# KILLED ON RAILROAD

Miss Christina Bates Struck by Express Train this Morning

Was Walking to her School When Fatality Occurred—Sad Accident

Miss Christina Bates, the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bates Park street, was killed this morning on the Grand Trunk track about a mile and a half out of the city,

The death is surrounded by the saddest of circumstances. Miss Bates was the teacher of the Bloomfield rublic school which is situated about two miles out of the city and was in the habit of boarding at home, walking to her school in the morning and walking home every evening after four o'clock, when her day's work was completed.

This morning she arose early and left her home on Park street about sight o'clock, hidding a cheery and happy good-bye to her mother. Her school was situated near the Grand Trunk track at Bloomfield and she thus chose the track for her walk every morning.

Early this morning there was a week on the left track on which all of the trains usually come from the west and this morning all of the trains were running on the right track. Miss Bates did not know of the wreck nor the fact that trains were running east and west on the one track. She was in the habit of walking on the right track, where she could see the approaching east hound trains, and this she did this morning. A train from the east came along. She saw it and stepped out and it passed by. This trails was met by a west bound express at the Chatham station and the west bound train proceeded west from Chatham on the right hand track. Persons residing over the river, which is No. 5 Ward, will register at the police station, and persons residing in any other part of the city will register at Harrison Hall before either Judge Bell in his chambers, James Holmes in Major Coogan's of fice, or Judge Dowlis in the Council Chamber. # SCHOOL BOARD **CLOSES YEAR**

Last Meeting of the 1904 Trustees Recognizes Worthy Work by Teachers.

Tributes to Retiring Chairman and Dr. Bray—An Increase to Secretary McNabb.

The schools were kept open 198 days in 1903. McKeough school was open every school day. The Central was closed on three school days.

Wrecked Her as With Winds and Wayne

New York, Jan. 11.—Seven survivors of the ill-fated Norwegian ship Marpesia, which was wrecked at sea on Christmas Day arrived here yesterday on the steamer Trinidad. They had been rescued by the Danish steamer Gallia, which was at hand when the Marpesia was blown into a shapeless mass and the seven men who survived the shock were taken from the sea. They were landed at Bermuda by the Gallia, which was bound from Hamburg for Savannah. The Marpesia salled from New York for Cette, France, on Dec. 9, with a cargo of naphtha and had been out only a day or two when her troubles began. One gale succeeded another, but all were weathered and knocked about, her ventilators carried away at the decks, her hold began to fill and soon the cases of naphtha began to give way under the strain, and in a little while the freed naphtha was floating cases of naphtha began to give way under the strain, and in a little while the freed naphtha was floating around on top of the water in the hold. Gas from the fluid accumulated steadily and by Christmas Day the Marpesia was a loaded bomb, needing only the slightest spark to blow the whole structure to atoms. How the spark reached the highly charged held never will be known, but suddenly there came a terrible report, the forward deck shot up into the air with a crash and a roar and in a moment the entire ship was wrapped in flames. Those of the eighteen men on board who had not been caught in the first hurst threw themselves over the side of the flaming ship into the sea. They were only seven. The Gallia came down to their aid.

# The Simple Life

We are not simple enough to be happy and to render others so. We lack the singleness of heart and the self forgetfulness. We spread joy, as we do consolation, by such methods as to obtain negative results. To console a person what do we do? We set to work to dispute his suffering, persuade him that he is mistaken in thinking himself unhappy. In reality our lan-guage translated into truthful speech would amount to this: "You suffer, my friend? That is strange. You must be mistaken, for I feel nothing." As the only human means of soothing grief is to share it in the heart, how must sufferer feel consoled in this fashion?

To divert our neighbor, make him pass an agreeable hour, we set out in the same way. We invite him to admire our versatility, to laugh at our wit, to frequent our house, to sit at our table. Through it all our desire to shine breaks forth. Sometimes, also, with a patron's prodigality we offer him the beneficence of a public entertainment of our own choosing, unless we ask him to find amusement at our home, as we sometimes do to make up a party at cards, with the arrierepensee of exploiting him to our ow profit. Do you think it the height of pleasure for others to admire us, to admit our superiority and to act as our tools? Is there anything in the world so disgusting as to feel oneself patronized, made recall of, enrolled in a claque? To a me pleasure to others and take it ourselves we have to begin by removing the ego, which is hateful, and then keep it in chains as long as the diversions last. There is no worse kill-joy than the ego. We must be good children, sweet and kind, button our coats over our medals and titles and with our whole heart put our

selves at the disposal of others.

