INQUEST INTO THE DROWNING

Verdict of Accident—Cases Before Justice Testzel.

HAMILTON, June 4.—(Special.)—The case of Mrs. Wright against H. G. Wright for a declaration as to the partnership agreement between the late E. T. Wright and H. G. Wright, in the business of E. T. Wright, came before Justice Testzel this afternoon. Mrs. Wright is claiming a half interest in the business. His honor said it was one of those unfortunate family disputes and a winding-up order would greatly affect the assets of the company. He advised a settlement. The suit of Major F. B. Ross against the Crystal Palace Theatre people over a lease was settled.

An inquest was held this evening into the death of Albert Millburn, drowned in the bay from a gasoline launch, with Harry McEwan, and a verdict of death by drowning was returned. There was some evidence that the party had been drinking, but David McEwan said that they were not drunk.

Col. Stoneham was this evening re-elected president of the Veterans of 1866. A banquet was held at the Waldorf. William Holloway, 335 North West-worth-street, was robbed over the head with a bottle. He was badly cut.

Body Washes Ashore.
All doubt as to the fate of A. W. Maguire, whose disappearance was reported on May 15, was removed to-day when the body was washed ashore at Van Wagner's Beach, about 150 yards east of where he left a note saying that he was about to drown himself.

Mrs. Doolittle, 618 North James-street, threatens to bring suit against the city because she claims her dog was picked up in her yard by the dog catchers.

At the assizes to-day James Brennan, New Westminster, B.C., got judgment against the estate of Gideon Perrie for \$1014. It was in connection with a wrestling match, in which Perrie figured as D. H. Cameron.

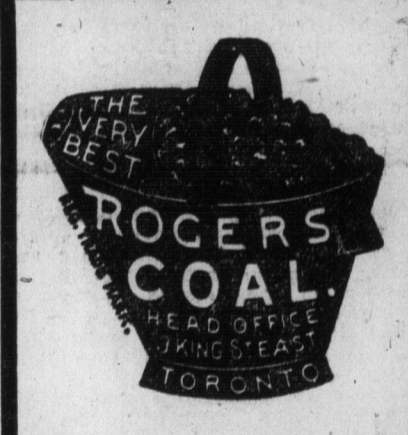
TAXICABS AT WOODBINE FEATURE OF MEETING

Striking Evidence of the Growth of Popularity of Motor Vehicles.

"The Woodbine is a revelation to me, for I had no idea that you went into racing so extensively over here and I must say I was most agreeably surprised to learn that over 1400 horses were competing at this meet."
This was the expression of Mr. S. F. Edge, general manager of the Napier Co. of London, Eng., who attended the races yesterday as the guest of Messrs. Andrew Elder and W. P. Kearney, vice-presidents of the Taxicab Co. Mr. Edge is making a flying trip to this country, having arrived on Friday via the Celtic at New York, and leaving on Wednesday via the Lusitania. He said that it seemed quite natural to see the taxicabs so much in evidence at the track here, as in London the demand for taxis had grown to such a remarkable extent that no affair seemed complete without them and the factories were all taxed to their utmost capacity to supply the demand. The Napier Company are supplying 100 cabs per month, which, with the large number from the other factories, are absorbed by the many companies operating taxicabs in London.

Dues From Milligan Estate.
Succession duties continue to swell the provincial treasury. Yesterday a cheque for \$5,969.89 was received from the \$104,329 of the late John Milligan of Port Hope. This brings the receipts for five months to within \$10,000 of the estimated amount for the fiscal year ending Oct. 31.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—The department of justice was advised to-day that the Missouri Pacific and the St. Louis, Iron Mountain and Southern Railway Cos. had entered a plea of guilty before Judge Trier in Little Rock, for making illegal rebates to grain merchants, and were fined \$15,000.

