Central Eclipse at noon, May 6th, 9h. 45m. 12s. in Longitude 147d. 12m. West of Greenwich, and Latitude 9d. 11m., South.

Central Eclipse ends generally May 6th, 11h. 27m. 30s., in Longitude 86d. 53m. West of Greenwich, and Latitude 13d. 35m., South.

Ends on the earth generally May 6th, 12h. 26m. 26s., in Longitude 98d. 58m. West of Greenwich, and Latitude 4d. 48m., South.

Central Eclipse begins generally October 30th, 10h 08m. 12s. in Longitude 126d. 47m East of Greenwich, and Latitude 42d. 9m., North.

Central Eclipse at noon, October 30th, 11h. 36m. 48s., in Longitude 178d. 15m. West of Greenwich, and Latitude 17d. 21m., North.

Central Eclipse ends generally October 30th, 13h. 33m. 42s., in Longitude 121d. 41m., West of Greenwich, and Latitude 16d. 32m., North.

Ends on the Earth generally October 30th, 14h. 48m. 30s., in Longitude 137d. 28m. West of Greenwich, and Latitude 5d. 14m., North

The middle line of this Eclipse will begin at the Island of Pilawan in the China Sea, crossing the Philippine Islands, up the Yellow Sea, crossing the Tibbonoi Mountains and Siberia to the Arctic Ocean, crossing the Arctic Ocean to the McKenzie River and following the Eastern Boundary of British Columbia, leaves the American Continent at Cape Concepcion, and ends in the Pacific Ocean in Longitude 116d. West of Greenwich, and Latitude 15d. South.

Light Houses in Bay of Fundy.

Cape Sable, N. S.—Revolving white light on Cape; bright, 15s.; dark, 25s. 43d. 23m. 19s., latitude N.; 63d. 37m. 11s., longitude W. Octagonal, white tower, 53 feet above high water. Visible 12 miles in clear weather.

Steam Fog Whistle on southern point of Cape, elevated about 40 feet above high water, sounds in thick weather, fogs and snow storms, a blast of ten seconds duration each minute, with an interval of fifty seconds between each blast.

Seal Island, N. S.—South point, $\frac{1}{2}$ mile inland, latitude 43d. 23m. 34s. N.; longitude 66d. 0m. 52s. W. Fixed white light, white octagonal. Tower 98 feet above high water mark. Visible 18 miles. The Blond Rock lies S. by W., $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from lighthouse. A fog whistle, near lighthouse, during fogs and snow storms, sounds in each minute a blast of five seconds duration, and after an interval of five seconds gives another blast of five seconds, with an interval of forty-five seconds.

Cape Forchu, N. S.—Flash white light on E. Cape, S. point, latitude, 43d. 47m. 28s. N.; longitude 66d. 9m. 21s., W. Light, $1\frac{1}{4}$ min.; dark $\frac{3}{4}$ min. Tower, octagonal, vertical stripes, red and white. Fog whistle on W. side, sounds in fogs and snow storms 10 seconds in every minute. Visible 18 miles.

Cape St. Mary, N. S.—East side of Bay, latitude N., 44d. 14m. 30s.; longitude W., 66d. 12m. 40s. Flash light, alternate red and white, at intervals of 30 seconds. White octagonal tower, 103 feet above high water mark. Visible 17 miles in clear weather.

Briar Island, N. S.—N.W. point, latitude N., 44d. 11m. 57s.; longitude W. 66d. 23m. 30s. Fixed white light, visible 13 miles. Octagonal white lighthouse, 92 feet above high water mark.

Steam Fog Whistle on N. W. of Briar Island, south side of lighthouse, sounds during thick and foggy weather three blasts of 4 seconds duration, with intervals of 4 seconds between them in each minute.

Boar's Head, N. S.—50 feet from edge of cliff, on S. entrance to Pettit Passage; latitude, N. 44d. 21m. 16s.; longitude, W. 66d. 13m. 0s. Revolving red and white alternately, every minute. Lighthouse, white, square, 70 feet above high water mark. Visible 14 miles.

Point Prim, N. S.—S. Point of entrance to Annapolis Basin; latitude, N. 41d. 41m. 16s.; longitude, W. 65d. 47m. 20s. Fixed white light, visible 13 miles. Vertical red and white striped, square tower. 76 feet above high water mark.

