Ralph W. Ruggles of Westport, Dead

UNITED STATES TARIFF

In one particular item only, does the bill presented to Congress of like reciprocal action by other countries, if advantage is to be taken of the terms of the proposed duty, and that relates to wheat flour, which is made free, but provides a duty of 10 per cent, against countries which levy a duty on United States flour.

The work of the ways and means committee of the United States Congress has been thorough. The new bill is radical. Nothing comparable is recalled since a bill introduced in the early days of the Cleveland administration, and even that bill preserved for duty products on which the present bill lays violent hands.

The changes proposed by the tariff bill are of unusual interest to Canadians. The duty on wheat, oats and barley has been heavily cut. Dairy products, cheese, butter, and cream, eggs and vegetables, apples and peaches, are subject to substantial reductions.

It must be borne in mind that President Wilson, and the ways and means committee had for their avowed purpose in so violently slashing the tariff duties, the benefits, which it was claimed the United States consumers would derive from an extended free list, and a substantial reduction in the dutiable list.

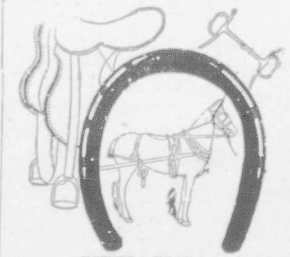

How I Grow Crisp Lettuce

I have grown bright, crisp lettuce throughout the season by making frequent successional sowings. The soil of my choice is rather rich, heavy and moist—of a kind to induce quick growth with frequent hoeing. This rapid growth makes for crispness.

My first sowing out of doors I make as soon as the ground can be worked into fine, loose condition then small sowings every two weeks until the beginning of July to ensure a constant supply of this appetizing salad.

I sow the seed thinly in rows fifteen inches apart, and cover one-half inch deep. As soon as the rows can be plainly seen I commence to hoe, and when the plants are well started I thin out, to stand three inches apart.

When the plants begin to crowd, I take each alternating plant up for use. The balance will then stand far enough apart to form heads, which are really the finest part of our lettuce.

Many people make the mistake of sowing their lettuce too thickly and later in this way miss the heads. In order to have crisp, tender, leaves each plant should have room enough to develop a head.

Always gather lettuce in the morning, while the dew is still on, as it is then much more crisp and tender than if allowed to stand until it becomes wilted by the hot noonday sun.

Lettuce is generally the best during the Spring and Fall, but it can also be grown to perfection during the Summer by using heat-resisting varieties, by planting on moist soil and by shading.—J. R. C.

Potato Market Stronger

Prices jump Fall 20 cents—Lighter Receipts Responsible.

New York, April 4—The potato market is stronger. Prices jumped from 5c. to 10c. at the very opening of the week under light receipts, caused by the floods that interfered with shipments. By Wednesday fancy Maines and States had struck \$1.85 on the dock, and towards the close were up strong at \$2 a sack, an advance of fully 20c.

Bulk stock at the yards showed no such material advances, prices at the opening and at the close on Maine in bulk and State and Western in bulk showing hardly any difference, but holding steady at around \$1.87 to \$2 for Maines and \$1.75 to \$2 for State and Western.

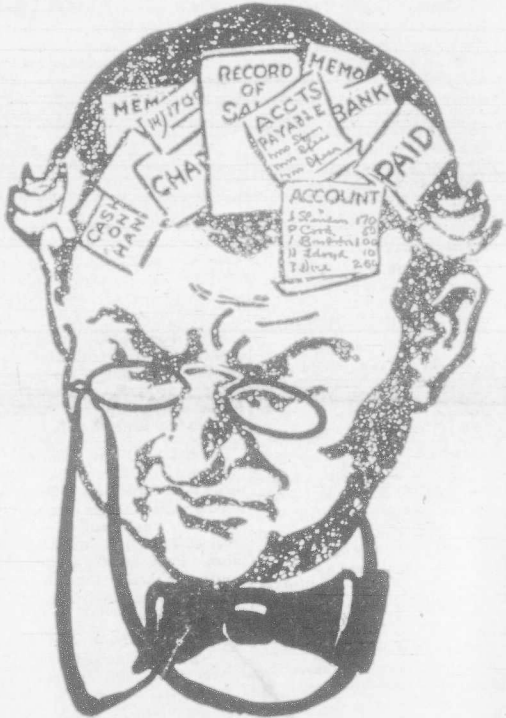

Woman at Home

White craps has become old and
rusty, and practically useless, it can
be restored in the following manner:
Boil some skimmed milk and water,
and add a small piece of glue. Dip
the craps into this while boiling, let
it soak, take out, squeeze and dry it.

damp, it is rolled through rollers.

Unused silver will keep quite

warm soapy water.