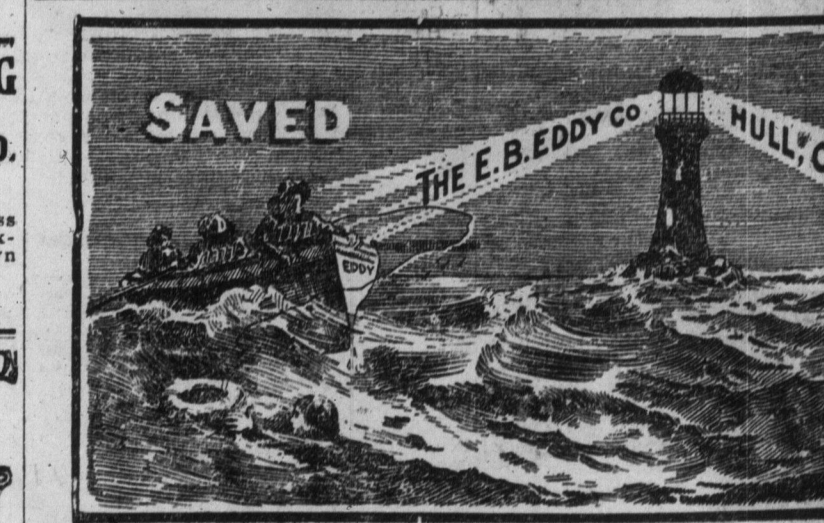
MASONIC BANQUET AT WOOD-STOCK.

