





Already business men in all parts of the country are petitioning the Dominion Government against the measure on the ground that it is unconstitutional. In one case the judges declared that "the regulation of trade and commerce must necessarily exclude the interference of all other bodies that would attempt to intermeddle with the same thing. The power thus given to the Dominion is general, without limitation or restriction, and therefore must include articles of merchandise not only in connection with foreign countries, but that which is internal between differ-

ent provinces of the Dominion." It would seem, therefore, to be not a question of provincial rights, but one of constitutionality. But even if British Columbia were within its rights in passing such legislation, its attempt to set up barriers to inter-provincial trade is manifestly unwise and unpatriotic, particularly at a time when Canadian solidarity is the great task of Canadian statesmanship.

A SUICIDE PACT

Young Polish Woman Crazed Over Old Love Affair.

The suicide pact, according to Mrs. Skora, who is a handsome woman of 21, was the outgrowth of a boy and girl love affair, which had its inception when she and Malski were in school

But Light Rain Caused Low Averages in Some Sections of the West.

Ottawa, July 13.—The conditions of all field crops are good in Ontario, the highest being 94.24 for fall wheat, and the lowest 84.79 for spring wheat. 


