

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Elders' Districts.

The Congregation is divided into fourteen districts, Each district is assigned to one or more Elders. The Elders visit the families in their respective districts, note changes of residence, and acquaint the Minister and Session of cases requiring special attention, such as sickness, &c. For residence of Elders see preceding page.

DISTRICT No. I.-Mr. JAMES TASKER.

From Bleury street (not inclusive) to St. Lawrence street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to Mile End.

DISTRICT No. II.-Mr. C. D. PROCTOR.

From St. Lawrence street (not inclusive) East to Long Point and Longueuil and from the River north to city limits (including Petite Cote).

DISTRICT No. III.-Mr. ROBT. WEIR and Mr. ALEX. MCFEE. From Bleury street (not inclusive) to St. Lawrence street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River and St. Lambert.

DISTRICT No. IV.-Mr. T. A. GIBSON and Mr. JOHN TAYLOR From Union Avenue (not inclusive) to Bleury street and Park Avenue (inclusive), from

St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. V.-Mr. COLIN MCARTHUR. From Beaver Hall (not inclusive) to Bleury street (inclusive) and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River by St. Peter street.

DISTRICT No. VI.-Mr. JOHN L. MORRIS and Mr. P. S. Ross. From McGill College Avenue to Union Avenue (including both) and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

STRICT No. VII.-M. G. M. KINGHORN. From University and Hanover streets (inclusive) to Beaver Hall Square (inclusive),

and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River by McGill street.

DISTRICT No. VIII.-Mr. ALEX. MACPHERSON. From McGill College Avenue to Mountain street (not including either) and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT NO. IX.-Mr. JAMES A. CANTLIE. From Metcalfe street (not inclusive) to University and Hanover streets (not inclusive),

and from St. Catherine street to the River by Duke street (including both). DISTRICT No. X .- Mr. JAMES CROIL and Mr. ALEX. MITCHELL.

From Mountain street (inclusive) to St. Mark street (not inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. XI. -- Mr. WILLIAM REID.

From Mountain street (not inclusive) to end of Dorchester Avenue, and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to Dorchester street (inclusive).

DISTRICT No. XIII.-Mr. WILLIAM WALKER.

From Mountain street (inclusive) to Metcalfe and Cathedral streets (inclusive) and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River by Ann street.

DISTRICT No. XIV .- Mr. JOHN LARMONTH. From Mountain and McCord streets, not inclusive, to farthest West, and from Dorchester street, not inclusive, to the River and Lower Lachine Road.

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PUBLIC WORSHIP on the Lord's Day, at Eleven A.M. and Seven P.M.

WEEKLY SERVICE, Wednesday Evening at a quarter past Eight o'clock.

- THE SABBATH-SCHOOL meets every Sabbath at Three P.M.—except in the months of July and August, when the School is closed.
- THE MINISTER'S BIBLE CLASS for Young Men, meets every Sunday afternoon at Three o'clock.

YOUNG WOMEN'S CLASS, meets every Wednesday evening at half-past Seven o'clock.

- THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER is usually administered on the last Sundays of January, May and October.
- ORDINARY MEETINGS of the Kirk-Session are held on the first Sabbath of each month, immediately after the Morning Service.
- THE MISSIONARY AND BENEVOLENT SCHEMES of the Church are under the management of a Committee, consisting of the Minister, three members of the Kirk-Session, three members of the Board of Trustees, and thur members of the Congregation, appointed at the Annual Meeting.

- The fund for the support of a missionary in India, undertaken by the congregation three years ago, is now under the management of Mr. ALEX F. RIDDELL, to whom contributions for this purpose should be sent ; Address No. 22 St. John Street.
- THE ANNUAL MEETING of the Congregation for the transaction of business is held in the School-room of the Church, on the second Monday of January in each year.
- THE YOUNG MEN'S ASSOCIATION meets in the School-room every Sabbath Morning at a quarter past Tea o'clock, and on alternate Monday Evenings at Eight o'clock during the winter months.
- THE DORCAS SOCIETY and LADIES AID ASSOCIATION meet at half-past Two o'clock on Tuesday afternoons during the winter months.
- APPLICATIONS FOR SITTINGS may be made to Mr. ALEXANDER EWAN, the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, or to the Sexton, 77 Monique St., near the Church.
- MEMBERS changing their residence are requested to notify the Minister or the Elder of the District in which they reside.
- CASES OF SICKNESS should be made known to the Elder of the District and reported by him to the Minister with as little delay as possible.
- THE MINISTER is at home during the winter months every Thursday Evening when the young men of the Congregation are invited to come and see him.

