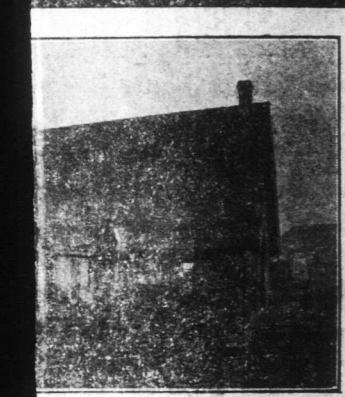

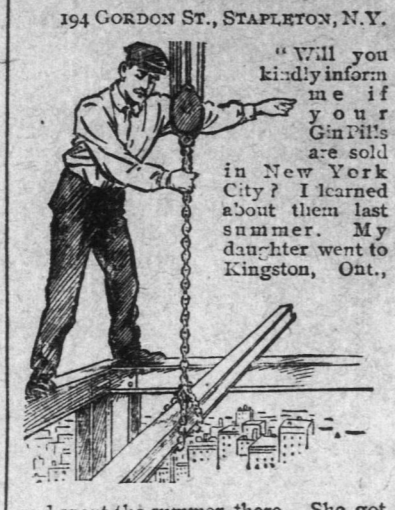

### By Way of Pedagogy.

#### School Teachers Have a Better Chance for Statesmen's Jobs.

No statesman has made a stronger mark for himself in the history of Great Britain than the present Prime Minister, for, whatever the views may be with regard to the Prime Minister's policy towards the House of Lords, it cannot be denied that in the face of odds that appeared insuperable to most of his predecessors in office he has been successful in bringing about the most revolutionary change that has taken place in the written and unwritten constitution of England since 1688, when James II. was deposed and the Protestant occupancy and succession of the throne of the country assured.

It may be, therefore, of timely interest to recall that Mr. Asquith acquired his habits of mastery over his ministerial colleagues and over the members of the Liberal party (except, of course, the Irish) as a school teacher. His father was far from rich, and, destining him to a commercial career, sent him to the City of London School, where he distinguished himself as a scholar, but not as a schoolboy. That is to say, he showed no taste whatsoever for the sports and games of the institution. He carried off, however, all the school prizes, including an Oxford University Scholarship, and entering Balliol College, from which so many men, of note have been graduated, became one of its most brilliant lights, and one of the bright particular stars of Dr. Jowett, its famous master, achieving a degree of prestige among his fellow students which eventually led to their electing him president of the celebrated debating club known as the Union.

Having thus made his mark at Oxford, he returned to London to study for the Bar. The regular course extends over a period of three years, and throughout this time, having only small means of his own, he earned his living as an assistant master at his old school, that of the City of London. It was not until some time after receiving his "call," in 1876, when he succeeded in establishing a legal practice sufficient to keep body and soul together, that he gave up his teachership. These few years of assistant mastership at the City of London School have proved of inestimable value to Mr. Asquith.

Evidence of the practical acceptance of this view may be obtained by a glance around Europe, where schoolmasters are to be found occupying so many of the high offices of the Government of their country that one is led to the belief that the pedagogue's desk is, after all, perhaps the most advantageous stepping-stone to high political preferment, and that teaching boys furnishes the best training for Cabinet office.

#### Items of Interest.

William A. Slater, Jr., son of a wealthy New York man and himself the possessor of a large fortune inherited from relatives, will, after the holidays, join the ranks of the millworkers, entering a yarn mill at Jewett City, Conn. He recently became of age and expressed a preference for a practical education rather than a college training. He will begin work at the bottom.

The comfort of horses is studied in Kansas. A new rule that works well there is to put into livery stables all horses found standing unblanketed. The owner is compelled to pay the costs of this procedure and soon learns that his horses must be made comfortable before leaving them. It has superseded the system of arrests and fines and seemingly increases the number of humane persons.

At Morris, Ill., excitement has been caused by the finding of gold in the gizzards of ducks killed on Aux Sable Creek. A hotel chef was first attracted by the brilliancy of particles in the gizzards on Thanksgiving Day. When it was found where the ducks came from, hunters went out and brought in more of the fowls. The gizzards of these were found to contain the same substance. Many believe that a rich strike may be located.

