WEDNESDAY, April 29, 1835.

having been pleased to summon, by Proclamation, a meeting of the General Assembly on this day—and the House being met;

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by George Richard Goodman, Esq. Usher of the Black Rod.

Mr. Speaker,

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immediate attendance of this Honourable House in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker and the House went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber—and being returned, Mr. Speaker reported, that His Excellency had been pleased to make a Speech to both Houses, of which he had procured a copy—which was read to the House, and is as followeth:

Mr. President, and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council; Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

I regret the occasion which compels me to call you from your homes at a season of the year so inconvenient to your usual avocations; but it is rendered imperative on my part again to meet you thus early in General Assembly, in consequence of being left, at the close of the last Session, without the supplies necessary to the due and effectual support of the Government.

I venture, however, to express my earnest hope, that you will now, in your collective wisdom, be enabled to adopt such measures as will relieve the Colony from those difficulties which at present threaten it.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

I shall cause the Estimates for the service of the current year to be laid before you, depending upon your liberality to vote such supplies as will enable me to meet the necessary and unavoidable expenditure of the Government.

Mr. President, and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council; Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

Since the termination of the last Session of the Assembly, I have received communications from His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, conveying His Majesty's pleasure upon the several Acts passed in the Sessions 1832 and 1834, copies of which I shall take an early opportunity of directing to be laid before you.

I have much satisfaction in being enabled to state to you, among the Bills to which His Majesty's approval has been signified, are the Marriage Bill and the Boundary Bill, which will render unnecessary the transmission of your joint Address to His Majesty upon these highly interesting and important measures.

In leaving you to resume the important duties which now devolve upon you, I trust that your united deliberations will be conducted with that spirit of harmony and good understanding, without which all our exertions to benefit the Colony must prove futile and fallacious.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to examine what Laws have lately expired, or are near expiring, and to report thereon to the House.

Ordered, that Mr. Pope and Mr. Thornton do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of Five Members be appointed, to prepare and report, with all convenient speed, the draught of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, delivered this day to both Houses of the Legislature.

Ordered, that Mr. Palmer, Mr. Green, Mr. Thornton, Mr. Brenan and Mr. Pope

do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to revise the Journal of each day, after the adjournment.

Ordered, that Mr. Douse, Mr. Thornton and Mr. Macdonald do compose the said

Committee.

Mr. Nelson moved, that the Chaplain have notice to attend the House each morning during the Session, to read Prayers, before the House proceeds to business.

So it passed in the negative.

Ordered, that the Entry in the Journals of this House, of April 10th, 1835, relative to an order served on the Colonial Secretary, to return to the Clerk a copy of the Royal Instructions presented to this House by Mr. Binns, be now read.

The said Entry was read accordingly.

Whereupon the Clerk acquainted the House, that the Copy of the Royal Instructions alluded to had been delivered to him, accompanied with the following Note from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor:

Government House, April 20th, 1835.

Mr. Binns having stated that the copy of the Royal Instructions were given to him by the late Colonel Desbrisay, whilst Colonial Secretary and Registrar of this Island, the Lieutenant Governor will not object to their being returned. Nevertheless the Lieutenant Governor cannot comprehend how they could have become the private property of the Secretary and Registrar, as they appear to be in the same hand writing with others in possession of the Lieutenant Governor.

A. W. YOUNG, Lieutenant Governor.

Ordered, that a copy of the Journal be sent to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor daily, as soon as possible after the adjournment.

Ordered, that a copy of the Journal of this House be also daily furnished to Mr. James Douglas Haszard, Printer, and that he be directed to print One hundred and twenty copies thereof; and that the same be disposed of in the manner directed last Session.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to examine Bills to be engrossed, or that have been engrossed.

Ordered, that Mr. Le Lacheur, Mr. M'-Callum, Mr. Green, Mr. Macdonald and Mr. Douse do compose the said Committee.

The Clerk laid before the House a letter he had received from the Clerk of the Legislative Council of New Brunswick, together with the Journals of that House, from the First Session of the First General Assembly of that Province, to the year 1834, inclusive.

And the said Letter was read, and is as

followeth:

Fredericton, New Brunswick, Clerk Legislative Council Office, 24th March, 1835.

Sir,

By direction of the Honourable the Legislative Council of this Province, I have the honour of forwarding to you a copy of the Journal of that House, and to inform you their Journal will in future be transmitted to you annually.

To the Clerk of the Hon, the House of Assembly, Prince Edward Island.

Ordered, that the Clerk of this House do in future transmit a copy of the Journal of this House to the Legislative Council of New Brunswick.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow at Ten o'clock.

THURSDAY, April 30, 1835.

R. Pope reported from the Committee appointed to examine what Laws have lately expired, or are near expiring—and he read the Report in his place, and delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as followeth:

Your Committee appointed to report on the expiring Laws, find that the Act of 9th Geo. 4th, cap. 3, intituled 'An Act for establishing the Standard Weight of Grain and Pulse, and for appointing proper Officers for measuring and weighing the same,' will expire

the last day of the present Session.

