LAGER AND WHISKY.

Prohibition Prevails in Goderich Just Now.

John Mc Bride, of the Albion Hotel, Sworn in Fines.

John Mc Bride, of the Albion Hotel, Goderich, appeared before Mayor Horton on Friday, charged with selling liquor contrary to the Canada Temperance Act. He was represented by P. Holt. W. Proudfoot conducted the case for the Inspector. The case had been adjourned from the previous Saturday.

There was the usual legal sparring at the opening of the case, Holt making two objections on behalf of the deft. (1) That he had not been served with a summons, only with a copy of one.

His worship. The objection was a good one had it been taken in the first place, but the defendant had accepted servi e, by appearing and pleading "not guilty."

Mr. Holt also took objection to the information on the ground that it covered the 5th and 6th days of July as the days on which the alleged offences might have been committed. The information should be to the effect that the defendant sold liquor on a certain day. If it turned out that defendant sold liquor on any other day but that named in the information, then his worship could have the information amended. Another objection still was that the information did not show that it was taken before Mr. Horton as mayor of the town of Goderich.

Neither did the summonses. As a justice of the peace his worship had no right or power to act in this manner. He had power as mayor, not as a J. P. It was just as when before two magistrates, the information should name both magistrates. He also took objection on the same ground to the summonses.

Mr. Proudfoot said there was really nothing in the objection to the information. The printed words put there were mere surplusages. They could be struck out, as they had no bearing on the matter, and the summonses and information would still contain all that was required. The fact that the defendant had appeared and pleaded to an information taken before the mayor of the town of Goderich settled any question as to the correctness of the information in that respect. As to the objection that the information could not be made to cover more than one day, that had been disposed of in the Wallace case. He also cited other instances where the information had been made to extend over 30 days.

Mr. Holt held that the plaintiff did not waive any right to object by appearing before the Mayor. He still claimed that the information was wrong.

The Mayor over-ruled the objections. Mr. Proudfoot then put in a copy of the Canada Gazette, to show that the Act was in force in Huron.

David Donaldson, bar-tender of the Albion hotel, was called, but failed to appear.

Constable Johnston swore to having served Donaldson with a summons to appear as a witness. He served him on Wednesday, the 22nd day of July.

Richard Simmonds, shoemaker, sworn, said: I live in the town of Goderich, and know the Albion hotel; I think it has been run as a hotel for about 20 years; there is a bar room in it; I don't know whether there has been any change in it since the Scott Act came into force; there is a bar there now; I cannot say whether I saw any bottles on a shelf or not in the bar, but I have seen a bottle on the top of the bar or the counter; I think I was in the hotel bar room on the 2nd of July, 1886, but could not swear positively; I was not in on the 3rd; I was in the bar between the 4th and 5th; I could not say who was in at the time, except the young man who went in with me; he works in the shop with me; I don't remember any bottles but him being in the bar with me at the time; the young man's name in Tom Montgomery; I had something to drink there; I asked for lager beer; I got what I asked for, at least I suppose so; Mr. McBride served me. (McBride then having I—paid for the lager; I had two drinks there, both lager; I only paid for one drink; each treated the other; what I got didn't intoxicate me.

To Mr. Holt—I have the opinion he paid for it because he generally pays for what he gets.

Mr. Proudfoot—Were you approached by Mr. McBride about giving evidence in this case?

Witness—Mr. McBride didn't do anything of that kind; he came to me the evening that I got my subpoena, and he said: "Well, Simmonds, did you get your subpoena?" I said "Yes," he said, "Do you recollect what you got?" and said, "Yes, I did," and he said, "That's all right," he didn't try to persuade me that I hadn't got the liquor that I took.

To Mr. Proudfoot—When I went into the bar-room the door was open, and I asked for what I wanted; I had no difficulty in getting it; I asked for what I wanted, and didn't take it without.

To Mr. Holt—I didn't see Montgomery pay for it; and the only reason I have for thinking that he did was he is a man who will pay for what he gets.

