British And French Both Make Gains

Important Positions Captured By Khaki Men—French, Since April 16, Have Captured 138 Cannon

London, April 27.—Important positions between Rouex and Gavrelle and near the Arras-Cambrai road have been captured by the British. The war office so announced today.

FRENCH WIN MORE GROUND

Paris, April 27.—The French have captured several trenches on the heights around Moortvillers and have also gained ground in the region of Hurtlebise and Cerny, according to an official statement issued by the war office. The total number of cannon captured since April 16 is placed at 138.

AGAIN HURLED BACK

French headquarters on the French front, April 27.—The renewed German efforts twice last night to loosen the French grip on the Chemin-des-Dames round Cerny westward of Craonne, willed, then died away under the stubborn resistance of the French. Strong German forces were thrown toward the French positions about nightfall along a 2,000 yard front, where the French, as a result of their forward push last week, virtually dominate the valley through which the Ailette stream runs.

Further along towards Craonne, which sits on the road and commands the main road from Rheims to Laon on the plain spreading eastward, lies Hurtlebise Farm, which shares with Cerny constant German attention, in consequence of its situation near Craonne, the continued possession of which is of great importance to the Germans. The opposing artillery fight incessant duels in this sector and the Germans are doing their utmost by holding Craonne to threaten the French advance across the flatlands towards Laon.

The Reason for the Drive

Paris, April 27.—Under the caption "Why We Attacked," a writer in the Matin says that before the present movement began the German plan undoubtedly was to escape from the grasp of the Allies, whose power had been revealed by the operations on the Somme. SPAIN'S POSITION

New Premier Says Neutrality Impossible When Honor and Interests Involved

Paris, April 27.—The Marquis Prieto, Spain's new premier, in an interview with the Madrid correspondent of the Petit Journal, declares that Spain cannot adopt neutrality when its honor and interests are involved. Incidentally the premier intimated that his administration was prepared to support the vigorous note sent to Germany by Count Romanones, his predecessor, in respect to the submarine issue. Premier Prieto is quoted as saying: "Neutrality is not a programme and the country cannot adopt neutrality as an ideal and object at the expense of its honor and interests. Those who favor neutrality at any price do not understand that they place us in some ways at the mercy of anyone who wishes to attack us."

BODY FOUND IN THE LAKE

Peterboro, Ont., April 27.—The mystery surrounding the disappearance of F. C. Migh, manager of the J. C. Turnbull Company, was cleared up this morning, when his body was found floating in "the little lake" by a resident of the east end of the city. His watch, ring and some private papers were found in the clothing. Coroner Greer decided that an inquest was not necessary. Mr. Migh disappeared on February 4, and since then search had been going on all over the country.

PLOT TO SEIZE THE PRESIDENT AND FOR INVASION OF CANADA

Charges Made Against Max Lynam "Count," in New York

New York, April 27.—Charges that Max Lynam, also known as "Count" Lynam-London, had plotted to "seize the person of the president and raise an army of 150,000 German revolutionaries in this country for an invasion of Canada" were made yesterday when he appeared for release on parole from a prison where he is serving a sentence for bigamy. During his trial agents of the department of justice made the allegation that Lynam was a notorious international crook, Max Schienmang by name, who had operated in France and Germany prior to serving a term in Germany under the alias of Count Marcel Depassy.

RAMSGATE IS SHELLED AGAIN

London, April 27.—German destroyers attacked Ramsgate last night, according to an official announcement issued by the war office. A large number of shells were fired but the destroyers were driven off by the fire from the land batteries. A statement of losses and the damage done was contained in an official announcement in the morning. The statement reads: "Lord French states that the damage and casualties occasioned here by the enemy during the bombardment of the east Kentish coast last night are: Killed, one man and one woman; injured, one man and two women. Damage was done to twenty-one dwelling houses and two stables. One horse was killed. The larger number of projectiles fell in the open country."

