MECHANICS LATE MAKE GOOD START

Victorias Lose Second Game
On Wednesday Evening
Before Good Crowd
GREAT PITCHING

After many days the copious
moisture (i.e. rain) was sufficiently
turned off to allow the free and in-
dependent electors and suffragettes
an opportunity to witness the second
baseball encounter which was
brought off at the bawlyard on
Wednesday evening to the huge
delight of numerous members of
the family of "Jack's Wife". Owing
to the unavoidable absence of our
peerless president of the league who
is rusticated in sylvan groves and
by murmuring streams, the game
was late in the starting. The late
arrival of the Mechanics might also
account for this, both reasons being
given absolutely free and without
cost.

The Victorias batted first, and
the first three men to face Shaddick
made three separate and distinct
pictures (i.e. one after the other)
in the atmosphere causing an east
wind to spring up for filling in the
gaps. Paterson for the machine
boys started with a hit. Cady
struck out and Paterson stole to
third on Shaddick's out at first.
Floyd went out at first retiring the
side. In the second innings Roy

home. Ahearn got to first but died
there when Wall struck out.

In the fourth and fifth innings

In the Mechanics half of the
fourth, Dobson reached first on an

FEMALE HOOLIGANS SET FIRE TO MANSION

Damage \$75,000—Militant In-
terrupters at Meeting Thrown
Out

London, June 4.—Damage esti-
mated at \$75,000 was done during
the night by a militant suffragette
"arson squad," who set fire to a new-
ly constructed but unoccupied man-
sion at Westwood, near Trowbridge,
Wiltshire. The women left behind
them a placard bearing the words:
"For damages apply to Runciman."
The Right Hon. Walter Runciman,
Commissioner of Woods, Forests
and Land Revenues, addressed a
meeting at Trowbridge last evening,
in the course of which a number of
suffragette interrupters were ejected.

CAMPBELLTON LOSES ONE OF HER MOST RESPECTED CITIZENS

Death of Mr. James A. McDonald, the Well Known Lumber
Operator Causes Intense Sorrow in Town.

"The moving finger writes and
having writ moves on."
Campbellton is today mourning
the loss of one of her best known
and most respected citizens, James
A. McDonald, who died on Wednes-
day morning shortly after five
o'clock at the early age of 48 years.
Mr. McDonald had been ailing
for nearly three weeks with stomach
trouble, and latterly his condition
gave his family and friends grave
anxiety. Cancer of the stomach
with the medical men here, a spe-
cialist, Dr. Martin who hurriedly called
from Montreal who arrived here
Monday. Mr. McDonald's serious
condition was not hidden from his
friends. The verdict of the Mont-
real medical man was eagerly waited
for, but grave fears were entertained
for his recovery. Hoping against
hope, however, they clung to the
knowledge that he had a fighting
chance, and brethren of the Maso-
nic fraternity of which he was a
member, were constantly in attend-
ance. Notwithstanding all that
skill and attention could do, Mr.
McDonald gradually became weak-
er, and on Wednesday morning fol-
lowing a hemorrhage he passed
peacefully away, having borne his
suffering with calm and resigned
patience.
He leaves a widow and ten chil-
ren (many of them young) eight
sons, Clifford, Wesley, Ronald,
George, Burns, Bruce and Fred, and
two daughters, Stella and Nina to
whom the sincere sympathy of the
entire community is extended.
Deceased was a member of various
societies who will attend at the fun-
eral to-day, but the body will be
taken charge of by the local lodge
of Freemasons, and buried with
Masonic ritual.
Many beautiful flowers were re-
ceived among them being: Pillar,
Masons, No. 32, Home Circle, and
Mr. and Mrs. Fred Wyers and fam-
ily, Cross, Mrs. Swan and family,
Moncton; Mr. and Mrs. F. M. An-
derson and Miss Anderson, I. O. F.,
Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Gillis, Flatlands;
Mr. and Mrs. Frawk, Wm. and Harry
Ferguson, L.O.L. No. 64; Shivers
Lumber Co., L.O.L., Mr. and Mrs.
Thos. Malcolm, F. J. Shirley, L. T.
Joudry, wreaths; Dr. and Mrs. Tay-
lor, Moncton; Edmund Sargeant,
Mrs. Elmes McKnight, Moncton;
Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Miller, sprays.
The late James A. McDonald was
one of the best known lumberman
around this section. Born and
brought up in the county, he was in
lumbering work all his life, raising
himself from one of the small job-
bers into the largest operator on the
Restigouche, and the premier of all
lumbermen. He was a man of high
spirit, kindly and generous to a de-
gree, ever ready with heart and hand
to assist the poor and the needy,
and one whom this town could hard-
ly spare. A true estimate of the
character of the man can easily be
obtained from the sorrow expressed
by the large number of employees,
who could always look up to him as
their friend as well as employer, a
man whose word was his bond, and
whose every action was for the good
of the community which ever ac-
crued him the highest respect.
"Let us call to remembrance the
great and the good."

