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REGULATIONS

GENERAL DISPOSITIONS

The Exhibition will be open to the public on Monday 11th September, at 8 o'clock a. m., and continue open each day from 7 o'clock a. m., to 10 p. m., until Saturday the 16th September at noon.

It is understood that all parties exhibiting do so after having taken cognizance of and assenting to the following Regulations and arrangements or those that may afterwards be adopted by the Company.

Every protection being taken to guard against fire, an ample police force being on duty night and day during the Exhibition, the Company will not be responsible for any damage or loss whatsoever or by theft or other casualty.

Visitors will find on the Grounds everything necessary to the convenience and comfort of young and old, during the entire day : Wash-rooms, Bagage-rooms, Telegraph offices, Telephone, Post Office and Express Office.

Each Department is under the control of a Special Committee and under the immediate administration of a Superintendant.

For that object, there will be :

- 1° A department for the horses ;
- 2° A department for the cattle ;
- 3° A department for the sheep ;
- 4° A department for the swine ;
- 5° A department for the birds and fancy animals ;
- 6° A department for the agricultural products ;

- 7° A department for industrial products ;
- 8° A department for domestic manufactures ;
- 9° A department for agricultural implements ;
- 10° A department for machinery, for heating and light ;
- 11° A department for horticultural products ;
- 12° A department for vehicles ;
- 13° A department for manufactured articles ;
- 14° A department for women's and children's work ;
- 15° A department for Natural History ;

Special regulations respecting each of these departments are to be found in the prize list, immediately before the prize list of such department. Most important to read them.

The Directors reserve the right to prescribe and regulate all matters pertaining to good order during the Exhibition.

Previous to the 1st of September, the Secretary's Office will be at No. 273, St. Paul street, Québec. After the date and down to the 26th of September, the office will be on the exhibition grounds.

Communications and inquiries pertaining to the Exhibition should be addressed to the Secretary, M. P. T. Legaré, Québec. During the Exhibition inquiries should be made of the different Superintendents. Any officer applied to unable to give the information required will refer the applicant to the proper official. The officers will be known by their respective badges.

Admission to the Grounds

Admission will be by means of Registering Turnstiles.

The price of admission is 25 cents; it is the same price for two children under 12 years of age.

Tickets of admission are of three kinds :

- 1° Exhibitors' tickets ;
- 2° Attendants' tickets ;
- 3° Ordinary tickets for the public.

Exhibitor's and Attendant's ticks are personal and admit the bearer on the grounds twice a day, once *before* and the second time *after* six o'clock p. m.

One *Exhibitor's ticket* admitting an exhibitor twice each day, and *positively not transferable*, may be purchased at the Secretary's office by any exhibitor for \$1.00 for the entire time of the Exhibition.

No attendant's ticket will be issued to any exhibitor whose entrance fees amount to less than \$1.50, but any exhibitor may purchase a *Special Exhibitor's ticket* for one dollar.

Necessary Attendants will be furnished with Special and Personal Passes on applying to the Superintendent of the special department in which are the articles they exhibit.

Exhibitors of horses will receive an attendants' ticket for every one or two horses they exhibit and an additional ticket for every addition of two horses.

Exhibitors in cattle will receive an attendant's ticket for one to four heads of cattle, and an additional ticket for every additional four heads of cattle.

Exhibitors of sheep and swine will receive an attendant's ticket for one to six heads of sheep or swine and an additional ticket for every additional six heads.

An attendant's ticket will be given to an exhibitor in birds who exhibits at least ten birds.

In the horticultural department and in the department of agricultural products as well as in the Dairy department, an attendant's ticket will be given to an exhibitor whose exhibits really necessitates the presence of an attendant.

The Superintendent of any department in which such a demand of attendant's tickets is made, much approve of such a demand, in accordance with the rules just laid down, before the secretary treasurer can be allowed to issue the attendant's ticket.

The Entry Cards upon animals or articles will admit the attendant bringing them to the Grounds for exhibition. Afterwards such attendants must be provided with the proper passes.

Educational institutions may obtain for their professors and pupils special rates for days and between hours to be agreed upon by the executive committee.

All persons not entitled to remain, and all vehicles for the transportation of supplies, etc., must leave the Grounds before 8.30 a.m. each day.

