The New French-Canadian Political Leader.

The Montreal Witness thuz sums up the opinions expressed by the leading French-Canadian papers with respect to the recent election of Mr. Langevin as leader of that party in the Dominion Parliament :-

Langevin as leader of that party in the Dominion Parhament:—

"The Journal de Quebce is severe on this election, and charges that the new leader has been thrust upon the Province of Quebce by the clique of Federal M.P's, who, it says, took it upon themselves to declare him chief not only of the Conservative party in the Dominion House, but also in the Quebce Legislature, which was not represented on the occasion. L'Evenement goes into a recital of all the rare qualities that enabled Sir G. E., Cartier the wield his influence as a party chief so successfully, and finds them entirely awanting in Mr. Langevin, who is, also unfavorably compared in point of disinterestedness with his predecessor. It says he would make a first-rate Minister in an assembly of deaf, mutes, and avers that unless he be attacked himself he never figures in a debate where the Ministry and the Opposition are contending over some important principle or question. It alludes to his alleged employment of ruffians at the Quebec elections, and concludes by expressing apprehensions that the French-Canadian race must be in a state of degeneracy to choose as their leading representative a third rate man such as it styles Mr. Langevin.

It is but fair to note that the editors of the Journal de Quebce, is particularly inimical to him, because of various disappointments, such as not getting the Lieut. Governorship of Quebec, &c, which have driven the latter into the ranks of the Opposition. Nevertheless this sound of discord is ominous, and seems to indicate that the potent spell which banded Lower Canadian members together behind a leader is broken. Discord in the church and discord in politics are signs of the times. They may be good signs, too, if they indicate that French-Canadians are beginning to think for themselves and casting off the reproach of being blind followers of any political leader or party. Under Sir George's regime they followed his dictates so tamely and without question that they came to be called his moutons.
