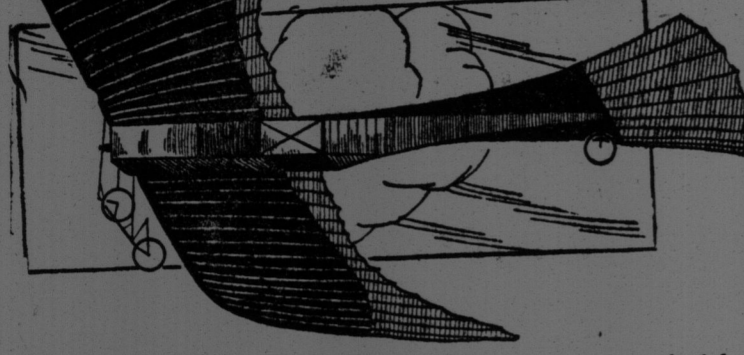


GERMANY'S DOVE OF WAR FAMOUS TAUBE MONOPLANE.



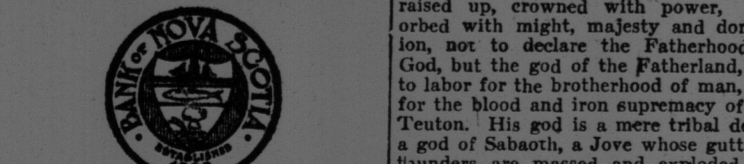
The Taube monoplane now used by the German army was evolved from a machine designed by an Austrian millionaire named Etrich. He modified the shape of the wings, it is said, from the leaf of an Indian tree called the Kanonia, having observed that its leaves were particularly buoyant, and drifted on the wind for miles without coming to earth. Etrich's machine was patented almost everywhere but in Germany, and there the design was adopted by the government as the standard type for all military monoplanes. The name "Taube" (German for "dove") is taken from the fact that in the air the machine resembles a pigeon with outspread wings.

THE KAISER'S CREED "I AM THE GOD OF THE FATHERLAND"

(Harold Begbie in London Chronicle) In view of the many recent utterances by the German Emperor, in which he couples his own name with God, it is interesting to recall that Harold Begbie drew attention in the columns of the Daily Chronicle four years ago to the serious menace to the precepts of Christianity entailed by the Kaiser's megalomania. Mr. Begbie's prophetic article is reprinted below:

It is deplorable that any man whose shoulder attracts universal attention should speak about the God of Christ so intently without the most profound reflection. "God," says Rothe, "is a great word." Nothing but danger of confusion from those rash and violent people who make use of this great word in a thoughtless manner, and use an exalted position to strut and posture and declaim with exuberant vanity before the Holy of Holies. To a Plymouth Brother who ventured to remonstrate with a noble man for misrepresenting God by his wild tolerance and embracing charity the sheltering retreat was made, "But you must say the same thing to the Kaiser. For this man continually presents before the world a conception of the Deity which disgusts the thoughtful and reverent thinkers and fills the soul of the humble and devout Christian with a well-justified manly indignation. He never once made use of the great word in his public utterances without a most insolent conflagration of it with himself and his relations, and these vain and egotistic proclamations of divine kinship are always accompanied by such a rattling of spurs and such a blare of bugles as make a horrid noise in the ears of all Europe who are laughing at him, because the caricatures of Berlin, and the wits of Vienna are making game of him, one never not supposed that he is powerful for evil or that his utterances only contribute to the gayety of nations. More than any body in Europe he is bringing Christianity into a laughable disrepute. On the continent a laughable has never been so common as the Kaiser's making it contemptuous.

