ANNUAL REPORT.

The Board of Management of the Toronto House of Industry, have much pleasure in submitting this their Annual Report to the subscribers and the general public.

The operations of this Charity have been continued with equal success, and with the same degree of benefit and acceptance to the poor of the City as during past years.

It may not be out of the place to remind subscribers of the nature and extent of the work that we have in hand, both of which will be readily seen by reference to the Superintendent's report herewith submitted. During the past year, irrespective of those who have been inmates of the House, the Board has been enabled to grant relief to no less than 586 families, numbering 2053 souls, while the casual poor who have obtained assistance from the Institution, have numbered 255, making a total of 2308 persons relieved, exclusive of the inmates. Twelve thousand one hundred and one 4 lb. loaves of bread, and 200 tons of coal have been given out to parties applying. On the recommendation of the Ward-visitors 90 lbs. of tea, 280 lbs. of sugar, 375 lbs. of rice, and 450 lbs. of oatmeal, have been distributed to the sick.

During the winter months 90 gallons of soup were made daily in the kitchen, procurable by all who wished to have it. The success of this particular branch of the Institution's operations has been found

The Board would likewise direct attention to the usual Report of the very efficient Medical Officer, which must be considered in connection with the above, and to the accounts of the House as prepared by the Treasurer, and duly audited by the proper Officers.

They feel that they can confidently point to the result of their exertions as shewing that the trust with which they have been charged is still faithfully and efficiently administered. Every care is taken that the funds shall be judiciously managed, that none of the deserving poor may be neglected.

During the past year they have been enabled to add to the premises specially appropriated as a casual ward, thereby doubling the accommodation.

The Board feel bound formally to acknowledge the valuable assistance rendered to the efficient working of the institution, by the several Ward-visitors, and they desire to express their entire satisfaction with the manner in which his duties has been performed by the Superintendent, on whose assiduity the successful working of the establishment so largely depends.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

As Surgeon to the House of Industry, I beg to report that my duties have consisted of the usual routine of visiting the House as heretofore, twice a week, and oftener whenever illness of the inmates required it. I have visited applicants for relief in remote parts of the city, in order to protect the House from imposition, and although I had no occasion to reject any who were thus visited, *have often* detected persons coming before the Committee, at the House, claiming assistance on the-ground of feigned illness

The following are the numbers and ages of those who have died in connection with the House during the year 1873, viz, 1 at 84 years, 1 at 82, 1 at 80, 1 at 79, 1 at 77, 1 at 73, 2 at 72, 1 at 68, 2 at 67, 1 at 65, 1 at 64, 1 at 62, 1 at 61, 1 at 56, 1 at 55, 1 at 52, 1 at 42, 1 at 39, 1 at 16, 1 at 4, 1 at 3. 1 at $1\frac{3}{4}$, 1 at $1\frac{1}{2}$, and 1 at 1 year.

The diseases of which they died were Cerebral Softening 4, Consumption 3, Marasmus 1, Disease of the Heart 5, Hooping Cough 2, Typhoid Fever 2, Chronic Bronchitis 1, Chronic Diarrhæa 1, Senile Debility 2, Dropsy 1, Measles 1, Epilepsy 1, Chronic Rheumatism 1, Intemperance 1.

The deaths occurred in Jan. 1, Feb. 5, Mar. 3, April 6, May 1, June 3, July 1, Aug. 1, Sep. 2, Oct. 1, Nov. 1, Dec. 1.

The influence of the intense cold of last winter will be observed in the high mortality for the months of February, March, and April.

Both heat and cold, when extreme, prostrate those of low vitality, and very sensibly increase the death rate.
