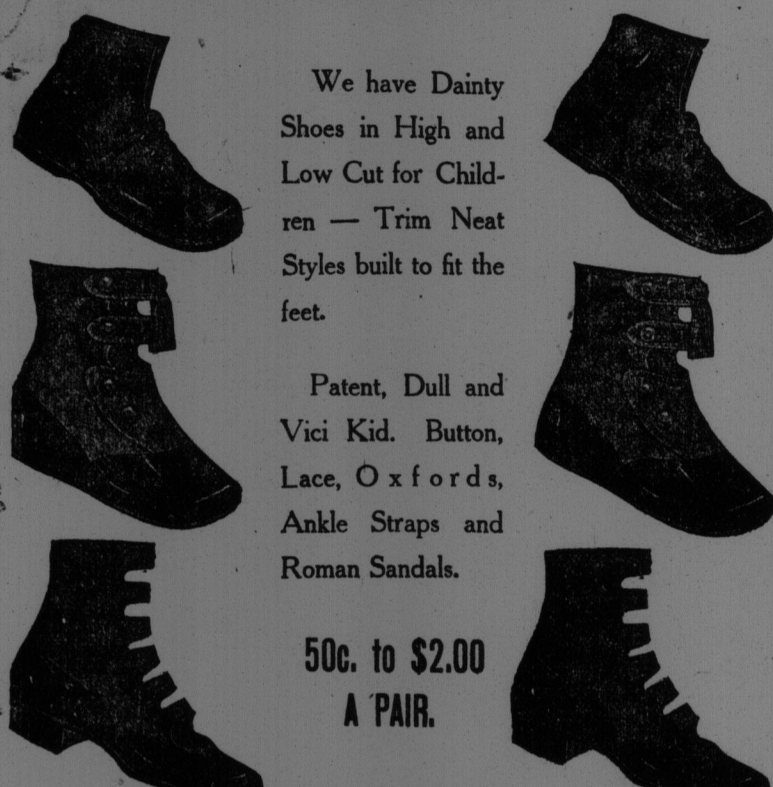

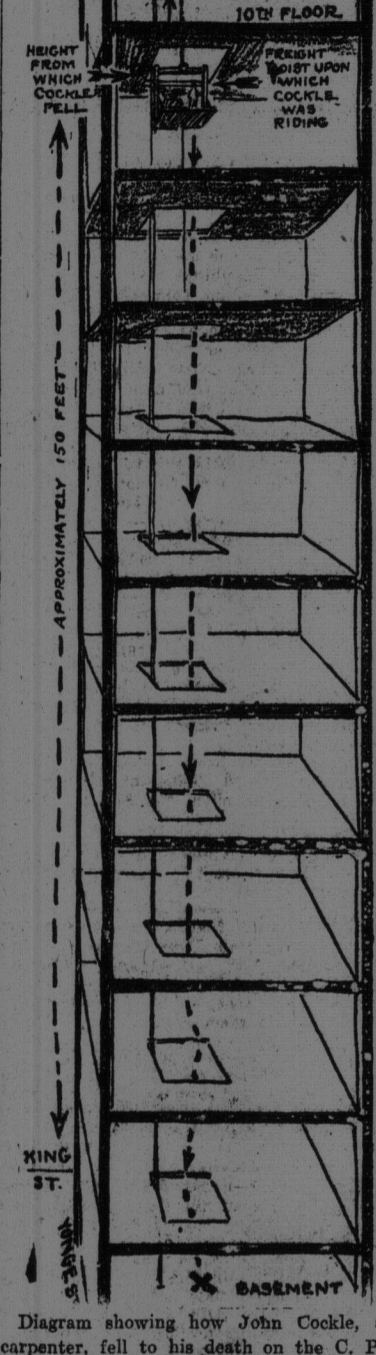


Diagram showing how John Cooke, a carpenter, fell to his death on the C. P. R. building in Toronto this week.