Exhibitors

The Grounds and Buildings will be open to Exhibitors and their assistants from Monday, 4th September, to Saturday, the 9 September from 7 o'clock a. m. to 6 o'clock p. m. to make preparations and to place their exhibits in position.

Exhibitors will confer a great favor on the officers of the Exposition Company by making their rentals at as early a date as possible.

Entries

All entries must be made on printed forms, which may be obtained, free of charge, from the Secretary from whom also copies of the Prize List can be had. These forms are to be filled up and signed by the exhibitor and sent in on or before Monday, 5th September.

Exhibitors will please take notice that it is *absolutely required* that the entries be made on or before the date above mentioned, in order to afford sufficient time to examine the entry papers, apportion space, forward the entry tickets, and to correspond with parties, when necessary, for the correction of errors and omissions.

The entry fee must, in all cases, be forwarded with the entry. No entry will be accepted unless this is done. Fees should be sent by money order or bills in a registered letter. *Postage stamps are not desirable.*

When entries are made, great care should be observed to have the name of the exhibitor and the *Post Office address in full*, with the street end number if in a city.

No person shall be allowed to enter for exhibition more than one specimen in any one section of a class, except by special permission.

In the *Live Stock Classes* the entries must, in every instance, be made in the name of the *bona fide* owner of each animal. If any person shall exhibit an animal of which he is not the *bona fide* owner, he shall forfeit any premium which may be awarded him.

In all the other Classes, entries must be made in the names of the producers or manufacturers or their duly authorized agents.

Every article must be entered under some one of the sections in the regular list, when possible; but if any article is of a different character

from anything specified in the list, it may then be entered in the class with which it most nearly corresponds, under the heading of *extra*.

On the entry of each animal or article, a card will be furnished to the exhibitor, specifying the section and number of entry and the name of the exhibitor, which card must remain attached to the animal or article during the Exhibition.

The right is reserved to the Committee of rejecting entirely or accepting conditionally, and entry or application : and under no circumstances will articles which are offensive, or dangerous by reason of their combustible or explosive character be admitted ; and if any such articles be found on the grounds they may be removed by order of the Management.

Entry fees

The charges for the exhibition are as follows :

A.—AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT:

Horse, entry fees, \$1.00 per head, stabling free.

Cattle, " 50c " stalls free,

Sheep, " 25c " pens free.

Swine, " 25c " "

Poultry, " 25c each section.

Herds of any kind \$1.00.

Dairy Dept., entrance fee, 25c. each section.

Agricultural products, ten entries and under, 50c. ; from ten entries to fifteen \$1.00 ; over fifteen \$2.00.

Agricultural implements, 25c. each.

B.—INDUSTRIAL DEPARTMENT

Machinery, \$1.00 each entry.

Stoves, 25c each ; over five, 10c each.

Carriages, 25c each vehicle.

Pianos and organs, 50c. for each instrument.

Women's work and domestic manufactures ; five entries and under 50c. ; from five entries up to ten, \$1.00 ; over ten, 10c. each.

For manufactures and all other classes than those above mentioned, the fee for each entry will be \$1.

Fees must in all cases accompany the entry.

The committee may make special arrangements for collections.

Applications for space

In the industrial, machinery, carriage and agricultural implement departments, exhibitors must sent an application for the space they require at the same time as their application for entry.

The company reserve the right to sell such spaces as the exhibitors wants to secure specially for himself. If a creditable display is not maintained in any space that may be sold or allotted, they may declare such space forfeited.

Exhibitors desiring the privilege to sell during the exhibition must make special arrangements with the committee.

The plan can be seen at the office of the secretary.

Particular attention is called to the importance of having the entries made in proper time, otherwise no promise of space can be given.

Exhibitor's Duties and Privileges

All articles for exhibition must be in position before 6 p. m., on Saturday 9th September. All Live Stock must be on the grounds by 10 a. m., on Monday, 11th September.

Exhibitors on arriving with their exhibits will apply to the Superintendent of their Department, when they will be informed where these are

to be placed. Exhibitors must provide for the delivery of their exhibits on the Grounds. The Company will not arrange for any expenses in this connection.

The Express Companies have consented to make free delivery of all exhibits to the Exhibition Grounds, provided the express rates have been prepaid to Quebec. They also agree to call at the Grounds for exhibits to be returned by express.

Articles not accompanied by their owners may be addressed to the care of the Secretary, on the Grounds; all charges on these exhibits must be prepaid, to and from the Grounds.

