and not even a word about McCoig being there. It is also hinted that the local Liberal organ realized that the printing of such statements from a man who is supposed to be in touch with what is going on would seriously handicap his chances of receiving public confidences.

As a matter of fact no such bill as the one Mr. McCoig speaks of has ever been passed by the Government. On the contrary, until certain legal points are determined, such a bill is impossible, as has been pointed out to McCoig several times. The Government is, at the present time, under the direction of the Hon. Mr. Foy, trying to establish these points in the courts, for the purpose of providing the relief for the farmers that they desire. So that the statement that McCoig "forced the Whitney Government" to put through such a bill is preposterous in the extreme.

Last March, McCoig introduced a bill in the Legislature, the first clause of which was to declare that the Canada Company had no power to reserve the mineral and oil rights in the lands which they granted to the purchasers, and that such reservation was null and void. The second clause provided that where the Canada Company had already granted a license to oil operators to go on lands in which they reserved these rights, it should be valid, but the farmer should share in the money, received by the Canada Company for such license.

This was pronounced by the leading lawyers as a most unrighteous bill, and impossible to enact or en-

force. Mr. Foy told McCoig that if he would withdraw the bill he would do what he could to assist the farmers who own Canada Company land where mining rights are reserved, to ascertain their rights in the matter.

Mr. Foy then wrote to Mr. Thos. Scullard, of this city, and asked that gentleman to go to Toronto to discuss the whole matter with him. Mr. Scullard did go to Toronto, and went into the matter fully with Mr. Foy and the leading counsel of Toronto. As a result of that visit Mr. Scullard was instructed by the Minister to insert an ad. in the newspapers, asking the farmers to hand in any information which would assist the Government in establishing their rights. This ad. has already appeared in the Banner several times.

The Government is willing to assist anyone who has a grievance in this matter in bringing the case before the courts to ascertain what their rights are. When these rights are ascertained, the Attorney General will consider the most appropriate legislation to be passed to help these people.

It has been found that the most of the farmers heard from since the ad. appeared have made arrangements with the operators. These will, of course, be out of court as through dealing with the operators, and allowing them to enter their lands, they have practically acknowledged the rights of the Canada Company to reserve the minerals. There are some, however, who refused to allow the operators to go on their lands. It is through these that the action will be brought.

In the meantime, what has McCoig been doing to assist the Government in securing the information which is needed before the farmers' rights can be established? How many of the farmers affected has McCoig brought to Mr. Scullard with a view to helping the fight along?

The only thing that McCoig has done to assist the farmers who own Canada Company land was to bring in a bill, which, had he been less ignorant on points of law, he would never have attempted, because while the Government was in sympathy with the idea aimed at, the actual wording of the bill made it ridiculous and absolutely worthless and impossible. Since then the Government has been conducting a single-handed fight for the farmers of this county. While McCoig has been idle, except for talking about "what he has done," and evidently trying to mix things up for the Government worse than they are.

A bill was brought in at the recent session of the Legislature, providing for the assessment of all mineral reservations at their actual value. Mr. McCoig assisted P. H. Bowyer, M. P. P. for East Kent in getting this bill through. Probably this is what McCoig calls "forcing the Whitney Government to put through a bill giving to the farmers the mining rights withheld from them by the Canada Land Co."

REID GETS NINE MONTHS

Penalty For Disobeying Rules and Causing Fatal Wreck

Guelph, Sept. 20.—Engineer Mark B. Reid, who was in the collision at Gourook, where three men were killed, was found guilty on the charge of breaking the rules of the G. T. R. and was sentenced to nine months in prison.

Justice Anglin expressed regret at having to deliver judgment, but it was a duty imposed upon him, and he could not escape it.

He originally intended to sentence him to six months, but taking into consideration that the accused had already suffered mentally and physically, and had lost his position, he had decided to reduce the sentence by three months, and he would see if he could not be confined to the county jail instead of being sent to the Central and herded with criminals.

Reid was visibly affected. Thompson, the conductor, sentenced to three years, was released from the penitentiary after serving nine weeks, and it is expected Reid will also be paroled before long.

Reid, who lives in Hamilton, has served six years on the Grand Trunk. Some years ago he was an engineer on the middle division.

In summing up the case, Mr. Guthrie, who appeared for the defense, said there had clearly been no criminal intent. The defendant had not been over the road for a year. His engine was not satisfactory, and he was acting under the control of a conductor who was asleep.

Mr. Guthrie contended that the orders must have been wrong. The defendant had been doing his best, and had been forced to stay too long on duty.

"In making my decision," said his lordship, "I have taken into consideration the decision rendered there has been disregarded."

In order to keep him clear of criminal association the term was not made in Central Prison.