CLOSING HOURS OF THE WOMEN'S AUXILIARY ANNUAL MEETING

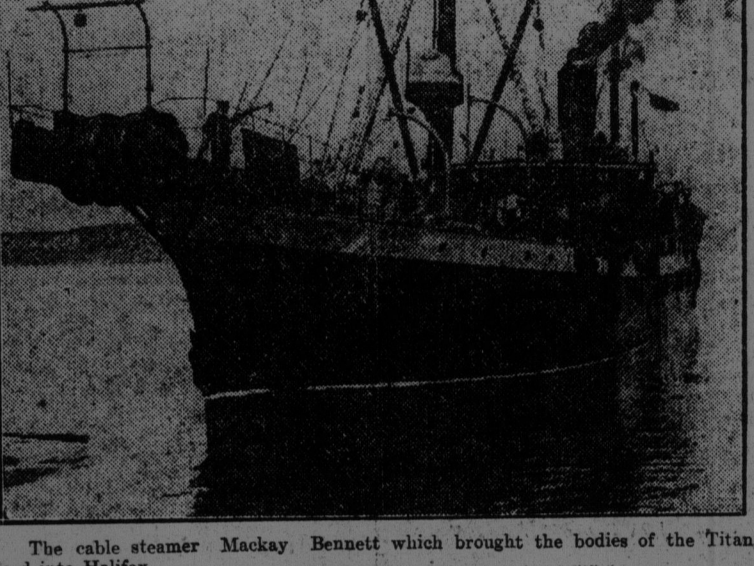

STRONG MEN AT HEAD OF THE CANADIAN HIGHWAY MOVEMENT

Actual Construction From Coast To Coast—Some Provinces Spending Large Sums on the Highways



New Westminster, B. C., May 2.—With the planting of the first post of the Canadian highway on the west coast of Vancouver Island tomorrow, the actual construction of this transcontinental road may be said to commence. Of course many hundreds of miles of this road are already constructed, but these had been built independently and now need linking up in this long chain, that will eventually make the highway the most famous in the world.

