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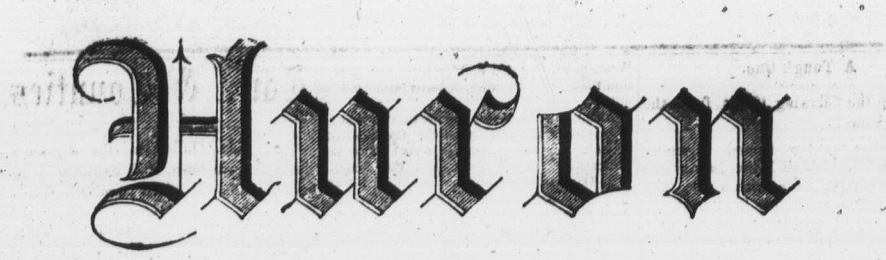

The first gun! We learn by special telegraph that the Premier, Hon. J. S. McDonald, was elected yesterday by acclamation, for Cornwall. A good commencement.

MR. DICKSON'S ADDRESS.

It is, we suppose, generally known that Mr. Dickson, who has so worthily represented this constituency during the stormy sessions just concluded, does not come forward at the present moment of his own accord.

The Confederates capture the Cumberland river steamer, but were driven back by our forces at the time of their capture.

Fort Monroe, May 25.—The water batteries of the fortress exchanged the national salute with the British vessels in the roads in honor of Queen Victoria's birthday.

Chicago, May 26.—From a private despatch received in this city today from an officer in the Illinois regiment, dated near Vicksburg on the 24th inst., the inference is that the city was not captured at that time.

The following items are taken from the Richmond Waig of the 25th inst:—Our Southern exiles intimate a rumor that General Johnston has taken from General Pemberton his sword and placed him under arrest.

The steamers Margaret, Jessie, and Kate, arrived at Charleston last Wednesday morning with valuable cargoes.

Tollhouses, May 25.—A rumor of the capture of two of our regiments in front with a piece of artillery, is not true.

The Jackson Appeal of the 13th, says that "our loss in the first day's engagement, near Raymond, may be stated 600 killed, wounded, and missing. The loss of officers is said to be small."

The following items also contain the following additional items:—An official despatch from Johnston dated the 23rd says:—An officer who left Vicksburg on Tuesday reports that an assault on Gen. Pemberton's intrenchments, near the Yazoo river, had been repulsed.

Atlanta, Ga., May 25.—Vicksburg has five months' supplies of victuals, and can be taken only when the force defending it have expended their supplies.

Washington, May 27.—The latest official intelligence from Vicksburg is to o'clock on Sunday morning, when all was repulsed as going on well.

Two very splendid chains, captured by Warren Hastings from the palace of an Indian Prince, were recently sold at auction in England for \$250.

TO THE Independent Electors OF THE UNITED COUNTIES OF HURON AND BRUCE.

GENTLEMEN,

In consequence of the dissolution of Parliament, you are again called upon to exercise the elective franchise, in choosing a person to represent you in the Legislative Assembly of this Province.

At the urgent request of the Central Committee of the Reform Association of these United Counties, and at the solicitation of many personal friends, I have been induced again to offer myself as a Candidate for your suffrages and support in the approaching contest.

During the two sessions of the Parliament just concluded, I have endeavored to pursue a straightforward and independent course, and to fulfill the pledges which I gave at the time of my election.

My views upon the great questions before the country are so well known to you, having been frequently expounded on various occasions, that I consider it unnecessary to allude to them at any length in this address.

With regard to Representation by Population, I may state that, if re-elected, I will, as heretofore, invariably vote for the adoption of that principle, whenever, and by whomsoever introduced. I consider that the carrying of this measure is the most likely means of securing justice to Upper Canada, and, therefore, any Administration which will make this a Cabinet question shall receive my support.

I am strongly opposed to any further increase of the Provincial debt, and will lose no opportunity of advocating the most right economy in the public expenditure, always, however, bearing in mind the necessity of such an outlay as may be required for the development of the resources of the country. I am decidedly averse to the practice, so frequently resorted to by former Administrations, of spending Public Money without the previous knowledge and sanction of Parliament.

Firmly relying upon the loyalty and patriotism of the people of this Province, I shall support any efficient and economical measure which will tend to encourage the Volunteer Movement, and which may be required to place the country in a proper state of defence.

Believing that the property of this Province is, in a great measure, dependent upon the speedy settlement of the country, I will advocate the sale of the Crown Lands to actual settlers on very terms.

I will advocate the improvement, and amendment, from time to time, of our municipal and assessment laws, and will endeavor to get a measure passed for legislating the assessments heretofore made upon unpatented wild lands, and for the more speedy collection of non-resident taxes.

Whatever will tend to promote the best interests of the Agricultural, Commercial, and Manufacturing classes, shall receive my cordial support. I will continue to urge upon the Government and Parliament of this country the necessity of aiding in the construction of adequate Commercial Harbours along the eastern coast of Lake Huron, the want of which has been so disastrous to life and property from year to year.

Contributing so largely to the general revenue of the Province, as they do, the inhabitants of these United Counties are justly entitled to receive increased Harbour accommodation, by which the value of their agricultural products would be greatly enhanced on the one hand, and the cost of goods required for home consumption proportionally lessened on the other.

Owing to the great size of the constituency, and the time appointed for the election being so near at hand, I will not be able to visit all parts of the Counties, but will endeavor to see as many of the electors as possible.