Fog whistle on Prim Point sounds 8 seconds in each minute, making an interval of 52 seconds between each blast.

Port Williams, N. S.—Marshall Cove, South Shore, latitude, N. 44d. 56m. 52s.; longitude, W. 65d. 16m. 0s. Two fixed white vertical lights, visible 10 miles, 20 feet apart. White, square, 60 and 57 feet from high water; lantern on top of dwelling, lower light in bow window visible from W. S. W. round N. to E. N. E.

Margaretville, N. S.—On extremity of Point, S. Shore, latitude, N. 45d. 2m. 57s.; longitude, W. 65d. 40m. Two red lights, visible 8 miles. Lighthouse, horizontal white and black stripes, square, visible from W. S. W. round N. to E. N. E.

Blackrock, N. S.—South Shore, latitude, N. 45d. 10m. 0s.; longitude, W. 64d. 46m. 0s. Fixed white light, visible 12 miles. Square white lighthouse, 45 feet above high water mark.

Fog whistle on extreme point of Cape D'Or, on the opposite side of channel, from Black Rock; sounds in thick weather twice in each minute, each blast being of 6 seconds duration, with interval of 24 seconds between.

Cape Enrage, N. B.—On pitch of Cape, latitude, N. 45d. 35m. 34s.; longitude, 64d. 46m. 55s. Fixed white light, visible 15 miles. White square tower, 120 feet above high water mark.

A Steam Fog Whistle 150 feet N. E. from lighthouse sounds during thick weather four seconds in each minute; will probably be heard in calm weather 10 miles, and in stormy weather from three to five miles.

Quaco, N. B.—A temporary light has been established on the pitch of the Cape at West Head, Quaco, to replace the lighthouse on the rock off Quaco, destroyed by fire. Latitude, N. 45d. 19m. 30s.; longitude, W. 65d. 32m. 0s. The light is a fixed white in a lantern suspended from a pole 20 feet high, and should be visible under favorable conditions about six miles.

A Fog Bell in a framed tower on the lighthouse block strikes every 12 seconds during thick and foggy weather and snow storms. Under favorable circumstances it should be heard two or three miles, and in stormy weather or against the wind about a mile.

Cape Spencer, N. B.—On pitch of Cape, latitude, N. 45d. 12m. 20s.; longitude, W. 65d. 54m. 0s. Revolving red and white alternately, at intervals of 45 seconds. Visible 20 miles. White square building, with tower 207 feet above high water. Partridge Island light by compass N. W. by W. 1/2 W., northerly distance being 64 miles from light to light.

Partridge Island, St. John Harbor.—Latitude, N. 45d. 14m. 20s.; longitude, W. 66d. 3m. 20s. Fixed white light. Visible 20 miles. Tower, vertical red and white stripes. 119 feet above high water. Steam Whistle on Island sounds for 10 seconds in every minute. A bell buoy near east side of Partridge Island reef.

Negro Point.—On end of Government Breakwater. Latitude 45d. 14m. 25s. Red. Temporarily from pole. Tower taken down pending repairs to Breakwater.

St John Harbor.—End of Bar, latitude, N. 45d. 15m. 10s.; longitude, 66d. 3m. 40s. Fixed white light. Visible 10 miles. Lighthouse, vertical black and white stripes, 35 feet above high water.

Lepreau.—On Point, latitude, N. 45d. 3m. 40s.; longitude, W. 66d. 27m. 30s. Two fixed white lights. Visible 15 miles. 9 yards apart. 81 and 53 feet above high water mark. Tower octagonal, striped horizontally red and white. Fog Whistle on Point, in thick weather sounds twice each minute, first giving a blast of five seconds duration with an interval of five seconds; then a blast of five seconds duration, with an interval of 45 seconds to complete the minute.

South West West Island.—On S. E. Point of the island, latitude N., 44d. 56m. 30s.; longitude W., 66d. 41m. 10s. White revolving light every 1 1/2

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minutes. Visible 17 to 20 miles. House, white, square, wooden, 111 feet above high water.

Beaver Harbor.—Fixed white light. Visible 10 miles. Latitude N., 45d. 3m. 45s.; longitude, 66d. 41m. W. Tower, square wooden building, painted white, 45 feet above high water.

Bliss Island.—West end of island, S. side of western entrance to Bliss Harbor, latitude N., 45d. 1m. 15s. Fixed red light. Visible 12 miles. White square wooden building, 45 feet above high water.

