And how do these gentlemen propose to And how do these gentlemen propose to help us out of our dilemma—for everyone admits that the farmer is not as prosperous as he ought to be? They tell us that we must grow two-rowed barley for the English market, and I have often thought what a good thing it is that we have such an experienced farmer as the Hon. John Carling, the braver, to give us such valuable addition perienced farmer as the Hon. John Carling, the brewer, to give us such valuable advice—(great cheers and laughter)—and they tell us to do this, as if anybody who was a farmer had never thought of that before, had never been doing that before. Why, gentlemen, we have been doing this for years! I don't want to discourage anybody; let these gentlemen go on with their experiments; but I may tell you frankly that although there are portions of this Province which may grow the two-rowed barley to advantage, there are other portions that never can grow it with any hope of success. What else do they propose? They propose that we shall grow horses for the English market. (Cheers and laughter, and a voice, "Two-rowed horses?") (Great laughter.) "Two-rowed horses?") (Great laughter.) Now, they say you must produce in this country horses for the English market. FLOODS AND FRESHETS.

Serious Outlook in the Valleys, of the Chio and Eusquehanna.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Feb. 17.—A flood, unequaled since 1834, is looked for by experienced river men here. Bradford reports the lower streets innudated and people on Ann street being taken from their houses in boats. The water put out the fires in Seyfang's Iron Works. At Johnstown the situation is serious. The low lands are completely flooded. People are leaving their homes, and thousands are gathered at the Pennsylvania depot.

At 11 o'clock this morning both rivers were 26 feet and rising at the rate of seven inches per hour. The high water was very unexpected, and all morning families have been moving from their houses in the lower part of Allegheny. Several streets are flooded to the doorsteps. The Pittsburg and Western Railroad is covered in the city, and all travel at this end is stopped, while many mills a.ong the rivers have been forced to close down. Reports from the head waters show steady rains, with the river still rising and towns flooded. Bridges are being carried away in every direction, and the loss is great. In the city river men say the flood will be fully as high as in 1834, when 62 feet of water was reached, and enormous losses were inflicted in the low-lying portion of the city and river towns.



Under an act of Congress, passed last ses sion, the sngar duties in the United States will, on 1st April next, be very materially reduced. The consumers will be able to purchase the refined article for at least 2 ents a pound less than it now costs them. and the price over the border is already lower than in Canada. Under unrestricted reciprocity. Canadians would get the full nefit of this cheapened sugar.

A WORTHY ENGLISHMAN.

Mr. Richard Craddock, the well-know leader in the Sons of England Order, seconded the nomination of Mr. Arthur Mowat in West Toronto yesterday. Mr. Craddock made an effective free trade speech, declaring that "protection" had brought smoke but no tall chimneys, and polists but no increased wages for the workingmen.

said at Toronto, "that in 1868, the year after confederation was formed under the guidance of the same statesman, Sir John Macdonald, an act was put upon the statute book to testify for all time to come our willingness, at a moment's notice of the willingness of the United States, to phave a fair interchange of natural products between the two countries." Yes, and let us remember also that from 1868 down to 1891 the United States has not entertained the proposal on the Canadian statute book, nor responded to it in any way excepting to place fruit, fruit trees and three or four other of the enumerated articles on the free list, and that after two years of profitable free trade in those articles the Canadian Government

meanly reimposed the duties.