RETURNED WAR HERO PASSES AWAY IN MONCTON

Moncton, N. B., April 27.—Driver Edgar Bertrand Dryden, a returned soldier, who enlisted early in the war in the artillery, died in Moncton yesterday afternoon. His health was undermined while he was serving in a hospital in England. He was sent to a hospital in England about a year ago. Last summer he returned to Moncton, and after remaining here for several weeks, was ordered to the Dalton Sanatorium, Prince Edward Island, for further treatment. His condition failed to improve and he returned to Moncton. Besides his parents he is survived by several brothers and sisters. This is the first death here of a veteran of the war. It is not yet known whether a military funeral will be held. Returned comrades are endeavoring to have a detachment of McLean Killies attend the funeral.

HENRY FORD OF AUTO FAME HERE TODAY

In St. John On His Way To Halifax—A Foot Race In Depot to Stretch His Legs

Henry Ford, maker of the Ford car and the man who has made that automobile one of the most popular in the world, arrived in the city on the Montreal train at noon today accompanied by Gordon McGreggor, Montreal, general manager of the Canadian Ford factories. He is en route from Detroit to Halifax where he will remain for a few days. As he stepped off the train after his long journey he turned to some of his companions and challenged them to a foot race in order to take some of the kinks out of their limbs. The deft was accepted by one of the party and pedestrians in the station were surprised to see two men dashing along one of the platforms at top speed. Few realized that Mr. Ford was one of the racers. After taking this form of exercise the party drove up town to the Victoria Hotel where they had dinner and then returned to the station in time to catch the train going to Halifax. Interviewed by a Times reporter Mr. Ford smilingly said that he did not wish anything said about his visit to Halifax when he pressed that of his visit to Halifax. Just twenty-six years ago Mr. Ford, who then resided a few miles outside of Detroit, began to work on a car that could be driven by power. At that time automobiles were practically unknown in America and it was his own genius that was responsible for an invention which is considered today to be one of the greatest in the world. His first car was very small and would not weigh more than 600 pounds. He kept working on it year after year and soon had a machine which became recognized all over the country. From a workshop in a barn Mr. Ford soon had a small plant constructed and as time went on that plant grew in magnitude until it became one of the largest in the world. Today Ford factories are scattered throughout America and the name of Mr. Ford is known to every owner and every person who ever aspired to own an automobile in the country. "When asked if he contemplated any changes in his present automobile Mr. Ford said he certainly did." He said it will not be long before the car weight is reduced to nearly 500 pounds. This he said, will be brought about through an improvement in steel. What today stands a strain of 3,000 pounds will some day be made so as to stand 20,000. While Mr. Ford would not talk of his offer to the United States upon their entry into the war, he said that he could do when others were offering the greatest of all possessions, life itself.

WOODSTOCK FIRE LOSS \$50,000

Woodstock, N. B., April 27.—The loss from this morning's fire is estimated at \$50,000, with very small insurances. The destruction is complete. The hotel was burned to the ground with all its contents, less about \$10,000 worth of insurance of only \$4,000. Benn and Torrey, besides wagons and farm machinery, had burned 100 tons of fertilizer. Their loss is in the vicinity of \$12,000, with \$4,000 insurance. The building which they occupied is known as the Cannan Hotel, and is situated on the corner of Southport, England. The Massey-Harris Company were heavy losers, their insurance is carried at the Toronto office. W. F. Dibble & Son, Ltd., lost a large lot of cement and lime, and L. E. Young several tons of pressed hay. A C.P.R. car loaded with fertilizer was destroyed. It is reported this morning that Mr. Boyer will erect a large hotel on the old site.

FROM PTE. ARTHUR STEEL

Rev. George Steel, D. D., received a letter this morning from his son, Private Arthur Steel, who was recently admitted to a hospital in France suffering from a wound in his chest. The letter was written by Private Steel and greatly allayed the fears of his parents, who had been very anxious since receiving a telegram informing them that he had been injured. He is at present in a hospital in Southampton, England. In his letter Private Steel said that he had sustained a shrapnel wound in the chest while in a trench. The bullet entered his chest and vital organs were injured. When struck down Private Steel was stunned, but was soon able to get back to the dressing station. While on the way he came across a companion who seriously wounded himself and assisted him to a place of safety where he could be given treatment.