DROWNED ON THE UPSALQUITCH

Young Man Returning From
Drive is Swept into the River
on the North West

BODY NOT FOUND

It was with sincere regret that
the report was received here on
Monday of the death by drowning
of Mr. J. C. Quinn, aged 30 years,
a son of James Quinn of Cross Point.
From information received it ap-
pears that deceased and a compan-
ion named Beattie were coming
down the North West on a "Cat"
on their way to Campbellton, fol-
lowing the Richard's drive, and
Quinn was knocked off the raft by a
sweep sticking out from the bank,
his companion saving himself by
throwing himself prone. The body
has not yet been recovered.

IS INJURED BY SER- IOUS EXPLOSION

A. H. English Has Face Badly
Burned in Acetylene Ex-
plosion at New Mills

Last Friday Mr. A. H. English
was the victim of a serious explosion
at New Mills shewing painful in-
juries. He had been called to ex-
amine the generator at Mr. B.
Windsor's store, which blew up
while he was bending over it mak-
ing an examination. His face as a
result was badly burned, his nose
broken, and it was feared he would
lose the sight of one eye. On being
removed to his home here, it was
found that the eye had escaped ser-
ious injury, but the doctors consid-
ered him fortunate as the occurrence
might have terminated fatally. Al-
though suffering considerably, Mr.
English is improving daily but
he will be confined to the house for
a considerable time yet.

I.C.R. DRIVER WOOD TRIED AT BATHURST

Bathurst, N. B., June 4.—The preliminary
trial of Cyrus Alfred Woods charged with
manslaughter, opened here this morning at
ten o'clock before Magistrate O'Brien. Mr.
George Gilbert of this place, who is clerk of
the court is acting for the crown, while Mr.
Allan A. Davidson of Newcastle, is appearing
for the accused, while it is understood that
Mr. H. A. Powell, K. C., will be here to-
morrow to act with Mr. Davidson in the in-
terest of Mr. Woods.

The circumstances regarding the case will
be recalled by readers, and the case is creating
much talk among railway men all over the
I.C.R. This is the first time that an I.C.R.
driver has been made the object of prosecution
through an accident in which a person has
lost his life, and it is regarded by many as a test
case. "May I remember the accident here
on April 19th when two men namely, Bat-
eman and Hickey who were sitting in the
caboose of No. 29 train standing here at the
station were killed, and also that a man
named Chamblain, an I.C.R. employee was
quite seriously injured. No. 39 way freight
was standing here in charge of Conductor
David Haines, when a freight special in
charge of Conductor McDougall, with Driver
Woods at the throttle smashed into the way
freight causing the loss of two lives, injuring
one, and burning down the station at this
point. Some talk of arresting Woods was
heard at the time, but nothing was done about
it until he was arrested last week at his home
in Moncton. A preliminary examination was
held and the accused was let out on \$8,000
bail to appear before Magistrate O'Brien to-
day.

Alphonse Lacombe, Chamberlain, Albert
Jesuit and George McKee, the two latter of
Moncton, were examined at this morning's
session. Jesuit stated he was in Woods's
engine and saw the semaphore was against
his train and said to driver, "Al, the semaph-
ore is against us," Woods applied the brakes,
he said immediately. Jesuit and the fire-
men jumped from the engine. Woods remain-
ed. "We were going twelve or fifteen miles
an hour. Could not see the semaphore plain-
ly. The glass was smoked up."
George McKee corroborated Jesuit's
evidence, saying the semaphore was up, and
called Woods's attention to it. The train, he
said, was going eighteen or twenty miles an
hour.