The King Inmate. The speech at Koenigsberg (delivered in the summer of 1910) is the culmination of a colossal arrogance. It is the impious for the Kaiser to regard himself as "the instrument of the Lord," but it is the summit of blasphemy when he pronounces that he perfectly interprets the will of heaven. There is not a waster in the midnight restaurants of the Princes, not a housemaid in the "Thiergarten, not a housewife in Charlottenburg, not a courtesan in the "d'Amour, not a beggar in Rickdorf, who is not definitely and perfectly a creature of God and therefore an instrument of the Lord; but if these people announced that all their opinions and all their actions expressed with an infallible accuracy the sentiments of Heaven and the purposes of God, how one would shudder, how one would sicken!

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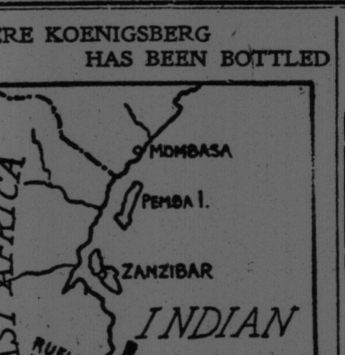
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INDIAN OCEAN

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CANADA IN THE WAR

Three members of the 26th battalion last night were noticed acting strangely about the barracks, and when one of them, Alex. Anderson, fell over a banister and cut his head, he was taken to the general hospital. The truth was that the test was being made to see how many would respond from the militia.

Ernest Schaffer, former ticket agent and court house interpreter in Montreal, pleaded not guilty to high treason yesterday and was remanded. He is charged with the murder of a man in the city of Montreal, and it was impossible by that method to say that a quantity estimated at 600 bushels, might not be 100 bushels over or under that amount. As the damaged grain was then dumped overboard, the estimate could not be verified.

ALL NORTH SEA TO BE MILITARY AREA

London, Nov. 17.—Premier Asquith said in the House of Commons today that the British government had decided to declare the whole of the North Sea to be in the military area. All subjects of the enemy found on neutral vessels, he said, would be liable to detention as prisoners of war. Mr. Asquith also announced that oil and copper would be declared contraband of war.

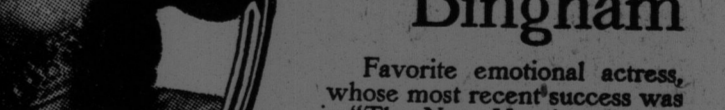

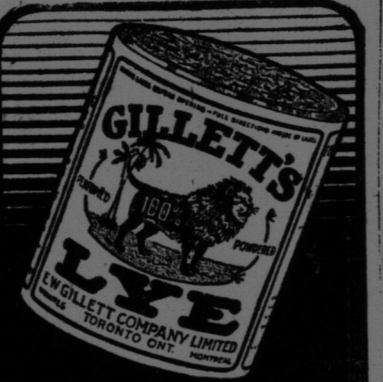

C. P. R. LINER AS A CRUISER. Empress of India Brought Prisoners and Prize into Hong Kong. The C. P. R. liner Empress of India, Captain Halley, has been having an exciting time as a naval transport, according to a letter received in Vancouver. It is dated Hong Kong, October 10, and the correspondence describes the movement of the liner during September. While at Singapore the C. P. R. liner had the honor of becoming the flagship for the Straits Settlements Squadron, and Admiral Jerram and staff took up their quarters on board. Other ships in the fleet were the Minotaur, Hampshire, Yarmouth, and two Japanese warships. The India was the flagship for ten days. There were three German prizes at Singapore when the Empress of India left. She steamed south and boarded every vessel they met. On September 15 she visited Batavia, where she found five German vessels interned at that Dutch port. On September 27 she picked her

clipper bows into Macassar, in the Celebes and there she found three Germans interned. On September 30 she arrived at Sandakan, British North Borneo, and found two Germans captured and under the guard of H. M. S. Clio, Cadmus and two destroyers. The captain, officers and crews of the two Germans were placed on board the Empress of India and on October 1 she sailed for Hong Kong with the two German steamers following with prize crews aboard. They were the Tannapfels, which had 8,000 provisions, and the Rio Passig, which had 4,700 tons of coal. The German prisoners on the Empress of India were very partial to singing "To the Day," and "Watch on the Rhine." The Empress of India and her prisoners and prizes reached Hong Kong on October 8. I. 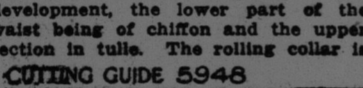

