

TRADE IMPROVEMENT.

Perceptible Improvement in the Wholesale Trade.

MONEY MATTERS SATISFACTORY

Goods Most Fancied by Retail Merchants.

BRIGHT OUTLOOK FOR SPRING TRADE

Wholesalers Getting Tired of Selling Sugar Below Cost - The Ice Harvest - When the Cotton-Combine Takes Over the Market - The Grain Situation - The World's Grippe Medicines - The World's Daily Budget of Commercial and Financial News.

Nearly all branches of the wholesale trade have developed more activity during the week. In some it is more apparent than in others, but there are none in which business can be said to be absolutely dull.

THE TRADE OUTLOOK.

As Viewed by the Country Merchants and Revealed to the Wholesaler. - Country customers who have been in the city lately are making a number of one-time applications for lower insurance rates which are not being granted.

It is a boom that does not look for, but they anticipate a good healthy trade. They are not in a hurry to get out of the city, although it seems to be the weather rather than the business that is the cause.

Nothing seems to be doing in floor wool and prices are nominally unchanged. Sheep are selling in small quantities at 22 to 25c. There is very little doing in extra and prices are nominal at 20 to 25c.

BOOTS AND SHOES.

Manufacturers are still filling spring orders, and travelers' orders continue to flow. Trade for immediate requirements has improved a good deal since the week before last.

Hide continues quiet and the inferior quality offering and selling at lower prices. The season for skins is pretty well over but few are coming forward in consequence.

Trade satisfactory. A little more demand is reported for heavy chemicals and some of the demand is likely to remain for some time. The demand for influenza medicines is now about down to the normal level.

There is no change in values. Excise-trader, insect powder is beginning to move. The advance in iron is not marked as in red. Prices here are slightly higher at \$1.50 to \$1.60 for the ton.

Country trade appears to be in a much better condition than for some time past. Stocks are light and orders are coming in.

There has been a big enquiry for gloves in cashmere, silk and linen, while all gloves which appear to be growing in favor. In extra demand. Heavy and undergarment wool, and there has been an advance in the price of various kinds of head, silver and gold trimming.

WHEAT STILL ADVANCING.

On the curb in Chicago at 2.15 p.m. May wheat was quoted at 95c.

Canadian Pacific opened in London at 95c and closed at 94c.

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A FORGER BROUGHT BACK.

Detective Rogers' Capture of Thomas Williamson in Nevada—Another Impression That "They Never Sleep" Government Detectives Rogers is expected to return in a day or two with a forger, whose arrest and extradition was only accomplished after the most persistent efforts.

On the 20th last, the forger, Thomas Williamson, was taken to the law office of Boutelle & Boutelle, Toronto, and requested to procure two loans of \$1500 each, one on the farm and the other on the city property.

The forger was discovered. Bowman was instructed to sign the valuation papers.

The company in April, 1891, laid the matter before the Attorney-General and requested that Detective Joseph B. Rogers be entrusted with the case.

On August 18th, the marshal succeeded in arresting Williamson on a ranch near Reno, Nevada; he was taken to the city and committed to the city jail.

On the 20th last, the forger was arrested again by the sheriff of Reno, on information sent by Rogers.

Mr. Whitney thought the bill was illiberal, that it was more worthy of a country like Russia than of Canada.

Mr. Mevius, in reply, said that the bill was not intended to be a measure of retaliation, but a measure of reform.

Mr. Mevius then moved to amend the bill, so as to give the Municipal Council the power to appoint a registrar.