BIG TRACT OF LAND FOUND IN ANTARCTIC

Was Named Queen Mary's Land by the Wild Party

London, June 1.—The first account has reached England of the experiences of Frank Wild and his companions, who, forming the second base of Mawson's Australian Antarctic expedition, lived on a glacier for a year and discovered a great tract of land within three hundred and fifty miles of the coast line. This land probably extends to the pole itself, and has been named Queen Mary's Land.

Speaking to the newspaper representatives, Wild said: "We prepared for the winter in our glacier home. We dug a tunnel with caves to hold our stores entered by means of a trap door on the top.

"We had a regular routine of meals and work. We amused ourselves with hockey, football and skiing in fine weather and chess, draughts and cards when unable to venture out. In August we again made preparations for sledging, one party of three going eastward, another to the west. The latter surveyed all the coast line to the point reached by the German expedition in 1902. On one trip we did 50 miles at an altitude of from 2,000 to 3,000 feet.

"This party discovered the largest emperor penguin rookery every recorded. It was on the glacier sixty-five miles west of our glacier hut, and here was congregated some 7,000 young emperor birds in addition to the innumerable ordinary penguins. Falling down crevasses were more or less common. We all got grazed and bruised, while once Mr. Watson was down a crevasse for twenty minutes before he was hauled out. Our worst experience was in October, when the western party was laid up for seventeen days in a blizzard, the longest on record. I never before experienced one of more than nine days. It is difficult to imagine what it meant for three men to be imprisoned in a tent six feet across which got gradually smaller with the piled up snow outside. There was not room to lie straight, nothing to read. Sixteen hours out of the twenty-four we spent in sleep. At the end of the blizzard we were as weak as kittens, but it is extraordinary how soon one picks up. I have known cases where a man would gain five or six pounds in weight after one meal.

ENGINEER FACES A SERIOUS CHARGE

L.C.R. Engineer Made Object of Criminal Prosecution

A charge of manslaughter has been brought against the engineer of the I. C.R. fast freight which some weeks ago collided at Bathurst with a local freight, the crash resulting in the death of two men, Batemen and Hachey, who were on board the way freight at the time. A preliminary examination was held at Bathurst, the accused being liberated on \$8,000 bail. The case will come up again on Wednesday.

The charge has been brought by the relatives of the men who were killed in the wreck.

The case is a notable one, in that it is the first time in the history of the province of New Brunswick in which a railway employee has been made the object of a criminal prosecution as a result of a wreck in which life has been lost. It is believed to be the first case of the kind in the whole history of the Intercolonial.

The engineer will be defended by Mr. H. A. Powell, K. C., of St. John, and other eminent counsel. A number of witnesses have been subpoenaed.

CANAL TO CONNECT CLYDE AND FORTH

A Project That Will Cost \$134,000,000

Glasgow June 3.—The Secretary for Scotland, Mr. T. McKinnon Wood, M. P., received a deputation in Glasgow on Wednesday, representing a corporation committee and the executive of the Mid Scotland Canal Association on the subject of a proposed deep sea canal connecting the Clyde and the Forth, and following the direct route by the Kelvin Valley. The naval and commercial value of the proposal was emphasized, and the suggestion was put forward that a grant should be given out of the Development Fund to enable engineers to obtain the necessary data on which to base a close estimate of the cost of the undertaking. Mr. McKinnon Wood expressed his sympathy with the latter proposal, but could not commit himself to any responsibility without consulting his colleagues, should the result of that survey be that the government was to find the whole cost, now estimated at £27,000,000 (\$134,780,000).

BANK ACT PASSED BY PARLIAMENT

Commons Endorses Amendments of Senate on a Non-Party Vote

Ottawa, June 2.—The bank act the chief legislative achievement of the government this session, apart from the other achievement of piling up expenditures of nearly a quarter of a billion dollars, is finally through both houses of parliament.