MONCTON'S DEATH ROLL

Mortality Record in Last Year Was Low—Garbage Collection System

Moncton, Nov. 17.—The annual report of C. E. Northrup, secretary-treasurer of the Moncton Board of Health, shows that Moncton has maintained an excellent record during the last year. There were 199 deaths. Of these six were accidental. There were no cases of small pox or measles. Twenty cases of diphtheria were reported, and only two deaths. There were seven cases of typhoid fever and one death. There were five cases of scarlet fever, but no deaths. There were sixteen deaths from pneumonia, and fourteen from tuberculosis. Of the total number of deaths twenty-nine were non-residents brought to the Moncton Hospital as the last hope. "This year's report," makes the total death rate chargeable to Moncton only 170, or a death rate of 12.02, an unprecedentedly low mortality.

Of the typhoid cases only one belonged to Moncton, resulting in death. Four cases from the suburbs proved fatal. The report calls attention to the longevity of those who have passed away. Thirty-seven per cent. were more than the three score mark. Many lived to be eighty-five and ninety, while one was ninety-seven. There were thirty deaths from old age.

Secretary Northrup says Moncton's record during the year has been the lowest he has ever known. During the year an up-to-date garbage collecting system was installed the first of its kind in the province.

MONCTON NOTES

Moncton, Nov. 17.—The Moncton-Lewis service on the Transcontinental Railway was not opened yesterday as expected but was deferred until Monday 23rd.

Several Women's Patriotic Leagues are being organized in districts near Moncton.

The German Soldiers in England's Big Prison Camp

(By Harry Payne Burton.) Fith Hill, England, Oct. 22.—"Wie geht's, Fritz?" I tossed the question to one of the 6,000 Germans roaming over the great compound England has built for her prisoners-of-war in a tight little valley tucked in amid the hills of Surrey. "How goes it yourself, kid! And when did you see the Woolworth tower last?" The German prisoner answered the question just that way, in just those English words, and his very lips smacked "New York" with each syllable. "Well," I said, "what are you doing here with a Jaeger cap on when you own a perfectly good American accent like that?" "Oh, just what a thousand more or so of us are doing—waiting for the war to finish so we can go back."

"Not on your tinky!" he returned. "To Germany?" I interrupted. "To the States! To our jobs. No more Europe for me. I get my naturalization papers the minute I hit New York this time. The statue of liberty is my motto from now on!"

"Fritz," was a good sample of most of these "prisoners" I found. They are all pretty happy and are more or less glad they are out of the battle line. They all tell you they didn't want war and they add, "neither did the Frenchies." The little they saw of the fighting in Belgium has made them realize that war is no longer a worthy engagement for mankind, no matter what the cause, they tell you. Such an attitude, coupled

6,000 "terrible Hunns!" The six day guards are stationed on high platforms. The six extra guards at night patrol the spaces between these platforms. Powerful electric lights illuminate the outer zone after dark. In the matter of food the prisoners have little to complain of. Each man is allowed a pound and a half of meat a day and bread in proportion. The perfect discipline of these German soldiers is never better shown than when the rations are being handed out. The men line up in orderly fashion and there is not the slightest pushing or jostling. "It's a marvel," said one of the guards to me. "It is easier to feed these 6,000 prisoners of war than it would be to look after fifty men in a deaf, dumb and blind asylum. Put some food in front of twenty of our English boys and there would be fighting at once."

