Another Great Gale Visits Great Britain.

Thirty Vessels Driven Ashore Near Queenstown.

The Thames and Shannon Overflow Their Banks.

London, Oct. 19.—There seems to be no end to the terribly severe weather which has prevailed almost without cessation for a week. Last night and this morning the Irish Sea has been most severely storm-twept. The Dublin mail packet for Holywept. The packet were being two hours in a tremendously heavy sea, which smashed several of the paddles of her wheels. The packet had to heave to for repairs, and hardly had the paddles been mended when another sea carried away the etering wheel and a portion of the bridge. A hurricane prevailed on the west coast of Ireland for several days. The River Shannon has overflowed and submerged large quantities of land, drowning a considerable number of cattle and sheep and destroying several houses and other buildings.

The gravest apprehensions are felt by the inhabitants of Sandgate, a small town on the English Channel, two miles from Folkestone. Storms have caused a most abnormal tide, and this combined with the hurricane which is blowing, is destroying the sea-wall. Many houses situated near the shore have already been washed over by the angry waters, and the high road leading to Hythe and Folkestone is submerged and destroyed in many places.

The River Shannon has burst its banks in county Limerick inundating large tracts of land. The reclamation work near Ennis, in county Clarc, which recently cost the Government £120,000 have been nearly ruined.

A Brute Dips a Boy's Head in a Vat of Vitriol.

Terrylle, Conn., Oct. 19.—A brutal crime was perpetrated by Engineer James A. Bradshaw, of the Eagle Loch Company, Saturday afternoon. As he was going through the shop he approached W. A. Hough, aged 17 years, who was at work cleaning locks at his bench, and ordered him to go to another part of the shop on an errand. Bradshaw has no authority over the men in the factory, and the boy, acting on the advice of the men in the room, refused to obey. Bradshaw repeated the command, and on a second refusal, picked the boy up in his arms, and carrying him to a vat of vitriol in the room, dipped him in, head downward, several times before the other employes of the room, too horrified to stir at first, could interfere.

The boy's screams were agonizing. His hair was all burned off, his scalp was raw, his face and neck were horribly burned, and both eyes were burned out. His recovery is doubtful.

Bradshaw returned to the engine room and was at once discharged. He walked out of the shop unmolested, and has not yet been arrested. The employes of the shop, among whom Hough was a general favorite, threaten to lynch the brute if they find him. Bradshaw is married and is 35 years old.



THE NEW DEAL IN ENGLAND. They have been making history in Great Britain recently with a vengeance. The death of Mr. W. H. Smith compelled Lord Salisbury to make a speedy move towards the selection of a successor to him in the leadership of the House of Commons. In point of seniority Mr. Goschen, Chancellor of the Exchequer, should have been chosen; but as it is only a year or two since this Whig gentleman broke with the Liberals on the question of Irish government, Lord Salisbury has shoved him aside and selected Mr. Balfour, Chief Secretary for Leeland, as the successor. This action must convince the Liberal dissidents that they have nothing to expect from Lord Salisbury. That haughty peer, it must still be confessed, has made a stroke in selecting his sister's son as First Lord of the Treasury. Mr. Balfour is undoubtedly the strongest man in the Cabinet. His masterful character has been exemplified in his rule at Dublin Castle, but it is questionable if the hard and persistent effort which has characterized Mr. Balfour's Irish administration will be of much value in leading the House of Commons. Tact and good humor are ever more necessary in a popular leader than strong will power, and the more so in the case of a combination such as the new leader will be called on to control. Balfour has come to front with remarkable celerity. The other lay he was unknown in the world of poli ties, but his elevation to the Irish Secretaryship gave him his opportunity. In his new sphere he is destined to exercise a cerful influence in his party's fortunes, but there are few indications that he will be able to avert their defeat at the next

general election. So far the new master for Ireland has not been chosen. It has been reported that Mr. Balfour would remain Chief Secretary while holding the post of Commons' leader, but that is not probable. The

Ritchie, President of the Local Government Board; Sir William Hart Dyke, who was Chief Scoretary from June, 1885, to January, 1886, and Mr. Jackson, Secretary of the Treasury. If his principle of discrimination is false he is influenced by vulgar distinctions of wealth and social position; if it is sound he instructively seeks out the wiser and nobler among his acquaintances and shuns the As with our friends so it should be with

our books. The thoroughfares of literature are becoming more and more crowded with authors of all grades of inferiority, whose influence over us is incalculable. Books of all sorts are as common as the dust beneath our feet, and a large majority of them are as little worthy of attention. The question of choice is nowhere more imperative than written page exercises over the mind an is responsible for opinions expressed in these influence simply incalculable. Take into your hands the innocent-appearing volume, and when you put it down you will never again be what you were before. A single sentence changed St. Augustine from a brilliant, godless, self-satisfied rhetorician into a powerful religious influence. On the other hand, many a pure mind has been polluted by a foul book; many a trusting spirit has been robbed of its saving faith through the influence of a mere magazine rticle written against religion.

