

## THE TRADE REVIEW.

MONTREAL, FRIDAY, DECEMBER 8, 1865.

## VERY IMPORTANT.

THE Annual Report of the Secretary of the Treasury, Hon. Hugh McCulloch, to the Congress of the United States, contains the following important statements in relation to the renewal of the Reciprocity Treaty. This question is of so much importance to the interests of this province, that we make room for the whole of his views. He thus refers to it:—

## THE CANADIAN RECIPROcity TREATY.

"The Reciprocity Treaty with Great Britain will expire on the 17th of March next, and due notice of this fact has been given, by circulars, to the officers of customs on the northern frontier.

"There are grave doubts whether treaties of this character do not interfere with the legislative power of Congress, and especially with the constitutional power of the House of Representatives to originate revenue bills; and whether such treaties, if they yield anything not granted by our general revenue laws, are not in conflict with the spirit of the usual clause contained in most of our commercial treaties, to treat each nation on the same footing as the most favoured nation, and not to grant, without an equivalent, any particular favour to one nation not conceded to another in respect to commerce and navigation.

"It appears to be well established that the advantages of this Treaty have not been mutual, but have been in favour of the Canadas. Our markets have been strong, extensive and valuable; theirs have been weak, limited and generally far less profitable to our citizens. The people of the Canadas and Provinces have been sellers and we buyers of the same productions for which we are often forced to seek a foreign market. It is questionable, in fact, whether any actual reciprocity, embracing many of the articles now in the Treaty can be maintained between the two countries. Even in regard to the fisheries it is by no means certain that instead of equivalents having been acquired under the Treaty more than equal advantages were not surrendered by it. But, whatever the facts may be, this subject, as well as that of inter-communication through rivers and lakes, and possibly canals and railroads, are proper subjects of negotiation, and their importance should secure early consideration.

"It is certain that, in the arrangement of our complex system of revenue through the tariff and internal duties, the Treaty has been the cause of no little embarrassment. The subject of the revenue should not be embarrassed by treaty stipulations, but Congress should be left to act upon it freely and independently. Any arrangement between the United States and the Canadas and Provinces that may be considered mutually beneficial can as readily be perfected and carried out by reciprocal legislation as by any other means. No complaint would then arise as to subsequent changes of laws; for each party would be free to act at all times according to its discretion.

"However desirable stability may be, an irrevocable revenue law, even in ordinary times, is open to grave objections, and in any extraordinary crisis is likely to be pernicious. The people of the United States cannot consent to be taxed as producers while those outside of our boundaries, exempt from our

burdens, shall be permitted, as competitors, to have free access to our markets. It is desirable to diminish the temptations now existing for smuggling, and if the course suggested, of mutual legislation, should be adopted, a revenue system, both internal and external, more in harmony with our own, might justly be anticipated from the action of neighbours, by which this result would be most likely to be obtained."

There can be no doubt that the general scope of Mr. McCulloch's views is antagonistic to the renewal of the present Treaty. Some of his statements, particularly his reference to the Fishery question, are of an extraordinary character, and indicate very plainly that there continues to exist a lamentable amount of ignorance among American politicians as to the real working of reciprocal trade. If the recommendations of the Secretary of the Treasury are adopted by Congress, if a new Treaty be negotiated at all, it will certainly be on a far less liberal basis than the last. We shall take up this important subject more at length next week.

## AN IMPORTANT CASE.

AN important and interesting case was tried before Mr. Justice John Wilson, at the assizes held at Berlin on the 25th October last. It was an interpleader issue brought by a respectable firm in this city to test the validity of a judgment recovered by Thomas Montgomery against John Montgomery & Henry Bird, who carried on business as boot and shoe dealers in Galt, Barrie & Bradford, under the name of Montgomery and Bird. The facts are as follows:

The defendant, who is father of John Montgomery and father in law of Henry Bird, carried on business with his son John in Galt, for some time, the firm being known as Montgomery & Son. In June, 1864, Thomas Montgomery retired from the business, and the remaining partner John associated with himself Henry Bird, and the new firm assumed the liabilities of Montgomery & Son. During the spring of 1865, Montgomery and Bird being sued by some of their creditors, Thomas Montgomery brought an action against them on alleged debt of \$1600 on the promissory notes, one for \$600 and the other \$1000, bearing the dates of August and November 1864 respectively. Judgment was obtained, and the Sheriff had the money in his hands.