Exhibitors will, at all times, give the necessary attention to their exhibits and at the close take entire charge of the same.

All exhibits must remain uncovered while the Exhibition lasts.

Articles placed on exhibition must not be removed until the close, except by special permission. Every facility will be afforded for the sale of goods, but no articles must be removed during the Exhibition except with the consent of the Executive Committee.

All cases and packing materials must be cleared away before 6 p. m., on Saturday 9th September.

All signs, stands or structures of any kind erected by exhibitors must be removed on or before the 1st of October 1899, otherwise they become the property of the Exposition Company.

Favorable arrangements have been made with the leading Railway and Steamboat Companies for the conveyance of passengers and exhibits to and from the City at greatly reduced rates.

If any person shall bring articles to the Exhibition without having entered them, the same may be allowed to be so placed that they may be examined by the public, but they shall not be classified, nor shall any official examination of them be made.

Live Stock

All Live Stock must be at the Grounds by 10 a. m., on Monday, 11th September, if not, their proprietors will forfeit the right of competition.

Good stabling and stalls are provided for Live Stock, with water and straw for bedding, free of charge.

Poultry will be fed at the expense of the Company.

Hay and provender will be for sale on the Grounds at market prices. Any complaints of excessive charges will be immediately rectified.

The management and judges may call for the production of any or all animals for review or other purposes at any time during the Exhibition.

Any exhibitor refusing to comply with such order will forfeit his right to compete for or to receive any prize which may be awarded.

Machinery Department

There is no charge for space in this Department.

Motive power to exhibitors must be asked for.

The Machinery Hall and all steam engines and machinery in operation will be under the care of a special Superintendent whose orders must be strictly obeyed.

Women's and Children's Department

All the articles in this class must be the work of the exhibitor. The charges for exhibiting are :—

Five entries or under, 50c.; over five entries, \$1.

Judges.

The Judges will be appointed by the Board of Directors.

No person can act as Judge in any subdivision in which he has an interest as exhibitor.

The Judges are requested to report themselves at the office of the Secretary to the Grounds on Tuesday, September 12th at 10 a. m.

The Judges will sign and hand in their awards to the Superintendents as soon as possible. The reports should be concise and full, and should contain any suggestions and recommendations that experience or circumstances may suggest.

Each award must be plainly written on the blank space opposite the number of the entry.

In the absence of competition in any section, or if the exhibits be of inferior quality, the Judges will award only such premiums as they think advisable. They shall exercise their discretion as to whether they will award the first, second, third or *any* prize.

It is desired that all Judges acting jointly should go *together* with the Superintendent to hand in their Report in order that cases of error or doubt may be jointly considered and promptly rectified.

Judges are not to award prizes other than those mentioned in the Prize List, but may distinguish articles deserving of notice which have not received prizes by cards with the words "Commended" or "Highly Commended" upon them. These cards will not entitle the holders to any money payment.

The Judges are requested not to award prizes unless the articles come up to the desired "Standard of Excellence". No extra prize will be paid unless sanctioned by the Directors.

Exhibitors can ascertain from the Superintendents of the several Departments when the Judges may be expected to begin work.

In case of fraud, the Directors have the power to withhold the payment of any prize awarded.

Judges are requested to make themselves acquainted with the special regulations governing the department in which they act as Judges.

Protests

No protest will be entertained unless signed and accompanied by a deposit of \$10, which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained.

Protests must be made in *writing*, must state the class and section of the entry referred to, and must state definitely and concisely the ground of protest, with proof in support.

All protest must be made *within four hours of cause of protest*, after which no protest will on any account be received.

The envelope containing a protest must be endorsed with the number of the class and section to which the protest refers. The Executive Committee will decide in all cases of protest, and their decision will be final.

Payment of Prizes

Persons entitled to cash prizes must apply to the Secretary, on Friday the 10th September, after 4 h. p. m.

All persons to whom prizes are awarded must apply for them to the Secretary, on or before 30th October 1899, otherwise they will be considered as having renounced the same.

Gambling and Pedling

The Officials in charge shall enforce the Rules, and also prevent all kinds of gambling or mountebank performances. The Executive Committee will have right to regulate or prevent huckstering or trafficking in fruits, goods, wares or merchandise on the Exhibition Grounds; and any person who violates such regulations, shall be liable to be removed from the Grounds.