Pea Point—(*L'Etang*).—White lighthouse. Fixed green light. Latitude, 45d. 2m. 3s. N.; longitude, 66d. 53m. 30s., W.

Letite Passage.—Fog Trumpet on Mascabin Point. Latitude, 45d. 2m. 20s., N. Longitude, 66d. 53m. 30s., W. During thick weather, fogs and snowstorms, the trumpet will sound blasts of seven seconds' duration, with intervals of thirty seconds between them. It can be heard two or three miles against, and six to seven with, the wind. The building is square, with a coal shed attached, and is painted white.

Head Harbor (Cannobello Island).—N. point, latitude N., 44d. 57m. 40s.; longitude W., 66d. 54m. 19s. Fixed white light. Visible 15 miles clear weather. Octagonal tower, white, with red cross, 61 feet above high water.

Fog Trumpet at the North Point of Head Harbor, on the island of Cannobello, in the County of Charlotte. Latitude N., 44d. 57m. 40s., Longitude W., 66d. 54m. 10s. During thick weather, fogs and snowstorms, the Trumpet will sound blasts of eight seconds' duration, with intervals of 35 seconds between them.

Swallow Tail.—On N. E. part of Grand Manan, latitude N., 44d. 45m. 52s. Fixed white light. Visible 17 miles. Longitude W., 66d. 44m. Lighthouse white octagonal wooden building, 148 feet above high water. A Steam Fog Whistle on extreme N. W. Head of Grand Manan, 80 feet above high water. Sounds in thick weather three blasts of four seconds' duration in each minute, with an interval of sixteen seconds between each blast.

Old Proprietor Ledge.—Spindle Beacon, painted red, on S. E. of Grand Manan island. Latitude, 44d. 13m. 10s.; longitude, 66d. 40m. 0s. Visible 8 or 10 miles in clear weather.

South West Head (Grand Manan Light).—Gull Cliff, at the South West Head of Grand Manan Island. Latitude N., 44d. 36m. 0s. Longitude W., 66d. 54m. 16s. The light, a revolving catoptric one, makes a complete revolution in two minutes, showing three white flashes and three red flashes with intervals of 20 seconds. It is elevated 200 feet above high water, and, in clear weather, should be visible for a distance of 21 miles. The building consists of a square wooden tower with dwelling attached, painted white, and 43 feet high from base to vane.

Grand Harbor.—Fish Fluke Point, on the eastern side of Grand Harbor, Island of Grand Manan. Latitude N., 44d. 40m. 2s. Longitude W., 66d. 48m. 5s. The light is a fixed white catoptric, elevated 40 feet above high water mark, and in clear weather should be seen 11 miles, from south around by west to northeast. The building is of wood, painted white, and consists of a square tower 32 feet high from base of building to base of lantern, with keeper's dwelling attached.

Gannet Rock.—A fixed and flash light on rock. Visible 12 miles. Latitude, 44d. 6m. 38s. Longitude, 66d. 47m. 1s. Octagonal tower, striped vertically black and white alternately.

Machias Island.—On island two lights, W. by N. ½ N. and E. by S. ¼ S. and 56¼ yards apart. Fixed white. can be seen 15 miles clear weather. House white. 58 feet E. and 54 feet W. from high water.

Moose-a-Bec. Au.—On Mistake Island, west entry to Bay of Fundy. Flash white light, 30 seconds interval. House, brick, white-washed. 65 feet above high water. Latitude N., 44d. 28m. 27s. Longitude W., 67d. 31m. 55s.

Petit Manan.—South side of island. Fixed white, varied by white flashes. Time between flashes, two minutes. Visible 17 miles. Tower, gray granite, natural color. Latitude N. 44d. 22m. 2s. Longitude W. 67d. 5m. 51s.

A Fog Whistle giving two blasts of five seconds each per minute. Interval between blasts, 8 minutes and 42 seconds.

Little River.—On an island at the entrance of the river. A fixed white light varied by flashes every 90 seconds, 40 feet above high water, visible 11 miles.

Richibucto Head Light.—This is a fixed white light, situated on Richibucto Head, Northumberland Strait, in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence. The light is placed at an elevation of 70 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fourth order. The tower is square, about 50 feet from base to vane, painted white, and stands in lat. 46 deg. 39m. 40s. N.; long. 64 deg. 43m. 30s. W. of Greenwich.