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Missionary and Benebolent funds.

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The following are the chief purposes for which the General Assembly invites all the congregations to contribute annually :---

I. Home Missions. The support of religious ordinances to settlers in the new districts of the country, such as Muskoka, Algoma, Parry Sound, Manitoba, the North-West Territories, and British Columbia, as well as in the more remote and scattered districts of the older Provinces. The amount required for the whole Church for the current year is 60,000. In the Western Section of the Church, for which our contributions are asked, there are upwards of 200 mission fields and 714 preaching stations; and 7,900 families receive religious instruction. The amount contributed by these mission stations themselves last year was \$40,000.

II. Augmentation of Stipends. Upon the principle that the strong should help the weak, this fund was instituted a few years ago by the General Assembly, with a view to supplementing inadequate stipends in some of the smaller congregations, the desire of the Assembly being that none of the ministers should receive less than \$750 a year with a manse. To accomplish this the amount required for the current year, East and West, is \$36,000. The number of congregations in the western section requiring to be aided in this way is 136.

III. Foreign Missions. The Presbyterian Church in Canada has a staff of 29 ordained missionaries engaged in preaching the Gospel to the heathen, besides a number of other labourers, among whom are several Canadian ladies. The missions are—[1] To the Indians in the North-West; [2] The mission to Formosa, China, which has been so wonder ully prosperous through the instrumentality of Dr. G. L. Mackay and his associates; [3] The mission to Central India, in which there are now 5 ordained missionaries employed; [4] in the New Hebrides; [5] in Trinidad; [6] in Demerara. The amount required this year for all these missions is about \$86,000. The number of native communicants in the different fields is upwards of 3,500; the number of teachers and native helpers 250, making with the ministers and their wives, a total effective force of about 300 labourers in the mission work to the heathen.

IV. French Evangelization. The number of French Roman Catholics in the Dominion is estimated to be 1,300,000. The estimates for French Evangelization for the current year, including the enlargement of the school buildings at Pointe-aux-Trembles, is 50,000. The Board of French Evangelization expends 535,000 annually in its efforts to bring these our fellow-countrymen under the influence of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Some thirty schools, attended by nine hundred pupils, are under the care of the Board, and at present there are openings for several others in districts where the need is very great. The number of preaching-stations supplied by the missionaries is eighty-three. In many of these services are conducted in English as well as in French, and in not a few of them, the only Protestant service in the district is that given by the missionaries of the Board. There has recently been a decided improvement in the attendance and in the number of Roman Catholics present at several of the stations. Especially is this the case in Ottawa, in St. John's Church, Montreal, and in St. Gabriel de Brandon, where a series of week-evening services have just been held. At Ste. Anne, the missionary reports a morning attendance in French of 300, and an evening attendance in English of 150, with an average attendance of 170 at the Sabbath-school. The number of French students at the Presbyterian College, Montreal this session is 19, all having the ministry in view. This is the largest number there has ever been. Three of them graduate next spring, all of whom are able to conduct services both in French and English.

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V. The Colleges. At its last meeting, the General Assembly abolished the so-called Common College Fund, "leaving it optional with the congregations to distribute their liberality among the several Theological Colleges as they shall deem best." The need for continued financial aid still exists. The estimated requirements for the current year are as follows :-For Knox College, Toronto, \$6,700; for Queen's College, Kingston, \$4,000; for the Presbyterian College, Montreal, \$4,500.


VI. Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund. From this fund annuities are provided for the Widows and Orphans of Ministers who die in the service of the Church. Each minister contributes from \$8 to \$12 a year to the The annuities to widows vary from \$140 to 300 per annum.

