SCALERS SHOW INCREASED CUT
Small Operations Will Produce Fair Total in New Brunswick.

(Fredericton Mail.)

It is reported that indications at the present point to the cut of lumber on crown lands in the Province of New Brunswick being much larger than was expected at the beginning of the logging season. These indications are gratifying, as it had been thought that with a period of depression in the lumber market the cut on the crown lands would be exceedingly small. The season as it progressed has opened up considerable areas of some two hundred million feet produced.

The scalers' reports from various parts of the province show that operators are cutting already and it is probable that before the winter is far advanced a very respectable total will be shown from the crown lands.

The operations generally are in the central and north of the province and although small in comparison with some seasons a few years ago, go a considerable distance toward solution of the problem of unemployment. The southern portion of the province shows little activity, as all operators are waiting for improvement in the market.

GEORGE SARGEANT REPORTED MISSING
Left Escuminac in Goose Boat Monday Evening Nov. 21st.

The Restigouche has added another tragedy to its list it is feared. The victim is George Sargeant. George Sargeant, who has been employed with the Shives Lumber Co. Ltd. for years, running their gasoline boats, went to Escuminac shooting geese about two weeks ago. Monday evening, Nov. 21st, he borrowed a small goose shooting boat and went out at the mouth of Escuminac river. This was the last seen of him.

Tuesday it was discovered that he had not arrived here and enquiries were at once started, and a search for the boat made. A wrecked boat was found near Oak Bay, but this was not the one used by Sargeant. Later another boat, partly broken, was found about six miles below Escuminac. This is being brought up and it is feared it is the one used.

It looks as if the boat had filled and the unfortunate young man perished in the cold waters of the river.

CONSIDERATION NEEDED.

PREDICTS LIBERAL VICTORY IN N. B.
Hon. J. E. Michaud Back from Tour of New Brunswick.

St. John, Nov. 28.—Victory for the Liberals, in many cases with overwhelming majorities, was predicted this morning for six constituencies of New Brunswick, by Hon. J. E. Michaud, Liberal Executive for the Province, after a tour in which he personally covered a large part of the territory. Speaking of the remaining seats, Mr. Michaud stated that the Liberals have an excellent fighting chance in three other districts, and that in one a Progressive candidate is conceded a winner. Mr. Michaud arrived in the city Friday night and will leave for Edmundston to-night.

Taking the Province by constituencies, Mr. Michaud said that beginning with Restigouche-Madawaska, the Liberals of Madawaska have not yet seen the government candidate, W. S. Montgomery, Dalhousie. The contest there will be a joke, with the Liberal taking the seat with a tremendous vote. The Liberal representative is sure of a majority of at least one thousand, while in Gloucester, it is only a question of how many thousands Mr. Turgeon's majority will be, should the electors take the trouble to go to the polls in the cold weather. Northumberland will elect Morris without question, he says; Kent will return Legere, Liberal, as Doucette, protection farmer, is not receiving any recognition, even from U. F. A., while Westmorland will send Copp back to Ottawa with a handsome majority.

In Charlotte, developments are daily becoming more favorable for Todd, Hon. Michaud says, and his chances of election are good. The York-Sunbury contest indicates that Osborne had the country sections from the start and is rapidly gaining ground in the larger centres, with conservatives conceding him a majority in Fredericton.

Royal has developed into a stiff fight, with the Liberal standard bearer making an excellent showing.

In Carleton-Victoria, Caldwell, Progressive candidate will win by a large majority.

Mr. Michaud said he would leave the St. John-Albert pretention to the press.

MURDOCK TURNS ON SIR HENRY

Can't Convince Himself That Drayton Told Him Facts, He Says.

(Toronto Globe).

"I have been longing for two years to appear before a proper tribunal. I should like to have a proper judicial tribunal place me on oath before the people: place W. F. O'Connor and Judge Robson on oath; place the late Minister of Justice on oath; place the members of the Cabinet on oath—order to get the facts as to the manner in which the rights of the people of this Dominion have been sacrificed, and intentionally so. But no opportunity will come, until after Dec. 6. When I am a member for South Toronto, I am going to continue in Parliament this battle for a show-down. And among those who may be questioned will be the Conservative nominee in West York, who will then be a private gentleman."

