The Secretary read a letter from Mr. Martin, teacher in the East Ward School, requesting the Board to make some necessary improvements in the School. Referred to School Property Committee.

The Secretary presented accounts from the H. wil Office, and from Messrs. D. Savage, for repairing school clocks, and Hart, for brooms, bught for the use of his school. Referred to Finance Committee.

A communication was read from Mr. Grafiley, respecting the procuring of a stove for the new addition to the North Ward School, and asking for a grant to purchase sheet lessons for the younger pupils. The report of the School Property Committee deals with the first item, and the other clause was referred to the School Property Committee. In accordance with the instructions of the Board, the Committee advertised for tenders for putting up the addition to the North Ward school, Mr. J. Armstrong's tender being the lowest (\$4400) was accepted. The contract being completed, and certified to by the architect, the same was ordered to be paid. The committee found that in order to render the North Ward School comfortable, and secure proper ventilation, several alterations would have to be made in the old portion of the school. The joints and flooring of the same being perfectly rotten, it was found to be absolutely necessary to make a have to be made in the old portion of the school. The joints and flooring of the same being perfectly rotten, it was found to be absolutely necessary to make a new floor, and to take further precautions for proper ventilation in order to prevent the liability of rot, as had taken place in the joints and bond timbers of the old floor. The several items, amounting in all to \$184.86\forall have been certified to as correct by the architect, and the Committee recommend them to be paid. Mr. Bruce's account for drawing plans, and inspecting the work amounting to \$46\text{, the committee also recommend to be paid. The Committee advertised for tenders for making seats and desks for tenders for making seats and desks for the South Ward School, Mr. Brownlow's tender at \$2\text{ per seat and desk being the lowest was accepted. As a number of desks were required for the new addition to the North Ward School, the Committee ordered ten to be made for it at the same rate. They also recommend that a stove be purchased, and put up in the newly erected part of this school. The report was adopted.

He has become thinner, though he takes his meals regularly, and pretends to be very cheerful. Sandy Gemmell appears to feel the dread-fulness of hisposition more than any of the others. He seems tohroughly cast down and broken-spirited. The Hudson Bay Company's Dying Struggle.

The North Wester of Sept. 21st says: The Hudson's Bay Monopoly, which prides itself on being the "last" of those grand old "Governing Corporations," which has been preparing to go down in dignified demise, with its flag at the mast head, like some unfortunate battle ship or, more clasically, like the Plelades set with pristine glory below the horizon of settlement and competition; or historically, folding its drapery of rat-skins about its body corporate, sink down like poor Caesar at the base of Pompey's statue, and all for the good of the people. This magnificent commercial funeral has been contemplated by the Hudson's Bay Company since the dividends became diminuitive. But notwithstanding the desire of the Company to go down with its original claims untarnished, several little obstacles present themselves that tend to lessen the grandeur of its departure. It is well known to many that the Company, in its grasping spirit to obtain as much of the veritable North Pole and solar system as a possible, pushed their employees beyond their territorial limits, and by mistake built Fort Youcon, on the Youcon River, in Russian Possessions. The possessions passed to the United States by the recent transfer. And now by advices we learn that the Company has received another territorial stroke under the same rib of grasping proclivities. The recent surveys of Mr. Armstrong's corps, under the direction of the Surveyor General, have demonstrated that the boundary line at Pembina instead of running at the point heretofore supposed actually crosses the river down two miles further north, thus bringing the Company's Fort at Pembina upon American instead of Hudson's Bay Company's territory.

Cape papers which have come to hand give a detailed report of the judgment given by the Judges in the Supreme Court at Natal on July 31, in the case of the "Bishop of Natal, se, the Rev. J. H. Willis," the object of the suit being to prevent Mr. Willis, who had been licensed by the Metropolitan Bishop of Cape Town, from officiating without Bishop Colenso, is long as he at great length contended that the court had jurisdiction (which had been denied) and that Bishop colenso, as long as he holds the letters patent, is to all intents and purposes the Bishop of the Anglican Church in Natal, saying, "If the applicant has misbehaved, if he has done any act, or put forward any theological opinion which renders him unfit or incapable of retaining this position, why is he not deprived? Why are his letters patent not cancelled? The same power that created him can unmake him. AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENTS.— In France, as in Ireland, the scarcity of farm labor promises to be the means of introducing inhproved methods of work, and especially agricultural machines. M. Leconteux, member of the Agricultural Society of France, lately issued an address to the farmers of the country on the subject of steam ploughs, suggesting a subscription to provide for a thorough series of experiments.
