New Turn to Evidence in Isaacs Case MAY RE-OPEN PROSECUTION

Prisoner on the Stand Nearly Three Hours—Prosecution Introduces Question About a Wife in Boston

R. D. Isaacs, accused of uttering forged documents, was on the stand nearly three hours this morning and was subjected to a long and severe cross-examination by Attorney Baxter, assistant counsel for the crown.

When the case re-opened in the court this morning Mr. Baxter, for the prosecution, reopened his cross-examination of the prisoner.

Mr. Baxter produced a certificate in which he had no recollection of the transaction. He would not swear that he did not do it.

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SAYS NO LABOR UNION MAN SHOULD JOIN THE MILITIA

Resolution Evokes Warm Speeches at Labor Congress—Bandmen Not Exempt; "War is Hell, But Strikes are Worse"

Montreal, Sept. 25.—That the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada should go on record as opposing the membership of any labor union joining the militia was the substance of a resolution introduced into the congress today by delegate W. Hoop of London, Ontario.

Debate on the subject was postponed after warm speeches by several of the delegates.

The resolution called upon the congress to go on record in view of recent events in British Columbia when the militia was used against labor men.

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STRIKES WERE SETTLED TODAY

Trouble in Great Britain is Ended

NEW ASSOCIATION Its Object to Consolidate Resources of Employers of Labor—"Employers Defence Union"

London, Sept. 25.—All the strikes in Great Britain were settled today when the directors of the Manchester Ship Canal agreed to consider the claims of their dock-laborers for better wages and the coal miners at Pontypridd, South Wales, returned to work which they left on Sept. 17, owing to the employment of a non-unionist.

The only trouble in the labor world of the United Kingdom for the moment is therefore the Transporters strike in Dublin and this is believed to be on a fair way to settlement.

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\$30,000,000 For Vancouver Harbor Scheme

Private Company Awards Contract for Immense Docks, Terminals and Industrial Sites

London, Sept. 25.—Messrs J. G. White, the eminent British harbor engineers, have secured the contract, involving some six millions sterling for the harbor extension scheme in Vancouver.

The provincial government recently granted shore rights to the Vancouver Harbor and Dock Extension Company.

It is intended to provide twenty-five miles of dockings at Lulu Island and Sea Island, for many miles for industrial sites and railway terminals.

The company agrees to give the government control over dock rates that are to be charged, and also undertakes to allow all railways and steamship lines equal privileges.

BOX EXPLODES UNDER HATCHET

Mrs. Laplante's Curiosity Gave Her a Fright

NOW SUSPECTS A PLOT

Railway Torpedo Left on the Doorstep by Some Youngster, the Police Think

Montreal, Sept. 25.—When Mrs. J. B. Laplante, of 215 Delnolle street, St. Henry, performing an operation upon a railway torpedo signal which she had found on her doorstep, with a hatchet, was badly frightened by the explosion which attended her efforts, she was so wrought up about the affair, not knowing the nature of the object which she had found, that she imagined herself the intended victim of some person who had placed a bomb upon her doorstep with the purpose of causing her bodily harm.

Aside from being badly frightened, Mrs. Laplante was uninjured by the explosion of the torpedo and on Saturday afternoon she went to the St. Henry police station, where she told her fears to Captain Masse. She stated that she had found the torpedo on Friday afternoon and that it had been wrapped in an advertising circular. Thinking that it was a sample of some household goods or other, she being busy at the time put it aside and thought no more of it until that morning when she had come across it and, upon unwrapping it from the circular, she found a small metal box which appeared to be held together by two metal bands, the clamps which hold the torpedo to the rail, which were attached to one side of the box. When upon straightening out the bands, she did not come open as she expected, the inherent curiosity which is accorded to be an attribute to her sex, prompted Mrs. Laplante to take the box to the woodshed and break it open with a hatchet to ascertain its contents, which action brought about the above-stated results.

Mrs. Laplante had brought the "bomb" to the station with her and as soon as the police had examined it they reassured her and explained to her the harmless nature of the supposed infernal machine.

It is the idea of the police at the St. Henry station that some small boy had in his rambles picked up the torpedo on the railway tracks, which passed through that part of the town where it might have been dropped by some trainman or have been jarred from the rails before being exploded by the wheels of that boy, trying of his toy, had left it wrapped in the circular on the doorstep and thought no more of it.

