

Rifle Bullet Pierces Armor

United States Officers Discover Small Projectile That Penetrates Steel Plate at Fifty Yards

An armor-piercing bullet which can be fired from the regulation army Spring-field rifle was tried out at the Sandy Hook Proving Grounds with surprising results a few days ago. It is of only 30 calibre. Fired at a distance of fifty words the projectile played through a 30 calibre. Fired at a distance of fifty yards the projectile plowed through a sheet of steel three quarters of an inch thick, and then penetrated a silhouette target planted behind the steel plate. In the tests that followed not one but many such targets were riddled by bullets which first passed through steel protection in front of them.

This bullet, which was called "an infinitesimal armor-piercing projectile," finitesimal armor-piercing projectile," yesterday by one of the officers who wit-nessed the Sandy Hook tests, is the outcome of months of experiment and study on the part of some of the ablest offi-cers in the Ordnance Corps of the army. Only a few have been manufactured up to date and all of these were made in government plants by government me-chanics acting under the direction of of-

ficers.

The first batch of the bullets was delivered at Sandy Hook a few weeks ago.

Last Wednesday they were officially tested in the presence of about 50 ordinance officers and the corps of engineers. Half a dozen silhouette targets the size of an ordinary soldier were rigged up and placed behing a sheet of 8-4-inch steel about forty feet long and ten feet in height.

A special detail of soldiers from the Coast Artillery Corps and enlisted men of the ordnance corps was selected to do the firing. At 100 yards the bullets did not penetrate the steel, but at fifty yards practically every one went crashing through and most of them also passed through a target after clearing the steel. The targets were practically destroyed as a result of the tests.

In appearance the new bullets are exactly like the ordinary bullets used in the army regulation rifles. The small armor-piercing pieces of steel is incased in lead, which acts as a lubricant when the bullet strikes steel and thus simplifies penetration. After the tests at







PRAYERS FOR THE DEAD

Episcopalian House of Deputies Also Recognizes Confession in

St. Louis, Oct. 25—For the first time the Prayer Book of the Protestant Episcopal church contains a prayer for the dead. It was adopted this afternoon in the House of Deputies, the bishops concurring. The toll taken by the European war is responsible for the introduction of this petition into the liturgy. The new form occurs in the burial office, and, although it is not headed as a prayer for the dead, its terms are so definite that it was objected to as such and adopted under the fire of protest.

"Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord," to quote the concluding paragraph. "Multiply, we beseech thee, to those who rest in Jesus manifold blessings of thy love, that the good work which Thou didst begin in him may be perfected unto the day of Jesus Christ." Discussion developed that some of the clergy had been praying for the dead these many years.

The burial office is much changed in the revised version of the Prayer Book now under discussion. In the old form it was set forth that "inasmuch as it hath pleased God to remove from the world the soul of our brother." As

Score hath pleased God to remove from the world the soul of our brother." As amended the soul of the dead is commended to the Divine Author without mended to the Divine Author without reference to His will, as modern medical science hold that many leave this life through the neglect of their bodies. It was proposed to modify the wording also to allow for the increase of the custom of cremation, but Francis Lynde Stetson of New York insisted that high authority held that the phrase "ashes to ashes" amply covered the committing the body to the flame. No action on this point was taken.







MUCH TRASH IN GERMAN GOODS

Remarkable Finish For Worthless Articles

What Exhibit Reveals

Canadian Manufacturer Can Find Much to Interest as Well as Amuse Him in Alien Display

Toronto, Oct. 27.—After viewing 10,-000 articles of German and Austrian manufacture at the exhibition of enemy nanufacture at the exhibition of enemy samples under the auspices of the government, one cannot help but admire the versatility and imitative skill of the workmen while at the same time giving a sardonic smile to the great bulk of the unbelievably cheap, worthless trash which German factories have turned out. A two or three-hour inspection of the splendidly arranged tables in Convocation Hall convinces one as could nothing else that German products are made to sell at the lowest possible price; sometimes at lower prices than one would think possible. Remarkable skill is apparent in putting brilliant finish on worthless metal cores; artistic and striking packages around totally inferior goods. The German manufacturer appeals entirely to the senses. Undeniably he makes a most attractive product. Only bitter experience teaches the purchaser the truth of the adage, "All that glitters is not gold."

