A campaign against these "Baby Killers" was urgent and it was given to a man of work like you to continue the battle.


Your tract should be in the hands of all the young mothers, they will find in it marked counsels of common sense and truth.

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## INTRODUCTION

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At the request of many devoted persons who keenly interest themselves in the welfare of the child, we have availed ourselves of their solicitations to retouch our conference in a manner to put it in the form of a booklet for the free distribution to mothers.

It must be that we have not exaggerated and that the harm is passably spread, even more than we surmised, since there is the awakening of the public opinion that manifests itself a little from every where, by requests for information.

At these signs of interest from private individuals here comes to join the movement a journalist of mark M. Georges Pelletier, who in a magnificent article entitled "Empoisonneurs d'enfants" delivers to the public his impressions on "Soothing Syrups" and asks that an urgent law be passed, at the present session to protect the life of the child.

At the "Sanitary Congress" held in Fraserville<sup>2</sup> in July last, the question of "Infantile mortality" was at the order of the day.

It was a subject of the highest importance, since our race, supports itself, not only on the proverbial fecundity of our Canadian mothers but especially on the preservation of the health of the child. We could not help but seize the occasion—since it was given us, to energetically denounce and with regret—for it is a symptom to the return to barbarity—that one of the most important causes

of infantile mortality is the daily and immoderate use of *soothing syrups*.

While waiting for this beneficial law that we hope will deliver us from *infanticides*, a duty imposes itself to us all.

Without loosing a minute the people must be instructed, especially the young mothers, on the necessity there is of not giving these soporific elixirs to their children.

In publishing this booklet we propose to make known what are *soothing syrups*, what effects they produce on the child and the disastrous consequences that result from their use.

We will also make known that certain syrups have a different composition according as they are sold in Canada or in an other country, and moreover that the labels do not bear the same information, here as elsewhere.

We hope that all those who interest themselves in the health of the child, alas! . . . too neglected!—will make it a duty to scatter this booklet amongst all the classes of society, in order that every one will know the effects of these poisons on the health and even the lives of their children.

## **SOOTHING SYRUPS**

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### **BABY KILLERS**

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What are soothing syrups?

All soothing syrups are preparations put on the market to enrich the manufacturers to the detriment of the child's health and without troubling about the use to which they are put.

The aim of the manufacturer is to make money—and he succeeds—infamously cheating the health and even the lives of your children.

His way of proceeding is certainly the most cruel and shameful that a person can take to attain an end, for, by the medicaments he sells, the false circulars he distributes and the grotesque advertisements in the papers, he reaches a little being without defense through an ignorant and heartless mother.

Young mothers call upon the child's tears, the lack of knowledge, the sleepless nights and fatigue to plead their cause.

It is important before marriage to think of all these things. One must bear in mind the fatigue, the sorrow, the devotion and especially one must remember to instruct one's self on the care and way of bringing up children and not to answer if the child cries we will give him—like that of the neighbor—a dose of soothing syrup and we will be quiet for the remainder of the night.

That way of interpreting a mother's part is unworthy of a woman. If Providence in its wisdom and infinite goodness fa-

vored you to the extent of giving your children, it is in a more deserving and nobler aim.

A mother ought to understand better than that her duties towards her child. If your baby cries and does not sleep that is not a reason, without knowing better, to give him a dose of a sleeping potion, in giving for excuse and support that it is marked on the bottle and advertised in the papers.

Do not depend upon those false advertisements of the papers and on the lies and deceitfulness written on the labels and circulators that accompany each bottle of soothing syrup.

Without entering into more details, let us tell you the names of the medicaments that enter into the composition of all soothing syrups. In knowing the names of the poisons that you give daily to your child, you may perhaps reflect a moment before giving him the next dose. If you give it just the same, you will at least do so deliberately and be doubly guilty.

Here, in Canada, nearly all soothing syrups are based on opium, morphine, chloroform, chloral, hyasciamus and alcohol.

We say "here in Canada" for the good reason that the same syrup sold in England, for example, if it contains morphine, the word: "Poison" must be written on the label in large characters. That single word on the label is equivalent to the death of the preparation.