The commons this afternoon by a vote of 83 to 10, on non-party lines endorsed the motion of the minister of finance to concur in the amendments made by the senate. The bill was finally passed substantially the same as it was when first introduced in the house early in the session. There is no radical departure in principle from the original act passed in 1871.

The final comparatively brief but somewhat vigorous discussion today gave opportunity for a little gallery play. It was charged that there had been too much lobbying on the part of interests representing the bankers both in the commons and the senate a charge, however, which indignantly denied on both sides of the house.

In the end a peculiar and somewhat amusing spectacle was presented by several of the members on the Conservative side of the house rising to demand a vote on the motion of the finance minister that the senate amendments be concurred in. Eight Conservatives, Messrs. Nickle, Taylor, Stevens, Bennett, (Calgary), Meighen, McCurdy and MacLean (York), and two Liberals, Messrs. Emerson and Buchanan, voted against the motion. Premier Borden and the members of the government with the rest of the members The amendments inserted by the upper house were, as Mr. White explained, of a minor character and did not effect any vital principle of the bill.

GOOD REASON FOR A RECIPROCITY PACT

Reports Show Geography is Too Much For Tariffs

Washington, June 3.—The United States ranks first as a caterer to Canada's needs and second as a customer of the northern neighbor's supplies, says a report just completed by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce. Canada buys more from this country than from all the others combined, having purchased sixty-five per cent. of its goods here last year. The United States in 1912 took from Canada thirty-eight per cent. of that country's exports. This country to-day, says the report, takes almost the entire export of Canadian minerals of all kinds, the bulk of its forestry exports, more than half of the manufactures it sends out and a third of its fishery exports. In spite of tariff preferences, it adds, Great Britain's share of the Canadian market has steadily declined before the advance of American goods, geography having been too much for tariffs.

Cambridge, Mass., June 3.—George Carlton Robinson, of Milton, Ont., has been granted the Francis Parkman fellowship at Harvard. The foundation carries a money consideration of \$450.

THE NAVY BILL

Speaking of the Senate's action with regard to the navy bill the Quebec Telegraph says:

By a majority of twenty-four the Senate has declared that the Borden navy bill shall not become law until it has been submitted to the people for endorsement. We are promptly told by Conservative newspapers that this action on the part of the Upper House "absolutely kills the bill and nullifies its whole intent." They state that all the talk and work and labor of the past five months in the Commons are lost. And again,

It is presumed that the Government leader will refuse to proceed with the measure, as the attempt to have Canada share in the burden of Imperial defence is effectively blocked.

Whatever may be the expressed opinion of the Honorable Rob Rogers and his colleagues as to the popularity of the Borden navy bill, it is evident that their newspaper supporters feel confident that if it were "submitted to the people" it would be condemned. On no other assumption can it be said that the Senate amendment "absolutely kills the bill."

The Lloyd George Budget—says the Ottawa Free Press—may be once more referred to. That measure, after being passed by the House of Commons, was thrown out by the House of Lords. It is absolutely killed by that action! Not much. The Asquith Government promptly requested the King to dissolve Parliament, a general election was called, and the government made the Lloyd George budget the sole issue of its campaign. The Asquith Government was returned with a direct mandate for the new system of taxation proposed by Lloyd George. The measure was again put through the Commons, and when it was sent up to the House of Lords it was passed by them because the people had expressed their wish at the polls that it should become law.

The same constitutional method is now open to Premier Borden. He can dissolve Parliament, appeal to the people, and in a couple of months—if he gets their endorsement—the Borden navy bill can become effective.

If there is any delay in the passage of this measure, if there is any further demonstration to the "enemies of Britain" that Canada holds aloof—as some writers and speakers have us believe is now the case—the responsibility for such delay must be laid at the doors of the Borden Government. For even if the Borden Government should be defeated in an appeal on its navy policy, the party opposed to that government is committed to a naval policy that is just as strong an evidence of Canada's love for the flag and British connection.

The Senate has not killed the Borden navy bill. It will be killed by the Borden Government if it refuses to adopt the precedent set by the Mother of Parliaments and the procedure advised by the Senate.