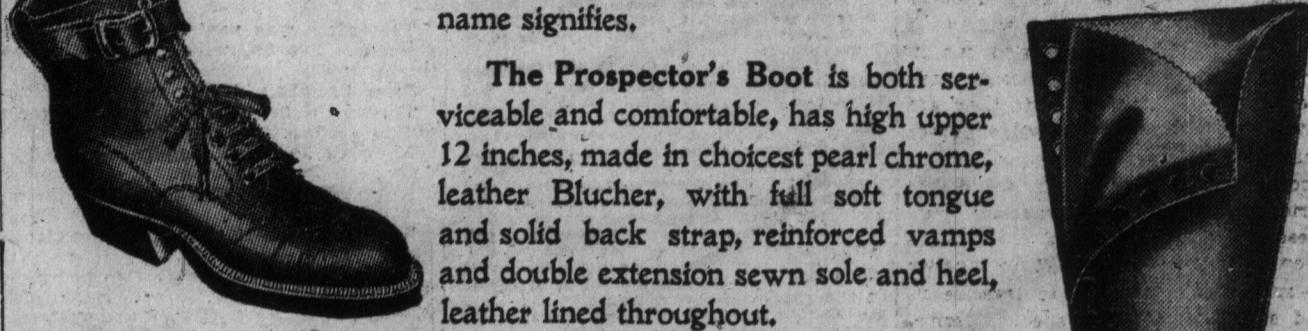

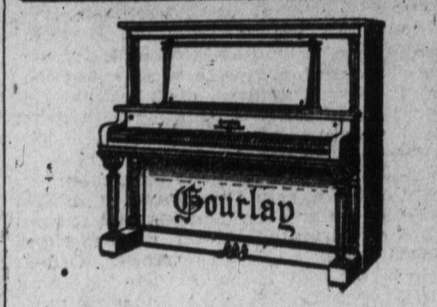

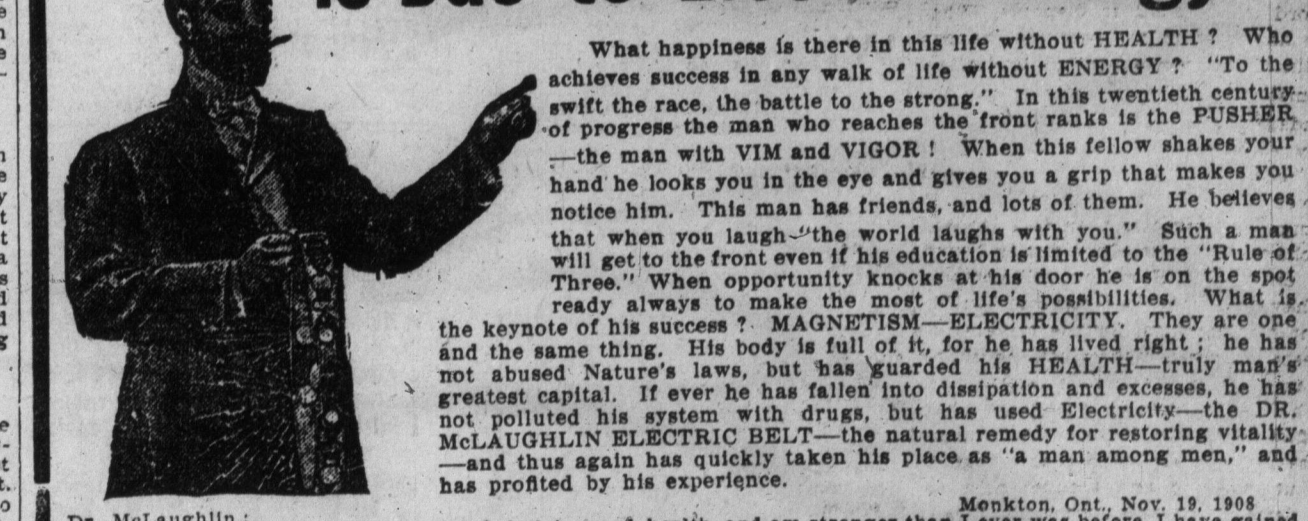
No Carpenters' Strike.

GRIMES GETS 3 YEARS STUFFING PAY ROLLS

BIG DOCK IN EAST

Poison's Will Build One For Vessels of Six Hundred Feet.

The new plant at Ashbridge's Bay, which the Poison Iron Works Company are intending to build shortly, will be equipped with a four hundred and fifty foot dry dock capable of floating a 600-foot ship and carrying a weight of 7500 tons. The dock will be fitted with compartments allowing it to sink deep enough in the water for a ship to sail into and then the water will be pumped out.

The estimated cost of the plant, which will be large enough to build three 600-foot ships, is from \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000.

The old plant will not be used by the Canadian Northern as a machine shop, says the Poison management. Work on the new property will be commenced as soon as the exact location is decided on.

Summer Train Service.

The Canadian Pacific announce their summer change of time effective Sunday, June 6th. The Winnipeg Express will leave at 10.10 p.m. for Port Arthur, Winnipeg and points west, instead of 10.15 p.m., as at present.

The evening connection from Toronto and points east will leave at 7.10 p.m. instead of 7.15 p.m. This train carries through New York sleeper.

A new fast through train leaves Toronto at 4.00 p.m. daily except Sunday, for Galt, Woodstock, Guelph, St. Mary's, Ingersoll, St. Thomas, London, Chatham, Windsor, Detroit and Chicago, via through Chicago sleeper, arriving at latter point in time to make connections for all points west and northwest.

The London local will leave at 2.45 p.m. for London and intermediate points.

In connection with these changes a Sunday train will leave Toronto at 1.00 p.m. for Montreal and intermediate points, thus making a double daily service in each direction between these points.

PROFESSIONAL DRIVES MADE AGAINST TWO MINING STOCKS

Temiskaming and Chambers-Ferland Are Depressed by Traders, But the General Market is Firm.

World Office, Friday Evening, June 4, 1909. For some unexplainable reason transactions in the mining shares were less active than those for several preceding days, and as usual with a decrease in activity, prices responded with small declines.

The market to-day was apparently governed by the selling of Temiskaming and Chambers-Ferland. These shares were not accompanied by any specific statements, and in both instances rumors were circulated among the holders of the shares, drives were made against both stocks, by professional traders, but it is questionable whether much real stock came out in either instance.