WAR NOTES

Lloyd George Sounds A Cheery Note

It Was Worth Submarine Losses to Have United States Come in—Irish Question Must Be Settled

London, April 27.—In an important speech at the Guildhall today, Premier Lloyd George discussed the military situation, the Irish question and others of the major problems with which the government is now engaged. The premier's speech was in acknowledgement of the conferring on him of the freedom of the city of London. Referring to Ireland, the premier said: "We must convert Ireland from a suspicious, surly, dangerous neighbor to a cheerful, loyal comrade. Settlement of the Irish question is essential for the peace of the world and essential to a speedy victory in the war. I appeal to the patriotism of all men to sink everything for the one purpose of getting this question out of the way."

Mr. Lloyd George paid a tribute to the financial community, through the help of which, he said, British credit had survived the financial panic of the early days of the war. This community, he said, took an honorable and leading part in the triumph of the last war loan, which was the most remarkable financial exploit ever witnessed. After alluding to the organization of the ministry of munitions, the premier said: "Now, thank God, our men have a real chance in the fight. The story now is very different from what it was in the early stages of the war. Before June, 1915, we lost eighty-four guns and a considerable number of prisoners. Since that date we have not lost a single gun, while we have captured 400. Regarding prisoners, we have taken at least ten to one. The tide has now turned. Victory is coming increasingly nearer."

"During the first eighteen days of the Somme battle we captured 11,000 prisoners and 84 guns. During the first eighteen days of the Arras battle our captures were 18,000 men and 230 guns, while we gained four times as much ground. This is the only ultimate victory; it meant victory is going to be won at less loss, and our chances are growing as our equipment is improving, and the German morale is falling. That is the explanation of the despair which has driven them to black piracy on the high seas. This is the next job we have to deal with. Our main problem is to feed a population of 45,000,000 in a country which is not self-supporting; to provide the necessary material and food to equip our armies and keep the sea free for the transport of the troops of ourselves and our Allies. That has had to be done against the swarm of pirates moving unseen un-

WOULD HAVE RAILWAYMEN PAID TWICE A MONTH

Bill Introduced in Canadian Senate—I.C.R. Employees Delighted

Ottawa, April 27.—Senator Gideon Robertson introduced in the senate last night a bill providing for payment of railway wages and salaries twice a month. The present practice is to pay once a month. He said that the press had reported statements which were unfair to the employees of government railways. The statement declared that the employees of the government railways were not loyal to the road. He was familiar with organizations of railway men on all the lines and he assured the senate that the men who looked after the movement of the trains and the country in the hands of servants of the railroad and of the state.

ARMY SERVICE CORPS

"That the doors of the Army Service Corps recruiting office in Prince William street, and also the office in Halifax are to close on April 30, was the information that Lieut. Men will be accepted until Monday afternoon. A special appeal has been made for transport drivers. This branch of the service should appeal to the young men of the city who enjoy auto driving, as that is practically the work from morning until night. Lieut. Laing will leave the city on Monday for Toronto, in charge of his last draft of men that will be taken from this section of the country. Why not be one of the draft?"

A. G. THOMPSON DEAD

He was president of the Thompson Sutherland Co., Ltd., North Sydney, and was one of the best known business men in Nova Scotia. He was in his seventy-fourth year. He is survived by his wife and four sons.



While I was running a belt cutter at the Rock Island shop in Chicago, write a contributor to Railway and Locomotive Engineering. I boarded at a house much frequented by locomotive engineers and firemen. These men talked a great deal about their tremendous feats in getting over certain hills without the help of a second locomotive. My opposite neighbor at a table, a young fellow who ran a lathe in the shop, grew tired of this monotonous bragging; he thought he was entitled to do a little talking himself. One evening he called out to me: "Well, I went over and saw the new machine today, and it's astonishing the line work it does."

"How does it work?" I inquired.