R. C. Miller, the state prisoner, will be released when Parliament prorogues this afternoon.

CIRCUS HAND SHOOTSMAN AT EDMONTON

Edmonton, Alta., June 5.—Jos. Bellens, a bartender, was shot and probably fatally wounded by one of the hands of Darn's circus, named O'Brien, from Philadelphia. Bellens, with his wife and two children, came from New York a month ago. O'Brien is under arrest.

Driver Wood was given bail for \$8,000.

The first gift to Acadia made by Senator Curry was \$25,000 in memory of his son, Ivan Curry, who died while pursuing his studies at the faculty of applied science at this institutions, and the present donation will establish three chairs in the same faculty.

New York, June 3.—Benjamin C. Gibson, a teacher, of Owensboro, Kentucky, who disappeared ten days ago from Columbia University, where he was studying for a degree of bachelor of science, was found dead in the East River today. An autopsy has been ordered to determine the cause of his death.

Gibson wore jewellery and carried money when friends last saw him on the college steps. When the body was recovered off 122nd street there was nothing of value found.

A college locker key and initials on a collar led to the identification at the morgue tonight by two of Gibson's acquaintances, who made affidavits that the body was that of the Columbia student.

ENTERTAINED WITH STOLEN MONEY

Young Scotchman Treated Relatives Royally Till Taken by the Police.

Montreal, June 2.—The far-reaching powers of the law have been successfully demonstrated by Detective Cronin, of the Toronto force, who has just returned from Scotland in charge of James F. Ashley, whom he captured in Edinburgh at the end of a chase which lasted nearly three months, and which took the pursuer and pursued over a distance of 8,500 miles. Ashley, with six previous convictions against him, is wanted in Toronto for the perpetration of the cleverest robberies on the police records of that city, in which he made a successful "get-away" with \$2,600 in currency.

Ashley, who is about 24 years of age, is a native of Edinburgh, Scotland, in which city, at the age of 13 years, a conviction was laid against him for theft. Since that time five other convictions were found against him in his own country until when three years ago, when he came to Canada and settled in Toronto, where he held several different positions, and had no trouble with the police although they kept an eye on him on account of his previous record, which they learned through correspondence with the Edinburgh authorities.

On the night of March 1st of the present year the joint offices of the Canadian Pacific and the Grand Trunk Railways in Toronto were robbed in a most original manner of nearly \$3,000 in silver and bills of small denomination.

Ashley had entered the offices during business hours and had removed four screws from each of the two wrought iron gratings which protected the wickets. The gratings were fastened with six screws each, and Ashley had removed the two bottom ones on each side. He managed in some way to secrete himself in the offices at closing time and after all the clerks had gone he came out of his place of concealment and easily gained access to the office on the other side of the wicket, raising the grating and shoving up the window, which, on account of the protection of the grating, had not been fastened. Once inside the office, the man threw off his coat and drew a pair of black sleeve protectors over his shirt sleeves, switched on the desk light, and when the char man came to scrub the floor a few moments later, he presented the appearance of a clerk who had remained after hours to make up some back work. The stolen money he made into a parcel and gave it to a friend, to whom he tendered \$100 to bring the parcel to Montreal, with instructions to meet him here. The friend came to Montreal immediately, while Ashley remained in Toronto for a few days so as to divert suspicion from himself. He then came to Montreal, where he met his friend, and received the money, after which he at once took ship for Glasgow, whence he made his way to his old home in Edinburgh, where he put up at one of the leading hotels, and showered presents upon his mother and sisters, who were still living there, often taking them for taxi rides and to the theatre.

NEW I.C.R. FREIGHT RATES UP IN HOUSE

Increase an Outrage and is Unfair to Small Shippers in Maritime Provinces

Ottawa, June 2.—Maritime province and Quebec members are preparing to have a pretty thorough discussion of the increase which has recently been made in the freight rates on the Intercolonial Railway.

In the house today Hon. Mr. Emmerson sought information as to the details of the changes which have been made and the reasons for them. He succeeded only in obtaining from Hon. Mr. Cochrane a statement that there would be opportunity for the discussion of this and other government railway matters before parliament prorogued.