We have a striking example in "Winslow's soothing Syrup". In England it does not contain morphine. They replaced morphine with potassium bromide, exactly because the manufacturers did not want the label to bear the word: "Poison".



What effects do these syrups produce on your child and what are the immediate and future consequences?

The effects you already know them before hand, since it is to obtain these that you drug your child.

They put it to sleep! . . .

Well, is it reasonable that a poor little being without defense, expressing himself in his own manner, by cries, since he cannot speak to say what he wants, suffering and crying either caused by overfeeding, cold or dampness, either from hunger, constipation or diarrhoea, be dismayed by a dose of morphine that he must take against his will. This is criminal.

Mothers, do you imagine that you will cure your child with that soporific elixir? Observe your baby, try to find out the cause of its cries—for there are the cries of hunger, of cold, of pain and of humour; each differs from the other—Do consult . . .

Do you think you can cure your child who has eaten too much, who has colic from over feeding, by giving him a dose of Dr Coderre's Soothing Syrup? No, never: It would be wiser to regulate "baby's feelings", give him less at a time and the crying will cease.

Do you think you can cure your child who is constipated, and consequently suffering, by giving him a dose of "Aniseed Syrup"? . . . No, never . . . Because you constipate him the more by giving morphine. A little balm or castor oil and the crying will cease . . .

Do you think you can cure your child who is suffering from cerebro-spinal meningitis by giving him "Winslow's Soothing Syrup"? . . . No, never . . . A good tepid bath will calm baby.

Do you think you can bring out Baby's Teeth by enchantment, by giving him a few drops of "Laudanum"? No, never . . . An ivory ring to bite at and the natural act of the cutting of the teeth will produce itself.

Do you think you can cure your child of that terrible gastro-enteritis (green diarrhoea) that robs us of thousands of children each year by giving him " Paregoric " ten times daily? No, never. A water diet and good intestinal injections will save him.

Do you think you can cure the cries of your baby who is hungry, cold or damp with " Knopps Baby's friend " . . . No, never. A little milk, a foot warmer or a dry diaper is what the child needs.

Every time that you administer one of these preparations you produce the effect for which you were looking. The child will sleep, well and good. The following morning you think baby better because he passed a good night, as you say, but if he cries again during the course of the morning you repeat the drugging and so on for days and weeks and months.

But, mothers remember that the sickness continues its course.

Remember that the spinal meningitis that you have not treated will give you an invalid; that infantile paralysis will bequeath you an infirm; that constipation gives you a sufferer from hemmoroides; that forced sleep from morphine or hyoscianus (henbane) inherits you with a nervous, a dyspeptic or an alcoholic.

Remember especially that gastro-enteritis, tuberculosis, meningitis, nephritis treated with soothing syrups will give you corpses.

To resume we say that when you decide to consult a doctor it will be, already too late, you will have lost precious moments during which time the sickness will have increased.

Instead of being the cherished baby, who should have lived to become a joy and happiness of the family, and to become later, productive capital, it is an invalid you have to care for or a corpse to lead to the cemetery.

Choose! . . .

This is how things are. Thousands of children yearly, swallow

terrible quantities of morphine, opium, chloroform, hyoscamus and alcohol.

One would be inclined to think that we exaggerate. But no. You would be surprised to know the number of bottles of soothing syrups sold in Canada.

Listen instead. Not long ago the father of a family told me that he had been obliged to "whip" his child several nights in succession to break him off the habit of drinking "Gauvin's Aniseed syrup". Aged two years, he had reached the stage when he had to have three bottles a week.

Another father told me that he had been obliged to drive to a village at night to procure a bottle of soothing syrup for his child who had long been accustomed to the stuff and who was crying and asking for it.

"Who will deliver us from this plague of soothing syrups that puts to sleep and kills," wrote Dr S. Lachapelle.

He had a thousand times reason. However this cry of distress thrown, there are some seventeen years, has not yet found enough courageous men to reclaim before Parliament the abolition of this unrighteous law nor a Parliament thoughtful enough of the health of children to prohibit the fabrication and sale of these "baby poisoners".

