### 8000 MANCHUS SLAIN 8 FOREIGNERS VICTIMS

Uncensored Reports From Sianful Tell Grisly Tale-Republicans on Top.

PEKIN, Dec. 8 .- (Can. Press.)-The first direct and uncensored news received from Sianfu since the recent outbreak there was brought here today by messenger. It consists of letters to the British and American legations and the director of posts. The letters say that 8000 Manchus were slain by the Chinese, and that there was much looting. Several mission houses in the province were destroyed and eight foreigners, some of them children, were killed. Four of the dead were Americans.

According to the letters most of the foreigners in the Province of Shensi, of which Sianfu is the capital, number-75, 17 of them being Americans A majority of these are now in Sian-fu, the others having fled to the Pro-vince of Kansu, where trouble is ex-

"We apparently are safe now," says one of the letters, "but the lawless reign. We had hoped to escape down the Han River, but the road is dangerous. The Kansu missionaries may have a hard time. Twenty-two of them, including children, are Americans. Money cannot be sent them as all the mails have been stopped, and the banks were robbed and burned."

This letter is signed by V. J. Plymire of the Christian and Missionary Alliance at Taochow Province of Kan Alliance at Taochow, Province of Kansu. It is dated Nov. 26.





tubes to the board of trade vesterday was the most convincing presentation of the question yet made, and the applause which greeted his statements showed that they received the hearty approbation of the large and influential gathering of business men.

President R. S. Gourlay, who was in the chair, introduced Mr. Hocken by saying that the object of the board was to foster the spirit of public service, and to recognize wherever possible any man or men who showed that spirit.

Controller Hocken declared that the proposed system of tubes was required by the social welfare of the city, its sanitary needs, and its industrial interests. The man who lived in his own house and garden was a better workman in the factor than an occupant of the tenements was. The basis of the modern city was rapid transit, and its development depended on it. The present manufacturing area of the city was restricted, sky-scrapers were going up. The workmen must find homes in the outskirts if the conditions in the east side of New York

homes in the outskirts if the conditions in the east side of New York were to be avoided. Rapid transit was a moral need of the rising generation. There was no other way to obtain it but by the tubes.

AQUATIC ANIMALS AND THEIR
FOOD SUPPLY.

How aquatic animals get an adequate food supply is still a problem of the zooflogists. In a British Association paper, Dr. W. J. Dakin referred to recent investigations, and gave reasons for believing that, while solid food is necessary, food in solution forms part of the normal supply of water animals.

Dr. Dakin has found that a specimen of the sponge suberites, weighing two ounces, requires per day as much carbon as 7.490,000,000 of its food organisms would yield, and to capture this number of the organisms it would meed to filter several thousand times its own volume of water per hour.

A more rational view is that part of dits carbon comes from the solution Crabs living in sponges exist and grow in water from which the solids have been filtered; and goldfish that live forty-one days in hydrant water continue alive seventy-eight days in the same water to which organic matter in solution has been added. One objection raised to this theory is that it is difficult to estimate how much solid food of aquatic animals is bacteria and like minute organisms. the United States, and endeavor to help in solving any difficulties that might arise in a way just and satis-factory to both.

BONES OF MONSTER FOUND IN NEW JERSEY.

The skeletom of a mammoth extinct reptile, called by a name comparatively unfamiliar, as names of extinct reptiles so, has been set up in the American Muscam of Natural History in New York City, and is now ready for exhibition. The animal has been designated by science as a species of the phytosauria. This phytosour has been popularly called the Fort Lee reptile, and when first discovered was thought to be a dinosaur, but later study and research has brought out the fact that the specimen is a rarer type of fossil reptile than the dinosaur, and is one of a group long since extinct, combining the characteristics of the dinosaur and crocodile.





EIGHT CIVIC CHIEFS AGAINST ENLARGING

Dr. Hastings, M. H. O., is Only One in Favor of North Toronto Annexation.

In a nine-page report submitted to the board of control yesterday, eight out of nine civic officials opposed the annexation of suburban territory by the

annexation of suburban territory by the City of Toronto.

The line-up is as follows: For annexation, Dr. Hastings, M.H.O. Against, City Treasurer Coady, City Engineer Rust, Assessment Commissioner Forman, Chief of Police Grasett: Acting Park Commissioner Chambers, Fire Chief Thompson, City Solicitor Johnston, and Property Commissioner Harris.

The reason for their report was the motion made by Ald. May that outlying districts, not including North Toronto, on the north side of the city as far north as Estlaton and he anneyed. on the north side of the city as far north as Eglinton-ave., be annexed. The report has been sent on to the city council without recommendation.

Controller Spence mentioned that the report contained much, such as information about the population of the city per acre, that had not been asked for.

"No, it was thrown in," said the mayor, "and we could hardly censor he report."

the report."

Extracts from it are as follows:

"The City of Toronto has a land area of 17,920 acres, whereon dwell 374,667 persons, as per 1911 assessment return. This shows a population density of 20.3 persons per acre. The assessment commissioner advises that there is sufficient vacant land within our corporate limits to accommodate 69 per cent, or 260,000 people additional, such computation being based upon the present layout of the city. We thus have ample area for a total population of 634,667 people, which, with the present acreage, would give a population density per acre of 35.3.

Room for 417,000 More.

"The tract covered by the resolution

Room for 417,000 More.

"The tract covered by the resolution submitted contains about seven square miles, or about 4,449 acres, equivalent to 25 per cent, of the area of Toronto. While we are not in position to indicate the number of people housed thereon, we believe it to be less than two per acre. If this section were annexed, it would, with a population density of 35.3 per acre, furnish space sufficient for 157,049 people, which, added to the number presently in Toronto, plus the 260,000, for which we have yet sufficient vacant land, would make provision for an ultimate population of 791,716, or 417,049 persons in excess of the existing number.

"The assessors' return for 1905 show-ed 238,642 resident within our limits, which compared with the 1911 return shows an increase during the six years of 136,025, or 56.7 per cent., or 26.8 per cent. increase by means of annexation. If during the next six years we increase in like ratio, we shall have 214.25 cent. in like ratio, we shall have 212,436 souls, forming a total of 587,108, still leaving sufficient space within our present boundaries for 48,000 additional.

No Public Services, No Public Services.

"We think that demand for annexation should emanate from within the City of Toronto, upon demonstration of its need for additional territory.

"Heed should not be given the desire of those without the city, who prompted by self interest seek to invest suburban and farm lands with artificial values, which annexation to a large municipality tends to create.

"With the exception of a portion the Town of North Towns." the Town of North Toronto, the district covered by the resolution is entirely devoid of the following services, and the public buildings and plant reand the public buildings and plant requisite thereto, viz. police, fire, sewage, water, paving, sidewalk, street lighting, street cleaning, oiling, sprinkling, and garbage collection and dis-

"Our experience has been that, immediately upon annexation, the residents of these districts instantly demand all public services, and are insistent that they be as expensive and thoro as in the older and comparatively popular sections, which by reason of high property value, contribute the major portion of the taxes. Compliance with these requirements burdens the general taxpayer with a portion of the cost entirely uncommensurate with the

advantage received therefrom.