Wants His Charges Answered.

In these burning words James Murdoch, erstwhile member of the Board of Commerce, carried last night into the rural riding of West York his fiery torch of protest against continued inaction of the protectors of writers. Before large gatherings at Long Beach and Mimico, speaking on behalf of Major J. E. Straight, Mr. Murdoch defied Hon. Arthur Meighen and his colleagues to answer the charges he is publicly making against them.

He challenged, too, his former benchmate on the Board of Commerce, Mr. W. F. O'Connor, to meet his allegations and with blunt phrases he dealt with the Conservative nominee in West York, Sir Henry Drayton.

"I'm on 'Distant From Facts'"

"I'm in the Dominion Cabinet in the past few years," he said, "there has been one autocratic individual who above all others, has had no consideration for anybody without big pull and wealthy, that man has been Sir Henry Drayton."

"I am sorry to say that, in so far as my business relations go, I have been absolutely unable to convince myself that he has been stating facts to me whenever he has made statements to me. I found that he was distant from the real facts that I could not accept his views—now or any other time. I would have been shown in black-and-white figures."

James Murdoch did not stop at generalities, or veiled insinuations. In respect of Sir Henry Drayton he went even further than in the terms above quoted. He charged him, directly and specifically, with having been implicated in the operations of the Board of Commerce. Describing certain men sent to the commissioners to assist them in their investigation of business firms, he said:

Tells of "Hiring" Quick Dismissal.

"One man was sent to us—I found him in the office one morning—who was a paid hireling. He was employed, I believe, by the candidate of the Conservative party in West York, Sir Henry Drayton. I found him there and I dictated his resignation to him. Not for him—to him! I discovered in ten minutes that he was working for the concerns we were trying to investigate. He left—and he went on to his friends up the hill. I believe that he got from them six months' compassionate allowance."

"Yes, Mr. Drayton is here. I am told that there is waiting on a board of literature to be turned loose in West York in a couple of days to convince them that Drayton is the innocent protector of the common people" (Cheers and cries "He'll need it!")

THE RETURNER MAN.

The Belleville branch of the Great War Veterans Association favors using the surplus canteen funds for a home where aged veterans of the great war, no longer of in their old age. The Belleville decision, unanimously made, is a suggestion highly practical in character, for it will be generally admitted that veterans' homes must be provided for deserving men who fought, and bled themselves for the cause of their country, and in addition, the necessity of having to spend their declining years in pauper institutions. But the veterans should not have to provide or maintain the necessary establishments for the war veterans whose wage-earning days are over, and it is for the government to do this on record before his auditors:

"If I live until tomorrow, I hope to write a letter to W. F. O'Connor and address it to him at the Conservative hut, the Conservative candidate at Brantford, asking him to give me answers to certain questions that will be asked him on Friday night's meeting. I'll send it, and I'll give the Press a copy when it goes. (Cheers.) Among others, will be a question asking him what protection the Canadian people have at present against combines, trusts and mergers. I'll tell him he and now—none whatever" (prolonged cheering).

"Over in Enemy's Trenches.

Attributing the Winnipeg strike to living conditions, a spokesman of the tolerable for workmen and their families, the speaker declared that little had been done by the board of the Dominion Cabinet and the Chairman of the board itself, Judge Robson. The latter Mr. Murdoch declared, had resigned at his suggestion—"and I have no apologies for asking him or suggesting to him that the time had come for him to go" (Cheers and applause). The Chairman, he declared, had been "over in the enemy's trenches, fixing up the enemy's temptations" at the very time he held his place on the board.

Rising Prices of 1919-20.

"For the past several years of the government has stood, first, last and all the time for the protection of about 15 per cent. of Canadian citizens to exploit, through tariff or otherwise, the other 85 per cent. of the people. I don't need to tell you; go back in memory. Go back to the rising prices of 1919-20, when you paid to profiteers five and six times their legitimate profits in the necessary articles of life. You have forgotten! Don't let some corporations that still want to exploit you lead you away from the concrete facts as you know them."

Paying for Paint.

TO THE WOMEN OF NEW BRUNSWICK

The day is drawing near when we shall be called upon to give out the verdict of the Federal government under which we have struggled for the past few years. What will this verdict be?