The plaintiffs employed Messrs. McMahon & McMahon of Brantford, who issued a writ of attachment under the Insolvent Act against Montgomery & Bird, and by them the Sheriff was notified not to pay over to Thomas Montgomery the money realised on his execution. The Sheriff applied for relief to the Court, when the issue was tried. At the trial a number of circumstances was adduced by Counsel to show that a fraud had been attempted on the plaintiffs, and after a short deliberation the jury brought in a verdict in their favour. Dishonest creditors who seek to give fictitious claims a priority for their own benefit, would act wisely to make a note of this decision.

Of these imports, \$4,763,478 were imports of coin and bullion, all from the United States. Perhaps it is well to include this amount in looking at the total volume of trade; but in several of the methods in which we propose to examine the details of the above figures, it will have to be carefully excluded, for the import or export of coin from or to the United States, is one of the ways in which we adjust with the various countries of the world the balance of trade (in our favour or against us), and is governed in great part by the financial position of the States, so that it can hardly be considered as a transaction exclusively appertaining to United States trade, or to the business of the year in which it may occur.

II THE PRESSURE OF OUR TARIFF ON THE TRADE OF VARIOUS COUNTRIES

The amount of duty collected on the above imports was \$5,633,378, and it is interesting to examine how much was raised on the imports from each country with which we do business, and the pressure of our Tariff on our Trade with those respective countries. The official tables do not supply us with the figures for our purpose, but we can arrive at them very closely by dividing the total duty collected on each article among the several countries from which it was imported, in proportion to the value of the imports of that article from such countries —

We cannot discuss the very important bearing of the above figures well, until, in future "Notes," we have alluded to other cognate subjects. We therefore content ourselves just now with pointing out that we have been favouring the United States to an extraordinary degree, in comparison with other countries; contrary to the assertions of those Americans, who have attacked until they have succeeded in abolishing the Treaty of Reciprocity, under which their trade with us has grown so large.

CHANNELS TO THE SEA.

THE people of the Western States, particularly the agricultural classes, still continue to agitate the transit question, which is one of vital importance to their interests. Millions upon millions are lost by Western producers every year from want of sufficient facilities to get their productions forward to Eastern markets. There are two great objections to the present transit

arrangements. First, their capacity is not equal to the requirements of the West; and secondly, they are exceedingly costly. A large and influential meeting recently took place at Morris, Illinois, to take the important question into consideration, and we notice that arrangements are in progress to hold a gathering of the whole farmers of the State at Bloomington at an early day.

At the Morris convention several speakers ably set forth the immense annual loss suffered by the entire North-western States from the fact that the Erie Canal is almost their only way of forwarding. It was affirmed that at present it takes every three bushels the farmer raises to send the fourth to market; and that in the case of some consignments of corn the cost of carriage ate up the entire returns, with the exception of a few cents per bushel. Under these circumstances it is no wonder that the farmers of Illinois feel warmly on the transit question, and that they are eager to secure the opening up of every channel to the sea which will decrease freights, and thus increase the profits of the producer.

The main recommendations of the convention were in favour of the building of the Niagara ship canal, and the deepening of the Welland and St. Lawrence canals. The latter was pressed upon the attention of the American Government in the event of the negotiation of a new Reciprocity Treaty. We cannot but think the latter a much wiser recommendation than that of the Niagara ship canal. Congress is hardly likely at the present time to undertake the construction of this canal, with the other expenditures—such as deepening the St. Clair Flats—which must accompany it; and besides, there seems very little sense in such an expenditure, when there is already a canal connecting Lake Erie and Ontario—a canal which the Canadian Government is prepared to enlarge sufficiently to permit the passage of the largest ships from one lake to the other. The only return asked is, that Canada and the U. States shall continue to enjoy the advantages of reciprocal trade—a trade which has been quite as advantageous to the latter as to the former. Nature has provided a great highway for the produce of the West to the ocean. That highway is the River St. Lawrence, and a glance at the map must show every impartial American that no artificial route will ever be able to compete with it successfully. The true solution of the difficulties of Western farmers regarding transit, is the deepening and enlarging of our Canadian canals, so as to admit ocean vessels to pass direct from Europe to Chicago, Milwaukee, and other lake ports, without breaking bulk. This boon can, we believe, be secured by Western producers, if a new Reciprocity Treaty be negotiated, and it would meet the requirements of the West for some years to come.

