The situation in Russia and Siberia apparently is still far from being settled. Although the Germans and Austro-Hungarians still control territory from Finland to Odessa on the Black Sea, it is not certain that the Russians will not again take up arrangements against them. The Bolshevik foreign minister, Leon Trotzgy, has asserted that he will oppose the ratification of the peace treaty with German and advocate the re-organization of the army for the defense of Russia. Meanwhile influential newspapers in Germany already are beginning to see the loss of Germany's prestige in the Far East because of her machinations in Russia and to point out that Germany's Russian policy has "played the game brilliantly for Great Britain, the United States and Japan."

Turks Take Erzerum

Meagre advices from Constantinople indicate that with the evacuation of the Russians of sections of Turkish Armenia, the Turks are again harrassing the Armenians, but that the Armenians are offering resistance. Erzerum, the principal city in Armenia, already has been re-occupied by the Turks.

England and U.S. To Take Million Tons From Dutch

One million tons of Dutch shipping, which will be used sending supplies to the armies of the Allies or in transporting troops to the war zones, will be taken over by the United States and Great Britain next Monday, thus selieving, in great measure, a dire need of the countries at war with the Teutonic



London, Mar, 14.—In an air raid last night one airship crossed the coast and dropped four bombs on Hartlepool. Six dwellings were demolished there and thirty were damaged. Five persons were killed and nine injured. The following official statement was fissued today:

"Only one airship crossed the coast last night. It dropped four bombs on Hartlepool. The raider, which was operating at a great altitude, remained over land only a few minutes and the remainder of its bombs appear to have fallen into the sea.

"Six dwelling houses were demolished and about thirty damaged. The latest police reports state that the following casual-les occurred: Killed. one man, one woman, three children; injured, three men, one woman, five children."

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



The British throne means to us what no other throne typifies—we known its traditions and its responsibilities. An old English lady once said to the American writer, Julian Ralph—"I have lived in London all my life but I've never seen Queen Victoria." On the American's expressing his astonishment, she replied: "Oh, yes I've had plenty of opportunities but something always comes up in my eyes and blinds me."

It is not often an English person lets one see their warm heart and there are those of English blood here in Canada to whom that incident would be perfectly natural, while to others it might be written in Greek or Sanskrit.

In one case where a family was left motherless a permit was secured and two of the children were placed in the Municipal Home. Relatives are making arrangements to care for some of the others.
