The supremething in life is to get one's work done, and it is the highest unselfishness to hold one's personal life, as it were, in abeyance at times, while one schleves that for which he was sent life, as it were, in abeyance at times, while one achieves that for which he was sent into the world. One cannot do this without doing more. He who is able to hold himself above the waves of personal calamity will be, in a way, buoyed up by them. There is an immense enrichment in the very cares, sorrows, and anxieties which so sorely perplex and at times exhaust us. Instead of being hindrances, they may be laiets into a strength greater than ours. To accept them as Dante accepted his life-long sorrow, and get the most out of it instead of being crushed by it, is to give one's work an eloquence, a magnitude, and a depth which stamp it as magnitude, and a depth which stamp it as something almost superhuman. God never intended any faithful worker to be crushed. Life, even in its vicissitudes, ought to be the supreme aid of every man in the doing of his work.—[Christian Union.



CANADA'S DRINK BILL

It is worth while, if only as an economic study, for the people of Canada to consider, once in a while, how much money is spent every year on the "luxury" of intoxicating drinks. The "Royal Templar" recently published the following computaion of the National Drink Bill fo compiled from the Government blue books:

Foster, our present Finance Minister, in his calculation some years ago, reckoned that our Canadian spirits, after passing through the hands of wholesalers and retailers, were finally purwholesalers and retailers, were finally purchased by the consumer at an average price of about \$5 per gallon. Some people think this is a low price to set, in view of the large amount that is consumed in small quantities at from 5 to 10 cents a glass. It is at anyrate not in excess of the actual amount paid. He estimates further that our imported spirits average to the consumer \$6 per gallon, our imported wines \$5 per gallon, our imported malt liquors \$3 per gallon, and home manufactured beer 60 gallon, and home manufactured beer 60 cents per gallon. They must, however, carry their inquiry further. Why should they not have answers to these questions:

What is the extra cost, per annum, for the administration of justice, caused by the sale and consumption of intoxicating liquors?

The extra cost for the maintenence o jails and asylums? The extra cost for keeping up poor

houses? The amount spent by the public in benevolent efforts necessitated by the ravages of drunkenness?

If they could also provide statistics o the loss entailed by the waste or destruction of the producing power of those who without intoxicating liquors, would be steady workers, they would show

to what an extent the system has demoralized and impoverished the land. The wonder is that it has any defenders. It can no longer be contended that intoxicating liquors are needed as a stimulus to industry. It is well to remember that inheritance for good or evil has its source of strength in repetition. If the growing prevalence of hereditary diseases is to be checked, a refusal to patronize any horse or use any mare so afflicted is demanded of all. More important still, do not breed from animals that have the conformation that gives use to these diseases. Type is undoubtedly one of the most hereditary fixtures of animal life. The narrow kuee, the straight pastern, the hock with weak foundation and little breath, is more to be shunned than the disease given birth to by them. A horse may be spavined and yet be fit for breeding purposes, provided the hock is constructed on right principles. On a properly built hock such a disease could only originate through a severe accident.