VII. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund. The number of annuitants at present is seventy. The highest annuity paid is \$227.50. Liberal contributions are urgently needed to maintain even the present very inadequate scale of payments. Expenditure last year-East, \$2,543; West, \$13,545; Total, \$16,088.

The above are the principal Schemes of the General Assembly, to which all the congregations of the Church are expected to contribute annually. The mode of contributing for them in this congregation is by means of a schedule sent to all the members and adherents at the beginning of the year, in which they are requested to enter the amounts they desire to contribute for the different purposes named, and to transmit it to the Treasurer, Those who prefer to contribute anonymously are at liberty to do so. As this is the *only* way in which the contributions of St. Paul's congregation are asked for those purposes, it is earnestly hoped that none will decline, but that each will give according to his or her intelligent judgment.

N. B.-In addition, and quite distinct from these, it is to be remembered that this congregation is pledged for the support of Rev. George McKelvie, our missionary in Central India under the auspices of the General Assembly's Committee on Foreign Missions. The amount annually required for this purpose is about \$1,400.

Pastoral Letter.

TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF ST. PAUL'S CHURCH:

It is with a feeling of great thankfulness that I write the annual letter to preface the congregational reports. The past year has been a year of unbroken harmony and of uninterrupted prosperity in every department of the congregation's life and work; and I have good reason to believe that the outward prosperity has been accompanied by a corresponding growth in spiritual life in the hearts and homes of our people. The reports of the various agencies and organizations speak for themselves, and will be studied by you all with much interest.

It has been a sincere pleasure to me to work with all the officebearers, with the Superintendent of the Sunday School and with all who assist me in the different departments of my work—in all I have found the most ready willingness to help, and I take this opportunity of cordially thanking them all.

In my own pastoral experience during the year the outstanding feature has been the unusual amount of sickness and sorrow in the congregation. Especially during the later months of the year the visits of the "destroying angel" to our homes were very frequent. Sad in all cases, death was unusually sad in some, and our sympathy and sorrow were deeply stirred. I was brought very near to many of our people, and shared again and again, as perhaps I have never before done, the burden of another's sorrow. The experience, even to those most sorely tried, was not all darkness and sadness ; amidst the darkness light arose, and in the sadness there was hope-the sorrow was lightened alike by fond memories of the past and bright hopes of the future. Very distinctly has the voice come to each one of us "Be ye also ready"; and that that voice may be earnestly listened to is my sincere prayer-and that our sympathy with the sorrowing ones amongst us may be accompanied by devout resolves and earnest endeavours so to live during this year that we may be ever ready to die-consecrating each day's work and life to Him in whom alone is true life here and the sure hope of life hereafter. Let us connect all the events great and small of our life-its troubles and its joys-its deepest experiences and tenderest feelings, with the thought of God. Let us never be far from Him-let there be a

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far as i reached are all re matter f those wh golden thread running through our common daily life which connects us with Him, which we can grasp in every time of duty, difficulty, temptation or sorrow. If we have found God, nothing can separate us from Him except sin, and if we keep close to Him sin loses its power over us.

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For the year before us, Oh what rich supplies ! For the poor and needy Living streams shall rise; For the sad and sinful Shall His grace abound ; For the faint and feeble, Perfect strength be found, Onward, then, and fear not. Children of the day, For His word shall never, Never pass away.

Report of the Kirk-Session.

In reviewing the work of another year the Kirk-Session feel that they have much cause for thankfulness to God for the continuance of His goodness.

The progress in all the different departments of the work of the Church has been greatly blessed in awakening and in deepening spiritual life and interest in the Master's cause. The Sabbath services have been largely and regularly attended both morning and evening. The attendance, however, at the Wednesday evening prayer meeting has not been as encouraging as it might be—very often disheartening to our pastor as well as to those who do attend and it is earnestly hoped that a larger number of the congregation will avail themselves of the privilege of these helpful services.

From the report of the Board of Trustees it will be seen that so far as its material interests are concerned, the congregation has reached a point of prosperity unequalled in its past history—the pews are all rented, and the subject of increased accommodation will be a matter for the Trustees to consider in order to provide pews for those who are desirous of worshipping with us.