### A Perpetual Pension.

An interesting fact has come to light in connection with Mr. Smith, a groom, who has lately taken up his residence at Peterborough, viz., that his family have been drawing a pension from the British Government for the space of 276 years.

Mr. Smith, who draws thirty shillings a week, explained in an interview the history of the pension. It appears that after the battle of Worcester an ancestor of Smith assisted Prince Charles to escape, and was one of those who helped to hide him in the famous oak tree. Years passed, and it was not till 1675 that King Charles II. was informed of the incident. Parliament, on the advice of the King, was not slow at rewarding those who had rendered services, however slight to the sovereign. The consequence was that Mr. Smith's ancestor was placed on the perpetual pension list at the rate of thirty shillings a week, with the result that the family have received (in round figures) something like \$107,500 since the pension was granted.

Mr. Smith's father, it appears, parted with the pension to another person while he lived, but on his death it reverted again to his eldest son, and in turn it will descend to the present pensioner's eldest child, and so on. It is stated this perpetual pension is the only one of its kind in existence.—London Daily News.

Sir Thomas Moore, Bart., Whose Family Has Come Upon Evil Days, is One of the Queerest Characters in Romantic Ireland.

Ireland has never lacked quaint and romantic personalities. Sir Thomas Moore is the owner of what must not be described as a mushroom title. It did not grow in a night nor was it conferred on him for any political service. Sir Thomas is no mere knight, he is a full-fledged baronet, but as in the case of many of the Irish aristocracy his title did not bring with it any of the rich things of this world. So Sir Thomas Moore, Bart., was obliged for quite a number of years to resort to the expedient of hawking coals for a living in the streets of the Rebel City, where he became a conspicuous character.

Sir Thomas' finances could not even reach the dignity of the usual horse and trolley, mostly adopted by coal hawkers in Cork streets. A donkey and barrow had to suffice, and from this barrow the baronet weighed out coal from 14 pounds upward to the democratic citizens of his native town.

There was however some satisfaction to Sir Thomas in feeling that his poor customers enjoyed the unusual honor of being served in this way by a real man of title, who moreover never manipulated the scales to the disadvantage of the buyer. They said he was a real "barrow knight."

Irish heiresses, anxious to annex a title, who flattered their money bags in the face of this imppecunious baronet, failed for a considerable number of years to move him from the position he had taken up of earning a modest living by the obscure occupation of coal hawker.

An amusing story is related of an English society woman who came to Cork with the hope of persuading Sir Thomas to abandon bachelorhood. She invited him to dine with her at a local hotel. The baronet left his donkey and barrow round the next block and put in an appearance at the hotel covered in coal dust and with all the other traces of his occupation thick upon him. In spite of that, the lady was out for a title and was willing to take Sir Thomas to the nearest Registry Office, but no amount of beguiling or fascinating glances could soften the bachelor heart of the aristocratic coal dealer. "She came, she saw, but she did not conquer" was his observation when he told the story some time after.

## By the Way.

At Brighton, Mich., several days ago, Mr. and Mrs. James Avis, their two sons and two daughters knelt by the bedside of their son and brother, James, Jr., and kissed him a last goodbye. A post mortem proved that the young man died of rabies and to-day the family of six are patients at an Ann Arbor Institute.

The interment took place in St. Augustine's Cemetery, LaManche.

