GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC AND WINTER PORT.

It is obvious that the Grand Trunk Pacific railway company has no present intention of building to the Maritime Provinces. The promoters promise to make Quebec the eastern terminus of the line.

The scheme is a failure. The St. John and Halifax elevators have been empty all winter as they were last year. The Intercolonial terminus at St. John has hardly been used at all through traffic, and would have been used still less if it had not been engaged to accommodate Canadian Pacific freight.

For the same reason the Intercolonial route would be useless for the winter business of the Grand Trunk Pacific. So far as St. John and Halifax are concerned, and so far as winter traffic is concerned, it makes not the slightest difference whether the eastern terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific is at Quebec or somewhere in the middle of Ontario.

THE QUEEN'S GOVERNMENT must be carried on, a distinguished soldier-statesman used to say. The commerce of the country must be carried on also, and if it cannot be done at Montreal because the employers and employed cannot agree, let it go somewhere else where there is no disagreement.

It has been suggested that if the ships which cannot be discharged or loaded at Montreal should come to St. John the ship laborers would not work on them. We do not see why. Neither the laborers nor the employers here are parties to the Montreal trouble.

This is not a Montreal matter alone. The people of the west want their wheat to go to market. Ontario farmers and middlemen desire to ship their live stock, bacon and cheese to the other country.