MUST STRAIGHTEN CURVE.

Inspector Makes Report on Disaster at Caledon Horse-shoe.

Ottawa, Sept. 20.—The Railway Commission inspector, John McCall, has made a report upon the Caledon disaster.

He says the accident was caused by the high rate of speed at which the train was running on a sharp curve.

"If this curve is not straightened out there will be liable to occur a change in route."

Irish Face on U.S. Coins. Harrisburg, Pa., Sept. 20.—The Independent Order of Americans in annual session here has adopted a protest against the proposed placing of the face of Miss Mary Cunningham, an Irish born girl, upon the United States gold coins, and has authorized the state councillor to forward the protest to the United States Government at Washington.

The new coins were designed by St. Gaudens, who modeled the face thereon from Miss Cunningham, a pretty Irish waitress.

New Monster Battleship. Portsmouth, Eng., Sept. 20.—The plans of the Admiralty for a new and larger vessel of the Dreadnought class have been received at the construction department here, accompanied by orders to commence building the warship immediately.

The placement of the new vessel will be placed in the new vessel will be 10,300 tons. The ship here will be launched before the one to be built at Devonport, orders for the construction of which were announced Sept. 16.

Meet Again at the Hague. The Hague, Sept. 20.—The heads of the various delegations present at the International Peace Conference yesterday adopted this resolution:

"The conference recommends to the powers the convocation of a third conference within a period similar to that which elapsed between the former conferences, serving the exact date to be fixed in a common accord by the powers."

Killed Waitress; Shot Himself. New York, Sept. 20.—Johanna Haeder, aged 23 years, a waitress in a Tambo-avenue bakery, yesterday was shot and instantly killed by John Fischer, a former employer of the bakery because she had refused to marry him. Fischer then shot himself and was removed to a hospital in a dying condition.

Kingston Man Killed. Montreal, Sept. 20.—A R. R. brakeman, who was killed in the freight-pitch in St. Yvonne Wednesday night, was Albert Robinson of Kingston. Another man who is dying as a result of injuries is William Metor of Brookville.

Guest of Earl Grey. Montreal, Sept. 20.—Hamar Greenwood, M. P. was in the city for two hours yesterday morning. He left in the afternoon to be the guest of the Governor-General for a day, and will sail for England to-night.

Ann. Puffed Off. Brookville, Sept. 20.—Mr. McLaughlin, well-known Brookville farmer and shrewd, had his arm torn off in a threshing machine. He will recover and return to work.

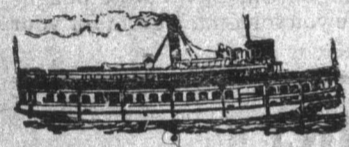

### INTERNATIONAL S. S. LESSON FOR TO-MORROW.

The Death of Moses—Deut. 34, 1-12. Read Deut. 31-34.

Golden Text—Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His Saints.—Ecl. 118-15.

At God's command—see Deut. 32, 49-50—Moses ascends Mount Nebo to die, although his eye was not dim nor his natural force abated. Why is this penalty visited and exacted from such a devoted servant of God? In the wilderness of Zin the people of Israel murmured against Moses and Aaron against God, who was leading them by the pillar of cloud and fire—because there was no water. God directed both these leaders to gather the people before a great rock and to command or speak to the rock before the eyes of all Israel, that it give forth its water. See Num. 20, 8. Instead of doing so they addressed the people and said: Here, now, ye rebels, shall we bring you forth water out of this rock? And Moses smote the rock with his rod twice, and the water came abundantly.

It was not righteous indignation on Moses' part; not the fruit of the Spirit, but the fruit of the flesh and the carnal mind, and prevented a God-designed type of the Rock Christ Jesus, once for all stricken on Calvary for our sin, and to die no more, but now exalted a Prince and a Saviour to give the Holy Spirit to them that ask. Moses' and Aaron's presumption dishonored God in the eyes of Israel and spoiled the double type of Jesus on the cross and Jesus on the right hand of God for us—The Rock of Ages.