Richibucto Harbor Range Lights.—Two range light towers, erected by the Government of Canada close to the present day beacons upon the South Beach, at the entrance to the Richibucto River, Kent County, N. B. The front building is on the outside of the bank. It is of wood, painted white, and consists of a square tower, 33 feet high to vane on lantern, with dwelling attached. Latitude N., 46d. 42m. 45s. Longitude W., 64d. 46m. 10s. The light is fixed white catoptric, elevated 40 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 12 miles. The back tower is distant W. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. 300 feet from the front one. It is an open framed square tower, 43 feet high to vane on lantern, and is also painted white. The light is fixed red catoptric, elevated 44 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 12 miles. These two lights are intended to replace the day beacons, and in one lead through the channel over the bar at the mouth of the river.

Restigouche River Range Lights.—The buildings are all square towers, built of wood, painted white; they are 22 feet in height from base to top of ventilator, and shows fixed white catoptric lights.

1. *Dalhousie Range Lights, Restigouche County, New Brunswick.*—The Front Tower is placed on the public wharf. The light is elevated 24 feet above high water mark. Latitude N., 48d. 4m. 40s. Longitude W., 66d. 22m. 30s. The Back Tower is placed on Montgomery Island. The light is elevated 27 feet above high water mark.

2. *Oak Point Range Lights, County of Bonaventure, Province of Quebec.*—The Front Tower shows two lights, one east and the other west, elevated 40 feet above high water mark. Latitude N., 48d. 2m. 40s. Long. W., 66d. 39m. 30s. The Back Tower shows light elevated 45 feet above high water mark, and ranges with the Front Tower as a guide to vessels crossing the Traverse.

3. *Campbellton Range Lights, Restigouche County, New Brunswick.*—The Front Tower is placed on a pier beside the railway wharf; the light is elevated 24 feet above high water mark, Latitude N., 48d. 0m. 50s. Longitude W., 66d. 39m. 40s. The Back Tower is placed on Mr. Moffat's wharf. The light is elevated 24 feet above high water mark.

Hay Island Range Lights.—Two Range Lights have been erected upon Hay Island, Miramichi Bay, Northumberland County, N. B., to enable vessels, in seeking shelter, to clear the point of the shoal off the east end of the island. Latitude N., 47d. 14m. 10s. Longitude W., 65d. 3m. 40s. The front light is fixed white catoptric, exhibited from a lantern hoisted on a mast 15 feet high. It is elevated 23 feet above high water, and should be visible 10 miles. At the base of the mast is a small shed painted red.

The back light is distant 210 feet from the front one. It is fixed white catoptric, elevated 30 feet above high water, and should be visible 11 miles. The building is a square wooden tower, 21 feet high from base to vane, and is painted white.

Buctouche Range Lights.—Two Range Lights, erected upon Dixon's Point, on the South side of Buctouche Harbour, Kent County, N. B., to guide vessels into Buctouche Harbor. The front building is situated on the Point near the water's edge, and close to the previously existing front beacon. Latitude N., 46d. 27m. 40s. Longitude W., 61d. 38m. 50s. The light is fixed white catoptric, elevated 35 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 11 miles in the direction of the range. The tower is a square wooden one 30 feet high from its base to the vane on the lantern, and is painted white.

The Back Range Light is distant 1,050 feet N. W. by W. from the front

one; the building is similar, 34 feet high, and shows a light also similar, elevated 41 feet above high water, and visible 12 miles.

Fox Island Range Lights.—The Beacon Lights on the North West end of Fox Island, Miramichi Bay, N. B., have been moved, and a third light added, and the lights as now arranged are in operation. All show fixed white lights, which should be visible 8 miles, from lanterns hoisted on masts; at the base of each mast is a shed painted white.

One of the Lights is situated within 100 feet of the most northerly point of the island. It is elevated 59 feet above high water mark, and has a post 40 feet high. Latitude N., 47d. 8m. 5s. Longitude W., 65d. 2m. 20s.

The second light is distant 1,051 feet S, E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. from the first named, and will be 46 feet above water mark, with a post 38 feet high.

The third light is distant 951 feet S. W. from the first named, and will be 36 feet above water mark, with a post 28 feet high.

The first and second in line range N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. into the old Horseshoe Channel.

