# ASSASSINATION OF HUMBERT HIS CAUSE GREAT SORROW

## The Murderer, Angelo Bressi, Worked as a Silk Weaver at Paterson, New Jersey, Until May 7—Says He Had No Accomplices.

### News of the King's Death Was Kept Quiet to Give the Cabinet Time to Secure the Safety of the Monarchy—Outrage Was Received With Horror in Great Britain—Queen Victoria Wires Condolences to Humbert's Widow—Cheering for the Young King.

Monza, July 30.—Few additional details of the terrible tragedy are available. It happened so quickly and unexpectedly that the king was dead almost before the spectators realized what had occurred. No special precautions had been taken. Very few police were in attendance and only a small guard of soldiers was keeping the way for the carriage. The king, amid the cheers of the crowd, came out smiling, accompanied by his aide-de-camp, Gen. Ponzio Vaglia. He had entered the carriage and was driving off when the revolver shot was fired in quick succession.

#### Bressi Was Cheering.

Some witnesses assert that Bressi was seen just previously waving his hands and cheering. The first shot wounded the king in the neck; the second, the fatal one, pierced his heart; and the third broke the arm of the already dying sovereign.

#### People Were Stunned.

The crowd, stunned by the unexpected news, but speedily a rush was made towards the assassin. He did not attempt to escape and was roughly treated until the carabinieri formed a cordon and secured him from the fury of the people.

#### King's Last Words.

An eye-witness says that immediately after the shots were fired the king fell back, placing his hand to his heart. He was instantly supported by Gen. Ponzio Vaglia, who told the coachman to drive with all speed to the castle. After his exclamation, "It is nothing," he did not utter a word.

#### Sorrow of the Nation.

Rome, July 30.—Thousands of telegrams have been received from all parts of the country indicative of the deep sorrow of the whole nation. Everywhere work was suspended to-day, and the houses and theatres were closed. In the principal cities the municipal authorities are considering plans to honor the memory of the murdered monarch.

#### Cheering for the Young King.

At Messina a procession marched through the streets cheering for the young king and the young queen. At Palermo an imposing demonstration proceeded in solemn silence to the municipal offices to express the sorrow and indignation of the population after which a vast crowd gathered in the square. There were similar demonstrations in other towns.

#### MORE DETAILS FROM MONZA.

When the story was broken to Queen Margherita she burst into tears.

#### AS TO THE KING'S ASSASSIN.

Bressi said he had no accomplices and he hated monarchial institutions.

#### WHO THE ASSASSIN IS.

Bressi was a quiet temperamental man and an inoffensive man—has a wife and daughter.

Paterson, N.J., July 30.—The rumor that Angelo Bressi, who was arrested at Monza, Italy, for the assassination of King Humbert, had lived here, caused quite a sensation in the Italian quarter.

The Ishmaelite horse, the Western plains is the outlawed broncho. This is the animal which, on account of his original devilishness and bucking propensities, can never be broken to ride quietly. He is of no use in rounding up cattle on account of his temper, and is of no avail for the ordinary purposes of the ranch. Once a broncho, however much he may buck at first, can be broken to go quietly and gently, but in one of the most peaceable and easy-going animals extant, but his outlawed broncho is exactly his opposite, and the moment any rider gets on his back he curves himself up and proceeds to lift all his feet, both fore and hind, and the rider has the sense of being in the air most of the time. It is these animals that are most highly prized by the Ishmaelite riders of the Wild West shows. No other riders can ever mount these outlawed bronchos. The American Historical Wild West Show a whole carload of these horses from the plains of the American West arrived on Friday. These were entirely additional to the regular forces of the show, and were selected by the American Amusement Syndicate for the purpose of the Canadian tour which commences this week.

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**ENLARGE TRAIL SMELTER.**

Project for Increasing Capacity of C. P. R. Plant as Well as Northport Works.

**THE ORE SHIPMENTS DEMAND IT**

In the Boundary District—Horn, Stratton and Others Tearing Country—Mining Stocks.

It seems well for the future of Rossland Camp that the two smelters which handle its ores are in prospect of enlargement. A day or two ago we announced the owners' plans to double the capacity of the Northport smelter, and now it is said that the Trail smelter is to be enlarged.