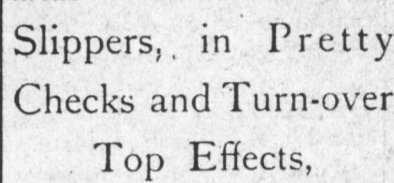

# GEO. KNOWLING.

## Hon. Mr. Greene's Funeral.

The funeral of the late Hon. D. J. Greene, M.L.C., took place yesterday afternoon and was largely attended. Headed by the band of the Catholic Cadet Corps, the cortege started from Queen's Road, down Church Hill to Duckworth Street, along to Prescott Street and on to the Cathedral by way of Military Road. A guard of honor of the C.C.C. of which the deceased was Lieut.-Colonel, was lined up on each side of the hearse, which was covered with floral tributes sent by friends. Immediately behind the coffin walked the relatives of the deceased. Then came in the order named His Excellency the Governor, Sir Ralph Williams, the Prime Minister, Sir Edward Morris; Governor's Private Secretary and A.D.C., in His Excellency's carriage; His Grace Archbishop Howley, His Lordship Chief Justice Horwood, Mr. Justice Johnson, members of the Executive Council, Legislative Council and House of Assembly, Mayor Ellis and City Councilors, officers of C.L.B., M.G.B. and M.M. Highlanders, heads of Government departments, and a large concourse of citizens. The band played the Dead March in Saul, which added solemnity to the proceedings. Arriving at the Cathedral the casket was placed on a catafalque at the sanctuary rail, where seats were provided for His Excellency the Governor and party and for the C. C. C. officers. Vested in cope and mitre the Archbishop recited the funeral service, "Liberia Me Domine" and "Ego Sum Resurrection Vita." His Grace was attended by His Rev. Monsignor Roche, Rev. J. Donnelly, Rev. J. J. McGrath, Rev. D. O'Callaghan and Rev. D. Sheehan. His Grace delivered a panegyric on the deceased from the text, "I know that my Redeemer liveth and that in my flesh I shall see my God." After dwelling on the Christian belief in the Resurrection, His Grace went on to pay a tribute to the many virtues and amiable qualities of the deceased, who was an important factor in the legislative and public life of the Colony, and whose brilliant talents would be missed in his county's councils. His Grace made touching reference to the beloved wife and mother and other relatives of the deceased, whose hearts were now filled with grief, but there remained the consoling thought that all would be united hereafter where there would be no parting. He enjoined that prayers be offered for the dead. At the conclusion of the service the procession formed up again and with solemn tread advanced to Belgivere Cemetery where the body was consigned to the earth to await the day of resurrection.

## Mr. Neal's New Purchase.

Mr. George Neal, who has been absent from the city the past couple of weeks, returned here by the express yesterday afternoon. While abroad he purchased the fine steamer Belma, which was built in France 3 years ago at a cost of \$75,000. The ship will be used as a general carrier by the Bell Island S. S. Co., of which Mr. Neal is one of the principals. She is a fine vessel of 456 tons gross, 154 net; lit with electric light and capable of steaming 12 knots. She is also fitted with a cold storage plant, which cost \$10,000 and which must be of great utility for those shipping perishable goods during the warm summer season. She has also an evaporator on board. The vessel is substantially built, well equipped in every respect and is now on her way from Sydney to Bay Roberts coal laden.

## Good Herring Fishery.

Herring are reported to be very plentiful still at Bay of Islands, especially at Middle Arm. Altogether 40 American vessels have loaded at Bay of Islands and Bonne Bay to date and have roundly taken 60,000 barrels of salted and fresh fish. There are a number of vessels now at both places and others are on the way from Boston and Gloucester.

## Became Ill.

Mr. Fred Harvey, the well known employee of the office of Bishop & Sons, while passing up Hutchings Street last evening became suddenly ill and fell on the street. Consts. Aylward and Bussey, who were near, picked him up and conveyed him to the Western Station. The man was suffering from hemorrhage of the lungs and bled profusely. Dr. Fraser was summoned and treated the patient, who was then driven to his boarding house on Gower Street. No dangerous results are feared, and it is hoped that with proper attention Mr. Harvey will soon be himself again.

## Supplied the Orphans.

To celebrate the anniversary of opening his new store, Mr. S. B. Kasher to-day gave a number of the Church of England Orphanage boys a fit-out of good strong boots. Mr. P. F. Collins supplied them with stockings and Mrs. McRae with candles and fruits. The children of other orphanages will receive similar gifts to-morrow.

## Persian Crisis.

Special Evening Telegram LONDON, To-Day. Referring to the Persian question during a discussion on Foreign Affairs in the House of Commons to-day, Sir Edward Grey said the Anglo-Russian agreement was not intended to impair the independence and integrity of Persia. A declaration to that effect had been made to the Persian Government, but he added that Britain had not undertaken an obligation to protect the integrity of Persia. The Russian Government, continued the Secretary, had demanded that Shuster be withdrawn. The British Government did not object to that demand. Shuster's intention of appointing British officials in Northern Persia was good, but the spirit and intention of the Anglo-Russian agreement could not be permitted to be upset, and two great nations embroiled by the action of any individual, no matter how good his intentions were. After what had happened he agreed with Russia's demand that the consent of the British and the Russian Legislatures should be obtained for the appointment of Foreign Advisers. As Persia was unable to pay the indemnity, he hoped Russia would be induced not to press that demand. The British Government was strongly opposed to the restoration of the ex-Shah. Russia had given a categorical assurance that she had no intention of that kind. In this connection Sir Edward read a communication from the Government at St. Petersburg stating that the troops would not advance from Kasbin for eight days, unless extraordinary circumstances should force an advance, and that, when Persia complied the demands for the further presence of the troops would be superfluous. The communication concluded with an assurance of adherence to the Russo-British agreement. Sir Edward insisted upon the importance of Shuster being replaced without delay by a Foreign Financial Adviser, acceptable to Britain and Russia, and that the latter country should co-operate to assist Persia in securing loans for the restoring of order.

