#### THE ALASKA CENTRAL MAY BE SOLD

Sovereign Bank Representatives on the Scene Watching Their Interests.

Toronto, Sept. 9.-The Alaska Central Railway, which was responsible in a great degree for the failure of the Sovereign Bank last year, is up for sale, and will fall under the hammer of the auctioneer. on this occasion one of the United States marshals, at Valdez, Alaska, on Oct. 9

When the railway was started it was a pretty pretentious affair. It was the intention to have it extend from Seward to the Tanana River, about 460 miles. About 50 miles north from Seward were put in operation in 1907, and there were about 60 miles under construction, while contracts were let for 185 additional miles. Then the crash came. In May of last year a receiver was appointed for the company at the instance of the bondholders, following a default in interest on the bonds.

The par value of the stock was \$50, of which there was \$30,000,000 authorized, \$27,500,000 preferred, and \$2,500,000 common stock. The amount issued totalled \$5,960,-000, of which \$4,000,000 was common stock. A large part of the bond issue was taken up in Canada by varoius banks and financial institutions, the best being subscribed in the States. The Sovereign Bank was among the heaviest holders of the bonds, or as one interested said: "The railroad was responsible almost wholly for the downfall of the bank, but the bank was not responsible for the downfall of the railway."

The bonds were floated by the president, A. C. Frost, of Chicago, and by Osborne & Fransic, of Toronto. Henry Osborne & Francis, of Toronto. Henry L. Francis treasurer. The other directors all belong to the Western States. What will be realized for the railway there is no knowing. There may not be a bidder at all, or it may go for a song. The Guggenheims, of New York, are at present building a railway to tap the silver mines, but it is said that the two lines are too far apart for an amalgamation to take place.

The Canadian Niagara Power Company exported 221,927,240 units, and generated for home consumption, 5,-

The Electrical Development Company exported 4,680,500 units, and generated for home consumption 85,-515,700 units.

The Ontario Power Company exhome consumption was 44,150,580 Maine and New Brurswick

841,764 units and the home consumption was 3,940 units.

Only one company was licensed to export natural gas during the year. The Provincial Natural Gas and Fuel Company of Ontario exported 387.019.ter this no licenses will be issued allowing exportation of natural gas.



Dr. Hodgetts Sent to Take Charge Sanitary Arrangements.

Two plots in town have been expropriated for dumping purposes, and extra scavenging rigs will be added to the present force.





#### Murphy, of Cubs, Says Umpire Klem Conspired Against His Team.

Chicago, Sept. 10.-Charges that Umpire Klem deliberately acted as conspirator, robbing the Cubs of any reasonable chance of victory at Pittsburg on Tuesday, were presented yesterday in lengthy protest by President Murphy to President Heydler of the National League. Not only did he question the honesty of Klem, but summed up the methods which he alleges are in vogue when Klem presides at a game involving the Cubs. In his letter Murphy says: "Umpire Klem, whose ungovernable temper is known not only to all ball playbut even to most patrons of the National League parks as well, smarting under a cumulative grievance from the baseball season of 1909, deliberately weakened the Chicago club in what is generally regarded as the most crucial series of the season, so that Pittsburg

could win.' Because of Klem's alleged violation of the National League constitution, Murphy has entered formal protest against the game of last Tuesday being awarded to the Pittsburgs and insists that it be replayed when Klem is absent.