"They know all the latest news. Many speak English. They even heard of the sinking of the three British cruisers before we of the guard did the civilian prisoners are allowed visitors and the former wig-wag the news to the soldiers. "Some of them have lots of money. With this they can buy tobacco and il-



Tobacco and Little Delicacies

delicacies in the way of food at the store in the compound. All those you see with the brass eagle still on their helmet or cap you can depend have money or they would have bartered the eagle for cigarettes long ago. Have these prisoners any chance to escape? They certainly have. They have at least forty army axes in their enclosures, and by throwing hundreds of blankets over the barbed wire and smashing down the posts supporting the fencing could get out and overcome the guards in ten minutes. For each sentry has only ten rounds of ammunition. But, as my British soldier friend pointed out: "Where would they go if they did get out?"

GERMAN RED CROSS LACKS ANAESTHETICS.

New York, Nov. 17.—A cable from London to The Tribune says: Besides the shortage of anaesthetics already reported, there is considerable lack of lead in Germany, according to Dr. E. K. Johnstone, of San Francisco, an officer in the United States Medical Reserve Corps, who has just returned from Belgium. Incidentally, Dr. Johnstone pays a slight tribute to the German Red Cross, which he was afforded opportunities of studying comprehensively. "There is no doubt that supplies of lead are running low in Germany, owing to the stoppage of the mines in Galicia and Silesia," said Doctor Johnstone. "A few days before I left Berlin a secret order was issued calling upon the music stores to turn over to the government all lead in pianos and other musical instruments in which that metal is used. This demand, which, of course, is being rigorously enforced, has aroused feelings of the deepest dejection in the music trade, which foresees an immediate ruin to itself."

"The shortage of anaesthetics is due chiefly, I think, to the German general staff's belief that it could readily replenish its supply from captured French and Belgian medical stores, and as Germany does not produce the basic ingredients of ether or chloroform the Red Cross is in bad shape in this respect."

ENCOURAGING HOMESTEAD FIGURES FOR OCTOBER

Saskatoon, Sask., Nov. 17.—The local land office reports that during October, 100 homesteads, ten pre-emptions and five purchased homesteads were disposed of in the Saskatoon district. This is considered to be most encouraging, and indicates the back to the land trend of the times.

St. John Rotary Club Are The Hosts BANQUET AT BOND'S

The St. John Rotary Club entertained the visiting members of the Halifax branch of the organization at a banquet in Bond's restaurant last evening. "The Spirit of Rotary," he said it was exceedingly difficult to define, and the international body was offering a prize for its definition. The idea was started nine years ago in Chicago, and was now spreading rapidly. They had now 20,000 members and the movement was spreading at the rate of fully four or five clubs a week. The Rotary Clubs were formed of business men and they did not exclude business talks, so that the clubs tended to become the confederation of all businesses in the cities where they were established. (Applause.)

W. Parker also spoke of the "princely way they had been treated at St. John." There had in the past been a good deal of ill feeling between Halifax and St. John, but that was now passing. There was work enough on the Atlantic seaboard for both. At Halifax they caught all the best men who passed through the city and got them to speak to them. They had divided the Halifax club into twenty sections with a "captain" for each, who was responsible for the section's activity. He then gave details of some of the means of developing the club. Civic and social services were among the things mentioned. He closed his "Rotary" look the meanness out of any man.

J. L. Rablton, who described politics as his "hobby," expressed pleasure at the visit to St. John. He said that one definition of Rotary was that of the "dirty days" bill which reminded one of what was due the other fellow. (Applause.) Sir Robert Borden was a member of the Halifax Rotary Club. Hon. J. D. Hazen also spoke to them. Premier Murray, of Nova Scotia, was to speak to them today.

H. H. Marshall gave a report of his trip to the Rotary International Convention at Houston, Texas, at which Canada had nine clubs represented.