"I think that the increase is an outrage," said Hon. Mr. Emmerson. "In the first place it is not needed. This year the operations of the road under the old rates showed a surplus of over \$1,000,000. If the system was losing money there might be some excuse for it, though a good case could be made out for the retention of the old rates. But with the road showing a heavy profit there is none."

"Then I object to the increase because it is going to affect the small shipper rather than the big shipper. The increases are to local rates. Where a man has been able to have a barrel of flour shipped a few miles for twenty-five cents, he will have to pay thirty-five cents in future. That is the way it will work on milk, produce and all other articles. The small shipper and consumer will have to pay the increase."

"While the rates are being put up on the government road for the people of the east to pay, the tolls have been absolutely removed from the canals which serve the provinces of Ontario and Quebec. The millions which are collected from the people of the maritime provinces through the rates on the Intercolonial will be applied to meet the cost of maintaining the canals and to pay interest for the benefit of the west on advances to the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canadian Northern."

"I do not think that the east is being fairly dealt with, and believe that this matter must be thoroughly thrashed out in the house."

It is expected that there will be a full debate in a day or so.

RUSSIAN OFFICERS ACCUSED AS TRAITORS

Vienna, June 1.—It is stated that the traitor, Col. Redl, besides selling Austrian secrets to Russia, denounced to their government the Russian officers who had sold information to Austria and other countries.

Redl's exposure was an act of revenge on a Russian officer he had betrayed.

LIBERALS CARRIED NICOLET ON MONDAY

Quebec, June 3.—Returns this morning show that the Liberals gained a sweeping victory in Nicolet yesterday when Mr. Trahan, their candidate, took a majority of more than 800 votes over his opponent, Mr. Rhault, who ran as an independent Liberal. The Conservatives made little effort to capture the seat.



CLEVERLY DUPED BY ADVENTRESS

Prominent Parisian Clubman Proves Soft Mark.

Paris, June 1.—A prominent young member of a Paris club was visited recently by a handsome woman who represented herself as the Princess Salm and presented a letter of introduction purporting to be signed by Mgr. Journe, Canon of Caracas, whom the young man had met in society. The introduction said that the bearer was an illustrious widowed foreigner of great wealth, who desired to enter Paris society and requested the recipient of the note to assist her.

The visitor claimed membership in the Salm-Kukr Kborg family, and said she was a princess of the Holy Roman Empire. She had married, she said, a nobleman connected with the Imperial family, who had left her, an immense fortune, while in addition her private fortune amounted to \$60,000,000.

The young man offered to do all he could for the princess. He met her frequently and at last he proposed marriage and was accepted. He placed on her finger an engagement ring which cost \$6,000. A few days later the princess departed for Madrid, ostensibly to settle family matters, and have an interview with King Alfonso, but meantime she had related the same story to another man, a friend of the first, who also gave her a \$6,000 engagement ring.

After her departure one of her fiancés discovered that his friend and himself had been duped. The police informed him that the self-styled princess was an adventress named Adelaide Julia Madeline Jelle, who was born in Paris in 1874. Eleven years ago the police learned that she had obtained jewelry under a similar pretext and in 1905 they were again called upon to investigate her identity in connection with a case of blackmailing.

The princess was arrested at the railway station on her return from Madrid.

BRITAIN'S POET LAUREATE IS DEAD

Death of Alfred Austin Was Novelist, Barrister and War Correspondent

London, June 2.—Alfred Austin, British poet-laureate, since 1896, died today at the age of 77.

Beside being a poet, he was a barrister, novelist, a war correspondent and a political writer. He published his first poem anonymously at the age of eighteen, before he had taken his degree at London University. Although he was a lawyer, he never practiced that profession. He was a newspaper correspondent in Rome for many years, and he followed the operation of the Franco-Prussian war in 1870-71 with the headquarters of the Prussian king.

His writings were very patriotic. In one poem of recent date, he called attention to the unpreparedness of the British army for war and in another he eulogized the achievements of the British navy. In 1911, he issued his autobiography.

The greater part of his poetical work was published between the years 1881 and 1890, including "Savonarola", "Prince Lucifer" and "English Lyrics." The poet laureate died at his home, Swinford Old Manor, Ashford Kent, where he had been lying ill for some time.