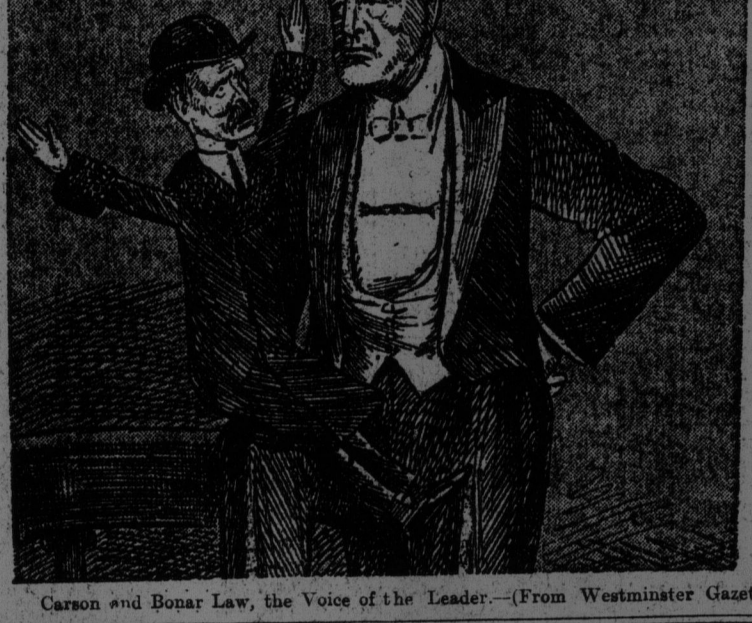

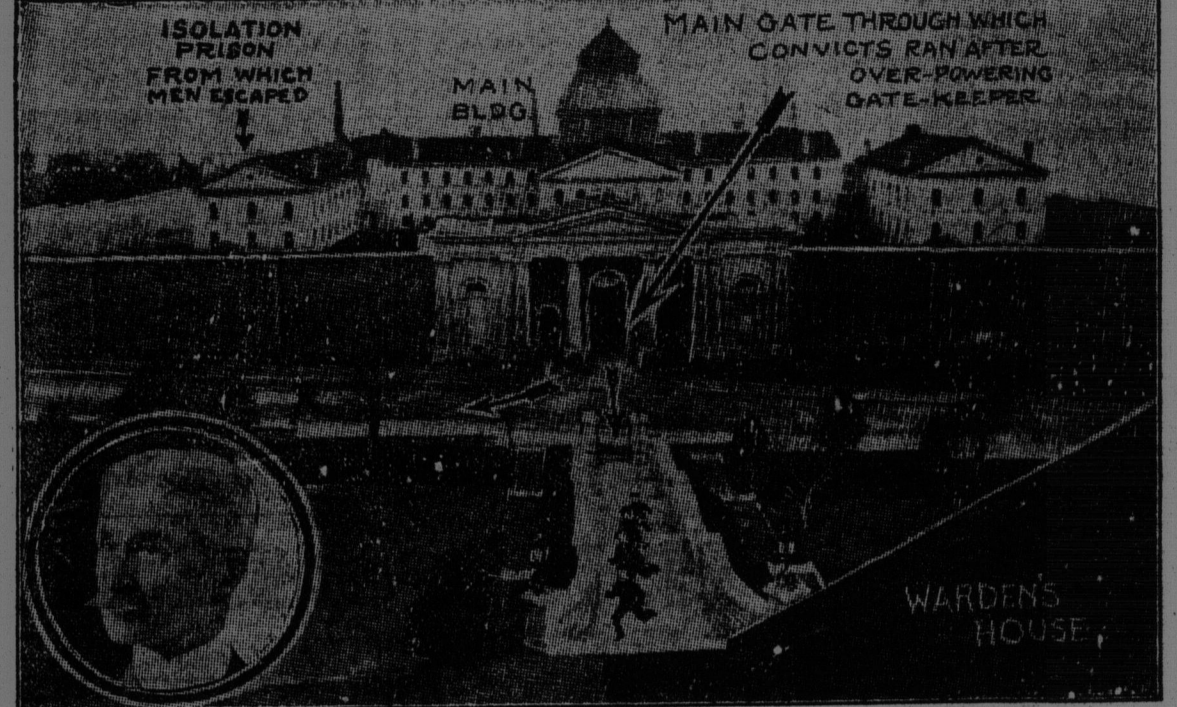

CRIMINALS' DESPERATE BREAK
FOR LIBERTY FROM PENITENTIARY



Portsmouth penitentiary in Kingston, Ontario, was this week the scene of the most daring attempt to escape, in the annals of Canadian penal institutions. The fight was started in the isolation ward, where Vincent McNeil a five year term man from Woodstock, Ont., knocked Guard Davis with an iron bar. He then let Harry Jones, Frank Kelly, Arthur Brown and John Williams, out of their cells in the same ward. These were the men sent from Stony Mountain penitentiary, Manitoba, to the Portsmouth institution for safe keeping.

Having got out of their cells the five prisoners encountered Doctor Phalen, the penitentiary physician and another guard. They took the clothes off both men and donned them themselves. When they approached the gate of the penitentiary, the guard there was deservingly thinking three prisoners were taken to the warden's residence by the doctor and a guard. When he had opened the gate for them he discovered his mistake, but was knocked on the head before he could give the alarm. They got outside before he was recognized after an exciting chase of two hours. Four of these men were prisoners who had made a desperate attempt to escape in Toronto on March 12.

In court this morning Detective Killen asked to have the case adjourned until then as he was to leave for Montreal tomorrow morning to take in custody former Purser Frederick Atherton, who is being brought out on the S. S. Lake Champlain to stand trial here on the charge of defrauding the C. P. R. and Dominion Express Companies. It is understood that Wilcox has engaged counsel.

Atherton is in charge of a Scotland Yard detective. The steamer is expected at Montreal tomorrow, and the detective expects to arrive home with his prisoner on Monday.

It was also decided by the members to have the funeral in a body. It will be held tomorrow afternoon from his late residence to St. Andrew's church.

TEN CENTS FOR A SHINE

Agreement Reached by the Men of the Shoe Polishing Business

This has been described as an age in which the cost of living was never greater, and higher prices are being asked for almost every marketable article than ever before. This reason is given by the shoeshiners for a decision to demand a dime for a polish instead of a nickel.

There are nine or ten shoe-shining establishments about the city, and the number seems to be increasing, for it is not so long ago that one man controlled the business with only one or two stores. They came to an agreement this week which has resulted in the placing of notices to the effect that in future all shiners will be ten cents. Formerly only one shoe-shine house asked this price, except on Saturdays, when some received ten. The proprietors say that the cost of brushes, blacking, and polish, together with the general cost of living expenses has so advanced that they cannot be satisfied with the lower scale. Some of them are today asking the dime for a shine, while in other places the agreement will not become effective until Monday of next week.

TWENTY HOURS RAIN AND SNOW IN SASKATCHEWAN

Advanced Farmers Are Benefited And Tardy Ones Kept Back

Winnipeg, May 3—One of the heaviest precipitations on record in the shape of snow, sleet and rain has visited most parts of the spring wheat country of the Canadian prairie west, doing immense good to those lucky or energetic farmers who have any considerable proportion of their seeding over, but tending to delay seeding for a great many more.

From Saskatoon south to Moosejaw, it has rained or snowed steadily for twenty hours.

PANAMA CANAL TO BE USED IN IMMIGRATION EXPERIMENT

Berlin, May 3—Several of the North Atlantic shipping lines are understood to contemplate making use of the Panama Canal for the purpose of exploiting the resources of the Pacific slope as a field for immigration. Two German companies are, in fact, credited with the intention of carrying steamer passengers from Europe to Californian ports at the same rate which they now charge to New York, plus only an amount to cover the cost of passing through the waterway.