That the Act of 10th Geo. 4th, cap. 3, intituled 'An Act to amend an Act made and passed in the Ninth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for establishing the Standard Weight of Grain and Pulse, and for appointing proper Officers for measuring and weighing the same," will expire the last day of the present Session.

That the Act of 11th Geo. 4th, cap, 11, intituled 'An Act for providing Pounds within this Island, and to suspend an Act made and passed in the Thirty-first year of the Reign of His late Majesty, intituled "An Act for providing Pounds in the several Royalties in this Province," will expire the last

day of the present Session.

That the Act 2d Will. 4th, cap. 6, intituled 'An Act to alter and amend an Act made in the Forty-eighth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for repealing an Act intituled 'An Act to prevent the throwing of Ballast into Rivers and Creeks on this Island,' and for the empowering the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Commander in Chief for the time being, to appoint Ballast Masters, and to regulate their duty," will expire the last day of the present Session.

That the Act 2d Will. 4th, cap. 8, intituled 'An Act to prevent the running at large of Swine within the Town and Royalty of Princetown,' will expire the last day of the

present Session.

That the Act 4th Will. 4th, cap. 19, intituled 'An Act to continue an ad-valorem Duty on all Goods. Wares and Merchandise imported into this Island, with certain exceptions,' will expire on the 7th day of May next.

That the Act 4th Will. 4th, cap. 20, intituled 'An Act to continue for One year an Act levying a Duty on Tobacco and Tea,' will expire on the 7th day of May next.

That the Act 4th Will. 4th, cap. 21, intituled 'An Act for continuing for one year an Act imposing an additional Duty on Wines and Spirituous Liquors,' will expire on the 7th day of May next.

Ordered, that the said Report be now referred to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into said Committee.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Pope took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. Pope reported, that the Committee had come to one Resolution; which Resolution being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Committee, that it is expedient to continue for one year the Act of 9th Geo. 4th, cap. 3, for establishing the Standard Weight of Grain and Pulse, and the Act of 10th Geo. 4th, cap. 3, in amendment thereof; the Act of 11th Geo. 4th, cap. 11, for providing Pounds; and the Act of 2d Will. 4th, cap. 6, for altering and amending the Act of 48th Geo. 3d, cap. 3, for preventing the throwing of Ballast into Rivers and Creeks in this Island.

The Chairman then acquainted the House, that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to sit again; which the House

agreed to.

Ordered, that Mr. Pope and Mr. Thornton be a Committee to prepare and bring in a Bill to continue the several Acts referred to in the above reported Resolution.

Mr. Palmer, from the Special Committee appointed to prepare and report the draught of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to both Houses, at the opening of the present Session, reported the draught of an Address, as prepared by the Committee.

Ordered, that the said draught Address be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into said Committee.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Palmer took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. Palmer reported, that the Committee had gone through the draught Address reported from the Special Committee, paragraph by paragraph, had made several amendments thereto, and then agreed to the same; and the said Address, as amended, being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:

The Humble Address of the House of Assembly.

May it please Your Excellency;

We the Representatives of His Majesty's loyal subjects of Prince Edward Island, beg leave to thank your Excellency for your Speech at the opening of this Session.

We regret exceedingly the occasion which has rendered it necessary for your Excellency thus early to have convened us again in General Assembly.

We will immediately apply ourselves to such measures, as we earnestly trust will tend to avert those difficulties which at present threaten the Colony.

We shall be prepared to enter with due diligence upon the consideration of such Estimates as your Excellency may be pleased to submit to us, and to make proper provision for the ordinary expences of the Government, and for such other objects of general benefit as the resources of the Colony will warrant.

We shall be happy to receive from your Excellency copies of the communications which, we are gratified to learn, convey the signification of His Majesty's pleasure respecting the Acts passed in the years 1832 and 1834.

We learn with much satisfaction that the Marriage Bill and the Boundary Bill are among those which have met with His Majesty's Royal approval; and we feel that the transmission of the Address to His Majesty on these Laws, will now be rendered unnecessary.

We beg to assure your Excellency that we shall endeavour to discharge the duties entrusted to us, with every disposition to cultivate that spirit of harmony which ought always to subsist between the different branches of the Legislature; and in all our proceedings it shall be our study to adopt whatever measures may tend to promote that object, which may not be inconsistent with the just rights of those we represent.

Ordered, that the said Address be engrossed

Resolved, That the said Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor by the whole House.

Ordered, that Mr. Palmer and Mr. Pope be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to know his pleasure when he will be attended by the House with the Address—who returning, reported, that His Excellency had been pleased to appoint to-morrow, at Two o'clock, to receive the House.

Ordered, that Mr. Brenan have leave to introduce a Bill to explain the Act of 2d Will. 4th, cap. 14, for confirming and rendering valid certain Marriages heretofore solemnized within this Island, and also to declare by whom and in what manner Marriages shall be celebrated in future.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was read for the first time.

Ordered, that the Tenth of the standing Orders of this House be suspended, as respects this Bill.

And then the said Bill was read a second time.

Ordered, that the said Bill be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into said Committee.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Brenan took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. Brenan reported, that the Committee had gone through the Bill, without making any amendment thereto.