For instance, there is an intricately chased scimitar more than three feet long; a dazzling weapon which would cause the eyes of any African chieftain to flash with delight. The finish is superb, yet it sells for but 15 cents. The metal of which it is made is absolutely worthless. One of Sheffield's experts told Mr. Herhert Kershaw of England, who is in charge of the exhibit, that he would not wear it to a dog fight. Hundreds of thousands of the swords have been made and sold.

It is in securing the African, South and Central American trade that Germany is particularly zealous. She can turn out as gaudy or as refined appearing articles as are demanded. There are enormous glass beads, brightly colored, which sell at 3 cents a pound; razors which will not shave, selling at from two to sik cents; pocket knives which will not cut, selling three for two cents; spades at six cents; rakes, whose teeth are bent nails, can be purchased for eight cents; scissors, which will not shear, at 36 cents a dozen; saws whose teeth have never been "set," selling at eight cents.

Then there are table-knives stamped out of a sheet of metal. They sell for 36 cents a dozen. Another type, called the Sudan knife, sells at \$6.50 for 100 dozen. Enterprise and ingenuity are indicated by the strings of black beads, millions of which have been sold in Sierra Leone. Germans noticed that the natives were very fond of beads made from a certain black bean. They duplicated the color and shape in vulcanite and immediately had a large trade.

Attractive umbrellas have celluloid handles. There is a quantity of cheap crockery, enamel ware which looks like pottery at a distance but which, upon inspection, is found to have a cheap tin base; musical instruments, electrical accessories, agricultural implements, pomades, perfumes and buttons made of celluloid upon a layer of gelatinized paper, stuffed with cardboard and mounted upon tin backing. Germany is painfully willing to steal the good name of British and American manufacturers of standard articles. The factory of one of the best known English cake and biscuit makes has been photographed and reproduced upon the label of a tin box containing a steamed cake. In large letters is "Made in Germany." The casual purchaser would think that he was buying English cake.

Advertising signs have been prepared for nationally advertised American and British goods. The trade names are sometimes stolen outright. At other times they are so closely imitated that with an ordinary reading the deception passes unseen.



Nearly Two Hundred Victoria Crosses Won During the War

Some of Those on Whom This High Honor Was Conferred for Valor in Battle Have Laid Down Their Lives

In the course of the great war nearly won the Victoria Cross, the greatest honor that can come to a man who fights for England. Recently the British Intelligence Service announced that 195 officers and men of the land and searvice had proved themselves worthy to wear the V. C. Since then at least two more V. C's have been won, both by aviators who accomplished the most daring of aerial feats, the destruction of German Zeppelins.

The statement announcing the number

He was a great believer in keeping cool. They called him a plodder, and when he played football he suffered from "lack of devil." Once he gave a good hiding to a bigger fellow who had fouled him four times very badly. He was a silent man and there was nothing in his life to suggest that he was anything more than a very respectable, hardworking paper-mill laborer.

Baxter was the captain of a daredevil trench-raiding party known to their comrades as "the Forty Thieves" because of the fact that they were never known to come back from a raid without a pile of swag in the shape of captured Germans. One night Baxter took his men out under cover of machine gun fire. At a critical moment Baxter tripped and dropped a bomb he was carrying. It was when they were nearly through, and could hear the movements of a German sentry a few feet away. Baxter had previously removed the split-pin, and obviously the lever flew out and the fuse commenced to fizz. Within five seconds it would have exploded, scattered the wire party, and given the whole show away. Scarcely hesitating to think of the risk, he picked it up, whipped the case plug out of the screw, and threw away the detonator, which went off unnoticed. It was a fine example of merit, skillfulness, and resource. But more was to follow.

The party cut all the wire that defended the German trench, and leaped into the trench and turned in single file alternately right and left, one section led by Sergeant McClelland and the other by Baxter. This trench was very deep, about twelve to fifteen feet, and it was obvious that there would be trouble in hauling out any fat and unwilling souvenir of the occasion in the shape of a prisoner.

one particular incident stirred England deeply. It was the death of John Travers Cornwell in the battle of Jutland. A boy of sixteen on H. M. S. Chester, he was mortally wounded early in the fight. Nevertheless he remained standing alone at a most exposed post, to the end of the action, with the gun's crew dead and wounded all around him. He said simply, when asked why he had remained there, he thought that he might be wanted. The boy's body was brought back to England and buried by his parents in a London cemetery. The British people had not then heard the story of his death, but when Sir John Jellicoe's dispatch was published telling about young Cornwell's heroism a wave of emotion swept over the country.