The first and third in line range N. E. through Portage Island Channel.

The second and third in line range W. by N., leading to the Upper Buoy of Horseshoe Shoal.

Cape Jourmain, Straits of Northumberland.—Latitude 46d. 10m. 0s. N. Longitude 63d. 51m. 0s. W.—Visible from all points of approach from S. E. around by N. to W. The Light House is an octagonal wooden pyramidal building, painted white, 40 feet high, elevated 72 feet above high water, and stands 66 feet from the extremity of the cliff. The Keeper's house, a one and a half story wooden building, painted white, is situated 50 feet to the westward of the Light House.

Goose Lake, Miscon Island, Bay des Chaleurs.—A revolving white light, elevated 40 feet above high water, and showing a flash every minute, is exhibited at this lighthouse, and is seen at a distance of upwards of 10 miles. The lighting apparatus has two faces, and makes a complete revolution every two minutes. The tower is a square wooden building, 28 feet high, with a dwelling attached, and painted white. The illuminating apparatus is catoptric.

Heron Island, Bay des Chaleurs.—This light is a fixed white light, elevated 66 feet above high water, is visible from all points seaward, and in clear weather is seen at a distance of 12 miles. The tower is a square wooden building, 29 feet high, and painted white. The illuminating apparatus is catoptric.

Caraque Island, Bay des Chaleurs.—Square tower on keeper's dwelling. White.

Miscon Fog Whistle.—A Steam Fog Whistle has been erected on Miscon Island, at the entrance of the Bay of Chaleur. The whistle is sounded twice in each minute.

Shediac Beacon Lights.—Two lights on Point du Chene wharf, in the Harbor of Shediac. Latitude, 46d. 14m. 20s., N. Longitude, 64d. 31m. 0s. W.

Point Escuminac Light.—This lighthouse is situated in Miramichi Bay. North latitude, 47d. 4m. 30s. West longitude, 64d. 50m. 30s. It is a fixed bright light, elevated 70 feet above high water. A third order French dioptric lighting apparatus has been placed on this tower, which is visible for twenty-five miles.

Miscon Island Light.—This lighthouse is situated on Birch Point. North latitude, 48d. 1m. 0s. West longitude, 64d. 3m. 0s. It is a fixed red light, elevated seventy-nine feet above high water.

Shediac Lights.—On Point du Chene Wharf, in the summer, north latitude 46d. 14m. 20s. West longitude, 64d. 31m. 0s. It is a fixed white light.

Two fixed white Beacon Lights on Shediac Island, visible ten miles.

Miramichi River.—Lighthouse on Portage Island. Fixed white light, elevated — feet above high water.

Two Beacon Lights on Preston's Beach, about five miles above Escuminac Light. Two Beacon Lights at Oak Point. Two Beacon Lights at Grant's. Fixed white lights. Visible ten miles.

Lighthouse at Shippegan Gully has been removed from Taylor's Island on the southwest, to Alexander's Point, on the northeast point of the entrance to the Gully. Latitude N. 45d. 43m. 30s. Longitude W. 61d. 39m. 25s. The light is a fixed white catoptric light, elevated 32 feet above high water, and should be visible 11 miles from all points seaward. The tower consists as heretofore of a square wooden building, 30 feet high from base

to vane on lantern, painted white. A small light, consisting of a lantern, hoisted on a pole, to show also a fixed white light, has been established 484 feet S. W. by W. from the main light. It is elevated 22 feet above high water, and should be seen 9 miles in the direction of the range. The two lights range with the buoy on the outside of the bar at the entrance to the Gully.

River St. John Lights.—Green Head, Sand Point, Oak Point, No Man's Friend, Oromocto Shoals, Wilmet's Bluff, Cox's Point, Robertson's Point, Faujoy's Point, Grand Lake, Musquash Island, Hendry Farm, Washade-moak Lake, Hackerest Point, Salmon River, Grand Lake. Visible ten miles.

RATES OF PILOTAGE.

INWARDS.

First District.—From Partridge Island to Musquash Head, bearing Northwest, One Dollar per foot.

Second District.—From Musquash Head to Point Lepreaux, bearing Northwest, one Dollar and Twenty-five cents per foot.

Third District.—From Point Lepreaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing Northwest, or North Channel, bearing Southeast, One Dollar and Fifty cents per foot.