Let us sometimes live—be it only for an hour, and though we must lay all else aside-to make others smile. The sacrifice is only in appearance. No one finds more pleasure for himself than he who knows how, without ostentation, to give himself that he may procure for those around him a moment, of forgetfulness and happiness.

When shall we be so simply and truly men as not to obtrude our per sonal business and distresses upon the people we meet socially? May we not forget for an hour our pretensions, our strife, our distributions into sets and eliques—in short, our "parts"—and become as children once more, to laugh again that good laugh which does so wuch to make the world better?

Here I feel drawn to speak of some thing very particular, and in so doing to offer my well disposed readers an opportunity to go about a splendid business. I want to call their at-tention to several classes of people seldom thought of with reference to

their pleasures. It is understood that a broom serves only to sweep, a watering pot to water plants, a coffee mill to grind coffee, and likewise it is supposed that a nurse is designed only to care for the sick, a professor to teach, a priest to preach, bury and confess, a sentinel to mount guard; and the conclusion is drawn that the people given up to the more serious business of life are dedi-cated to labor, like the ox. Amusement is incompatible with their activities. Pushing this view still further,

we think ourselves warranted in believing that the infirm, the afflicted, the bankrupt, the vanquished in life's battle and all those who carry heavy burdens are in the shade, like the northern slopes of mountains, and that it is so of necessity; whence the conclusion that serious people have no need of pleasure and that to offer it to them would be unseemly, while as to the afflicted, there would be a lack of delicacy in breaking the thread of their sad meditations. It seems therefore to be understood that certain per rious, that we should approach the a serious frame of mind and talk to them only of serious things. So, too, when we visit the sick or unfortunate, we should leave our smiles at the door, compose our face and manner to dolefulness and talk of anything heart rending. Who suspects the work of in-fernal cruelty which is thus accom-plished every day in the world! This

ought not to be. When you find men or women whose lives are lost in hard tasks or in the painful office of seeking out human wretchedness and binding up wounds, remember that they are beings made like you; that they have the same wants; that there are hours when they need pleasure and diversion. You will not turn them aside from their mission by making them laugh occasionally, these people who see so many tears and griefs. On the contrary, you will give them strength to go on the better

with their work.

And when people whom you know are in trial, do not draw a sanitary cor-don round them, as though they had the plague, that you cross only with precautions which recall to them their sad lot. On the contrary, after showing all your sympathy, all your respect, for their grief, comfort them, help them to take up life again, carry them a breath from the out of doors—some-thing, in short, to remind them that their misfortune does not shut them off from the world.

And so extend your sympathy to

those whose work quite absorbs them; who are, so to put it, tied down. The world is full of men and women sacrificed to others, who never have either rest or pleasure and to whom the least rificed to others, who never have either rest or pleasure and to whom the least relaxation, the slightest respite, is a priceless good. And this minimum of comfort could be so easily found for them if only we thought of it. But the broom, you know, is made for sweeping, and it seems as though it could not be fatigued. Let us rid ourselves of this criminal blindness which prevents us from seeing the exhaustion of those who are always in the breach. Relieve the sentinels perishing at their posts; give Sisyphus an hour to breather take for a moment the place of the mother, a slaye to the cares of her house and her children, sacrifice an hour of our sleep for some one worn by long vigils with the sick. Young girl, tired sometimes perhaps of your walk with your governess, take the cook's apron and give her the key to the fields. You will at once make others happy and be happy yourself. We go unconcernedly along beside sur brothers who are bent under burdens we might take upon ourselves for a minute. And this short respite would we might take upon ourselves for a minute. And this short respite would suffice to soothe aches, revive the fiame of joy in many a heart and open up a wide place for brotherliness. How much better would one understand another if he knew how to put himself heartly in that other's place, and how much more pleasure there would be in life!

I have spoken too fully elsewhere of systematizing amusements for the roung to return to it here in detail, but t wish to say in substance what cannot no too often repeated: If you wish