The ordinary Sunday collections show a considerable increase over those of last year. It would be still more gratifying and encouraging to find the Envelope system for our Sunday collections more generally adopted in the congregation.

The amount contributed for the Missionary and Benevolent Schemes of the Church is the largest that has yet been given by St. Paul's Church, but the number of contributors is disappointing, and the Kirk-Session would feel greatly encouraged if all could see their way this year to become sharers to some extent in this good work.

INDIA MISSION .- Mr. A. F. Riddell, who has charge of this fund reports that there is a deficiency of about \$250 of the sum required for the support of our missionary, Mr. McKelvie, for the current half-year. The Kirk-Session earnestly hope that this good work will continue to have the hearty support of the congregation generally and that the amount required will be at once subscribed.

The congregation will be pleased to know that the Trustees have decided to proceed at once with the building of the manse on the vacant lot on the east side of the church-the architecture and style will correspond with that of the church.

The finishing and decorating of the interior of the church, it is also understood, will be undertaken during the coming summer, as well as important improvements to the organ.

The various organizations of the Church are again in active operation and full information regarding them will be found in the several reports.

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In closing this report the members of the Kirk-Session desire to avail themselves of the opportunity to express their high appreciation of the Rev. Mr. Barclay's earnest faithful work, and of the cordiality and confidence which exist between him and his Session, and they believe that this feeling of respect and regard is shared in not only

by all the office-bearers of the Church, but also by every member and adherent in the congregation. Our united earnest prayer is that he may be long spared in health and strength to go in and out amongst us.

The Annual Meeting.

Minutes of Annual Meeting of St. Paul's Church, held within the School-room of the Church, on Monday the 14th January, 1889, at 8 o'clock p.m.

Mr. Alex. Mitchell was called to the chair and Mr. E. B. Greenshields requested to act as secretary.

The meeting was opened with prayer.

The minutes of last annual meeting held on the 9th January, 1888, were read and confirmed. Before the business of the meeting began, the Rev. Mr. Barclay made a few remarks, referring to the India Mission and the general state of the Church. He found an increase in every department of church life, both as shewn by the finances and other statistics, and he expressed his thanks to all the members with whom he worked, and his satisfaction at the progress made during the year.

The report of the Trustees and Treasurer's financial statement having been placed in the pews of the church on the previous Sunday, were received as read.

The chairman moved, seconded by Mr. J. A. Cantlie :---

That the report of the Trustees be approved and adopted, and that it with the Treasurer's statement and the minutes of the meeting be printed for circulation among the members of the congregation.—Carried.

Mr. John McDonald read the report of the Committee on the Missionary and Benevolent Schemes of the Church. After doing so, he stated his desire to resign from the secretary-treasurership of this committee, and said that Mr. R. S. Kinghorn had agreed to take the position for next year.

That the thanks of the congregation be tendered to the Trustees for their able and satisfactory management of the financial affairs of the church during the past year.

The chairman next announced to the meeting that the two Trustees retiring by rotation this year were Mr. Alex. Mitchell and Mr. John C. Watson, and that both were eligible for re-election.

Mr. J. Tasker moved, seconded by Mr. Robt. McFarlane :---

That Messrs. Alex. Mitchell and John C. Watson be re-elected Trustees for the usual term. -Carried.

The following resolutions were thereafter put to the meeting, and carried :---

Moved by Mr. G. M. Kinghorn, seconded by Mr. W. W. Mowat : That Messrs. John Fair and P. S. Ross be thanked for their services as auditors for the past year, and that they be requested to continue in the office for the present year.

Moved by Mr. Alex. McFee, seconded by Mr. F. E. Jodery :---That the thanks of the congregation are due and are hereby tendered to the Organist for the attentive and able manner in which he has conducted the musical services of the church, and to the members of the Choir for their valuable assistance.

Mr. J. Tasker then referred to the conclusion of the report of the Trustees asking for an expression of opinion on the part of the congregation in regard to building the manse. He thought the manse should be built, and while it might be desirable to have more ground to build on, if this could not be arranged, he thought the manse should be built on the lot next the Church.

He moved, seconded by Mr. C. McArthur :---

That this meeting recommends that the Trustees should proceed to build a manse on the vacant lot next the church.—Carried.