\* \*

What are the immediate and future consequences of the use of these syrups?

Nearly all these children drinkers of opium or morphine are nervous, irritable, dyspeptics and especially constipated. You know the troubles that accompany or follow a child's bowels filled with excrements for several consecutive days; auto-intoxication, that is to say the organism becomes poisoned by the presence of putrid matter that sejourns too long in the bowels.

The intestinal mucous of a child is exceedingly delicate and reacts at the least change in its action.

Every time we are consulted in regard to a child who suffers from constipation or does not sleep we say: "Your child takes soothing syrups" and we rarely make a mistake.

Soothing syrups invariably lead to insomnia by the simple fact that they procure sleep. Children who do not sleep are nearly all drinkers of soothing syrups. They are "morphinomen" on a small scale.

Let us repeat it very loud: These sleeping syrups are a scandal and a disgrace to intelligence, to maternal love and to civilization; they have killed more children than a hundred Herod's.

"Opium, says doctor W. Hutchinson, is dangerous for the adult and doubly so for the child."

And the learned Comby in his 160 consultations says: "Opium puts the child asleep, constipates it, closes its kidneys, binders the rejection of the poisons."

"All the so called dental syrups are based on narcotics, particularly opium, and only calm the child by overpowering it and occasionally increases its digestive troubles" says doctor Domme-dieu.

And doctor S. Lachapelle in closing his remarks on the use of soothing syrups adds: "We are so convinced of the evil that results from their use that we are in duty bound to signal it."

Chopin and Piseck say that opium and its derivatives should not be given to the child.

"To calm the child, says Doctor Perret, syrups have been recommended. All these medicaments are useless and dangerous."

Do you want other closer and authorized opinions?

Doctor Jos.<sup>1</sup> Pageau says that: "in using these syrups if you do not kill your child, you will at least make of him an invalid or one with a shattered health."

Professor Alb. Jobin does not hesitate to assert that the habi-

real use of these soothing syrups is the indirect cause of death from troubles of intoxication that their use produce.

Professor A. Vallée speaking of these medicaments that kill says: "Others, after all, more toxic in reason of their dose or "those to whom we administer them act more brutally and cause "immediate or rapidly mortal accidents. There are perhaps none "amongst these more fatal than those deplorable soothing syrups "that annihilate our infantile population."

Were we to give the opinion of all those who have pronounced themselves against the use of soothing syrups the list would have no end.

However the question is so important and the abuse so much spread that the American Government has had these syrups analyzed and published a list of the dangerous substances they contain.

They did not fear on the other side of the 45th to publish and distribute circulars, pamphlets in which was said to mothers: "If you care for the life of your child never give him these preparations."

You will say: if these syrups are so bad for the health of children is there not a law to protect them?

Unfortunately no. In looking over our "Laws" we find . . . for the protection of pure maple syrup against all falsifications; a law protecting domestic animals; a law protecting the plant.— For the human plant . . . nothing.

We have already made, elsewhere, a comparison between the law regarding the sale of a bag of fertilizer for the protection of the plant and the law for the sale of a bottle of dope for the destruction of the child.

There has been an intelligent law made to protect the former, but the children . . . Why! . . . they are perhaps the bad weeds, in any case they are left to be destroyed.

Here is the comparison: Ascertain for yourself! . . .

One is for a plant.

One is required by law to print its ingredients on the package.

One can be used intelligently, in accordance with scientific knowledge regarding the effects of the substances and plants.

One thrives upon openness and public intelligence.

One defrauds with difficulty.

For the one, the Government, knowing its composition, can furnish the consumer exact information as to its effects.

Is it just and right that the farmer may know what he gives his plants, and unjust and wrong to allow the parent to know what he gives his child?

The other for a child.

The other is not required to disclose its ingredients.

The other cannot be used intelligently, in accordance with scientific knowledge regarding the effects of the substances and human beings.

The other thrives upon secrecy and public ignorance.

