The Advance.

The absence of their position by the Council is the subject of a timely recommendation by the County Accounts Committee at the late session of the Municipal Council. Like the retention in their hands of the appointment of Alms House Commissioners, however, the multiplying of coroners by the Government at Fredericton, is a dispensation of patronage, which costs them nothing. If the coroners were as conscientious in the discharge of their functions as the Alms House Commissioners, however, there would be no great ground for complaint, save on account of the principle violated by rendering them independent of those for whom they perform a purely local service supported entirely by local taxpayers. In many cases, coroners hold positions which the cause of death are known to everybody to be purely accidental, and when no legitimate purpose whatever is served by the enquiry—the coroners' simply prostituting their office to the selfish purpose of pocketing the fees which an absurd custom permits them to exact from their fellow citizens. As there are so many coroners of this class they should be compelled to a more honest and discriminating exercise of their official functions by Act of Parliament.

How they Value Reporters' Services.

We observe, among the reported proceedings of the Municipal Council the following:— "Moved and seconded that the reporters of the press receive \$1 per day for their services—carried." We have only to say that we hope no representative of the press present at far forgot his position as to accept the gratuity offered. Since the Municipal Council of the County has been in existence the ADVANCE has given very full and faithful reports including the publication of full lists of the Parish and County officers appointed, and for several years it has, in addition, furnished the Council with a large number of copies of Calendars with the lists of officers in their several parishes—all at the expense of the ADVANCE. It is not only the enterprise and the labor and valuable newspaper space they have given to their Council reports. This year the editor of the ADVANCE could not go personally to Newcastle, as usual, and engaged a reporter of the best reputation available, paying him as much per day as this contemptible gratuity of the Council would amount to for the whole session. Our Reporter has not acquainted us with the action he took in respect of the \$1 a day voted him, but it shall not be received in any form on account of the ADVANCE. If the Council desires to have its proceedings officially reported, let it employ its own reporter or reporters and pay them such fees as that kind of service is worth and, further, if they desire official reports, let them pay for their publication as they ought to do. But when papers that have always treated them fairly send well paid reporters to record their proceedings, let them not attempt to insult them by the offer of such gratuities as that embodied in the resolution referred to. We desire to respect the Municipal Council of Northumberland, but its "dollar a day" business gives us a rather cheap measure of its deservings.

The Alms House Matter.

The Municipal Council appears to have placed itself in a false position in the present matter, as, by vote of 13 to 10 it resolved that it know more than the Commissioners about how and how much salaries for the keeping of that institution should be paid. The Council has really nothing to do with the matter, as the local Government refuses to recognize the principle that those who pay for a public service should control it. Moreover, if the Commissioners should entertain and act upon the Report of the Council, they will thereby admit that they have heretofore failed in their duty and under-paid the keeper. In this respect, however, local public opinion is not with the majority of the Council. If Miss Harrington is underpaid or not paid at all, the matter is compensated for by the keeper being well paid and overpaid for all the services he performs. If he were a good manager as some of his friends give him credit for, he would utilize the labor of some of the inmates as capable and, thereby, render it unnecessary for a salaried assistant keeper to be employed. It is easier to pay for salaried officials upon the public than to shake them off when they are unnecessary; and, in the public interest, we hope the Commissioners will scan the Council's resolution (although it appeared ashamed of it, subsequently) more critically than all those who voted for it appear to have done. By all means let a keeper and matron be employed, but \$360 a year and board, and et cetera for a family, is not a bad return for both. Miss Harrington might be given \$60 a year as matron's assistant keeper, while \$300 ought to be considered fair or even liberal remuneration for the keeper.

OUR NEXT GOVERNOR GENERAL.

The Toronto News of 23rd ult. says:— "We have good authority for stating that the British Government has decided to appoint Lord Garnet Wolseley, Governor-General of Canada for next term."

Farley, of Ludlow, beg to report as follows, viz.—We find that she has been over-assessed on personal property to the amount of \$4,000, making her taxes \$13.00 too high, and recommend that the collector for the Parish of Ludlow be ordered to pay over that amount to her out of rates collected in that Parish for the present year. Signed, SAM'L FERRIS, Committee. ASH. R. FORD."

On motion the report was received and adopted.

ALMSHOUSE.