## Nfldr. Married At Seattle.

A very pretty wedding between two former residents of Newfoundland, took place in far-off Seattle, Washington, on October 19th, in the Church of Our Lady of Good Help. The contracting parties were Mr. Patrick Byrne and Miss Mary Goss, both residents of Torbay. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Father Barrett. The bride looked charming in a dress of crepe meteeur over white messaline and carried a shower bouquet of lilacs of the valley. After the ceremony a wedding supper and re-union were held, and attended by the many friends of the happy pair. Amongst the guests were quite a few Newfoundlanders including Mr. and Mrs. P. Ryan and Messrs. G. Molloy, J. Doyle, G. Doyle, W. H. Ryan, T. M. Tapper and J. M. Tapper. Both Mr. and Mrs. Byrne received numerous and very handsome presents. Mr. Byrne, the groom, is a brother of Detective Sergeant Byrne, of this city. The happy couple are making their home in Concrete, Washington. The Telegram extends its felicitations.

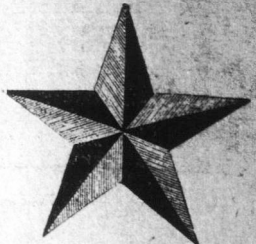

**Household Notes.**

If there is a cold chicken left from the roast cut it into dice, mix with a cream dressing, put in the baking dish sprinkle the top with cheese and stuffed olives and bake in a quick oven until brown.

To remove warts without leaving a scar, drop oil of cinnamon carefully on the place two or three times a day. This will occasion no soreness and the warts will disappear in the course of four or five weeks.

When cutting garments by paper patterns, much time can be saved in marking perforations for tucks, etc., by putting carbon paper under the top piece of goods and marking two pieces at the same time.

When woolen materials become greasy, rub in some powdered French chalk (such as tailors use). Allow it to remain there some hours. Then shake it out and the grease will be found to have disappeared.

The best way to clean patent leather shoes is, after removing all the dirt, to wipe them with a soft cloth dipped in milk. Polish with a dry cloth, and you will have a bright polish, besides preserving the leather.

Extra crab meat for which there are no shells is delicious dressing with Hollandaise sauce, and served on round croutons. Shreds of red peppers sprinkled on top just as the crab is served makes it more artistic.

To use liquid bluing without removing the cork, bore a hole in the centre and insert a quill, having it extend below and above the cork. In this manner it is easy to use the exact amount and less danger of waste.

To clean ribbon sponge with alcohol and rub over the spot with some clean white soap. During the process the ribbon must be kept straight. When clean rinse in alcohol and place between two towels. Press out with a hot iron.

To make mock whipped cream use one cup of milk sweetened, scant teaspoonful flour, stir in milk and cook

until like cream. Have whites of two eggs, beaten stiff, pour boiling cream over them and beat for a minute or two.

Jewelry can be successfully cleaned by washing it in hot soap suds in which a little ammonia has been dissolved. Shake off the water and lay the jewelry in a small box of the sawdust to dry. This method leaves no scratches or marks of any kind.

Canned peaches left from one day's dessert are delicious put in individual deep pie molds and baked with strips of rich pie dough across the top. Put a lump of butter in the bottom of the dish and sprinkle sugar and cinnamon on top of the peaches.

To stone raisins free the raisins from the stems and put them in a bowl. Cover them with boiling water and let them stand for two minutes. Pour off the water, open the raisins and the seed can be removed quickly and easily without the usual stickiness.

A very handy stocking supporter is made by cutting a piece of wide elastic in three-inch pieces. Sew a fastener on each end of each piece of the elastic. Fasten one end to the underwear and the other to the stocking. One or two may be used on each stocking.