Rev. A. B. Cohen, formerly of St. John, was always well received in St. John. In the past decade there had been a great change in the trade of both Halifax and St. John and the next decade would see it again. He, however, did not see why that petty spirit of through of the past should be continued. The ports could do better work for the dominion by working together. Touching on recruiting his worship said that there had been some apathy in the response of the province but he thought that when the full realization of the position broke upon the younger men they would respond with the old loyalty and patriotism.

In Canada they had lived so long in peace and security that they had forgotten that the empire was built on sacrifice. "But we cannot live on the victories of Nelson and of Wellington. They blazed a trail which we will have to keep clear and we as Canadians are going to keep it clear. (Applause.)

"The old spirit of the Briton which pervades Canada has not, I think, deteriorated and will be shown in the hour of trial. There will be an obliteration of old feuds and we shall work for the elevation of Canada to the high place we think she is entitled to in the empire." (Applause.)

H. M. Culver, U. S. Consul, and Senator Thorne also spoke appropriately of the aims and aspirations of the club and hoped that the visit of the Halifax delegation would be for their mutual benefit. Other speakers followed and a remarkably pleasant gathering of a unique kind for the rival ports came to a conclusion with the singing of the National Anthem.

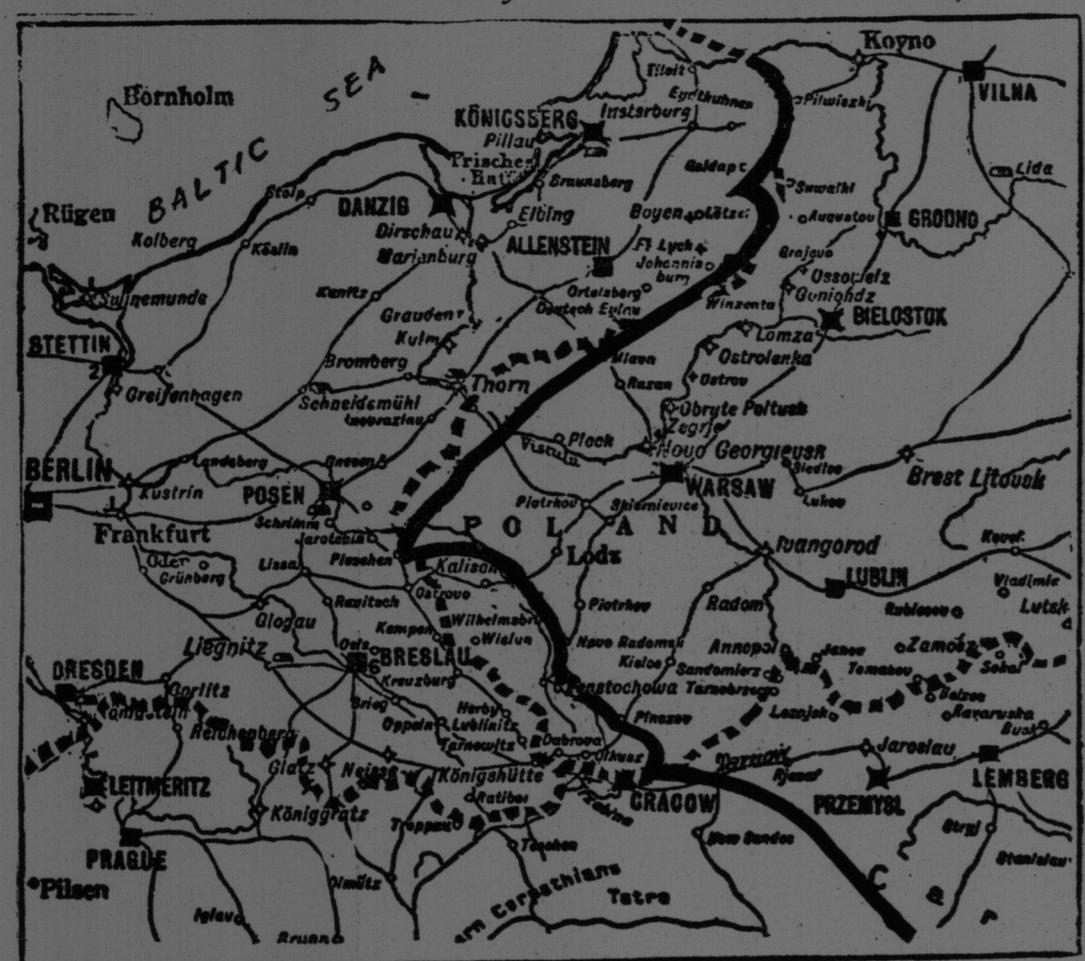

Russians Now Only 185 Miles From Berlin



Map shows the great Russian advance against the German empire. The solid black line is approximately the Russian front. The three points in that line are the centers of three drives aimed at Emperor William. The northern drive will first have to take Königsberg, the ancient Prussian capital, or isolate it. This army, under the famous General Rennenkampf, will then move forward towards Berlin. The central drive, which is now nearest Berlin, at Pleschen, has made the swiftest progress. Less than two weeks ago it was at Warsaw, but the Russians followed up their defeat of the Germans here by speedy pursuit and the bringing off all forces. The third drive, menacing Cracow, is now said to have completely severed communications between the Austrian armies and the German lines. More than a million Austrian soldiers are said to be seriously threatened by the southern line of Russians. The black, broken line is the boundary between Russia and Germany on the west and between Russia and Austria on the south.

Morning War Summary By Cable

