THE LAURNETIC.

LONDON, Jan. 31. About 260 men were lost in the sinking of the auxiliary cruiser Laurentic, many of them having been killed by the explosion of a mine, which sent the former White Star Liner to bottom last Thursday, says a despatch to the Press Association from Belfast. The despatch says the Laurcoast of Ireland and sank in about ten minutes. A big hole was blown in the side of the ship by the explosion. Several boats were quickly launched and filled with scores of men, but were engulfed in the vortex of the sinking steamer. For a time the sea was dotted with struggling men, some of whom were taken into other boats and saved. The remainder could not be rescued. A half gale was blowing and the weather was intensely cold. 



Schr. General Laurie Reaches Port.

The schr. General Laurie, Capt. Reuben Benson, reached port at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon after a voyage lasting 46 days from Bahia. in the early part of the return trip the ship ran into dead calm and was fifteen days covering a distance of three hundred miles. Benson was about to fend off a blow from an approaching boat and in doing so his foot slipped heneath the crank of the motor engine which was revolving at full speed and broke several bones near the ankle.
