





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REGISTER,

ON June 22nd, Saturday, every man and woman,

resident in Canada, who is 16 years and over, must attend at one of the places provided for registration, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 10 p.m., and there truthfully answer

all the questions set forth upon the registration card. Upon signing the card, vouching for the accuracy of the answers, the man or woman will receive a Registration Certificate, as shown below, which must be carried upon the person thereafter.

Why the Certificate is so Important

For failure to register a maximum fine of \$100 and one month's imprisonment is provided, also an added penalty of \$10 for each day the person remains unregistered after June 22nd.

Persons remaining unregistered cannot lawfully be employed, and cannot draw wages for work done after June 22nd. Employers who keep unregistered persons in their employ will be liable for fines equal in amount to those recoverable from the unregistered Unregistered persons cannot lawfully purchase transportation tickets, and may find themselves barred from travelling on railroads, steamboats, etc. Similarly they may be denied board and lodging at any hotel, restaurant, public house or boarding house.

In a word—All persons remaining unregistered, and all persons having dealings with unregistered persons, knowing them to be such, incur heavy penalties under the

KEEP AT IT. "The prospects for an extremely high vegetable yield this year are of the brightest, provided the weather keeps right," declares one of the officials at the Experimental Farm, Ottawa, "Keep heeing." Keep hoeing although it is warm. Go on with successional sowings of lettuce, corn, beans, beets, radishes, etc. Only in this way you will be making the most of the ground as your disposal. Remem-ber that the peas need hilling when they are six inches high to prevent their being broken in the wind.

Cut the weeds down in the morning so that they will wither during the day in the hot sun. Then you can rake them

up in the evening. The ground between the vegetable rows should be constant-ly stirred. Do not be satisfied merely with keeping the weeds in check but in crease the fruitfulness of the ground by

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

EQUIPMENT IS FREE

Special Boots, Crutches, Splints, Etc., Will be Supplied and Renewed by Government

Many discharged soldiers, owing to the nature of their injuries sustained on active service, require the use of specially contrived boots, crutches, splints, spectacles, and other minor orthopedic appliances. The dominion government, according to an official statement issued by the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment, has undertaken the responsibility for issuing this class of equipment, not only in the first instance, but throughout the men's lives so long as the disability lasts. Hitherto, this responsibility has been discharged chiefly by the Board of Pension Commissioners, but since the organization of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment the Invalided Soldiers' Commission of that Department, has taken over the responsibility. The original appliances of such soldiers as may be in need of them will, in most cases, be issued on prescription of their medical officers, while the men are still in hospital. Upon discharge the Medical Board will pass upon the question as to whether there will be permanent need of such appliance or appliances. If so, the decision of the



Taking up the question from a purely that vocational training pays and that from the social and industrial point of view we cannot afford to be without it. view we cannot afford to be without it. The report recommends some very sound methods of applying vocational training to the present scheme of education and touches on the important question of compulsory attendance. That vocational training and attendance of adolescent pupils are closely related, the report shows in the following quotation:

"Your committee believes that the proper law in this connection would require all students to remain in school full time until sixteen and part time until eighteen years of age. As a step proper law in this connection would require all students to remain in school full time until sixteen and part time until eighteen years of age. As a step towards the realization of this ideal it is recommended that an act be passed requiring full time attendance from fourteen to sixteen and evening school attendance two evenings per week from sixteen to eighteen; and that such an act be enforced throughou, the province."

Several appendices are given in the report and they contain some rather startling statistics. The age grade table for the city of St. John, 1918, is worth consideration as the following extract from it will show: The total attendance in Grade II., 1,127; in Grade VII., 514; in Grade III., 1,144; in Grade VIII., 514; in Grade III., 1,144; in Grade VIII., 515; in Grade III., 1,144; in Grade VIII., 516; in Grade III., 1,144; in Grade VIII., 517; in Grade III., 1,145; while Grade XII. had only ten. WAR SUMMARY

The Teutonic allies apparently have lost their spirit of do-or-die. Their attacks everywhere lately have lacked the tenaciousness of days

gained, they now waver and then halt in the face of artillery and rifle fire barring their way, with the points they try to attain, still beyond their reach.

The opening of a gateway to Paris through the western front running from Montdidier to the Marne failed completely; the offensive on the Italian battle line launched by the Austrians seemingly has sive on the Italian battle line launch-ed by the Austrians seemingly has failed miserably in the mountain re-gions and apparently has almost been stopped along the Piave, while a stroke started by the Germans against Rheims broke down in its inception without the enemy taking

against Kneins betwee town in the sinception without the enemy taking a yard of territory.

And in these various attempted enterprises the high commands of the Germans and Austro-Hungarian armies have seen their men literally mowed down until battlefields have been clogged with dead or wounded as recompense to the Allied troops for the small bits of terrain they yielded.

The Austrian offensive on the Italian theatre is still in progress along the Piave river, but in the mountain region after the sharp reaction the British and French troops, in counter-attacks having pushed back the invader from the points he had reached in his initial rush, the enemy evidently is fearful of again trying out the mettle of the defenders.

On the Piave numerous attempts have been made by the Austrians to gain further bridgeheads on the western bank of the stream, but the Italians everywhere are holding them with their gun-fire and also doing sangulary execution within the

with their gun-fire and also doing sanguinary execution within the ranks of the enemy across the river with bombs and machine gun fire.

The Austrian war office asserts that the Austro-Hungarian troops have crossed the Fossetta Canal at some points where, Tuesday, it was claimed they had made advances and also that several Italian lines at the southern foot of the Montello Plateau, the key to the Venetian Plains, have been pierced. Rome, on the other hand, declares that all the weak attempts made in the Montello region were completely repulsed.

More than 9,000 men have been taken by the Italians since the offensive began, and many guns and several hundred machine guns have been captured. That intensive airfighting has also taken place is shown by the fact that fifty enemy planes have been shot down. Only two of the Allied machines have failed to return to their base.

The attack of the Germans near Rheims resulted disastrously to them. Hardly had they left their trenches, after one of the most terrific bombardments of shells of all calibre, including gas projectiles, ever experienced on the western front, nearly 40,000 men were faced by the reinforced French armies and literally cut to pieces and forced to fall back precipitately. Only at one point, to the east of Rheims, did the enemy succeed in penetrating the French line. Here they were ejected almost immediately.