Fourth District.—From the North Head of Grand Manan, or North Channel, as aforesaid, to Machias Seal Island, bearing South, or Briar Island, bearing Southeast, One Dollar and Seventy-five cents per foot.

Fifth District.—From the outside limit of the Fourth District to a bound ranging with Mount Desert and Cape Sable, Seal Island, bearing Northwest and Southeast, being the outside limits of the Pilotage District, Two Dollars and Twenty-five cents per foot.

OUTWARDS.

Pilotage from the Harbor of the Port of St. John to outside of Partridge Island, One Dollar and Twenty-five cents per foot.

Pilotage down the Bay of Fundy, when required, shall be Two Dollars per foot over and above the One Dollar and Twenty-five cents Harbour Pilotage outwards.

Any pilot employed in the removal of any ship or vessel within the Port or Harbor of St. John, from any mooring ground to any wharf, or from any wharf to any mooring ground, and properly mooring and securing the said vessel, shall be entitled to demand and receive for such services, as follows: One dollar and fifty cents for vessels not over 100 tons. Two dollars for vessels over 100 tons, and not exceeding 200 tons. Three dollars for vessels over 200 tons, and not exceeding 300 tons. Four dollars for all vessels over 300 tons, and not exceeding 400 tons; and twenty-five cents additional for every 50 tons such vessel may measure over 400 tons.

Boarding Districts and Rates of Pilotage for the Piloting of vessels into that part of the District of St. John called the Harbor of Musquash, are as follows: Nos. 1 and 2 of the Port or Harbor of St. John shall be No. 1 District of the Harbor of Musquash, and Districts Nos. 3, 4, and 5, of the said Harbor of St. John shall be Nos. 2, 3, and 4 of the Harbor of Musquash. That the rate of Pilotage inwards into the Harbor of Musquash shall be: For No. 1 District one dollar and seventy-five cents per foot draft of water, and twenty-five cents additional per foot each District bounded beyond the said First District.

The Pilotage outwards within the First District shall be one dollar per foot.

The following vessels are exempted from compulsory pilotage: All vessels registered in the Dominion of Canada, 150 tons and under, and all vessels outward bound beyond the First District.

EXTRACT FROM BY-LAWS.

Section 7.—The Pilot piloting a vessel from sea shall be entitled to pilot her to sea when she next leaves port, and should the master or owner require the services of the pilot down the Bay of Fundy, to perform this service as well, unless in either case on complaint of the master, owner or agent of the said vessel, the Pilotage Authorities direct otherwise, and in case the master of such vessel shall engage any other person to pilot his vessel down the Bay, he shall be liable to pay to the Pilotage Authorities the full pilotage dues for such service, for the benefit of the pilot so entitled, and shall also be subject to a penalty not exceeding forty dollars.

Section 2.—Provided always, that it shall be at the option of the Pilotage Authorities to license such persons for the first year after passing such examination to pilot only vessels not exceeding 500 tons register nor 12 feet draft water.

Time for Going Through the Falls.

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the *food*, and about two and a half on the *ebb*, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

TIME BALL.

The Time Ball on Northern Tower of the Custom House Building, will be hoisted half its elevation each day (Sundays excepted) at fifteen minutes before one o'clock. At one minute before one o'clock it will be hoisted its full length; and at one o'clock, mean time, the Ball will be dropped. A Chronometer, keeping correct Greenwich time, should then show 5h. 24m. 15s., and the difference between this and the time shown by a Chronometer, is its true error on Greenwich time at the moment. As the above hour of one o'clock, when the Ball drops, represents 5h. 24m. 15s. at Greenwich, the error of a Chronometer may be ascertained, no matter where the ship is lying. Masters of vessels arriving at St. John should compare their Chronometers by the Time Ball, as it will enable them to get the sea rate, which frequently varies from harbor rates. Latitude 45d. 16m. 42s. North; Longitude in time, 4h. 24m. 15s. West of Greenwich.

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All letters sent to any part of the Dominion or United States are liable to a Uniform Rate of three cents per half ounce, according to the following scale:—

A letter not exceeding half ounce in weight.....	3 cts
A letter exceeding half ounce and not exceeding one ounce.....	6 "
A letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding one ounce and a half.....	9 "
A letter exceeding one ounce and a half, and not exceeding two ounces.....	12 "
A letter exceeding two ounces and not exceeding two ounces and a half.....	15 cts

And so on, adding three cents extra for every additional half ounce. Postage on Drop Letters, one cent per half ounce, and must be prepaid.