Thomas Robertson, blacksmith, was the next witness. He was sworn and said:—I live in Goderich, and know the Albion hotel; it is kept by Mr. McBride; I could not say how long he has kept it; but he kept it before the Scott Act came into force; I was in the hotel on Saturday the 3rd of July; I had something to drink there; I said "Give me a drink." I didn't ask for anything particular; I cannot say whether it was lager or whisky, but I cannot remember; Donaldson appears to be his bartender; to the best of my knowledge it was whiskey I got to drink; I should think the liquor would intoxicate me; I have no doubt it was intoxicating; I paid for it; I don't remember if there were any others in the bar at the time; there was no secrecy about my getting into the bar.

To Mr. Holt—To the best of my knowledge it was the Saturday after the 1st of July, but I will not positively swear to that; it was between the 3rd and 7th of July; I was between six and seven in the evening; I was sober; I will not swear who was behind the bar; I don't remember whether McBride or Donaldson was there; but it was either one of them; I don't know Donaldson is in the employ of McBride or not, in a capacity; I went in and asked some one to give me a drink; I didn't mention any kind of liquor; but I got the drink; it was given to me then and there; I will swear to the best of my knowledge, that it was the liquor that I had a drink of liquor there; I could not tell whether it was intoxicating or spirituous; I have not been drinking anything for some time.

To Mr. Proudfoot—I was there on the Saturday night after the 1st of July; to the best of my knowledge; I have seen Donaldson behind the bar, when I was in the hotel. To the best of my opinion it was whiskey I got; to the best of my knowledge it was spirituous.

T. B. VanEvery, shipping clerk, was called as a witness, but did not appear. Asher Farrow, collector of customs, did not respond.

F. W. Johnston, Reeve of Goderich, was called, but did not turn up.

Constable Johnston swore as to service of summonses upon the witnesses.

W. Campbell, town clerk, testified to the fact that there was no police magistrate, or any acting as such, in the town of Goderich.

His worship then intimated that sufficient evidence had been adduced to warrant him putting the defendant on his defence.

dismissed the Inspector having still appeared on his list against the lessee of the Albion hotel.

THE THIRD CASE. Tuesday, July 27th.

The case of the license inspector against John McBride, of the Albion Hotel, Goderich, was held on Wednesday before Mayor Horton, in the town hall.

The Canada Gazette of February 7th, 1885, was produced, showing the Canada Temperance Act of 1878 is in force in the county of Huron.

The defendant's counsel took exception to the proof of the Canada Temperance Act of 1878 being in force in the county of Huron.

The following witnesses were then called, but failed to appear: T. B. VanEvery, D. C. Strachan, John Scobie, Wm. Davis, H. Clucas, Asher Farrow, T. B. Dancy.

Constable Johnston testified that he had served summonses upon the above witnesses.

In consequence of the absence of witnesses, the plaintiff asked for bench warrants for above witnesses.

The Court then adjourned until July the 28th inst., at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

Wednesday, July 28th. The Court opened according to adjournment July 28th, 1886, at 4 o'clock.

D. C. Strachan, sworn—I know the Albion hotel; Mr. McBride keeps the Albion hotel; he has kept it for some two or three years; I will not swear I was in or was not in on Monday or Tuesday, the 5th and 6th of July inst. Probably almost every day within the last month I have been in the Albion hotel; I had something to drink in the Albion hotel within twenty days prior to the 24th July inst; I cannot name any day or occasion when I had anything to drink during that time; I drank beer during the time; I suppose I did pay for beer then, but I will not swear positively; I also had whiskey to drink during the same time; I suppose I did pay for some whiskey; I have very little doubt, but I will not swear positively that I did; if a man took enough of what I had to drink, I should think it was intoxicating; I had bottled ale to drink; I presume bottled ale similar to what I had in sufficient quantity is intoxicating. I don't remember being in the Albion hotel on the Tuesday after the 1st of July; David Donaldson served me with drink during the time; I have seen him a dozen or more times during the time behind the bar, I supposed waiting upon customers.

