This Conference having listened to a memorial from the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance, C. W., it was

resolved:

XXVII. That we regard the use (or rather abuse) of alcoholic liquors as the most gigantic evil of the daywhose ravages are to be found in the shattered intellect and diseased body of the individual-in the squalor and wretchedness of the domestic circle-in our prisons and penitentiaries, -and, sweeping beyond the cottage of the poor and the prison of the convict, has invaded the mansions of the rich, our colleges and universities, our halls of legislature, and regarded not the sanctity of our pulpits, but has blasted and ruined some of the brightest intellects that have graced our pulpits, our platforms, and our Legislative Halls; -and, considering this evil to be a legitimate subject for civil legislation, we would urge upon all our Ministers and Churches the solemn duty of seeking to arrest this evil, not only by precept and example, but also in every constitutional way to seek its extermination by legal prohibition.

XXVIII. That this Conference accept with pleasure the Connexional Chart forwarded by the Rev. S. B. Gundy, as a present from the Rev. T. Rump to this Conference—and on returning thanks to Bro. Rump for the same, would pray that he may be long spared among us, and that his declining

years may be peaceful and happy.

MISSION FUND.

XLIV. The income of the Mission Fund having again fallen off, and there being another deficiency in the payment of grants, it is indispensibly necessary to prevent a recurrence of this painful result; therefore, it is resolved:-

1. That the grants of the present year shall not exceed the sum of £1350,

2. That, as the Conference believes that more money may and ought to be collected for this fund, it is resolved to establish Juvenile Missionary Auxilliary Societies on all our Circuits, having their own meetings and collectors; and that the efforts of these societies be made in each year not later than the month of September; cards and books to be provided and sent to the Circuits.

3. That the Stationing Committee shall still further extend the plan initiated last Conference of giving no grants to some Circuits, and of diminishing grants to others, that our Mission Funds may thus be applied to their legitimate objects, by assisting mission stations only, and extending the work into the more necessitous parts of the country.

4. That the Superintendent of Missions, in meeting the Christmas payments, shall pay cash so far as the funds allow, the balance of claims for the first half year to be made up by notes on himself, maturing at the following Confer-

5. That the financial officers apply the Mission Funds in hand at the present Conference as follows:-They shall pay eighty cents on the dollar for the present year, and the last year's deficiency in the following manner-first, by charging to the deficiency account all unpaid subscriptions to the "press;" secondly, all unpaid subscriptions to the Beneficent Society, and the balance in a note of hand on our General Superintendent, redeemable at the next Conference, with interest at 7 per cent.*

CHAPEL FUND.

XLV. That the income of this fund being so entirely inadequate to meet the claims made upon it, and being also

This last clause it is found impossible at present to carry out. The state of the fund will not bear this charge of interest, and he question is reserved for the re-consideration of the next conference. It is also deemed advisable to make the notes syable at a bank, that they may be more easily negotiated.

so deeply involved in debt, no further grants be made except those already sanctioned, until the fund is better supported,

and its embarrassments liquidated.

2. That a grant of \$50 towards the purchase of a chapel in Erin village, and a grant of \$40 towards the erection of a chapel in Colchester, be sanctioned by the present Conference.

That the only possible plan of meeting the present claims on the Chapel Fund is, that the funds of the Beneficent Society be allowed to accumulate, and placed at the disposal of the Chapel Fund, on such security as that fund will be able to give, and that, by a system of retrenchment and increased income, the Chapel Fund redeem itself from its present embarrassments.

5. That the grant to St. Thomas parsonage be cancelled.

6. That the grant to Carrick chapel be transferred to Walkerton.

7. That the grant to Ainley chapel be cancelled.

8. That the grant to Lewis chapel, Walkerton Circuit, be cancelled.

9. That the grant to Aylmer chapel be suspended.

10. That the Mission Fund pay annually to the Chapel Fund the sum of £30, till the present liabilities are dis-

charged.

11. That this Conference returns thanks to Bro. McClure and the Montreal friends for the service they have rendered us in securing a model deed for our chapel and parsonage property in Eastern Canada, and accords to them the sum of £2 10s. to assist them in defraying their expenses in the matter.

12. TO THE

MEMBERS OF THE CANADIAN WESLEYAN METHODIST NEW CONNEXION CHURCH.

After great revivals, it is not an uncommon thing that there be a relapse. This, however, is not necessary, and may be avoided, if ministers and members be faithful to their duty. The great danger is of persons concluding that so much has been done during special services that they may safely take their ease for a while—and hence they often neglect the ordinary, mean, and give an opportunity to the enemy to sow his tares, and in a little time the Church is as cold and as dead as it was before the work began. time is spent in this world.

We never met with any person who faithfully attended those blessed means but gave evidence of their being the most pious and useful members of the Church, and who, according to their abilities, support all its institutions better than others. It is not, however, an address like this, but a life of experience that will adequately acquaint you with the benefit of Class Meetings; therefore the best refutation we can give to those objections sometimes raised against them is, the experience of all those who have tried those means, and who have declared a thousand times that they are the most precious means of Grace they ever enjoyed. Hence, let nothing but absolute unavoidable necessity prevent you from attending Class Meetings; as those who are most punctual in their attendance are persons who make rapid progress in the divine life, both in