Letters for the United States must be prepaid one rate, or they will not be forwarded.

Letters posted for delivery within the Dominion, must be prepaid at least one rate of postage, otherwise they will not be forwarded.

Via Halifax.—Jamaica, 10 cts. Hayti and San Domingo, 10 cents. St. Thomas, 10 cts. Other places in West Indies 10 cents.

French Possessions, by all routes, 10 cts. Porto Rico, via New York, 5 cts. St. Thomas, via New York, 5 cts. Trinidad, 10 cts.

Prepayment of letters and other mail matter must be made by postage stamp. Stamps can be obtained of the following sizes of any of the authorized dealers: ½c., 1c., 2c., 3c., 5c., 6c., 10c., 12½c., and 15c. each.

Registered Letters.—Letters intended to be registered, when addressed to places in Canada, must be prepaid by stamp, 2 cents each. To the United States, 5 cents each, in addition to the postage rate. For Newfoundland, registered letters, 2 cents. Other articles 5 cents in addition to the postage. All letters for registration should be posted 15 minutes before the hour of closing ordinary mails, and in the evening previous to 9 o'clock. For English mails letters must be registered 30 minutes before the time of closing.

Canada Post Cards, 1c. each. British Post Cards, 2c. each. Post Bands, 4 for 5 cents, or \$1.25 per hundred.

Stamped Envelopes are for sale as follows: One Cent Stamped Envelope at the rate of \$1.30 per hundred, or 10 for 13 cents. Three Cent Stamped Envelopes, small size, \$3.30 per hundred; large size, \$3.35 per hundred. Smaller quantities as follows:—1 for 4 cents; 2 for 7 cents; 5 for 17 cents, etc.

Post Cards at 1c. each may be sent to any address in Canada or U. S.

Canada Post Cards cannot be forwarded to the United Kingdom.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.—Newspapers and Periodicals addressed to places in Newfoundland, Great Britain or the United States, printed and published in Canada, posted from the office of publication, or News Agency, to actual Subscribers or News Agents (*including Exchanges*), are subject to a rate of one cent per pound, gross weight, which must be prepaid by publisher at the time of posting. Such newspapers and periodicals must be issued not less frequently than once per month.

For places in Canada such papers and periodicals are FREE.

Newspapers posted for City delivery will not be delivered by Letter Carriers, unless prepaid by stamp.

Transient Newspapers and Periodicals addressed to places in Canada, Newfoundland and United States.—On all newspapers and Periodicals other than those specified above, the postage rate will be one cent per 4 ounces in weight, which must be prepaid by postage stamp.

Newspapers and Periodicals published not less frequently than once a month and weighing less than one ounce may be posted singly, if prepaid by postage stamp one half cent each.

Newspapers published in the United Kingdom, and remailed by News Agents to regular subscribers, may be remailed Free. This will apply to Newspapers only, and not to Periodicals.

MISCELLANEOUS POSTAL MATTER.—Pamphlets, Occasional Publications, Printed Circulars, Prices Current, Handbills, Book and Newspaper Manuscript, Printer's Proofs, Maps and Prints, Engravings, Sheet Music, Photographs, Documents, wholly, or partly printed, or written, such as Deeds, Insurance Policies, Militia and School Returns, or other documents of like nature, wholly or partly printed or written.—When posted addressed to any place in Canada or the United States, and not exceeding 4 pounds in weight, 24 inches in length, and 12 inches in breadth or depth, must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of one cent per 4 ounces in weight, and must be put up so as to admit of inspection. Such books, papers, returns, &c., must not be accompanied by any instructions or directions. Bank notices, advices of goods in transit and personal notices are liable to letter rate because intended for the information of a particular person. Legal and commercial papers are liable to letter rate of postage unless sent by parcel post, and the exceptions above given to matter of that class are restricted to documents specified, such as deeds and insurance policies.

The rate of postage on Seeds, Cuttings, Bulbs and Roots is one cent per 4 ounces, the weight of a package not to exceed 4 lbs.

BOOK PACKETS.—Passing between places in the Dominion of Canada or to and from Newfoundland, and not exceeding 5 lbs. in weight, 2 ft. in length and 1 foot in breadth, must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of one cent per 4 oz. Book Packets posted for delivery in the Dominion cannot be registered.