Cross-examined—I do not know in what capacity Mr. Donaldson is in the Albion hotel, but he is in the Albion within twenty days immediately following the 5th of July inst; the ale I drank did not intoxicate me; I believe if a man took enough of it would make him drunk; I will not swear that I paid for a drink; I don't remember, but if I did; I will not swear that I paid for the beer and whiskey I drank; I have no doubt I did; I know I have paid for whiskey there, but cannot say if within this specified time; I do not consider myself an expert on liquor, but I know liquor from another.

Re-examined—I carried on a liquor business myself for some years. John Scobie, sworn—I know the Albion hotel; I cannot swear that I was in the Albion hotel on the 5th or 6th days of July inst. I have been in the Albion hotel within twenty days prior to the 24th inst; I cannot recollect any one being in the Albion the same time I was there; I will swear I was not in the Albion every day during the time specified; I was in pay in Toronto several days; I cannot say the day I was away in Toronto; don't think I was out of town six days during the time specified; I presume I had something to drink in the Albion during the specified time; I might have had intoxicating liquor to drink during that time; perhaps I had beer and whiskey; I do not recollect any particular time when I had beer and whiskey; I might have paid for some beer and whiskey; I cannot say whether I got whiskey or not; I generally ask for a drink; I don't remember, but if I might have been in the Albion with Captain Dancy and T. B. VanEvery during the time specified; I do not recollect Mr. Farrow being there at any time. I think it was Mr. McBride or Mr. Donaldson who served me a drink; I presume he was in the bar-room when I got the drink; I saw bottles in the bar-room; there is a bar counter; I did not see a beer pump there; the beer I drank was poured out of a bottle; I don't know who poured it out; some persons call it bottled ale and some ginger ale; sometimes it might be ginger ale I had; sometimes strong ale; I cannot say if it was I drank was intoxicating, but it might have been if I took enough of it; I mean by strong ale fermented ale; the whiskey I had I cannot say was intoxicating; it did not intoxicate me; I have no doubt the whiskey I got contained intoxicating spirit; I can't say I paid for any of the beer or whiskey I had; I dare say I paid for it; I never heard Mr. McBride say he was giving liquor away; the liquor Mr. McBride had I have no doubt was for sale.

generally pay for what I get; the door leading into the bar is open a portion of the time; I mean the door leading from the resting room into the bar; I have seen bottles behind the bar in the bar-room; I have not seen any beer on draught; I have not seen any beer pump; the intoxicating liquor I drank was whiskey; I have seen Mr. Donaldson of and on for spoiled time behind the bar of the Albion hotel; I had drinks there more than once during this time on different days; what I had was called whiskey.

Cross-examined—All I can say is I have seen him (Donaldson) behind the bar and looking after the billiard table in the Albion. I don't know how he is hired there; I don't know whether he is hired or not; I am satisfied I was in the Albion between the 5th and 24th inst; I understand that whiskey is intoxicating; but I did not take enough to intoxicate me; I know I paid for liquor during the specified time but I cannot specify any particular day.

Re-examination—When I was in the bar room Mr. Donaldson was serving out drinks to customers.

Cross-examination—I cannot specify any particular date; I know that Mr. McBride and also Mr. McDonald served me with drinks during the specified time; I don't know on what day Mr. McBride served me; I cannot fix any day between the 5th and the 24th inst. Henry Clucas, sworn—I was not in the Albion hotel from the 5th to the 10th of July; was there on the 6th, 11th and 24th; I was out of town between the dates, and only returned on the 16th; I had something to drink then; I asked for a drink, and got something that looked like lager; it was what is called lager; I will not swear it was not intoxicating; I don't know how the liquor in the Albion during the time mentioned, and drank what is called lager, and nothing else; I think I paid for it; to the best of my knowledge it was Donaldson who served me; don't think there was any secrecy about the selling of liquor in the Albion; the lager I drank was not taken from a bottle; it was taken from behind the counter; there were no bottles on the shelves; don't recollect seeing any bottles behind the bar.