Ordered, that the Report be received.

Ordered, that the said Bill be engrossed, and that the Title be An Act to explain an Act passed in the Second year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled 'An Act to confirm and render valid certain Marriages heretofore solemnized within this Island, and also to declare by whom and in what manner Marriages shall be celebrated in future, and to provide for the public Registry of the same.'

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

And being met—

several Laws near expiring, presented to the House a Bill, as prepared by the Committee, and the same was received and read for the first time.

Ordered, that the Tenth of the Standing Orders of this House be suspended as far as respects this Bill.

And then the said Bill was read a second

time.

Ordered, that the said Bill be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into said Committee.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Pope took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. Pope reported, that the Committee had gone through the Bill, without making any amendment thereto.

Ordered, that the Report be received.

Ordered, that the said Bill be engrossed, and that the Title be An Act to continue Four several Acts therein mentioned.

Resolved, That a Supply be granted to His Majesty.

Resolved, That this House will, to-morrow, resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the consideration of Supplies for the Public Service.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow at Ten o'clock.

FRIDAY, May 1, 1835.

R. Palmer moved that the Bill introduced into the House last Session, relative to certain Roads within the Royalty of Charlotte Town, be referred to a Special Committee, with instructions to bring in a Bill of similar tendency, embracing the subject of the state of the Streets of Charlotte Town.

FIRST MESSAGE.

A. W. YOUNG, Lieutenant Governor.

Extract from a Report of the Lords of the Committee of Council for Trade, upon an Act passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, in the year 1832, (No. 330)—dated 8th Dec. 1833.

- The Lords of the Committee have this day had the said Act under consideration.
- This Act requires that in every case where the Landlord has a derivative Title, to enforce payment of Rent, he must register the whole of his Title, although it may have been repeatedly acknowledged by the Tenant by the payment of Rent, and sanctions the claim of the Tenant under such circumstances to contest his Landlord's Title: whereas the Law of this Kingdom, and general convenience and justice, alike require, that the Tenant should not be permitted to question the Title of the Landlord from whom he has taken the tenement.
- Very little advantage could arise to the Tenant from the preposed Registration of the Landlord's Title: whereas the Landlord might be seriously aggrieved by the necessity of conforming to the many minute regulations to which this Act would subject him.
- 'For the reasons above stated, the Lords of the Committee are humbly of opinion, that this Act should be disallowed by Your Majesty.'

- The Lords of the Committee have this day had the said Act under their consideration.
- This Act proceeds on the supposition that Lands forfeited to the Crown for the breach of a condition contained in the original Grant, are the subject of Escheat.
- Without the aid of any positive Law, the Crown might take advantage of any such conditions, and by the enactment of such a Law as the present, your Majesty would be fettered in the exercise of your Prerogative, either of enforcing or remitting such Forfeitures, as the merit of each particular case might require.
- * For the reasons above stated, the Lords of the Committed are bumbly of opinion, that this Act should be disallowed.

Mr. Palmer, from the Committee appointed to wait on His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the Address of the 2d inst. thanking His Excellency for his Messages of the 1st inst. reported, that the Committee had, pursuant to order, waited upon His Excellency with the same.

In consequence of the severe illness of the Lieutenant Governor, a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by His Excellency, having been issued, authorizing and empowering the Honourable Edward James Jarvis, Chief Justice, and the Honourables Ambrose Lane and Thomas Heath Haviland, Assistant Justices of the Supreme Court, or any two of them, to give the Lieutenant Governor's assent to such Bills as had passed the Council and House of Assembly, and also a Commission to prorogue the General Assembly —the said Commissioners, in pursuance of the powers in them vested, did, by Message, delivered by the Usher of the Black Rod, require the attendance of the House of Assembly in the Council Chamber.

Haviland, Assistant Justices of the Supreme Court, I have given them, or any two of them, full power and authority, and do hereby command them, or any two of them, to be Commissioners, for me and in my name, and in His Majesty's name, to assent to all and singular the matters and things concluded and agreed upon by you the said Legislative Council and Commons in this present Colonial Parliament assembled, and expressed and contained in an Act intituled An Act to continue four several Acts therein mentioned:' also an Act intituled 'An Act for the increase of the Revenue in this Island;' and also an Act intituled ' An Act for appropriating certain Monies therein mentioned, for the service of the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and thirty-five:' and I have commanded, and do hereby command the said Edward James Jarvis, Ambrose Lane and Thomas Heath Haviland, or any two of them, diligently to apply themselves in the premises, and to do and perform those things with immediate effect. And I hereby declare and make known to you, the said Legislative Council and Commons of Prince Edward Island, in the present Colonial Parliament assembled, that I will ratify and confirm, and do hereby ratify and confirm, whatever the said Edward James Jarvis, Ambrose Lane and Thomas Heath Haviland, or any two of them, shall do in the premises, by virtue of and according to the tenor of these presents.

In testimony whereof, I have caused these Letters to be made patent, and the Great Soal of the said Island thereunto affixed, this Sixth day of May, in the Fifth year of His Majesty's Reign, Annoque Domini One thousand eight hundred and thirty-five.