It is not a little singular that, in their recommendation of different channels to the sea, the farmers assembled at Morris should never have mentioned the Ottawa canal. The opening up of this route would be of incalculable advantage to them. It would greatly shorten the distance of transportation, and largely reduce the cost of freights. If the North-western States continue to increase the quantity of their productions as they have done of late years, the Ottawa canal will almost become a necessity to them; and it recent utterances of two leading members of the Canadian Government can be credited, the day is approaching when this important undertaking must be gone on with. There can be no doubt that the Ottawa canal is also important for Canadian interests. It would tap the flow of Western produce on its way towards the East, and bring it down through the St. Lawrence, whilst it would tend to develop and open up a very excellent and promising section of the country.

It is remarkable that whilst the people of the Western States are demanding increased means of transportation and particularly desire the continued use of the St. Lawrence route, that many in the United States, and even journals in the West, are doing their best to secure the abrogation of the Reciprocity Treaty. Such meetings as that held at Morris show the necessity of the St. Lawrence route to the great producing States, and the serious loss which the closing of our canals would have upon their interests. It is time, therefore, that they should clearly understand that if this Province is attempted to be injured by the denial of reciprocal trade, there is little hope of the enlargement of our canals; and it may be that Western producers may find themselves shut out from them altogether, and left to the tender mercies of the Buffalo monopolists. We would fain see better feelings prevail, however. We would like to see our canal navigation improved, so as to render the St. Lawrence route superior to all others, and we also desire to see the wise and liberal trade regulations of the past ten years continued. Whatever politicians may say, this policy will best further the interests of the people of both countries.

THERE is no improvement in the grocery market to be noted this week. As a general thing, the sales have been limited in character and light in extent. A few good sales have however been made to houses in the Western States, and at very satisfactory figures, indeed better than would have been realized had the sales been made to Western Canada. The market continues in somewhat a similar condition to that reported in our issue of last week. The trade is decidedly dull, and it may certainly be expected to continue so until the winter roads are fairly established, and travelling becomes pleasant and carriage easy. A good deal of business has been done during the past season in groceries. Immense quantities of teas and other articles have been disposed of, both in the regular course of trade, and by mammoth trade sales at intervals during the past few months. Although the business is now unusually dull, yet every one can enjoy a slight change of this character after so active and prosperous a season.

**COFFEE.**—Stock of a medium character; demand only moderate.

**FRUIT.**—Some few lots are expected shortly to arrive from Europe by way of New York. The present stock is only moderate in extent, and the demand continues pretty fair. We may therefore conclude that fruit will soon experience a rise in price.

**SUGARS.**—In moderate demand. Stock is light. The large shipments made during the season to the United States have left our market almost bare.

**TEAS.**—Very little doing in teas during the week. The transactions have been light, and the general tendency is to dulness. We may anticipate an increase in the prices, as the stocks at home are considerably reduced. A gentleman in the trade, who has just returned from England by the *Hibernian* states that a large fire in London has consumed some thirty to forty thousand packages, and had not good efforts been made, there is little doubt that the entire contents of the warehouse, some two hundred and fifty thousand packages, would have been lost.

THE sales effected during the week, although not very extensive, have yet been quite as good as could be anticipated at this season of the year. The stocks are as low as usual, and are confined to a few sorts, which do not agree with the requirements of the trade. Purchasers have, therefore, found themselves limited both as to variety and extent. The receipts, too, during the week, have been of an unimportant character.