London, Nov. 16.—The meeting of the House of Commons today was entirely devoted to war measures, and without partisan politics. Premier Asquith requested a vote of \$1,125,000,000 and another million soldiers, both of which the house granted without a dissenting voice.

The condition and morale of the soldiers; the inevitable spy system and the press censorship were discussed freely. The prime minister characterized the crisis as "the greatest emergency in which the country has ever been placed." He said there were already under arms 1,200,000 men; that the war was costing nearly \$5,000,000 per day, and that the government proposed to lend Belgium \$50,000,000 and Serbia \$4,000,000 without interest until the end of the war.

Timothy Healy, the Irish Nationalist, said that the money should be given to the war.

William Henry Cowan, Liberal, proposed that Great Britain follow Russia's example, and prohibit the sale of liquor during the war.

In his closing address, Premier Asquith placed the burden of the censorship on France and said it was necessary to defer to the wishes of the country which was doing the greatest part of the fighting, and where the fighting was being carried on.

Dealing with the matter of pay, the premier said: "The insufficiency of the pay of the lower ranks of commissioned officers has long been a reproach to this country, but has become an indecency and scandal when men are laying down their lives." He announced that Earl Kitchener, secretary for war, had prepared a scheme for increased pay.

He concluded by declaring that sickness among the troops had not exceeded ten per cent, possibly fifteen per cent, and that he believed no body of men had ever been brought together who had comported themselves better than the present army.

London, Nov. 16, 10:13 p. m.—Today has been one of the most unevenful in the history of the war, as far as great results are concerned. The coming of winter has paralyzed the movements of the troops, both in the east and the west.

The Russians on the border of East Prussia are reported to be marching through snow, which is their natural element, clad in sheep skin jackets, similar to those which the Japanese first wore in Manchuria. Blizzards have swept the trenches in Belgium and Northern France, and brought great suffering to the wounded, as well as to the men in the fields. A large area of West Flanders, around Dixmude, has been flooded by the heavy rains, and is no man's land for fighting.

An observer with the British army, who furnishes the newspaper accounts from the front, announces that the German attempts to batter a wedge through the British lines have greatly decreased in force during the past few days, and that they bear no semblance to the attacks in great force launched against Ypres at the end of October. They are, he adds, more in the nature of demonstrations in force, than serious assaults.