"Well," said James, "by means of a pedal attachment, a filament, lever converts a vertical reciprocating motion into a circular movement. The principal part of the machine is a huge disc that revolves in a vertical plane. Power is applied through the axis of the disc, and when the speed of the driving arbor is moderate the periphery of the apparatus is traveling at a high velocity. Work is done on this periphery. Pieces of the hardest steel are by mere impact reduced to any shape the skillful operator desires."

"What in the name of sense is that machine, anyway?" demanded Tom Briggs.

**BRITISH SUPERIORITY IN ARTILLERY FIRE**

The outstanding feature of the second battle of Arras is the definite superiority of the British over the Germans in artillery fire. General Maurice says this is due not so much to an excess of guns as to superior gunnery and a plentiful supply of munitions. An additional factor is the superiority which has been established by the British air service which is of vast importance in the rival artillery fire.

**Submarine Menace.**

A grave warning regarding the seriousness of the submarine menace was given yesterday in a public address by Sir Albert Stanley, president of the British Board of Trade. He said: "We have not yet found a way of dealing with the submarines so as to remove the danger of their being an enormously important factor in determining the outcome of the war. The effect of the submarine war upon the existence of the British empire is simply this: That we cannot continue to bring into this country all the supplies and materials required for our existence, because of the continuance of the war, and for the actual needs of our industries."

PROVINCIAL PROBE IN COMPETENT HANDS

(Moncton Transcript)

The new provincial government is face to face with the most difficult of problems, the problem of making both ends meet. The late administration most improvidently squandered and wasted the public resources until today the provincial income is unequal to the maintenance adequately of its public works and undertakings without drastic savings in some one direction and the increase of revenue in another. The wasting of money and what is worse its stealing, has brought the province face to face with a need for changed conditions. It is unfair to the provincial government that it should be asked to undertake the administration of provincial affairs without the public being thoroughly seized of the real financial standing of the province. The late government declared that its financial standing was excellent, but the then opposition maintained that the government has been imprudent and reckless.

This is a matter which needs to be determined. In fairness to the new government the facts should be investigated and the results made known by a tribunal of impartial men. The new government has done well in placing this matter in the hands of experienced men—a firm of gentlemen, who stand outside of one provincial political difference and a firm by the way which has had recent experience along similar lines.

This step taken by the new government is one which should receive the warmest commendation and support from the people of this province. Let us know the facts respecting our financial situation be those facts pleasant or unpleasant to learn. When we know the actual facts, then the province through its new administration may set itself to the task of seeking to master the financial difficulties which actually exist.

The horses of the king, the court being in mourning for the Duchess of Connaught, will run for the present in the name and colors of Lord Marcus Beresford, who has from the beginning been His Majesty's trusted adviser in racing matters, as he was for King Edward VII. He is the largest nominator for the New Coventry Stakes, just closed with 102 entries. The five from the Royal stable form the largest individual contribution. H. W. Rudel coming next with four. It is not thought among followers of racing that anything of Derby calibre is included in King George's three-year olds.

Yacht Races are Off.

Boston, April 24—The Massachusetts Yacht Racing Union tonight voted to cancel all races which it had been proposed to hold under rules of the union during the coming summer. No races will be scheduled until the war is ended. The action of the union, it was stated, will not interfere with any races scheduled by individual clubs.



**LOCAL NEWS**

**PLACING NEW HYDRANT.**  
A new type of hydrant is being installed in Union street, opposite the head of George street. As it was necessary to cut the eighth water main to connect the new six-inch supply pipe, the water in that district was cut off for several hours this morning.

**LOCAL ARTIST COMPLIMENTED**  
Many highly complimentary remarks were made regarding the excellent work of the artist, Mrs. H. H. McAvity, formerly of this city, when a portrait of Hon. M. H. Gouge, speaker of the Nova Scotia council, was unveiled in Halifax on Wednesday. Mrs. McAvity has earned an excellent reputation as an artist, and particularly as a portrait painter.

