

Edmonton, Alta., Sept. 24—Henry Howes of Busny Park, Bristol, Eng., who is organizing the Ladies' Co-operative Farming Society, Limited, of Canada, under the Industrial and Provident Societies Act of England, says in a letter to George M. Hall, industrial commissioner for the municipality of Edmonton, that he will establish a co-operative farming colony within fifty miles of this city. Girls and women from England, Ireland and Scotland will be located on the land and do the work of caring for milch cows, poultry and pet stock and produce gardens.

The plan was suggested to Mr. Howes during a recent tour of western Canada, when he visited a farm of eighty acres, managed by a half dozen young women from England and Scotland. One of the members, a college trained girl, had charge of the greenhouses. Another did the housework and one looked after the poultry and outside work. A Scotch girl opened a district store in the city and an English typist did all the clerical work. The sixth member of the colony attended to the cows, bees and rabbits. The scheme worked out satisfactorily until Dan Cupid made his appearance with his bow and quiver of arrows, carrying off four of the women, who became wives of farmers. The wedding took place within two weeks. The remaining two stayed a month, doing all the work, when they, too, fell victims. The farm was sold and the profits divided equally among the six women.