Mr. W. W. Mowat expressed the satisfaction of all present at the able conduct of Mr. Alex. Mitchell as chairman of the meeting, and moved, seconded by Mr. John McDonald, a vote of thanks which was cordially carried.

Mr. Mitchell in acknowledging the resolution, expressed the pleasure he had in being able to attend the annual meeting, and to see the very satisfactory nature of the various reports.

There being no further business, the meeting was closed with prayer. A. MITCHELL, Chairman.

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Report of the Trusiees

1888.

The Trustees of St. Paul's Church in presenting their Annual Statement have again the pleasure of congratulating the congregation on the satisfactory state of the finances.

They also avail themselves of this opportunity to express their cordial appreciation of the Rev. Mr. BARCLAY's untiring exertions, attended with most successful results, to promote in every way the interests of the Church.

The Sunday services have been largely attended, and all the pews are rented.

From the Treasurer's statement, now submitted, it will 'be seen that the receipts from pew rents have been \$7800.56 against \$7698.60 last year, a gain of \$101.96. As the pew rents are payable in advance, the members of the congregation are requested to send the amount due to the Treasurer, as early in January as possible.

The ordinary plate collections for the year were \$4388.14 against \$4140.45 last year, a gain of \$247.69.

It is gratifying that the large increase mentioned in last year's report, resulting from the adoption of the envelope system, has not only been maintained but increased. The Trustees thank the members of the congregation for the hearty support they have given to this scheme for increasing the collections, and they hope that former subscribers will continue their subscriptions, and that those members who have not seen their way hitherto to join, will do so now. As will be seen, it only requires a small amount to make the revenue sufficient for the demands upon it. The Trustees are confident that the sum can be secured, if all the congregation will co-operate earnestly in supporting this scheme.

The Treasurer has drawn from the Guarantee Fund \$1952.77. Deducting the amount carried over this year in excess of that carried over last year, \$760.25, and the cost of the new chairs for the basement, \$296.87, together \$1057.12, leaves the sum of \$895.65 as the amount that has been required this year to be added to the ordinary revenue to meet the ordinary expenditure. There has also been spent a sum of \$249.00 on permanent improvements and repairs to

the furnaces and plumbing work. This is included in the ordinary expenditure, as provision must be made each year for extras of this nature.

In the month of June, the Kirk-Session and the Board of Trustees sent out a circular to the Congregation, stating that an anonymous subscription of 5,000 had been received from a member of the Church towards the cost of building a manse, provided the amount of 12,000 in all was collected. Attention was also drawn to the advisability of completing the decoration of the interior of the Church, of paying off the mortgage on the caretaker's house, and of making repairs to the organ.

The amount required for the manse has been subscribed, and several subscriptions have also been received towards decorating the interior of the Church, and it is hoped that enough will be collected to secure this being done during the summer.

Nothing definite has been done yet as to putting either of these schemes into work, except soliciting subscriptions. The Trustees will be pleased to hear the views of members of the congregation about them at the annual meeting.

The Trustees who retire by rotation this year are Messrs. ALEX. MITCHELL and JOHN C. WATSON, both of whom are eligible for reelection.

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Mission to Central India.

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This is the only branch of the congregation's work which has to report a financial deficiency, and there is reason to hope that the deficiency is more apparent than real. There are yet a few months during which the requisite sum, amounting to about two hundred and fifty dollars, may be received. An earnest appeal is now made to former subscribers, who have not done so as yet this year, to renew their contributions, and to others, who have not hitherto contributed, to join in the good work. The example set by this congregation of sending a missionary of their own to the Foreign Mission field has been followed by several other congregations, and any shortcoming on our part would be disastrous. Such a result, I feel quite sure, the congregation will never allow. In a few weeks I fully hope to see all the money required in the treasurer's hands. In the interval between Mr. Murray's death and Mr. McKelvie's appointment, the Foreign Mission Committee made full provision for the work being done and the balance of money accruing during the four months we had no missionary was handed over to the Foreign Mission Committee for Mr. McKelvie's outfit.