**SPANISH SOLE.**—Sales confined to some small lots for the immediate necessities of trade. No change to note in prices.

**SLAUGHTER SOLE.**—The stock in the market is rather light, and the demand continues fair. Holders are therefore very firm.

**HARNESSES.**—The receipts of the week have, in a measure, supplied passing wants, and the demand has not lately been so active. Prices continue firm, however.

**WAXED UPPER.**—Demand light. Market inactive.

**BUFFED AND PEBBLED.**—Are in fair demand, and any stock arriving is readily disposed of at good paying prices.

**SPLITS.**—Stocks in first hands are quite light. Demands pretty good.

**HIDES.**—No further receipts. A feeling of confidence is, however, entertained that trade with the West, in these articles, is again likely to spring up, and if this does occur, we may expect to do well supplied.

**PULLED WOOL.**—No improved demand.

Stock Market.

The Stock Market still continues heavy, and sales have been made at lower rates than last week. Bank of Montreal, is selling at 112; City Bank, has been placed at 99 to 95; Commercial Bank, to some extent at 75, to 76; Montreal Telegraph, at 125; Huron Copper Bay, at 57; and City Passenger Railway at 60.

THE buyers who have gone to England, in the interest of Canadian houses, will this year have arrived there fully a month sooner than usual. It was necessary, owing to the abrogation of the Reciprocity Treaty and the uncertainty arising therefrom that the English markets should be well watched, so that no opportunity may be allowed to pass of securing a desirable class of goods, and at the cheapest possible rates. Being early in the market, and having, as they will have, a choice of goods, we may anticipate our stocks of dry goods for the spring to be well assorted. We need not however expect any extensive purchases for this market until the new year sets in. We find with satisfaction, that a general determination exists among the trade to limit importations to very moderate dimensions, as a cautious policy is the best that can now be pursued.

In our local market the business of the week has been very moderate. This however is not surprising, considering the lateness of the season and the activity which has hitherto prevailed in the trade. The stocks must be regarded as rather light, and the general condition of business tends to a lull.

Advices from Britain by the *Hibernian* yesterday, indicate a considerable depression in Manchester, mainly owing to the conviction that prices for manufactured goods had touched too high a point, for safety. A statement appears in one of the Manchester papers from the American Consul at Liverpool to the effect that only seven hundred thousand bales of cotton may be anticipated from the South this year. This creates an impression that the prices for the raw material will not decline to any large extent for some time to come. Indeed every day gives fresh evidence of the opinion we expressed some months ago, that the decline of cotton will be exceedingly gradual, and that a long time must yet elapse before prices can come down to the level held previous to the war.

The goods now being manufactured and purchased for next spring importations will certainly be as high, probably higher, than those imported during the last summer; and consumers through the country may make up their minds to high prices for at least six months longer. The news lately received confirms a continuance in the advance of silks. Prices for every grade are now nearly twenty-five per cent higher than last season, and the tendency, even yet is an upward one. It is therefore extremely probable that next spring silk dress goods will be some fifty per cent higher than last year.

**COTTONS.**—The stock is exceedingly light, and some difficulty is experienced in filling orders, but yesterday's advices indicate that the next two steamers to arrive will likely contain supplies sufficient to assort the market. Prices very firm.

**WOOLENS.**—Are quite scarce, and are becoming more so every day. Notwithstanding a largely increased manufacture and moderate importations, the activity of the demand has absorbed all that has offered. The market is therefore barely supplied, and at very firm prices.

In other articles of Dry Goods there is no particular change to note.

Petroleum.

The advance in Petroleum continues. Crude has advanced at the wells to \$12 per barrel. In August last it would have been had for \$5. Refined is scarce and firm at 58c per gallon and will probably touch 60c. before the middle of the month. A month ago it was 45c., and in October large contracts were made as low as 33c. per gallon. This is almost an unprecedented advance. Importations are talked of from Pennsylvania.

Close of Navigation.