SAYS MAN SEEKING THE U. S. PRESIDENCY IS FOOL

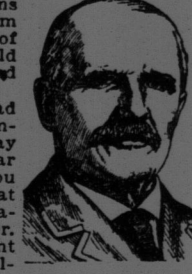

CANADIAN TROOPS NOT OUT FOR PICNIC Salisbury Plain Troopers Disgusted at Few Disgraced Members of Contingent

(Canadian Associated Press) London.—A communication subscribed to by several Canadian soldiers appearing in the morning papers complaining of the wrong impression that has been spread about by the "chick-hearts" of their members, that conditions at Salisbury Plain Camp are far from satisfactory.

"It is true," they say, "they are not such as we should adopt for pleasure in times of peace, but have we not adopted them in grim earnest at the time of imperial danger? For ourselves and all those with whom we have come in contact we most assuredly say that we are a great deal more comfortable and better off than most of the troops in England today."

"We have three or four good blankets apiece, straw mattresses, pillows and waterproof sheets. We have good great coats and an abundant supply of warm underclothing—sweaters, socks, helmets, and boots. Finally, we should like to say the Canadian troops arriving in England were given a reception that went to the hearts of us all, and returned in a manner that may well bring the blush of shame to all those who with whom we have come in contact here not to picnic, but to undergo whatever might be necessary to give up our comforts, if need be our lives, in the service of the empire."

MOTOR CAR CORPS FOR THE HOME GUARD Montreal Automobile Club Promises Use of Many Machines for Emergency Work

(Montreal Gazette) Montreal.—An automobile squad was the latest promise of aid to the home guard yesterday, with anywhere from 500 to 1,000 motor cars for the use of the troops in case of emergency. This offer was made to the home guard by Howard Fillov, chairman of the Automobile Club, who wrote offering the use of such motor cars as the club could get together in case their services should be needed. These automobiles would be required only if a rapid movement of troops was needed, in which case they would be invaluable. While the matter is as yet in its infancy, it is expected that the number of automobiles available will be registered, together with the names and addresses of the owners, so that in case of necessity the machines could be called out with little delay.

Will Be Organized as Home Defence Corps COUNCIL APPROVES Home Guards Will Use Same Ranges—Car Purchased For Com. Potts—Water Extensions Ordered

It was decided with one dissenting vote at yesterday's common council meeting to grant the commissioner of public safety \$2,000 to be used for such purposes in connection with the fire department in military defence as he shall deem advisable. The principle met with the approval of all the council except in a matter of detail when Com. Potts opposed it. His idea was that the expenditure should be put before the council.

Com. McLellan declared that there would be no military control at all in the proposal and said that it would be entirely voluntary. He did not think that a large body of the firemen would be drilled at the same time so that the public safeguard against fire would be interfered with. He hoped and counted it in his scheme that the members of the Home Guard scheme should be included in any arrangement and that details of the expenditure should be put before the council.

The matter of protecting the west side utilities was also mentioned and Commissioner Russell gave the assurance that things were being well looked after there by an extra guard. An extension of the sewerage line in Douglas avenue was authorized at a cost of \$8,000, rendered costly because of rock cutting and the commissioner for public works was authorized to purchase at a bargain price of \$25,000 that he has been using in the department for some time.

Commissioner Wigmore recommended that an extension of the water and sewerage mains be made to Portland place on property belonging to Armstrong & Bruce, providing that the property owners paid 10 per cent, and subject to their submitting the plans for the remainder of the lots to the approval of the Town Planning Commission.

The commissioner added that he understood the owners had no objection to so submitting the plans and the matter was passed.

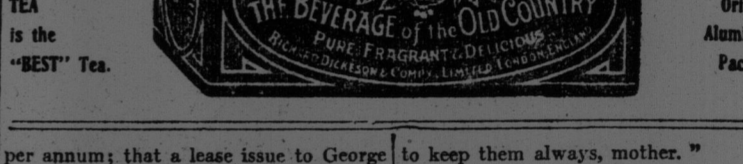