In the case of Beaver and Peterson Lake, much strength was displayed, and the profit-taking forthcoming in Beaver was readily absorbed, and good buying was reported in Peterson Lake, without a sufficient supply of stock to warrant any more rapid advance in the shares than occurred.

On the New York curb there was less activity, owing to the interest taken in the bigger issues at the New York Exchange, but this had no injurious effect upon the leading mining issues dealt in on this market. La Rose and Nipissing sold at firm prices, and were not offered except at advances.

To-day's irregularity is regarded as one of the episodes of an up and down movement in mining securities, and does not destroy the belief that higher prices are due later on.

Change of Offices. Messrs. Greville & Co., brokers, who were formerly located at 89 Yonge-street, have moved their offices to the Standard Stock Exchange Building, 43 Scott-street, where more commodious and suitable premises have been obtained.

AT SOUTH LORRAINE. Expectations Are That a Boom Will Strike This Camp.

HAILEYBURY, June 4.—A gang of some 25 men left here to-day to work on the property in South Lorraine, which was formerly half of the Haileybury Silver Mining Company's claim. Nineteen acres of the above company's property have been acquired by Buffalo interests, and are being worked. Several strong leads of Cobalt have been struck on the property and active development work is now in progress.

This is only another indication of the stir that has begun in South Lorraine, and that is bound to end in a big boom for that camp. No more than five good strikes were made in the camp last week, and it is rumored that the Keeley property has bonanza ore.

The traffic between Haileybury and South Lorraine is greater than it has ever been before, and every morning sees the boats crowded with men bound for the camp.

H. O. Taylor, Will Tour Gowganda. Mr. A. Virtue of Queensborough, general manager of the Mundle Mining Co., left Toronto yesterday on the prospector's trip to Gowganda. He will make a tour of the Montreal River district, and will be absent some weeks.

McKinley Dividend. At a meeting of the directors of the McKinley Darragh, at Rochester, on Thursday, a dividend of 6 per cent was declared, payable on July 15. No statement is made, however, as to whether this is a quarterly or interim declaration, but it is expected that the latter is the case, and that the company's dividends are paid according to the output of the mines.

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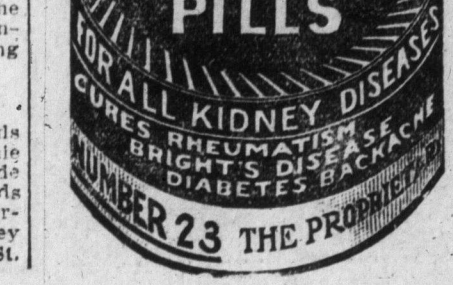

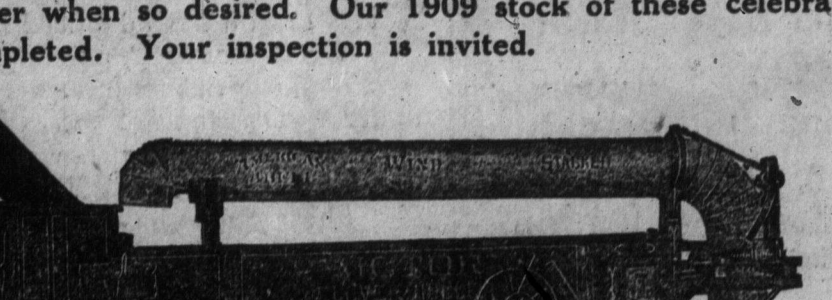

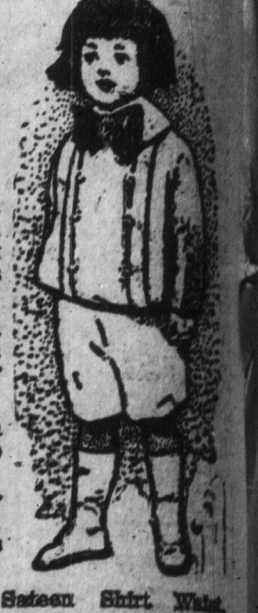