The navigation of our lakes and rivers may be said to have closed for the season. The *Grecian* and *Passport* and other steamers have, we believe, laid up in Kingston, and the Richelieu Company's steamers, plying between here and Quebec, have ceased their trips. Crafts of all kinds have either entered, or are rapidly being placed in their winter quarters. The weather continues mild for the season, but it cannot now be long until the St. Lawrence is frozen over.

IN consequence of the closing of river navigation, and the rush which prevailed up to the last moment, the business this week is by no means active. Some few houses however have quite as much as they can attend to even yet, and all may be said to have a moderate share of activity. Any small orders which they have been hitherto unable to attend to, are now receiving the best attention, and goods are being despatched by Rail as fast as possible.

**COPPER.**—The advance of £20 per ton, which we reported last week as having taken place in England, has not only been fully maintained, but prospects at present point to a still further increase. Indeed from private advices received by the *Hibernian* yesterday, by one of the best houses in the trade, we understand that a large increase has actually taken place; but nothing is said of it in our regular advices. The blockading of the Chilean ports by the Spaniards has thus resulted in seriously disturbing trade all over the world. The trade with the Pacific was becoming most valuable in its character, and would have been increased almost in a geometrical ratio in this particular article of copper if it had not been for the meddlesome interference of the Spaniards. The question is strongly mooted in England, as to how long the trade relations of the world are thus to be rudely interrupted by the caprices of any one particular nation who has only its own purposes to serve. The total amount of copper ore imported into England last year was 67,000 tons, and of this 23,000 came from Chili, while of copper regulus the total amount imported was 25,000 tons, Chili supplying 23,000 of it. Of pure copper, wrought and unwrought, Chili has also supplied more than 300,000 tons during the year 1864. These figures show the importance of the Chilean ports being always accessible to European ships; and it is to be hoped that the idea broached by the English papers, that England, France, and the United States should interfere, may have the desired effect.

In this market copper is of course sympathizing with the advance in England, and may be quoted at 30c. to 32c. per lb. for pig, and 37c. to 40c. per lb. for sheet, and firm at these.

**PIG-IRON.**—Is, as usual, very light in stock, and not likely to improve in this particular. Common brands are held pretty stiff at \$25, and Gartshorrie firm at \$27.50.

**BAR IRON.**—Very scarce, and held stiffly at our quotations.

In other articles there is nothing of any importance to be given; the general tendency of the trade, and indeed of every other trade, at the present time, is to inactivity and dulness. Our merchants however have had a good autumn's business, and are, generally speaking, pretty well satisfied with the result.

TRADE AND OTHER ITEMS.

The Boston Board of Trade endorses Secretary McCulloch's policy of contraction, and approves the Secretary's purpose of getting back to specie payments as soon as possible.

The total shipment of oil at Wyoming, the Station for the Eauville oil wells, on the Sarnia branch of the Great Western Railway, from July, 1861, up to October, 1865, which period includes the oil production of the district from the opening, aggregates 187,653 barrels.

An immense iron block, in Chicago, five stories in height, and weighing with its contents about 60,000 tons, has just been raised twenty-seven inches, without in the least interrupting the business of the occupants.

Cotton seed is now selling at \$5 a bushel in the Southern States, a price which must have its due effect on the area planted. Before the war it sold for 10c a bushel. Competent judges are of the opinion that the crop of the present year will not exceed 300,000 bales.

The financial report of the United States Sanitary Commission has just been published; it appears from it that the amount of contributions was \$4,313,733; the amount of supplies purchased \$3,912,785; the cost of management and distribution the enormous sum of \$2,616,959; and the balance in hand \$222,976.

Mr. John Sullivan, of the township of Douro, brought four pigs to Peterborough market, two of which weighed 1,011 lbs. and brought \$100 each; the other two weighed 678 lbs. and netted \$65. The same gentleman, two years ago brought two pigs to market that weighed 1,076 lbs.

THE PRODUCE MARKET.

THE whole week has been one of uninterrupted dullness in every article of Breadstuffs and Provisions, not only in this market, but also in Britain and in New York. Sales have been in most cases impossible, no decline in price being sufficient to enable holders to move the stocks, which are rapidly accumulating on their hands.

Askes are unsettled but firmer at the close, although transactions are limited.