It is stated on good authority that large improvements and additions are contemplated on the smelter at Trail. The lead stack that was built two years ago has proved so much of a success that the erection of two more is under consideration. This will be for treating the galena ore, a considerable quantity of which will be smelted at Trail in the future.

Besides these, other furnaces will be built, and it is said that the company is prepared to spend \$100,000 on the additional capacity of the smelter should the fall fall short of that of Northport, which will be increased to 1300 tons by the middle of September next.

The present capacity of the Trail smelter is 650 tons. As the additions of the two 40-ft. compressors on the lead lines will increase the capacity of shipping to very nearly treble their present output, it will be seen that this shipment, which will approach the million ton even the increased number of furnaces at Northport. Besides this amount of ore, the production by the West Coast Central and other mines must also be taken into account just as soon as these mines resume shipping.

It will be seen that the alleged addition to the capacity of the smelter should not be sufficient, even with the increased capacity of the Northport plant to deal with the ores of the camp.

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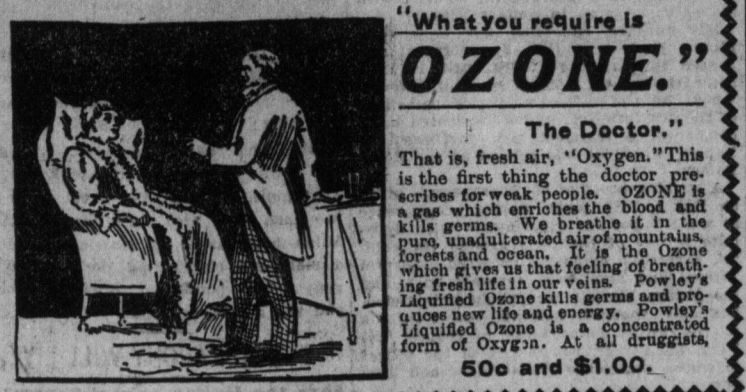

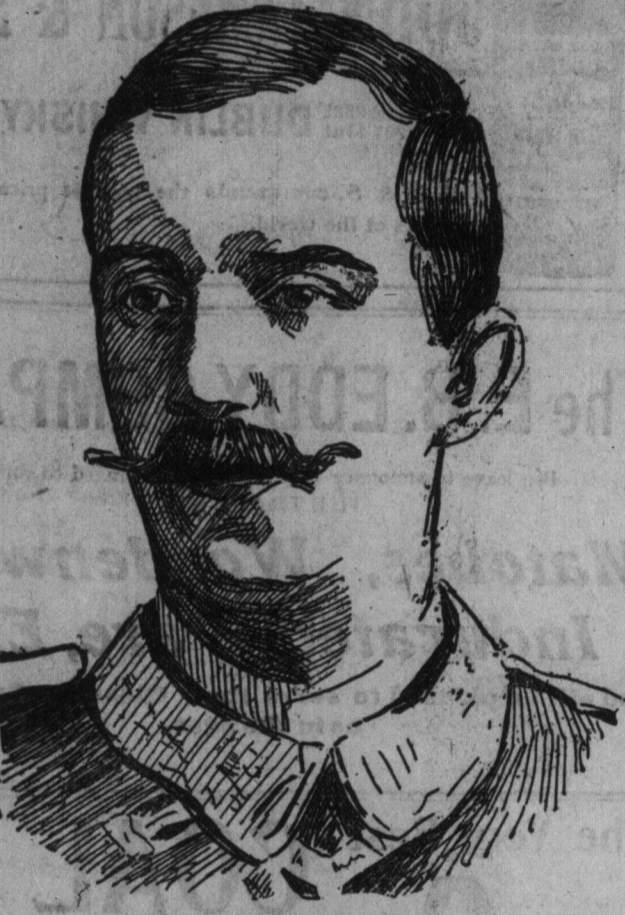

At the age of 12 the Prince Victor spoke French and English perfectly. He then began to learn the art of war, carrying out his studies strictly according to the military regulations of the Italian monarchy. Latin, history, geography, mathematics, physical sciences, constitutional right, political economy and German the most renowned professors were his masters, and his yearly examinations in the presence of
