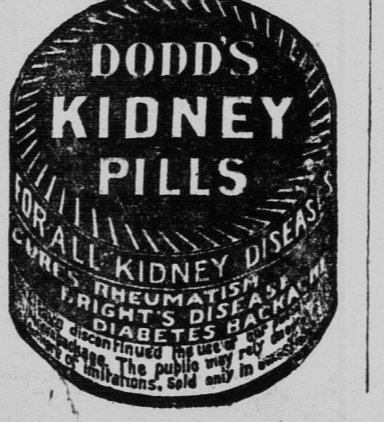

Halifax Knights of Pythias will probably have an excursion to Boston next August, when the grand lodge of the order meets there.

Norwegian steamer Hirundo, Captain Sorenson, sailed from Dalhousie, N. B., yesterday for Rosario via Sydney, C. B., with a cargo of dry lumber.

Dr. J. H. Scamell, who has been acting as quarantine officer since the death of Dr. J. E. March, last evening received notification that Dr. R. B. Ruddick would undertake the duties after November 30th.

Boston steamer Calvin Austin arrived this morning early, and landed 23 passengers. She was detained by the recent storm.

The schooner Four Brothers of Murray Harbor, P. E. I., loaded with produce, was wrecked off Merrigosa in last Monday's storm. The crew escaped when the vessel was beached.

A mass meeting of the St. John Orange men will be held in Orange Hall, Gernsey street on Friday evening at eight o'clock, under the auspices of the St. John County Lodge. Matters of importance in connection with the order will be considered.

A verbal report was received from R. A. McIntyre, auditor of the books in the chamberlain's department, at a private session of the treasury board yesterday afternoon. The board will meet again this afternoon to hear the chamberlain with reference to the existing state of affairs.

Russian sailing ship Emperor Alexander II, Captain York, sailed from Dalhousie, N. B., for Melbourne, Australia, last Sunday, but owing to the fierce gale on Monday the ship had to put back to a safe anchorage.

Sixteen cans of United States products were manifested on this port from frontier ports. The manifest of interest, from the United States exports received at the warehouses are ahead of last year's business.

The Allan liner Victorian, which is due at Halifax on Thursday has 511 passengers, consisting of 38 first class, 122 second class and 347 steerage. After landing the mails, those of the passengers who wish to disembark at Hants, and 480 tons of cargo, she will proceed to St. John.

A meeting was held last evening in the Victoria street Baptist church, in connection with the B. Y. P. U. The organization was formed and Vanway was elected the first president. Some sixty ladies joined as charter members.

The anniversary service of the Woman's Missionary Society of Centenary church, will be held this evening, when several addresses of interest, will be delivered and reports received from the branch meeting recently held in Charlottetown.

The C. P. R. tug Cruiser, Captain Stevens, which has been used as tender to the Empress steamers at Quebec the past season, arrived at Halifax last Monday evening for shelter. The tug is on her way here, where she will be engaged during the winter months in docking the winter port steamers.

It is stated in Boston steamship circles that the steamer Yale will next summer resume her sailings between St. John and Boston, and that her sister ship will perform a service between New York and Halifax. Both steamers are now controlled by the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railway Company.

Police Clerk Henderson has received from P. B. McCafferty, formerly of the local press, who is now in Saskatoon, a newspaper clipping telling of the organization of a Canadian Club in Saskatoon. Mr. McCafferty's name appears on the list as a charter member.

The steamer Empress, from Picton, which arrived at Charlottetown on Saturday, had on board the bodies of three former P. E. Islanders who met their deaths by accident. The bodies were those of Daniel McDougall and wife, who were suffocated in their home, and Mrs. William Green, who was instantly killed by being struck by an automobile, while stepping off a street-car.

A woman unknown to the police was picked up in a dazed condition, the result of drinking, at the foot of Dorchester street last night. Serge Kilpatrick carried her far as King Square where he handed her over to Patrolmen Marshall and Hughes. The woman was chilled when discovered, but revived after reaching central station.

Eighteen of the Allan liner Tonician's passengers who attempted to land at Halifax were deported because of trachoma or other disease, or lack of funds. One of them, a Jewish woman, had a first class ticket and possibly thought in this way to escape inspection, but she came under observation and made one of the eighteen who went back on board. Twenty of the immigrants also went to the detention hospital.

ANOTHER OLD CITIZEN GONE

Roger Hunter Died This Morning in His 78th Year.

St. John lost a worthy citizen today in the death of Roger Hunter, which occurred at 4.30 o'clock this morning.

Mr. Hunter was in his 78th year and had been ill for two weeks. He was the oldest employing printer in St. John, both in point of age and number of years in business. Since 1833 he had conducted the Franklin Printing office here.

Few citizens were more widely known than Roger Hunter and few will be more sincerely mourned. For many years he has been a prominent figure in the city where he lived and his passing will be marked even by many who did not enjoy his acquaintance.

Although suffering for many years from a particularly severe affliction his was a cheerful, genial spirit, and the fact that he was deprived of his eyesight had no effect upon the gentle kindness of his disposition.

Mr. Hunter was born in the city of Cork, Ireland, in 1830 and was educated in his native city. He was sent to New York as a representative of the old London Printing & Publishing Company. He remained in New York for two years coming to St. John in 1833 where he established the Franklin Printing office and at the same time conducted a large book and stationery business. Before the fire of 77 "Hunter's Book Store," was one of the well known establishments in St. John.

At the time of his death Mr. Hunter was the oldest employing printer in St. John. The firms of J. & A. McMillan and Barnes & Co. antedated his but the original heads of these firms pre-deceased him by several years.

Mr. Hunter was a heavy loser by the St. John fire and he never re-established his book and stationery business after that time confining his attention to his printing business. Shortly after the fire Mr. Hunter's eyesight became affected and for a time he was practically blind. A few years ago he secured temporary relief by means of an operation but it was only temporary and to the grief of his many friends he was again afflicted. In spite of this however he was in daily attendance at his office and personally directed most of his affairs. He was a prominent member of the Anglican church and at one time a teacher in St. Luke's Sunday school. He was also connected with the Masonic fraternity being a member of Albion lodge of which the son Percy R. Hunter is now presiding officer.

Mr. Hunter married Miss E. J. Cook, daughter of the late John Cook of this city, the ceremony being performed by the late Canon Harrison. Mrs. Hunter who survives him is very seriously ill. He also leaves three sons, Fred, of Winnipeg, Percy R., who has been associated with him in business and Richard, of this city. Three daughters, Miss M. Harriet, of St. John and Florence and Belle of Portland, Oregon, also survive.

The funeral will be held from his home, 34 Sydney street on Friday, November 24. Service in Trinity church at three o'clock.