pleasures or leave to chance the task of providing them. You will perhaps say that young people do not like to have their amusements submitted to regulations and that, besides, in our day they are already overspoiled and divert themselves only too much. shall reply, first, that one may sugges ideas, indicate directions, offer opport tunities for amusement, without making any regulations whatever. In the second place, I shall make you see that you deceive yourselves in thinking from amusements that are artificial, enervating and immoral, that blight life instead of making it bloom in splendor, there are very few left today. Abuse, that enemy of legitimate use, has so befouled the world that it is becoming difficult to touch anything but coming difficult to touch anything but what is unclean; whence watchfulness warnings and endless prohibitions. One can hardly stir without encountering something that resembles unhealthy pleasure. Among young people of today, particularly the self respecting, the dearth of amusements causes real suffering. One is not weaned from this enerous wine without discomfort. Imgenerous wine without discomfort. Impossible to prolong this state of affairs without deepening the shadow round the heads of the younger generations. We must come to their aid. Our children are heirs of a joyless world. We bequeath them cares, hard questions, a life heavy with shackles and complexities. Let us at least make an effort to brighten the morning of their days; let us interest ourselves in their sports, find them pleasure grounds. sports, find them pleasure grounds, open to them our hearts and our homes; let us bring the family into our amus ments; let gayety cease to be a com-modity of export; let us call in our sons, whom our gloomy interiors send out into the street, and our daughters, moping in dismal solitude; let us multiply anniversaries, family parties and excursions; let us raise good humor in our homes to the height of an institu-tion; let the schools, too, do their part; let masters and students—schoolboys and college boys—meet together often-er for amusement. It will be so much the better for serious work. There is no such aid to understanding one's professor as to have laughed in his com pany, and, conversely, to be well un-

derstood a pupil must be met elsewhere than in class or examination. And who will furnish the money? What a question! That is exactly the error. Pleasure and money—people take them for the two wings of the same bird! A gross illusion! Pleasure, like all other truly precious things in this world, cannot be bought or sold. If you wish to be amused you must do your part toward it. That is the essential. There is no prohibition against opening your purse, if you can do it and find it desirable, but I assure you it is not indispensable. Pleasure and simulative contentials. simplicity are two old acquaintances Entertain simply, meet your friend imply. If you come from work well done, are as amiable and genuine as possible toward your companions and speak no evil of the absent, your suc-

Before Lady Minto left Canada the details of the resting places of Canadian soldiers in South Africa were given out.

The number of Canadians who fell during the war was 246. Of this number 11 were buried at sea or drowned, and their bodies not recovered, and 5 are buried in England. Whilst it was found that relatives or comrades in arms had already not compared to the compared of the compared o comrades in arms had already pro-vided lasting memorials in 12 cases, 25 graves still remain unidentified, but it is expected that these will be located shortly, and as soon as this is done memorials will be sent from Canada to mark the same.

After deducting these numbers there remained 198 graves to be marked,

remained 198 graves to be marked, and memorials were accordingly despatched to South Africa for this purpose, the last instalment reaching that country in April, 1904. A telegram has now been received from South Africa stating that all memorials for the above graves are now in position over the graves for which they are intended. they are intended.

The accounts of the fund stand at

present as follows: The amount of subscriptions collected plus the interest on the same up to date is about \$13,000. The balance on hand, after paying all claims, is now about \$5,100. Further expenditure will be incurred in fencing in the graves on the open veldt, and the balance will probably be time. probably be diverted to the er probably be diverted to the erection of a central Canadian memorial bear-ing the names of all Canadians who fell during the war, which it is pro-posed to erect later on in Pretoria.

# PREPARE FOR WAR.

London, Jan, 11.—The active pre-parations already reported to have been made, both in Turkey and Bul-London, Jan. 11.—The active preparations already reported to have been made, both in Turkey and Bulgaria, for a possible war this year are fully confirmed by a private letter received in London from a minister accredited to the Balkan courts. This minister, who has just completed a tour of the Balkan capitals, writes that the Turkish and Bulgarian Governments are energetically preparing for eventualities. Large shipments of arms and ammunition have been made and recruits from Asia Minor are arriving at Salonica weekly for service in the Turkish army. The Bulgarian and Greek bands in Macedonia are increasing daily and are fighting, each other and the Turks. This three-cornered guerrilla warfare threatens to assume the bloodiest phase in the spring.

Tarkey to Change Face.

London, Jan. 11.—Discussing the effect of the fall of Port Arthur on the Far Eastern question, the correspondent at Softs of The Times says that belief in Russia's invincibility has received a severe shock, the result of which among the Balkan States, is rather exaggerated fears of Turkish encroachments in Macedonia.

These nervous apprehensions tend to increase Servian efforts at rapprochement with Bulgaria. The effects produced in Constantinople, the correspondent says, are likely to be more serious. Turkey is quick to appreciate the military significance of events in the Far East and is likely to stiffen in her attitude towards the reforming leaders in Manchuria.

Already there are indications that Turkey is preparing severe repressive measures to forestall the apprehended rising in the spring, but there is reason to fear that these measures may hasten rather than avert the outbreak.