The other defrauds with ease.

For the other, the Government, not knowing its composition, cannot furnish the consumer any statement regarding its effects.

Yet the law forbids druggists to sell opium or morphine to adults under any form, without a doctor's prescription, but for those helpless children it is permitted on a large scale for you do not enter a single pharmacy, store, or grocery without finding an assortment of soothing syrups that any one can procure and administer to his child who cries.

They prosecute without pity, and with reason, the poor ignorant chinaman who sells opium, yet they leave thousands of intelligent canadians and strangers sell the same product. More than that they protect them with an unrighteous law.

What difference is there in selling morphine in tablets or selling it in a liquid baptized under the name of "Gauvin's Aniseed Syrup" . . .

• • •

Mothers, read the following documents that prove that soothing syrups are based on narcotics : retain well their names and after . . . dope your child with these same medicaments if you care . . .

*Kopp's Baby's Friend.* — This syrup contains morphine, according to the analysis made by the United-States department. In 1906 in one single state, the coroner reported twelve cases of death due to this syrup.

*Dr. J. Emery Codere's Infant's Syrup.* — This syrup contains morphine. The stuff was declared misbranded because of the statement that it could be administered with safety by persons unskilled in the giving of drugs to infants. It was further misbranded because the presence of morphine and alcohol in the bottle was declared on the wrapper in type smaller than that required by the law. Codere arraigned by the American Government pleaded guilty and was fined \$150. (Notice of Judgment No 1277.)

*Dr Fahrney's Teething Syrup.* — A sample was analyzed at the Bureau of Chemistry, United States Department of Agriculture and was found to contain: Alcohol, chloroform and morphine.

In as much as a mixture of morphine, chloroform and alcohol cannot truly be said to be non-injurious to infants and as "bad results" are likely to occur from continued use of it — as too, it is neither a "sure remedy for all ailments" nor "the best remedy for teething", as stated on the labels; a United States district court decided that Dr Fahrney's Teething Syrup was misbranded, the defendant entered a plea of guilty and a fine of \$100. was imposed. (Notice of Judgment No 144.)

*Dr Winchell's Teething Syrup.* — This product was declared fraudulent because all the statements contained on wrappers were false and misleading, the drug was misbranded and the defendant fined. (Notice of Judgment, No 610.)

*Dr Moffett's Teethina.* — This mixture is based on opium. It was declared fraudulent on account of the false curative properties attributed to it and that it did not possess. Pleaded guilty and was fined \$10.00 and costs. (Notice of Judgment, No 1019.)

*Hodnett's Gem Soothing Syrup.* — This preparation contains approximately 4 4 5 grains of opium and 4% per cent of alcohol in each ounce. Because wrapper contained false and misleading statements and because, moreover, the product did contain morphine, it was declared misbranded. (Notice of Judgment, No 401.)

*Gauvin Aniseed Syrup.* — J.-A. Gauvin, Lowell, Mass., sells a baby-killer which bears the innocent name "Aniseed Syrup". Samples of this stuff were analyzed by the Bureau of Chemistry and found to be a watery-alcoholic solution of morphine acetate sweetened with sugar and flavored with oil of anise.

As a mixture of morphine and alcohol is not "harmless" and may injure the health, and, as the amount of morphine was in excess of that given on the label, the stuff was declared misbranded. Gauvin pleaded guilty and was fined \$150. (Notice of Judgment No 773.)

We have promised to prove that certain syrups have a different composition according as they are sold here in Canada or in an other country and that the labels and circulars do not state the same things.

Gauvin's Aniseed Syrup offers a typical example.

In october 1918 we bought a bottle of Gauvin's mixture in a grocery, in Salem, Mass., in the same month we bought an other bottle in one of our country store of the Province of Quebec.

Here is what we find printed on the exterior wrapper of the bottle.

As you see, in the United States, the preparation bears the name of "Sirop d'Anis Gauvin Composé". It is declared to contain 6% alcohol and  $\frac{1}{4}$  grain of morphine acetate to the ounce. As the bottle has the capacity of two ounces, therefore it must contain  $\frac{1}{2}$  grain of morphine acetate.