This is a grand and of a great life. At last the wilderness is past, the hot dry sands, the fiery serpents, the weary marches, the desert graves, the slow, sad schoolings and muttered grumblings, all past; and here before Moses, in full view is the promised land flowing with milk and honey. He could not sing, "I've reached the land of corn and wine," but he could sing, "Nearer my God to Thee, than though it be a cross that raises me." 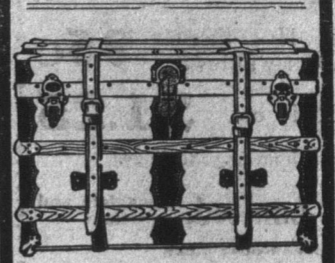

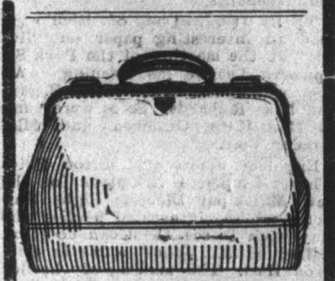

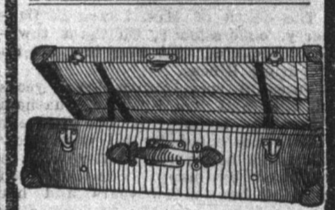

### FIERY TALK OF LIBERAL

Aylesworth Would Like to Cross-Examine Mr. R. L. Borden.

Minister of Justice Indulges in Violent and Abusive Language.

Essex, Sept. 20.—Hon. A. B. Aylesworth was in fighting trim yesterday afternoon when he addressed the Liberals of Essex. "Mr. Robert L. Borden," he said, "wants me to explain my connection with the Gandy case. I call upon him to explain his connection with the Leturgey-Fowler-Pope syndicate. Mr. Aylesworth distinctly intimated that the coming contest would resolve itself into a 'fighting scandal with scandal'."

This attack was so violent and evidently so tinged by personal pique, that his auditors were puzzled, interested, and yet uncertain what to do. He reached the climax by stating that, although Mr. Borden might deny the personal charges brought against him in the Halifax election cases, yet he (Mr. Aylesworth) would not regard such denial as conclusive until Mr. Borden had passed through the ordeal of cross-examination.

Features of the meeting are to be found in the initial announcement by the members of the Legislature present that A. G. MacKay will be chosen as leader of the Provincial Opposition, and in Mr. Derbyshire's positive statement that Parliament will assemble on Nov. 5, Aylesworth.

Hon. A. B. Aylesworth was introduced as a man who "would one day be the Premier of Canada." He said that the issue being today presented by the Conservatives, as he understood it, was to the effect that the present Ministers of the Crown were a band of plunderers. "Was this fair?" he asked of a body of 100. The Tory party in the House was a mere remnant. It amounted to little outside of Ontario. There were but six Conservative members west of Lake Superior. There were none at all from the Provinces of Nova Scotia and British Columbia, yet notwithstanding their weakness in 1904, the Conservatives were looting ground. Last fall North Bruce had deserted the Conservatives and joined the Liberal column. Wednesday the great Conservative riding of St. John's N. B., had declared itself in favor of the Laurier Government.

There had been a great outcry, the Minister said, about his attack upon Mr. Borden. He had merely said what he now repeated, namely, that the petitioners in the Halifax election cases had submitted to him their case. As a lawyer he told them that if they could prove that case, they would not only win, but they would disqualify Mr. Borden for eight years. Mr. Borden had lived all his life in Nova Scotia, yet in 1904 he was discredited by every count in that province. He had never forgiven Mr. Fielding for that castigation.

Mr. Borden had referred to the Gamey case. What was there in that? Take the recent account in the Mail and Empire, which amounts to nothing. It simply comes to this, that Mr. Gamey, who was looking for a purchaser, had come to him (Mr. Aylesworth), and he had ordered him out of his office. Mr. Aylesworth then referred to the Graham testimony at Montreal. Mr. Graham had given \$30,000 for the Quebec City district alone. Was this given for legitimate purposes? Mr. Aylesworth recalled that his own election in West Durham had amounted to \$1,400 in North York, or a little more. "Mr. Borden has condescended to deny that he wrote this letter," Mr. Aylesworth admitted, "but this, after all, merely creates an issue between him and his friend, Mr. Graham. Can Mr. Graham be mistaken? He is corroborated by all the surrounding circumstances. His testimony is given under the sanction of an oath."

THE LOCAL MAIL SERVICE

People of Chatham Complain That Morning Mail Is Late

Petition Should be Made to Get a Better Train Service

For some time past bankers, business men and others, have made frequent complaints because of the late hour at which they receive morning mail from the east.

Relative to recent complaints, a Planet reporter called on Postmaster Sam. Barfoot yesterday afternoon, and inquired as to the cause.

"The mail is sorted just as promptly as we can get it," said Mr. Barfoot in reply. "There are two morning mail trains—one at 8.30 and another at 8.37. The mail carrier has to await the arrival of both these trains before he can bring the mail to the post office.

"The morning mail is the heaviest mail we have to handle during the entire day. When it comes in, the entire staff is called into requisition, and everyone hustles their portion of the work up as promptly as possible.

It will be seen from this that the only possible remedy for the late morning mails would be a better mail-train service into Chatham.
