At the age of young Livingstone became a "piecer" a cotton factory, and for many years engaged in hard work as an operat An evening school furnished him with copportunity of acquiring some kaledge of Latin and Greek, and fina after attaching a course of medicine ledge of Latin and Greek, and inally, after attending a course of medicine at the Glasgow University, and the theological lectures of Wardlaw, Professor of Theology to the Scotch Independents, he offered himself to the London Missionary Society, by whom he was ordained as a medical missionary in 1840. He intended that China should be 'the field of his labors, but owing to the Opium war it was deemed inexpedient for him to go there and accordingly he was designated for the African mission—an event which determined the future course of his life. In the Summer of 1840 after a woyage of three months he landed at Port Natal in South Africa, and promptly repaired to Kuruman, where the veteran African missionary Dr. Moffatt had founded a station. Here he met the lady—a daughter of Dr. Moffatt—who four years later became his wife. After studying for two years the language and customs of the Bakwains he removed in 1843 to Mabosta, where he founded a missionary station, and during the next six years labored in his calling there and at Kolobeng, a station about 50 further north. In June, 1849, in company with Oswell and Aurray, two English gentlemen, Dr. Livingstone started on his first exploring expedition into the interior, and on August, reached Lake Ngami by crossing the Bakalihari desert, which had for a long time presented in superable obstacles to persons approaching in that direction. The party returned to Kolobeng in October and in the succeeding year Livingstone made another journey to the lake, but was prevented by the prevalence of fever, and a species of fly very troublesome to cattle, from proceeding to the northward of it. In 1851, in company with Mr. Oswell, he again started for the north, and proceeding in a more easterly direction, reached the great river Zambes; flowing in the centre of Africa. In April, 1852, he accompanded has the missionary settlement he and chaldren to Caps Town, and Laving witnessed their departure for England, returned to Kuruman with the intention of selecting a locality for a ne

peril across the Congo River to Angola at the capital of which country, Loanda on the western coast of Africa, he arrived May 31, 1854, and was hospitably received by the Portuguese authorities stationed there. "We are met together," said that distinguished geographer, "for the purpose of welcoming Dr. Livingstone on his return home from South Africa after an absence of 16 years, during which, while "endeavoring to spread the blessings of Christianity through lands never before trodden by the foot of any European, he had made geographical discoveries of incalculable importance. In all his various journeys Dr. Livingstone had travelled over no less than 11,000 miles of African territory; and he had come back to Englandas the pioneer of sound and useful knowledge; for by his astronomical observations he had determined the sites of numerous places, hills, rivers and lakes, nearly all of which had been hithertounknown, while he had seized upon every opportunity of describing the physical features, climatology and geographical structure of the countries which he had explored, and had pointed out many new sources of commerce as yet unknown to the scope and enterprise of the British merchant."