In Canada the only indication we find on the same wrapper is under "The Proprietary or Patent Medecine Act. No 704" the two words — Morphia — Henbane.

What do those two words mean, thrown amongst the heads of children?

"Morphia" is english and seldom used for morphine, and "Henbane" is an other english name but never used for hyoscyamus.

Therefore his syrup sold in Canada contains morphine and hyoscyamus, probably an alkaloid: either hyoscine or scopolamine. It must be remembered that the same syrup here contains two

narcotics instead of only one as in the United States; also that the doses are not so strong here. For a child of one month 10 to 15 drops in the United States and 5 to 10 drops in Canada.

The circular that surrounds the bottle is even more interesting.

As you see the American circular is very sober. Seeing that the law does not allow a preparation to give the peculiar qualities it does not possess, the word "cures" colic etc... that we read on the canadian circular does not appear on the other.

The entire paragraph produced under de "doses" of the canadian circular is eliminated from the american. It is by this false and deceitful paragraph that Ganvin was found guilty by the court of the United States.

*Winslow Soothing Syrup.* — In England, this syrup does not contain morphine, because "The British Pharmacy Act" obliges the manufacturers to put the word X Poison X in large characters on all the preparations that contain morphine.

They have therefore replaced morphine with Potassium bromide because, as we have already stated, the manufacturers did not want the word X Poison X to appear on the label of the bottle.

Here in Canada this same syrup contains morphine because our legislators have not yet found it useful, or even necessary to protect the lives of the children.

The Board of Health of "New South Wales" Australia, has forbidden the importation, advertisement and sale of Mrs Winslow Soothing Syrup" as being injurious to the health.

The publication of this decision was made in all the papers of Sydney, so as that the public in general, the papers, the druggists and other merchants, would know what to do.

We are still optimist enough to believe that in the very near future Canada will take such an attitude and will not fear to prohibit the manufacture, advertisement and sale of soothing syrups.

And why should it not take this attitude? Why would it not take this step forward in the sense of civilisation?

Has it not for mission first the protection then the conservation of the health of its subjects?

We do not, at all, fear to say that the state that permits the fabrication, advertisement and sale of narcotics for children is guilty and criminally responsible for all the harm that results.

The thoughtless mothers, ignorant friends, irresponsible servants cram the child with narcotics without reason under the pretext that it cries — Passes — they do not know better.

But that a government of intelligent men, of men who are in a position to ascertain the injurious effects of the use of these potions — or for the least can procure information — tolerate such an abuse to the detriment of the health and the future of the country cannot be understood.

Canada and especially the different provinces will not remain indifferent before the fine initiative enterprise of the United States, Australia and others to purge their countries from the plague of these "baby killers".

There ought to be found enough men of heart, courageous women, energetic mothers to continue this fine campaign!

The man of heart will reclaim before Parliament a law prohibiting the manufacture, advertisement and sale of syrups based on narcotics.

He will refuse the advertisement in the papers, he will give up the sale of these degrading products.

The courageous women will preach every where, each time that the occasion presents itself, the sound doctrines of hygiene and prove that one if not always direct at least indirect cause of infantile mortality is the immoderate use of soothing syrups.

The energetic mother will learn the elementary notions on the "care of the child" and remember that to have "mens sana in corpore sano" the new born does not need narcotics.

\* \* \*

Good mothers, take the resolution to never more give these poisons to your children.

Take example on our good old grandmothers who tell us every day: "In our time, we had none of these syrups, and we raised big families of healthy children," and they have a thousand times reason.



## APPENDIX

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The active campaign undertaken about four years ago against the use of soothing syrups had a happy result.

On July 7th 1919, the following amendment was sanctioned.

Art. 6. — "Is prohibited the fabrication, importation or sale "of all proprietary or patent medicine containing opium or its "derivatives for internal use."

Opium has finished its reign. However we, once more, put mothers on their guard against these syrups. It is to be feared that opium be replace by other hypnotics just as dangerous.
