ELECTION PROSPECTS.

We have never pretended to have any
very definite ideas as to the prospects of
a dissolution of parliament this fall, and
do not know that we have anything es-
pecially new to offer upon this subject,
but it is well to keep the run of reports
and rumors so that each reader can make
up his mind for himself. One thing may
be accepted as beyond a peradventure.
Sir John Macdonald will bring on the
election when it suits him best, and
therefore the liberals ought to be ready
for work at the shortest notice. The
Quebec correspondent of the Toronto
Globe says it is believed that the par-
liamentary elections are "very imminent."
The Montreal Star of Friday last said:

The members of the house of commons
resident in the city and vicinity are evi-
dently of opinion, with one or two exceptions,
that the Dominion elections will take place
some time between now and the end of
the year, the general impression being that
the date is already fixed for the last week
of November or the first week in December.
This, however, is not the case, as a gentle-
man who saw Sir John Macdonald yesterday
was informed by the premier that everything
depended upon the success of the Hon. Messrs.
White and McLean in the mar-
time provinces. So far the reports, received
from them are considered highly favorable
to the government, so that it may be con-
cluded that the date of elections will shortly
be fixed. The idea, according to one M. P.,
is to go to the country before Mr. Her-
gert gets into power and is able to use his
influence.

Mr. M. H. Gault, M. P., was interviewed
by a Star reporter this morning on the sub-
ject, when he stated he had heard nothing to
justify him in believing that any time had
been fixed.

Mr. Masson, M. P. for Bellefleur, had heard
that the whole battle would be over by
Christmas time, while several other members
who refused to allow their names to be men-
tioned said they were preparing for the fight.

The Star professes not to be in line
with either of the political parties, and
editorially it gives no expression of opin-
ion upon this subject. Referring to that
part of the Star's paragraph touching the
visit of the ministers to the maritime
provinces it may be remarked that they
are in Ottawa to-day, and if their mission
was to spy out the land they have proba-
bly before this made their report to their
chief, and therefore some news may be
looked for within a few days either one

way or the other. The liberals in the
neighboring County of Sunbury have
again selected Mr. Charles Burpee as
their leader, and on Friday next the
liberals of York will nominate their can-
didate.

AN INTERESTING CONTEST.

The contest for the New York mayor-
alty is not usually of much interest to
outsiders, but the present one is rendered
exceptional by the fact that Henry
George is a candidate. Mr. George is
well known as a writer on social and
political-economic subjects. He is a
so-called labor champion, and entertains
somewhat revolutionary ideas as to land
and capital. Some of his theories are
only the notions of previous writers
stripped of their philosophy and popu-
larized. Others he may claim to have
originated. Much that he advocates is
good, much is visionary, but on the
whole he deserves the respect and con-
fidence which he has gained. His can-
didacy is represented as an effort on the
part of the working men of New York to
assert themselves; but there is reason to
think that he will not get the full sup-
port of the party whose spokesman he is,
while he doubtless receives many votes
from the Republicans who have no can-
didate in the field. The democratic
candidate is Abraham S. Hewitt, a dis-
tinguished public man, who would fill
any station with credit. The prohibitionists
also have a man in the field, one Wm. T.
Wardwell. His vote will probably come
chiefly from the Republicans and the
independents; the straight democrats
will all go for Hewitt whose election
seems assured. The interesting feature
of the contest will be the George vote.

THE REIGN OF BOODLE.

When one-half of the New York City
council in Montreal and the other half
actually or constructively in jail, not
counting an odd one or two in the streets
prison; when cabinet ministers at Ottawa
living in houses presented by govern-
ment contractors, and diamonds paid for
out of public subsidies flashing at state
dinners; when candidates for the legisla-
ture are asked how much they will take
to retire and members elect are offered
money to change their allegiance when
their bouzou are given to corporations and
public contractors who a few years ago
were in humble circumstances live in
palaces, one may be justified in con-
cluding that the reign of "Boodle" is
upon us. This last quarter of the nine-
teenth century has been great in art,
great in science, great in literature, but
it has been phenomenal in the matter of
"Boodle" transactions. What the law-
yers call an *animus furandi* seems to be
abroad and men are bound to be rich at
all risks. When Cincinnati had saved
the state he went back to the plough;
but our patriots seek rest in million dol-
lar palaces from the labor of pocketing
the people's money.

MONSIEUR CHINE.

A Young Girl Recently Treated and
Harmed and her Home Burned.
Camp Gilmore, Que., Oct. 23.—One of
the most horrible crimes ever perpe-
trated in Canada was made public here
last night. A party of six lumbermen
came up from Lower Gaiters lumber
camp, bringing a large quantity of rum.
They were more than intoxicated.
Soon after midnight the gang made a
raid on a house occupied by Mrs. Tur-
cotte, just outside the camp, and finding
only the old lady Turcotte and her
daughter Nellie at home, they fas-
tened the old lady to a chair, gagged
her, and then tying the hands
and feet of the daughter, the girl,
who is but 10 years old, faint, and fear-
ing that she was dying the men released
her mother. Finding herself free, the
old lady made her escape to the cabin
and escaped to the woods. It was not
known for some time whether the girl
was left to perish or carried away; the
cabin was so far destroyed when help
came that it was impossible to make any
search. Later the girl was found with
her throat cut from ear to ear, in a
thicket near the remains of the cabin.
The men have escaped, and while there
has been a searching party out to look
for them, it is doubtful if they will be dis-
covered, owing to the great number of
men constantly going and coming from
this section, which is purely a lumbering
region.

JUSTIN MCCARTHY WINS.

LONDON, Oct. 23.—Justin McCar-
thy has been awarded the seat in the
house of commons which he contested in
the recent election against Charles E.
Lewis, conservative. Lewis has sat for
London since 1872. In the
recent election the poll was counted gave
Lewis 1,781 votes, McCarthy 1,778, and
the seat was awarded to the former who

McCarthy at once entered a protest and
has ever since been pushing his claims, bas-
ing his case largely upon the allegation of

part of his opponents. Today, Lewis's
counsel abandoned his client's claim.

A Winnipeg telegram states that the

DIED AWAY FROM HOME.

A Normal School Student's Death
Under Very Sad Circumstances.

The ranks of the Normal school have
been broken by the loss of one of its
most promising students. Mr. John B. Secord, who
was a student in the Normal school, died
after his return to his home in Queens County
last night. He was suffering from typhoid
fever, contracted the disease himself shortly
after his return to this city, and died about
eight o'clock Sunday evening. He was
lodging with a family by the name of Somers-
ville, on Charlotte street, who removed here
from the same locality at the beginning of
the present Normal school term. It is a
startling fact, but nevertheless true, that as
soon as his boarding mistress learned the
nature of his disease she utterly refused to
care for him, or provide for the sufferer in any way
whatever. His folks were made aware of
this cruel treatment, and his father, who
himself had only partially recovered from the
disease, and a Colton arrived here and
with the help of the neighbors attended to
the patient as best they could under the cir-
cumstances. Mrs. Henry Glendon, who lives
on Charlotte street, as soon as she learned of
the young man's sad condition, kindly
attended him night and day. Other neigh-
bors had also lent assistance. The Somers-
ville family, on Friday morning last, packed up
everything in the house except the furniture
of the sick room and moved away to the
country again, leaving the empty, dreary
house to the dying student and his anxious
friends. This barbarous treatment on the
part of the Somersvilles may be due to some
extent to their dread of the disease, but it is
entirely inexcusable even in this respect and
cannot be overlooked. The remains of the
young man were removed to his home to-day
for interment.