Lessees of booths and stands will be protected as far as possible but will forfeit their claims and rights when abusing them.

Pedlers or salesmen of any articles, not entered and placed on exhibition, must first procure permits from the secretary, and shall present them when required.

All questions not recovered or provided by these Rules, shall be referred to the Executive Committee.

In case at any differences between the french and english versions of the present regulations, the french version shall prevail.

Entrance Fee : \$1 00 per head. Stalls Free

All horses must be on the Grounds by 10 a. m. on Monday September 11th.

Special Rules governing the exhibit of Horses in the Horse Ring, may be made by the Committee at the opening of the Exhibition, and all exhibitors will be required to conform to the same.

The ages of Thoroughbred and Standard bred horses will be calculated from the first January, 1899, all others from 1st July.

Stalls will be allotted by the superintendent when the horses arrive on the Grounds : they must be cleaned out before 7 a. m.

All animals competing for prizes must be entered in the names of their *bona fide* owners or their duly authorized agents ; should doubts arise, the Judges may require solemn declarations of ownership.

In making entries, the owners' name and address in full, *the name of animal* (if named), and the age, must be given.

In the classes for Thoroughbreds, full pedigree, properly certified, must accompany the entry, or the number of registration in the Stud Book or the American Trotting Register for standard bred horses, must be given on the entry form. No animals will be allowed to compete as pure bred unless they possess regular stud pedigrees.

In the class of Canadian horses, a certificate must be given from the "Canadian Book of Genealogy."

No horse will be allowed to enter or compete in more than one class or section, except for the Medal for the best horse or mare or any age in such class.

No horse will be allowed a premium unless sound, except injured by accidents which do not lessen its usefulness.

The Judges will commence their duties on the day specified for each class and continue their work during consecutive days up to its completion.

All horses competing for prizes must be brought out for inspection by the Judges, or for exhibition, whenever called out by the superintendent to attend to that duty.

Non-compliance with any of these rules, or the general rules of the Company, on the part of any exhibitor or his employee, shall entail the forfeiture of any premium awarded.

Exhibitors who may desire to take their horses home at night will be allowed to do so on depositing \$10 with the Superintendent as a guarantee for the return of the animal next morning. If the horse is not returned or permit renewed by ten o'clock the next morning, the amount deposited will be forfeited to the Company.

Exhibitors, if required, must at any time during the progress of the Exhibition produce a certificate from a Public Weighing Office, giving the weight of the horses exhibited.

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
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
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

1. All the specimens placed in competition for prizes must be *bona fide* grown by the competitor or his employer, or have been at least two months in the possession of Exhibitor, and, if not, the competitor shall not be entitled to any prize.
2. All exhibits must be carefully labelled with their proper names.
3. In awarding prizes on plants in pots, special reference will be had to the beauty of the specimens, profusion of bloom, and evidence of superior cultivation.
4. Any deviation, *more or less*, from the exact quantities or numbers specified, will disqualify a competitor in that section.

5. All exhibitors in class for bouquets must have them of such a size that they can be shown in the vases provided.
6. Cards corresponding with the entries will be furnished to the exhibitors, who alone will be responsible for the placing of them, and are requested to satisfy themselves that the cards correctly describe the objects exhibited.
7. In order to allot the space required in each section, all entries must be made in writing, not later than Monday the 4th of September, after which date no entries will be received.
8. Competitors must state, as nearly as possible, the amount of space they will require in each section, on a table $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet wide.
9. Exhibitors will supply their own boxes for exhibiting cut flowers.
10. All articles to be exhibited for premiums must be in the building by ten o'clock on Monday, 11th September, at which hour the doors will be closed, and no further exhibits admitted. Two hours will be given thereafter for exhibitors to finish placing and ticketing their articles, at the close of which time they must leave the building, and the Judges will proceed to make their awards.
11. No individual, except the Judges, will be allowed to touch or handle any fruit, flower, or any article exhibited, and any exhibitor proved guilty of having tampered with any article on exhibition, or having changed any ticket will, at the option of the committee, be liable to be deprived of all the prizes he may have been awarded.
12. While the Judges are making their awards, no person shall be present, except parties appointed guardians by the Directors.
13. The Company shall not be responsible for damage done to plants during or after the Exhibition, but all possible care will be taken of them.
14. Parties will not be allowed to compete for more than one prize in the same section:—no article which has already been awarded a prize will be entitled to another.