The limit of weight of Book Packets to the United Kingdom is 5 lbs., Commercial papers, 4 lbs. 6 oz. Book Packets for France, Germany, Italy, Belgium, Netherlands, Portugal, the Azores, Madeira, Denmark and Switzerland, must not exceed 4 lbs., 6 oz. in weight, and 24 inches in length or 12 in breadth.

PATTERN AND SAMPLE POST.

Canada.—Patterns and samples of merchandise, not exceeding 24 oz. in weight, when posted in Canada for places within Canada or Newfoundland, must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of One Cent per 4 ounces weight, and put up in such a manner as to admit of inspection. Goods sent in execution of an Order, however small the quantity may be, or articles sent by one private individual to another which are not actually Trade Patterns or Samples, are not admissible.

Registration fee 5 cents.

UNITED STATES.—Patterns and Samples of Merchandise, posted to places in the United States, will continue to be subject to the special rate of 10 cents each, pre-paid by postage stamp, and must not exceed 8 ounces in weight.

PARCEL POST.—The postage on parcels addressed to places in Canada, continue at former rates, which must be prepaid by postage stamp, viz.:

Parcels intended to pass through the mails should not exceed 5 pounds in weight, or 24 inches in length, or 12 inches in breadth, and should be marked "by Parcel Post." Parcels may be registered by affixing a 5 cent registered letter stamp thereto, in addition to the postage.

Parcels cannot be transmitted by post to any place beyond the limits of the Dominion of Canada, nor can any parcel be forwarded to British

Columbia or Manitoba (Winnipeg excepted), via the United States, which exceeds in weight the limit of 2 lbs. 3 oz. Parcels for Winnipeg of 4 lbs. weight can be transmitted.

On orders payable in the United Kingdom: Not exceeding £2 10s. sterling, 20 cents.

No single order to be granted on the United Kingdom for more than £10, or on Newfoundland for more than £20, but as many orders for these sums may be issued as will make up the sum required.

No orders to be granted under any pretence, unless the Christian and Proper Names are supplied. The Christian names of married women to be given, and not those of their husbands.

Names of parties, places and sums to be written in the plainest possible manner. As there are several localities of the same name, Remitters must be careful to indicate which of them they mean. For this purpose, the Province, County, or State in which the paying office is situated must invariably be supplied.

33 Victoria, chap. 7, sec. 24, enacts that "It shall be a misdemeanor for any Postmaster or other person authorized to issue Money Orders, to issue any Money Order without having previously received the purchase money, or sum payable therefor;" and Sec. 29 enacts that "every person who aids, abets, counsels or procures the commission of any such misdemeanor as aforesaid, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and punishable as a principal offender."

The person to whom an order is payable, can have it paid to a second person by writing on it, "Pay to the order of _____ (the name of the second person to fill the blank), for value received.

Persons remitting money should obtain a Money Order, as the Department is not responsible for the loss of a letter containing money; and in no case should a money letter be sent without registration. No notice is taken of any unregistered letter.

USEFUL HINTS.

Never send money or other articles of value through the Post Office except either by Money Order or Registered Letter.

Make complaints and inquiries in writing.

Preserve and request correspondents to preserve envelopes of missent or delayed letters.

Business men should be careful to authorize but a limited number of persons to receive their letters, and only those in whom they have full confidence.

Have a letter box on your office door.

Letters addressed to mere initials, or fictitious names, will not be delivered, unless addressed in care of a resident, or to some box in the Post Office.

Letters containing Gold or Silver Money, Jewels or precious articles, or anything liable to Customs duties, cannot be forwarded by Post to any of the Postal Union countries except the United States.

RE-DIRECTED LETTERS TO ANY PLACE IN CANADA, THE UNITED STATES, AND POSTAL UNION COUNTRIES.

Re-Directed Letters to places within the Dominion or United States will be forwarded without any additional charge if returned promptly to the Office.

Letters sent to or received from a Country of the Postal Union, and afterwards re-directed to any place in Canada, or a Country in the Postal Union will be forwarded even if taken out of the Office and re-addressed; but if re-addressed to a place where there is a higher rate of postage the difference of postage will be chargeable.

OBSERVATIONS.—The nearer the time of the Moon's change to noon or midnight, the more nearly will the result accord with the prediction.

The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

The Moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e., from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table
