

To be completed from Norton to Salmon River this Fall.

The Moncton Times, whose representative recently went over the Central Railway from Norton to Saigison's Creek, regards the Central as one of the most important railway enterprises in the Province. The charter of the company is for something like 95 miles from Norton to Fredericton, but Mr. Wheat-ton's contract is for 443 miles from Norton in Kings to Salmon River (Chipman) in Renous, of which he is one of the lessees, states that 1100 salmon were illegally caught is one week lately from the mouth of Renous down stream a few miles. These were taken by drifting, a method of fishing which is strictly forbidden by law. These facts have been placed before the Department of Marina and Fisheries, and it is to be hoped that an immediate stop may be put to this wrong doing.

There is also an abundance of hard and soft wood along the line and at the Grand Lake end are the well known coal fields, the outcroppings covering an area of 18 equare miles. Those who have passed through this district are astonished at the numerous evidences of coal. Nearly every farm has its coal pit, from which a supply for home consumption has been obtained, and small veins were cut through at different points in the construction of the railway. A number of Americans interested in mining enterprises have recently been through the some 40 teams were steadily employed hauling the coal to Fredericton, where it is highly prized, and it is believed the construction of the railway will lead to the extensive working of the mines, one of which is already sunk to the depth of 70 feet.

Mr. Wheaton commenced active operations a year ago last spring and before the winter stopped work, had the greater part of the grading done. At the present time of grad-ing of the 443 miles is completed with the exception of about three-quarters of a mile, on which 75 men are now at work and will soon have completed. As stated, 10 miles of track have been laid at the Norton end and track have been laid at the Norton end and ballasted ready for the rolling stock; 5 miles at the Grand Lake end have also been laid and 1000 tons of rails are expected from St. John in a few days. This will lay about 12 miles and the rails for the balance of the line are expected in September. When it is considered that the work has been very heavy, 90,000 yards of earth and rock being removed from cuttings in the first 12 miles. removed from cuttings in the first 12 miles it will be seen that extraordinary progress has been made. 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




