

A German professor has made experiments on men and animals to ascertain the comparative nutritive value of fish and meat, and has come to the conclusion that there is no marked difference in favor of one or the other. His investigations are timely; for, in consequence of the increasing prices of butcher's meat, fish is becoming more and more important as an article of food. In Germany, twenty years ago, fresh sea fish was practically unknown as an article of food, except along the coast. At present, the fisheries yield thirty times as much as they did then. In 1884, Geestemunde launched the first steam vessel for high sea fishing. Today there are over a hundred of these steamers, and quite as many sailing vessels as ever. The fish are sold in the harbors at auction. Geestemunde alone thus offered 50,000,000 pounds last year. The government gives its assistance freely, having spent 7,000,000 marks on the harbor of the town just mentioned. A number of Scandinavian vessels are kept busy supplying the ice needed.