**FLOUR.**—Under the influence of heavy receipts and an almost total cessation of demand, the market has been completely paralyzed, no concessions made seeming sufficient to induce transactions beyond the most trifling local wants; and latterly little attempt has been made to press sales, holders finding that beyond further depressing prices, nothing can be accomplished thereby, and, however reluctantly, have been left no choice but to store almost everything coming to hand. Stocks have rapidly accumulated of late, and at present greatly exceed those of last year, and with a declining tendency in Britain and a serious drop in the States, fears are induced that nothing but a considerable sacrifice will serve to work off the receipts and accumulations. The transactions in the higher grades have been restricted to the small consumptive wants, the state of American markets utterly forbidding shipments thither, and quotations are mostly nominal. In supers. the few sales transpiring have been mostly in the vicinity of \$5.60 to \$5.70, only some broken parcels of strong sponging flour commanding more, while it is believed \$5.60 has been accepted in one or more instances, to move a few hundred barrels. No. 2 and grades below, though not materially in excess, participated in the general depression, and are a dragging sale at quotations. Bag flour has been scarcely saleable at any price, there being no retail demand of moment, and dealers positively refuse to lay in stock except as needed, and most of the arrivals from abroad are necessarily going into store. Indeed, the flour market for the last few weeks has been in that state wherein price has been no particular inducement to proposing purchasers. Navigation having closed before the late serious decline, exporters require more definite and encouraging British advices than have latterly been supplied, to induce operations under the increased expense of shipping *via* Portland, and therefore hold back for the time, while the unusual limited local trade has been quite inadequate to absorb receipts, dealers, as is usual, declining to lay in stock on a receding market. Agents have therefore been placed in the mortifying and embarrassing position of having to hold their receipts, though persuaded that yet lower rates will rule, and of meeting heavy acceptances without the possibility of realizing.

**OATMEAL.**—The limited offerings have induced more firmness on the part of holders, who now demand \$5.10 to \$5.20, but few sales over \$5 have yet been noted.

**WHEAT.**—Receipts are considerable, though with the proximate closing of navigation they begin to fall off. Quotations are purely nominal in the absence of transactions.

**COARSE GRAINS** are dull and nominal, there being no noteworthy transactions on the spot.

**PORK.**—The market for Mess is lifeless—demand confined to the merest retail prices drooping, and expected to further decline; a parcel of Primo Mess was sold lately at \$16.

**DRESSED HOGS** are beginning to arrive more freely, and with fair supplies from the neighbouring farmers, the market is dull, and sales difficult; prices have latterly been so high that a great stimulus has been given to raising Hogs, and it is probable that the supply this season from every operator will be considerable while the city retail, which in cheap season absorbs a large quantity of the arrivals, will, from the increased production in this vicinity, be less than usual. It is, therefore, anticipated that when the bulk of the Hog crop comes to market, prices will have to pitch at a point at which packers will be willing to operate; and in view of the declining tendency of all markets, both in Britain and in this continent, the ideas of the trade are as yet unsettled.

**BUTTER.**—The stocks in both Boston and New York have at length accumulated in a degree which appears to preclude the hope of being relieved by the local Trade, British shippers have, therefore been sounded as to their views, which at present are too low for the ideas of holders, and as yet no shipments have taken place.

In this market stocks held by dealers and the trade generally are heavy, and far from wishing to increase their stocks, they are anxious to sell at as near former rates as possible, while at this advanced stage of the season shippers are indisposed to operate, except at a very marked decline from even present quotations. The quantity of Butter in Uppur Canada is large, and holders are casting about for the best market, so that it is likely receipts at this point will be considerable during the winter.

**ASKES.**—Have been coming in freely for the season of the year, prices of Pots advanced about the middle of last week, and then without apparent cause declined materially. Since then, during the greater part of the week, prices were very unsettled until the arrival of the *Hibernian*, when the market became steady at the quotations, at which, however, there are few transactions, shippers for the most part holding off for further advices from Britain.

**PEARS.**—Have been unchanged, firsts bringing from \$7 to \$7.25, and seconds about \$7.75.
