Such societies already exist in Spain, Italy, France and Holland. The objects are "I. the application of the Christian virtues and professional charity in the practice of medicine; and 2. the study of medical questions with especial attention to those regarding faith, morals, and deontology," submitting "to the decisions of ecclesiastical authority," Political questions are to be avoided; and, while the societies as established in each country are to be independent in their working, they are all to be kept in friendly communication through their respective presidents, and are to have general reunions, meeting in Rome as often as possible. 