Coun. Saunders read report of Committee appointed to visit Alms House and report thereon to which the Committee stated that they had found everything in that institution clean and in good condition and recommended that this Council ask the Alms House Commissioners to grant Miss Ann Harrington the sum of \$60 per annum as assistant keeper, as they did not consider the keeper was sufficiently remunerated for the amount of work he had to perform. They also recommended the building of a fire escape up the side of the building of the Alms House. On motion the report was received and adopted. Coun. Adams said he was surprised at such a report. Any recommendation from this Council in regard to the Alms House had always been treated with scorn by the Alms House Commissioners and the Local Government. We should not make any recommendations to increase the salaries as the parties who had charge of the institution were capable of deciding whether it was necessary or not and if they considered it was, would not do so accordingly.

Coun. Loggie spoke for some time, defending the report and strongly urged upon the Council the recommendation to give Miss Harrington a salary of \$60 per annum.

Coun. Sullivan said that the keeper and his wife and daughter did not do so much work as some people would like to make us believe. They had a good deal of assistance from the inmates, and the Alms House Commissioners were the parties to decide whether Miss Harrington was entitled to a salary or not.

Coun. Saunders said the recommendation came in the first instance from the Council from Chatham, where the Alms House was situated, and they should know more than the others as to what work was done. He thought Miss Harrington was a very good woman, and recommended that the Council should give her the salary of \$60 per annum.

Coun. Adams moved, seconded by Coun. Stewart, that all works in the report concerning keepers' salaries be struck out and that it be referred back to the Committee for consideration.

Coun. Loggie thought that Coun. Adams was only taking advantage of the opportunity to air his oratorical abilities.

Coun. Stewart felt it to be his duty to oppose any move towards increasing expenditure.

Moved, as an amendment, by Coun. Morrisey, seconded by Coun. Jardine that the report be received and adopted.

After lively discussion in which Coun. Cameron, Ryan, Morrisey, Baidwin, Adams, Loggie, Jardine, Saunders, Sullivan and others took part, the amendment was carried.

On motion of Coun. Adams, seconded by Coun. Sullivan, ordered that the vote be recorded.

Yes—Foord, Freese, Donalds, McLaughlin, Jardine, Robinson, Park, Fitzpatrick, Saunders, Flanagan, Loggie, Morrisey, Fish—11.

No—Cameron, Bamford, Adams, Ryan, Corrier, Thibodeau, McNaughton, Foley, Sullivan, Stewart—10.

Coun. Sullivan read the report of the Committee appointed to visit the County Jail. The Committee found the jail in good condition and clean, and the prisoners well provided for, but recommended that there be some new flooring and that some strong new material be purchased for bed ticking.

On motion the report was received and adopted.

The Council now resumed the passing of County Accounts.

Wm. Mason, Collecting Justice, correct, passed.

John Lyons, Com. of Roads, no vouchers, passed.

Roland Getchell, Com. of Roads—No surveys' returns, no detailed statement of persons liable to road tax, passed.

John Murray, Col. of Dog Tax, correct, passed.

Coun. Morrisey thought the Collector ought to make a return of defaulters, which has not been done.

Coun. Fish said that dog owners said they would not pay dog tax as there was no law to compel them.

The Sec'y-Treas. said there was a law to compel them to do so.

Moved and seconded that the return pass and that the collector be ordered to deliver a default list to the collecting justice. Carried.

Chas. Marshall, col. of taxes, Com. recommend that he be ordered to furnish tax list. Passed as recommended.

John Niven, Police Magistrate. Coun. Morrisey gave the names of 6 persons who had been convicted before the Police Magistrate, by whose return it would appear they had gone to jail and had not paid their fines. He (Morrisey) knew himself, that those fines had been paid. He thought the Council should take such strict measures in such a matter.

Coun. Fish moved, seconded by Coun. Morrisey, that this account be laid aside till to-morrow as it is 10 o'clock, and that in the meantime, the P. M. be requested to be present at that time to give an explanation. Carried.

Robertson's land, and also across Burns Church River from Peter Davidson's to the end of the Anderson and Davidson road on South side of river. Carried.

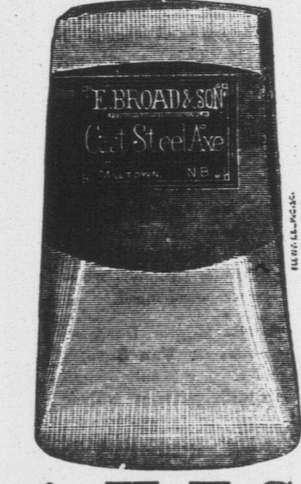