T. B. VanEvery sworn—I was in the Albion hotel on the 19th of July inst; I had something to drink there that day; it was lager I had; no one was with me when I went there, but some one was with me when I drank; I had just one drink; did not pay for it; no one paid for it; Mr. McBride gave it to me; have no recollection of being in the hotel any other time; there was no consideration for the lager I drank; probably if a person drank enough of it it would intoxicate.

Stephen Yates was sworn regarding the purchase of licenses under the Crooks Act, and his position as inspector. Cross-examined—I laid three information against McBride; the second one was withdrawn; I consider McBride pleaded to the second charge; I got the information on the 19th of July inst in Goderich, but refuse to answer who gave me the information.

After the evidence of Stephen Yates had been taken, counsel for deft. said he had no evidence to offer on behalf of the defendant; he did also not believe the evidence was now closed. His worship replied, "Yes, it is."

After the argument on both sides, the counsel for the prosecution asked leave to recall Mr. Yates, and his worship then adjourned the court until the 29th of July inst.

The court opened on the 29th inst, according to adjournment. His worship allowed Mr. Yates to be recalled.

The defendant's counsel objected to any further evidence being given, and Stephen Yates, recalled, and sworn—The Albion hotel kept by the defendant, John McBride, is situated in the town of Goderich, county of Huron, on the south side of the market square; he has kept it for some time under the name of the "Crest," and has been keeping it since the Scott Act came into force.

At the conclusion of Mr. Yates' evidence, the Mayor said he would give his decision in writing on Monday morning.

Croquet had its leaders in G. H. Clutton and F. B. Linfield. Baseball winners found Harry Horton and J. H. Williams as rival captains, with the ladies interested rather than spectators. The game was won by the latter side. After an adjournment at the house a short time, songs were given by Harry Horton, Edith Horton, Miss McManus and Miss Macdonald, of Dunlop, and recitations by Linfield, F. Linfield and G. H. Clutton. The Dunlop scribe made a few remarks, congratulating all present on the merry evening they had, and expressing thanks to their host and hostess for their kind attention to the guests.

**Deaths of a Pioneer.**—Christopher B. Lindsay, one of the oldest settlers in Goderich township, died on Tuesday last at the great age of 83 years. He was a native of Ireland, born near Belfast. He came to Canada 54 years ago, and after spending about four years in and around Goderich, settled on his farm, which for fifty years has been the homestead of the Lindsay family. Mr. Lindsay was of robust health up to within a few days of his decease, having never required the services of a physician. He took unwell on the Thursday before his death, and the complaint developed into inflammation of the lungs, which carried him off. He was a veteran of 1837, having shouldered a musket and marched to Saratoga in defence of the country. He was a quiet, unobtrusive man, and a good neighbor. He leaves two sons, David and Nixon, and four daughters, Mrs. T. Laurence, of Lucknow, and Mrs. Robt. Marshall, Mrs. James Caldwell, and Mrs. Edward Ahsson, of Goderich township.

John Ford died at the residence of his brother William, Holmesville, on Monday morning, July 26, at the mature age of 72 years. His demise was unexpected. The evening previous he attended service at St. Stephen's church, having walked there and back, a distance of four miles. Upon returning home he was standing up partaking of a lunch when suddenly his lower limbs lost their power and he sank to his knees. In reply to a question from his sister he quietly said, "Leave me alone." These were the last words he uttered. He remained unconscious until next morning, when his gentle spirit took its flight from its clayey environment. He was one of a family of nine, six boys and three girls, all of whom, but one brother, survive. His is a remarkably stalwart family, the average height of the brothers being about 6 ft. 4 in. He came to this section from Ireland 54 years ago. He was a skillful shipwright, and in earlier times often worked in Goderich, Detroit and other points. Of late years he has been residing with his brother William, here, in easy circumstances, his wants having been provided for under the will of his father. Although of giant form and a somewhat leonine countenance, he was gentle as a child. Though not destined to be one of the exceptional few whose deeds are of national repute, his name will long be a household word in many families as the synonym of honesty and kindness of heart, a great big, human heart. He is supposed to have died of congestion of the brain. Deceased was never married. The funeral took place on the 27th, to Goderich cemetery, and was largely attended. —[Ex.]