I expect very soon to have a letter from Mr. McKelvie giving an account of the field and of the work, which I will gladly communicate to the congregation : meanwhile it is gratifying to know that our new missionary has won golden opinions from all in the field, who hail him as a great acquisition to their ranks.

Acknowledgments are due to Mr. Robinson for his kindness in training the scholars for this service.

During the year, quarterly services for the scholars have been held by Mr. Barclay.

The number upon the roll of Mr. Barclay's Bible-class is 38.

The number of scholars upon the roll is-male, 131; female, 124; total, 255, showing an increase of nine.

We are pleased to state that the past year has been quite equal to any former year, both in point of attendance and interest taken in the work of the school by teachers and scholars.

The average attendance was very high, viz: 181 for the year.

811 " " " 106 " " " 224 " Scholars The missionary contributions for the year amount to \$138.26, an excess over last year of \$15.88.

The envelope system in taking the collections has tended to largely increase them, and has many advantages over the old fash- . ioned "tin boxes," mainly in saving the teacher's time and patience during the lesson hour.

Teacher's meetings for the study of the lesson, are held every Wednesday evening, this evening being found the most convenient for the majority of the teachers. They are well sustained.

The Sunday evening services are still continued, and are under the charge of Mr. McIlwraith, student in the Presbyterian College. They are self-supporting.

To shew the interest taken by even the youngest in the school, we may here mention that six little girls decided to do something

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towards the debt fund, and for that purpose held a Children's Bazaar in October last, at which they realized the sum of \$60.01. This amount has been placed to the credit of the Mortgage Fund, as will be seen by the Treasurer's statement.

We regret to announce during the past year the death of our late assistant-secretary, Mr. John Chauvin. Mr. Chauvin had been connected with the school from his earliest years, taking the deepest interest in all that pertained to its progress and welfare, and in every way proving himself a dutiful son to his parents, and a true disciple of our Lord and Master.

The teachers and office-bearers of the school, desire to place on record the kindly visits of members of the Kirk-Session from time to time, which have been much appreciated, and have greatly tended to strengthen their hearts in the good work, which in the providence of God they are called on to perform from Sabbath to Sabbath.

We have again entered upon a New Year of our work, and it is our sincere prayer that each day of that year may be marked by a more loving devotion to God's service. May we be ever ready with our sympathy and to extend a loving helping hand to alleviate the sufferings of others, and by our devotion to practical Christianity show that we are living, loving workers in the Master's vineyard.

One feature of the past year has been the increased interest that has been taken in the Society; many new and active workers, having added their names to our membership, rendered most valuable assistance, thereby strengthening and encouraging the hands of our faithful president upon whom so many arduous duties must necessarily devolve. We trust that this interest begun may continue and increase, and by our united action we may accomplish much in the cause of humanity and Christian charity during the year that has just opened.

In the beginning of the year the Society was engaged in the work of the Industrial Rooms. The meetings were re-opened earlier in the autumn to prepare work for the Hervey Institute Bazaar, afterwards the time was devoted to making clothing for St. Margaret's Nursery.

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he work er in the erwards Nursery. The goods sent to the Industrial Rooms Bazaar were valued at \$181.00, and to the Hervey Bazaar at \$185.00. Donations of money were sent to the Women's Presbyterian Missionary Society towards the support of their nurse, and to the Diet Dispensary, Sheltering Home, and Home for Friendless Women, also a donation of cotton to the East End French Mission School. The Society also assisted in providing tea for the French pupils at the anniversary meeting. There were distributed among the poor, 89 yards of dress goods, 30 yards of flannel, 17 yards of cotton, 10 parcels of tweed samples, 8 pairs of boots, and some made-up garments.

We would acknowledge with thanks several parcels of clothing which were sent for our distribution, also a useful donation of sewing and crochet cotton from Mr. J. Hunter.

It is with deep regret we have to record the sad and sudden death of Miss Sanderson, who was for many years an active member of the Society. A wreath was sent at the time of her death in the name of the ladies as a slight token of their sorrow.

Before closing our report we desire to return thanks to those ladies who have kindly undertaken the duty of collecting, and to all who in any way have assisted us in furthering the interests of these most deserving charities.
