



LONDON'S HOSPITAL BURDENS.

The duty of making provision for the victims of consumption must be strongly felt in the city when the majority of the ratepayers voted \$5,000 for that object, although hospital expenditure is already burdensome, and a large outlay upon the water supply is a necessity of the immediate fu-

The question of hospital cost has been raised more than once, and disposal to levy a new charge upon the taxpayers for the care of consumptives. The present system is a very expensive one, though doubtless efficient. The municipal outlay for hospital purposes in London is as large as that of the city of Toronto, with a population of nearly 300,000. Toronto has no public hospitals coreresponding with Victoria Hospital in this city. All the Toronto institutions are under private management, subject to public regulation. The municipality merely pays 70 cents per day for each patient who is unable to pay for his own maintenance and who secures an admission order from the health department. In this city the general hospital is owned, financed and managed by the municipal corporation. Necessarily London's plan is much of their revenue from private philanthropy and from paying patients. The

It is highly creditable to the citifinancial burden on the community? under private control, to which paying and non-paying patients would be admitted, the latter, of course, being maintained at the cost of the city. This would be following the methods adopted in Toronto and Hamilton. Is it not possible also to care for incurable cases in a portion of the new wing of Victoria Hospital, without go. ing to the expense of purchasing other per week. premises? This matter ought to be considered by the medical profession and the trust, in the interests of the ratepayers.

RETURNS AFTER

Explorer Leffingwell, Left Alone In Arctic, Surveys Frozen Coast of Alaska.

New York, Jan. 5 .- Ernest De Koven Leffingwell, of Knoxville, Ill., or Flaxman Island, Beaufort Sea, as the case happens to be dropped into town on Monday to have a little talk with some people here who take an interest in men who go out to learn things in heretofore unknown places far up beyond the Arctic

Mr. Lefflinwell found a ready audience, for he had fust returned, and was the last to return of the Mikkelson-Leffinwell expedition, organized three years ago by Capt. Ejnar Mikkelson to hunt for a frozen continent in the untracked sea north of the coast of Alaska.

He was last to return because he stay-ed after the rest of the party had taken ship for the south, to make maps and geological surveys of an unmapped land. As a result of this stay alone in the wilderness, Mr. Leffingwell has a map of the coast of Northern Alaska for a strip of 200 miles to the Arctic Yukon divide. Which means that he has lifted, if for ever so little way, the fog curtain that hides the most northerly fringe of the United States domain.

Mr. Lefflingwell emphatically asserted that in his stay in the Arctic zone the worst hardship he experienced was the depletion of his stock of cigars. He said: "Before the others left we had all pitched in and built a cabin on Flaxman Island. I was alone part of the time, and the rest of my stay there was enlivened, if you could call it by that term, by the presence first of a native family of Eskimos, and later by two white prospectors who had been working about fifty miles to the eastward. These prospectors were a queer pair; they had been working all the streams thereabouts even as far as the mouth of the Fraser River, and they had not found more than a color of placer gold in all their experience. But they are there yet, and I don't doubt that they will die there, still hunting for gold. spent seven months in the field in 1907, and six months in 1908. I had two things I wanted to do; to make a map of the country, as correct as possible, and to make a geological survey of the strip of land from the coast back to the mountains composing the Arctic Yukon divide.' WEST INDIES LOOK TO U.S.

Not Eager as to the Reciprocal Trade With Canada,

London, Jan. 6. - The Telegraph discussing the prospect of success of reciprocity between the West Indies and Canada, points out that Jamaica at present is unwilling to enter into a system of preferential tariffs maintaining that the United States will probably remain her chief customer. The belief is also prevalent in Jamaica that what is really required to promote increased trade with Canada without endangering the colony's interests with the United States are improved shipping and railway facili-

It is probably in connection with this and the larger question of a general scheme of reciprocal trade relations that Sir Charles Lucas is not on the way to Jamaica.




