EUROPEAN AFFAIRS.

(FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.)

London, March 26, 1851.

After seven nights debate, the second reading of the Papal Aggression Bill has been carried by a majority of 485 to 55. After all the bluster of the Irish faction, headed by Mr. Reynolds, and by their divided allegiance to support the supremacy of a Foreign Power, after all the eloquent speeches of Mr. Russell Palmer, Mr. G. Smythe, Mr. A. B. Hope, Mr. Sidney Herbert, Mr. Gladstone, and several more illustrious gentlemen, who are playing such fantastic tricks on the verge of the precipice, as to make their friends weep; after the able but factious speeches of Sir James Graham, and two or three others, who now form the "rump" of the broken-up, and scattered Peelite party—these two parties, being reinforced by the worst men of the Whig and Tory school, who, in the shape of votes, amounting to 22 in a House of 435 Members, the Protestant feeling of the country is so far indicated; and the vote of Sir F. Thesiger, who, I am glad to say, has withdrawn from the Peelite party—convince me that the Protestants intend to propose a counter project to the Ministerial measure, with a view, at least, to remove the Bill to its original integrity. I suppose that by this time the eyes of Lord John Russell and his colleagues are opened to a just apprehension of their position; and of the grievous mistake they have made. THE FIRST PAGE.

The Lapland Steamer brought down the English Mail at midnight on Saturday. The length of our London and Toronto correspondence letters provides us from the knowledge of any editorial matter.

The last Mail from England brought no further news from the Cape of Good Hope. We do, however, have more than fifty letters, and the Government, were under orders to that effect.

An Address was recently placed in the hands of Sir George Grey, for presentation to Her Majesty, signed by 65 Peers, 105 Members of the House of Commons, and 140 Members of the Church of England, all of whom had signed their own names, with their respective offices. The object of the Address was to protest against the aggression of the Pope of Rome, and the Tractarianism lately introduced into the service of the Church of England.