It may be said that these remarks are applicable only to young people, and those whose minds are yet unformed. But as the affected by bad food or bad air, so the atmosphere of the books we read and the kind of pabulum they afford the brain, unquestionably affect mental health and growth. Parents should be more particular in getting testimonials for the literature which comes into the hands of their children than in learning the character of their schools and school companions. There is no one so old or so wise who can safely take up a new book without the sharply challenging glance that he would bestow on stranger in an unknown city, who should try to represent himself as an old try to represent himself as an old friend. "Every man and every woman who can read at all," says Sir Arthur Helps, "should adopt some definite purposes in their reading—should take something for the main stem and trunk of their culture, whence branches may grow out in all directions seeking air and light for the parent tree." This is not a warning against desultory reading, which, when kept in its own place, is an excellent device for lightening heavy hours, but which should not be allowed to encroach on the sacred ground which is reserved for

purposeful and disciplinary reading. As it is better to go friendless than to have false triends, so it is said that it is better to go bookless than to read had books. Good books -- the Bible, Milton, Wordsworth, Shakespeare-are within the reach of almost everyone; and for the rest, "The Advertiser" advocates Obligatory Voting as both necessity wisdom the wise are not far away."

In an article on "the Demoralization of Russia" in the current number of the Fortnightly Review, E. B. Lanin, whose remarkable papers on Russia have been a feature of the Fortnightly for the last two years, and who has drawn the darkest picture of Russian traits and questions in the English language, sum-marizes the good his earlier articles have accomplished for the Russians. The article on Finance was followed by a decree abolishing the premium on Russian sugar exported to Persia; that on Finland by a ukase giving the assurance, which he had authority to state would satisfy the legitimate aspirations of the Finnish people, viz., a solemn promise that the legislative independence of the principality would be rigorously respected; the paper on Prisons by the creation of a secret commission to report specially on the subject; that on the Racking of the Peasantry by project of a law which will probably receive the imperial signature this year, the object of which is to abolish inhuman usury, and by another proposal, now under consideration by the Ministry, to lessen the burden of local as distinct from imperial taxation. Tokonyo, Oct. 19.—The annual convention of the Baptist churches of the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec opened is first session in College Street Baptist Church. There were about 320 delegates, ministerial and lay, in attendance. Prominent among them were: Rev. Dr. Thomas, Rev. Dr. Rand, Rev. Dr. Goodspeed, Prof. Farmer, Hon. John Dryden, Minister of Agriculture; Mr. D. E. Thomas, Q.C., J. Shortt McMaster and all of the members of the McMaster University faculty. The number in attendance is expected to be augmented by fully 200 to-day.

The president, Dr. Bentley, of Montreal, made an earnest address, in which he pointed out that by greater faithfulness, especially from individual members, the work of the church might be greatly increased. Rev. Dr. Thomas, of this city, was elected president for the enumy year by acclamation. Rev. E. W. Dadsen, of Woodstock, was elected vice-president; Rev. John Alexander, of Dovercourt, second vice-president, and Rev. D. M. Mitchell, of Parkdale, secretary. The following were elected governors for McMaster's University: Rev. Elmore Harris, Dr. E. Thomsen, Q.C., Rev. E. N. Dadson and Mr. John Stark.

The report of the Senate and Board of Governors of McMaster University was submitted to the convention. The past year, it is stated, had been one of marked progress in the church's educational work. The arts department of the university, which had just been inaugurated, had a class of sixteen, most of whom passed creditably. The second year class numbers 18, freshman class 21. A large class had entered the Theological College, and excellent work had been done. Woodstock college had the largest attendence sirce 1884, and was in a highly prosperous condition. The report of the new principal of Moulton College was very promising, and the college was never in a better state.

The treasurer of McMaster University presented his report. The total assets and liabilities taken into account showed a surplus of \$1,012,844 70.

REVELING IN RAIN.

Success of the Shower-Producers in Toxas—Another Side to the Story.

New York, Sept. 19.—A special to the Sun fron San Diego, Tex., says the Government rain-makers are the heroes of the hour here. The experiment, which was begun Saturday evening and continued during the night, was entirely successful. At 4 o'clock Sunday morning rain fell in torpents in the camp and soaked the ground. The people of San Diego and of the surrounding country are astonished at the result. When they went to bed at midnight the moon was shining in a cloudless sky, and there was no sign of rain anywhere. Four hours later they were awakened by the patter and pouring of rain on roofs, and in a few minutes it came down in torrents. The rain continued for nearly an hour. Telegrams received from stations along the line of the Mexican National Railroad say the rain extended about 40 miles to the northeast, 108 miles to the west and 30 miles to the southwest. It did not rain either to the east or to the south at a greater distance than ten or fifteen miles. They estimate the rain is worth to them at least \$500,000. The entire cost of the experiment was about \$2,500. Already offers are being made to the rain-makers to go to Mexico and experiment there.