**NEED MORE ROOM**  
On account of the steady increase in their business, the Eastern Steamship Corporation has found that their present warehouse accommodation is becoming inadequate. They have under lease from the city the large wharf on the point which is not occupied and they have applied to the city for permission to have a warehouse erected on this part of the wharf.

**WORSE THAN THEY THOUGHT**  
The work of replacing the old wooden sewer which runs across the city from the bridge to Brussels streets is likely to be more extensive than had been estimated. It now appears that the continuation of the sewer across the head of Brussels street to the place where it enters a main sewer in Union street, is in bad condition also, and that this will have to be replaced. The officials had hoped that it would not be necessary to open the street, but this now appears inevitable.

**MRS. GEO. B. STACKHOUSE**  
Many will learn with regret of the death of Mrs. George B. Stackhouse, which occurred at her residence in Kitchener street this morning, after a lingering illness. She was sixty-four years old and is survived by her husband, three sons, Benjamin A., George E., and Sterling B., all of this city; three brothers, Charles Stackhouse of this city and Thomas and Benjamin of California; three sisters, Mrs. B. Garey of South Boston, Mrs. James Logan and Mrs. E. Pace, both of this city. The funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon.

**ACCIDENT TO CAPTAIN HAYES**  
Captain Ralph Hayes, son of Mayor Hayes, who is at the front in command of a battery of artillery, has had the misfortune to dislocate his shoulder, his first mishap since going over with the first contingent. At the time of the accident he was riding and a shell burst nearby. He was severely wounded and Captain Hayes tried to throw himself clear so that he would not be caught under the animal when it fell. There came a bad tumble which resulted in the dislocation. He did not allow the accident to interfere with his work, and returned to duty.

**WON IT ON MERIT**  
The Y. M. C. I. bowling team not only brought back from Calais the trophy which marks the championship of the New Brunswick and Eastern Maine, but they proved themselves the most consistent and steady bowlers of any team in the series. Besides winning the cup they won the high single string score, which goes to Captain George V. McGee, who rolled up 125 in his first game; the highest individual average of the whole series, which honor goes to John Coughlan, the anchor man of the local team who had an average of 100; the high three string total, which also goes to Coughlan, who made the good score of 384, an average of 111, and finally the total pinfall.

**WELL PLEASED**  
Brigadier-General H. H. McLean, G. O. C. of the New Brunswick command, accompanied by Lieut.-Colonel McCreese, returned to the city last evening after a tour of inspection. While absent, the general inspected the forestry company at Sussex, under the command of H. S. Jones, also the divisional ammunition draft at Sackville, under the command of Lieutenant Gunn. Both units, said the general, were composed of a fine lot of men and he especially mentioned the members of the forestry unit. Men who have seen the forestry unit report that it is composed of a typical lot of New Brunswick woodsmen, and that they take their place with the best woodsmen in the world. There is no doubt that when they come to help the timber in England and France they will give a good account of themselves. Both units are to change their places of training soon.

**A WILD TIME**  
Probably a runaway in the city has not for some time caused more excitement than yesterday morning. The delivery team of O'Neil Brothers of the City Market, started in a wild dash about 8.30 o'clock from King street east, ran around Crown street into the lower end of Union and from there up the stretch of Union street and was finally stopped at the corner of Charlotte. The runaway was marked by the narrow escape of several old ladies from serious injury. As it was an elderly lady who was knocked down near the corner of Union and Charlotte streets, but was only slightly injured. The driver of the team received bruises but was able to return to work in the afternoon. It is said that some part of the harness became entangled in the horse's feet and caused the animal to become wildly excited. He was finally subdued and thrown to the ground in Charlotte street. Those who witnessed the runaway say that it was sensational and it was amazing that no one was seriously injured. The horse narrowly escaped plunging through several large plate glass windows.

**DIRECTORS OF VALLEY RAILWAY RESIGN**

The resignation of the directors of the St. John and Quebec Railway, the "Valley" road, have been placed in the hands of the provincial government and have been accepted.

