Deputy Attorney-General Cartwright has carefully gone over the evidence taken at the trial of Duncan Hendershott and W. D. Welter, sentenced to be executed at St. Thomas on June 18 for the murder of the former's nephew, and has decided to refuse the application of the counsel for the prisoners for a new trial Mr. Cartwright has given the matter the fullest attention and reviewed the various points submitted by the counsel, and has arrived at the conclusion that the prisoners have had a fair and impartial trial and he sees no rea-

son whatever why a new trial should be granted. be granted.

The only hope left for the accused now is the commutation of their sentence to imprisonment for life, which has been applied for from the Deputy Minister of Justice. In view of the nature of the crime, it is highly improbable that the commutation will be granted, and the law will probably be allowed to take its course