PLANS WERE DEEPLY LAID

Search of Vessel Revealed Complete and Accurate Chart of Every Inlet and Point on Coast

Ottawa, Sept. 25.—The development of the deep-sea fisheries on the Pacific coast has led the Hon. J. D. Hasee, minister of marine and fisheries, to take greater precautions in preserving them for Canadian fishermen and two new fisheries protective vessels will be placed on the British Columbia coast. The second vessel is being built on the lines of those used by the Irish Fisheries Board. The vessels now in use are out of date and until the completion of the two new boats the naval service department was obliged to hire boats. On the east coast reports at the department show that adequate protection is being afforded.

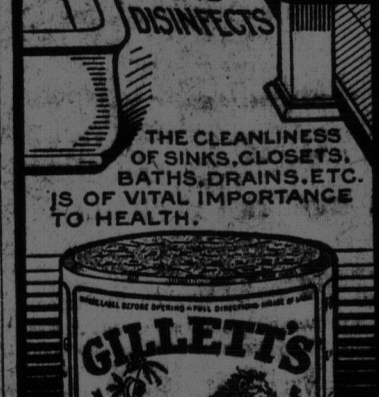

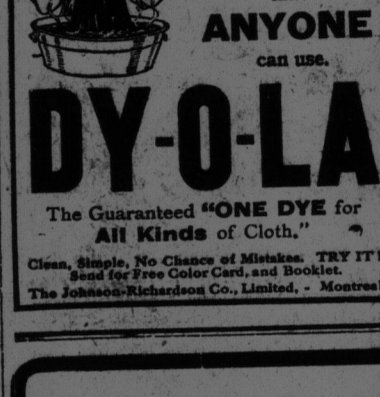

Take two pounds suet (chopped fine), four pounds grated bread crumbs, four pounds carrots, four pounds raisins, five pounds brown sugar, one and a half pounds of preserved peed (lemon, orange, or citron), six pounds apple, weighed after being chopped, two tablespoons cinnamon, two tablespoons cloves, one tablespoon mace, one tablespoon salt, two quarts boiled cider. The ingredients are thoroughly mixed, without cooking. Pack in jars, put in cool place and it will keep all winter.

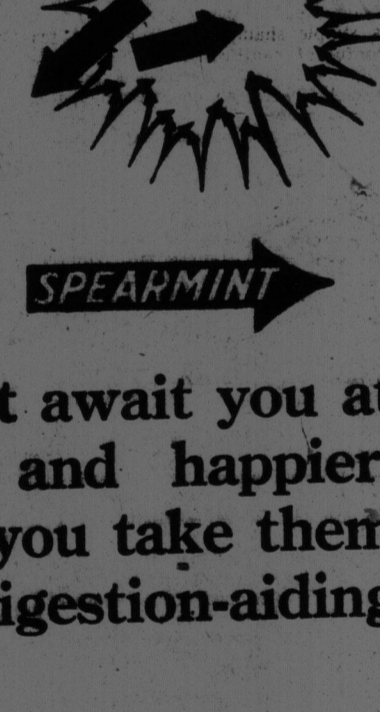

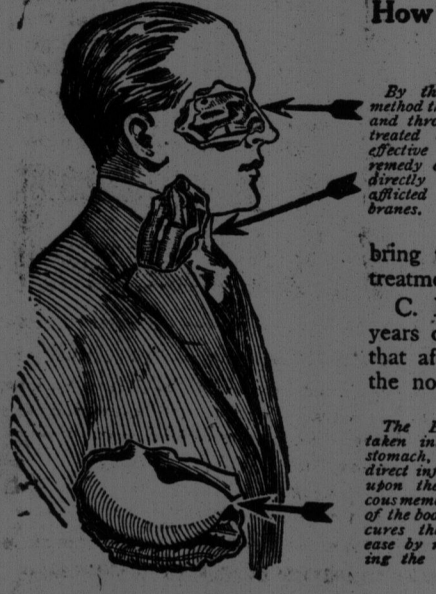

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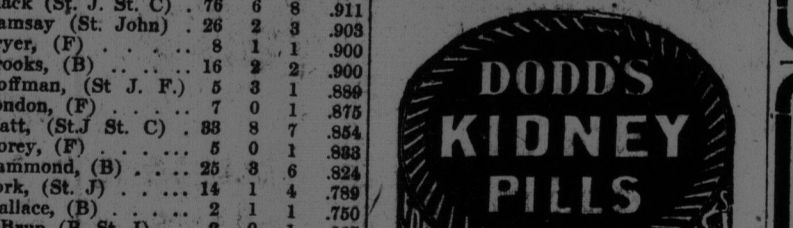