W. S. Fisher of this city, who recently was appointed to take charge of the Ross rifle factory in Quebec, had already handed in his resignation and it has been followed by those of F. W. Sumner of Moncton, president of the company, and John D. Palmer of Fredericton, the treasurer.

New directors will be appointed immediately by the provincial government and the work of constructing the railway will be pressed forward to completion in a vigorous manner.

**OF BIG INTEREST IN WAR CIRCLES IN SAINT JOHN**

**General Re-habilitation of the Defence Force in the Dominion.**

According to the statement of Major-General S. C. Newburn, who is in charge of the organization of the Canadian Defence Force, the departure of the overseas troops is to be followed by a general rehabilitation of all militia units in the Dominion.

The present state of the C. D. F. organization only calls for the city militia regiments to recruit battalions for the defense of Canada, though it was suggested a couple of weeks ago that the artillery would be asked to do the same. This latter part of the work, however, has not yet been put under way, and now it is announced that it is the intention of the department of militia to make an attempt to build up all the branches of the militia, infantry, artillery, army service and army medical corps, and all the allied services, in order that they may all be brought up to their pre-war establishment of men who are physically fit for service according to the present overseas standard.

Just how soon this new work will be undertaken, General Newburn was not in a position to state, but it is the next step under contemplation.

Should the militia department decide to take this step it will add eight new militia regiments in this district. The commanding officers of the following units will be called upon to don the uniform and get in the field for recruits: The 8th Hussars, 28th New Brunswick Dragoons, Mounted Company, Corps of Guides, 4th Brigade, Canadian Field Artillery, 1st Field Company, 1st Telegraph Detachment, No. 7 Company, Canadian Army Service Corps, and No. 8 Field Ambulance. The commanding officers of all these units will be called upon to recruit up to full strength, and will go into camp during the coming summer. The same orders issued for the mobilizing of the infantry units, it is understood, will apply to these units.

**INTERESTING CASE IN CHANCERY COURT HERE**

**McKeown vs. Shand a Dispute in Matters in Connection With Ashburn Lake Properties.**

An interesting case is now being tried in the chancery division of the supreme court, with His Honor Chief Justice White presiding. Agnes Grace McKeown, wife of Chief Justice McKeown, is the plaintiff, and Adam Shand the defendant. Parties to the suit own a lot of land which is now owned on a part of the plaintiff's land, and the plaintiff in her statement of claim alleges that the defendant has wrongfully removed the fence which formerly separated the adjoining lands and has enclosed a part of the plaintiff's land with his own, and has erected and now maintains a building upon a part of the plaintiff's land so enclosed by him and has cultivated the same and is now wrongfully in possession thereof. The plaintiff's claim is for an injunction restraining the defendant from maintaining his fences and buildings upon the plaintiff's land, and for possession thereof, and for a declaration of title thereof, and for damages.

The defendant in his defence sets out the allegations that in addition to the lot of land which he now owns he also has a right of way over the plaintiff's property. The defendant declares that when the plaintiff came into possession of her property, the plaintiff was reserved to him mill privileges, water rights and easements to the plaintiff's land. The defendant denies that he has reserved any fences, which at any time separated the lots of land described in the plaintiff's statement of claim, and also denies that he has set any fences over upon the land of the plaintiff, or that he has enclosed any part of the plaintiff's land with his own, or that he has erected, or that he now maintains any buildings upon any part of the plaintiff's land, or that he has cultivated any part of the plaintiff's land, or that he is now in possession thereof. The plaintiff further alleges that prior to the defendant coming into possession of the property now owned by him, the mill was destroyed and ceased to be used or occupied, resulting in an abandonment and discontinuance of the right of way.

The following witnesses have been called for the plaintiff—A. E. Hanson, Fredericton; W. T. Peters, Catherine Moore, Eileen Moore, Hugh McHugh, Francis Burpee and William J. McLean. The plaintiff took the stand this morning in her own behalf. Francis Kerr and M. G. Teed, K.C., are for the plaintiff, and J. B. M. Baxter, K.C., and Dr. W. B. Wallace, K.C., for the defendant.
