





Market Fluctuates Under Influence of

Chicago Options Made a Net Gain Chicago Corn Advanced Half a

The supplement to The Liverpool Corn Trade News, April 3, gives a list of 214 steamers and salling vessels now loading or er gaged to load at Argentine ports.

The first charters for straight grain cargoes from Chicago to Buffalo were made on Thursday last. They were for boats now on Lake Erie, which will arrive on opening of navigation. The rate was 2 cents, corn or wheat, shippers' option.

A Kansas miller writing to The North-western Miller says: Wheat is not nearly in as bad a condition as reported. Not over 15 per cent. will be plowed up, and as there is an increase in acreage the loss will be comparatively little. With favorable wea-ther we can raise more wheat this year than last.

The receipts of flour and wheat at the nine primary western markets during last week were 186,801 barrels flour and 2,054,-809 bushels wheat, as compared with 128,-547 barrels flour and 1,651,098 bushels wheat in corresponding week last year. Stocks of wheat at Duluth, 10,706,000 bushels; at Minneapolis, 8,723,000 bushels; at New York, 2,015,000 bushels; at Detroit, 354,000 bushels; at Toledo, 320,000 bushels; at St. Louis, 473,000 bushels.

Visible and Afloat.

Thus the wheat and flour on passage increased 560,000 bushels during the past week, and corn on passage decreased 1,040,000 bushels. The wheat and flour on passage a year go was 39,360,000 bushels.

To recapitulate, the visible supply of wheat in Canada and the United States, together with what affoat to Europe, is 66,742,000 bushels, against 66,111,000 bushels a week ago, and 68,514,000 bushels a year go.