If Sir John Thompson possessed half the finsight with which he is credited by his flatterers he would perceive that the meation of the Canadian standing offer of reciprocity in raw products was convincing proof of the hopelessness of seeking a trade treaty with the United States on that basis. Speaking in Parliament in 1884, Sir John Macdonald himself declared his belief to be "that you will never get a treaty between the United States and Canada for reciprocal trade in the natural productions of the two sountries. That is true, and if the people Mowat, the talented son of the Premier of trade between the two countries they may depend that there is no way of attaining it axcept upon the lines laid down by the block," and a type of the young manhood

MR. CARLING AND MR. DRYDEN. Mr. Carling as Minister of Agriculture for the Dominion is strong against allowing the farmers of Canada to gain free access to the markets of the United States, and vice versa. He claims that the Canadian farmers are contented and prosperous, and that they have so grown under a policy of

high tariffs. He believes that they only need to grow horses and two-rowed barley for the British markets, where they now sell cheese and fat cattle, and that they can laugh at the McKinley tariff, with its prohibitory duties. Mr. Carling is a brewer. Mr. Dryden as Minister of Agriculture

for Ontario is as much in favor of Canadian farmers getting free access to the Uniten States as Mr. Carling is against it. He denies that the farmers of this country are either contented or presperous, and he invites Mr. Carling to go down to his own county of Ontario and get his answer from the farmers there. He says that farmers have been injured all along by the tariff laws of the United States, where their principal market is, and that the McKinley tariff pinches them harder than ever before Mr. Dryden is a farmer.

Mr. Carling cannot speak from personal experience of the evil effects of a tariff on rm products, for he grows nothing and sells nothing. He draws his salary of \$666 month from the Dominion Treasury-or about \$22 a day, Sunday included -and he pays no duty upon what he gives in ex-change for it; he does not even pay the axes upon income which almost every man n the country pays whose earnings are above \$400 a year, or \$1 10 per day. Therefore Mr. Carling is "happy, contented and prosper ous."

Mr. Dryden is a practical farmer, and the bulk of the animals reared upon his farm and the bulk of the cereals that he grows which he can spare for sale must find a narket in the United States. He grows on his farm about 1,800 bushels of barley every year, of which he sells about 1,600, and under the United States tariff he would have to pay on that quantity duties to the mount of \$480. On 50 lambs which he could sell in United States markets he would pay \$37 50, and on 320 pounds of wool he would pay \$32. He sells also two orses a year to American buyers, and on these the duty to be paid by him is \$60; and upon poultry and eggs he pays a further sum of \$15. The total sum so paid is \$624, and the whole of it goes into the treasury of the United States.

Now what is true in the case of Mr. Dryden is equally true in a less or greater degree of a very large majority of the farmers of Canada, because for many of their surplus products there is no market excepting in the United States. How much it costs them in the aggregate Mr. Dryden showed by the figures of the United States Government report on commerce for the year 1889. Taking the principal articles, uch as cattle, horses, sheep, barley, beans, potatoes, hav and eggs, it appears that acording to the United States report that ountry imported from Canada farm prodcts which in a free market would be worth \$7,000,000. What, then, is the net result to the Canadian farmer? Simply this, that instead of getting \$17,700,000, the actual value of the goods to him in a free market, but \$10,700,000. And Mr. Dryden very

There is no reason why he should not. Many of the carriages now sold in Michigan are brought from New Haven, Conn., and other far-east cities. With cheap raw material, the abolition of the heavy taxes on iron, trimmings, varnishes, etc., the London carriage builder can get a better market for his products over the border, and can undersell the carriagemakers of the Eastern States. Would he and his employes not be much better off with this widened and comparatively near market than with the far-away markets of the Northwest and the Pacific coast?

That they would is the opinion not only of Mr. Campbell, but of such well-known carriagemakers as the Coopers in Hamilton, and Armstrong, of Guelph. The last named believed in the N. P. promises of 1878, but after a twelve years' trial he de-clares that high taxation has injured rather than helped the carriage husiness and he than helped the carriage business, and he is now heartily working to secure unrestricted reciprocity.





Mr. H. McColl read an essay on "Thoroughness," defining the term referring to the elements included in it, and closing with words of encouragement to, those seeking to acquire it. A vote of thanks was tendered the essayist.

The afternoon session concluded with a recitation from Mr. T. H. Morgun, and a discussion upon the last entrance grammar paper by Inspector Johnson.