A fruit pie is very good, made with a little water and the edges not stuck together. Then, when it is baked the top crust may be lifted off and a syrup of water, sugar, spice and butter poured in. In this way the juice does not boil out in the baking and leave the pie dry.

To wash brushes and combs, put a teaspoonful of ammonia in a basin of hot water and dip the brush up and down in it, letting the comb remain in the water for a few minutes. In this way all the grease will disappear, and after rinsing in cold water, both brushes and combs will be perfectly clean.

In many cases after a grease spot has been removed there will be left a faint mark of the spot, which may be noticed, after a time, by the dust which adheres to this spot. Make a saturated solution of alum and water. Heat this slowly on the stove and when very hot apply to the grease as before. The effect will be all that is desired.

**Romance of a Diamond.**

### More Power to Him.

It would appear that the end is not yet in regard to the investigation of the anarchy and violence which has alienated sympathy from some of the labour agitators in America. Mr. W. J. Burns, who had charge of the investigation against the McNamara's, states that there are developments to come in reference to the dynamiting conspiracy and that men higher up in official union life than the McNamara's are to be arrested. There is also a suspicion that some of those most vehement in shouting for the hanging of the two convicted men want to see them silenced, and some of the Unionists have not been slow in giving expression to their suspicions. It would be beneficial to the States, it would be especially helpful to the principle of unionism if American unionism should be purged from the sinister influence of murder and criminal conspiracy. All men who can give utterance to such a plea as James B. McNamara did, viz., "I am guilty, but I did what I did for principle," are a danger to society, and a menace to unionism. Such a detestable doctrine as murder for "principle" should be frowned upon by all right thinking men and women, and all who hold it waded out from industrial and other societies. The American authorities have a duty to perform in this respect, and the general body of union workers will, we are sure, help them to perform it thoroughly and will back Detective Burns in exposing all who are bringing unionism into hatred and contempt by murder and other criminal outrages.

### Not Men Enough to Man Life-boats.

WASHINGTON, To-day.  
Mr. Frasier, Secretary of the Seamen's Union, Boston, started the House Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries by declaring that the majority of passenger carrying ships on the Atlantic coast had not enough members of the crew to man the lifeboats. He said most of the ships carry only boats enough for 75 per cent of the passengers carrying capacity of the ships. This witness was one of a score of sailors of various trades who urged the passage of the Wilson Bill to improve the conditions of the men in the seafaring trade. The Bill would increase from 72 to 1,000 cubic feet, the space for each member of the crew, and from 12 to 16 feet the deck space. It would provide for more efficient men in the fire rooms and for other reforms.

## French Debate On Moroccan Question.

Special to Evening Telegram. PARIS, To-day.

An attempt by the Conservative members of the Chamber of Deputies to postpone the ratification of the Franco-German Agreement about Morocco, evoked a speech on the subject from Foreign Minister De Selves. In the course of his remarks, he declared that Germany at the beginning of the negotiations asserted she would not accept nor abide by the new Algeiras Conference as the method of settling the Moroccan question. A heated debate ensued, the German, British, Russian and Spanish ambassadors being present. The discussion followed an interpellation by Count de Mun and other members of the Conservative side, who wish to postpone the ratification of the Franco-German accord in regard to Morocco until after the negotiations going on with Spain is concluded. De Selves opposing the motion for postponement of the ratification of the Franco-German Agreement, traced the negotiations between France and Germany since the beginning of the crisis. He admitted there had been moments of tension due to the excessive demands of Germany. De Selves denied that Germany had become irritable and tried to start a conflict. On the contrary, her attitude had been conciliatory. The chief advantage of the Agreement is that it frees foreign politics from the Moroccan question, which had been a permanent source of conflict. We have no intention of abandoning our friends. On the contrary we shall bind them closer. In conclusion, he said, the negotiations with Spain had been taken up in a friendly spirit. De Mun's motion was defeated by 448 to 39 votes.

DELHI, To-day.

The Emperor of India yesterday reviewed 50,000 British and native troops. He held an investiture in the Royal Camp last evening bestowing orders for 83 Knighthoods and 200 Companionships.

All the others have been taken off and reached Tangier on the backs of mules.
